





DON'T BE A QUITTER

Luke 18:1-7. That men ought always to pray, and not to faint; Saying, There was in a city a judge, which feared not God, neither regarded man: And there was a widow in that city; and she came unto him, saying, Avenge me of mine adversary. And he would not for a while: but afterward he said within himself, Though I fear not God, nor regard man; Yet because this widow troubleth me, I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me. And the Lord said, Hear what the unjust judge saith. And shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him, though he bear long with them?

Our text tells us of a judge who didn't fear God neither regarded man. There was a widow who came before him one day, and the Judge pronounced his judgement. The widow asked him to change his mind and he told her no. The next morning she was back and asked him to change his mind. Again he said No. The next and the next, and again and again she came back. The hard judge said listen woman I don't fear God and neither do I regard man No. This widow kept coming until finally he said though I don't fear God, nor regard man; yet because this widow troubleth me I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me.

If this widow would have stopped after about the third trip she would have never got the avengence she thought. She refused to be

He thought he had better get back home, because he lived quite a distance in the country. As he was next morning about 500 feet from his house door. He quit just a little too soon. Friends when you've started to do something for our Lord or our country have you been a quitter? Or have you stuck it out? Our country needs strong people who refuse to quit and most of all God needs strong people who will refuse to quit. Friends for our country's sake and for our Heavenly Father's sake . . . Don't be a Quitter.
