Junior exhibitors supper - Monday night, March 2nd.

F. F. A. Judging and Sr. Breeders Show - Tuesday, March 3rd.

Sale of Junior swine and steers - Wednesday morning, March 4th.

Sale of Senior breeding animals - Wednesday afternoon, March 4th 1:00 P. M.

Balancing U. S. Budget Is Difficult Says The Philosopher

(Editor's Note: The Sweetwater Creek Philosopher on his shinnery farm on Sweetwater Creek must have budgetary problems of his own, his letter this week indicates.)

Dear Editor:
I don't know how President Eisenhower handled his son when he was growing up, but if he handled him like he's suggesting Congress be handled, I take my hat off to him.

As I understand an article I read in a newspaper last night, Ike has drawn up a balanced budget for the next twelve months and has informed Congress if it wants to spend more money than the budget allows, it ought to add enough taxes to cover the extra cost.

This is a splendid idea for families - I don't know about Congress, what Congress does is not always limited to reason on account of the people - but I don't know of anybody who has succeeded in making it work.

Say you have a couple of kids and you draw up a budget, carefully including so many pairs of shoes, so many pairs of pants, so many dresses, coats, jackets, etc., and for the first month or two everything is in balance, until your son comes in with the toes busted out of his shoes at least six weeks before they were supposed to play out.

Maybe Ike could do it, but all the parents I know who say, "Look here son, a new pair of shoes at this stage of the year wasn't included in the budget, if you want another pair you'll have to find the money for them" - well, most parents just can't bring this off.

And it doesn't have to be something as necessary as a pair of shoes. Say your daughter comes in with the announcement she's been nominated as a candidate for class queen and has to have a new fancy dress for the campaign, the average father would be run out of the house if he suggested it wasn't included in the budget and she'll have to find the money herself for the new outfit.

That's the problem Ike is up against with Congress. And the problem Congress is up against isn't that Congress just likes to spend the money, it's just that the people like to have these things.

I guess that's the way it works. In my case, I don't have any trouble balancing my budget on (Continued on Page 8 No. 4)

What The Heck Are We Doing!

It never ceases to amaze me when I listen to some of the local prophets predict the doom of area schools, such as Mobeetie, Allison, Briscoe and Kelton. Perhaps they are predicting the inevitable, but on the other hand, these same prophets of doom should take a closer look at our school system here in Wheeler. Perhaps their song would change.

Anyone who has taken the time and effort to visit our neighboring schools will understand when I say, "What the Heck Are We Doing?" Mobeetie has started construction of a new \$82,700 high school building. They also plan to spend several thousand dollars for equipment and furniture. Briscoe has cleaned up, painted up and remodeled part of their school buildings. Superintendent Robert Taylor is working on plans to rebuild the Briscoe gym and include two class rooms on the front of the building.

At Allison more than \$70,000 was spent during the past year to completely remodel the old school building and build additional class room area. Allison, by far, outclasses Wheeler in conveniences afforded by a new modern structure.

And at Kelton property owners just recently voted a \$37,000 bond to rebuild and remodel their school.

It's a waste of money, some say, and perhaps they are right, but who can put a price tag on education and our children's future?

It appears to me that now is the time for the people of Wheeler to act.

Some will say, "I'm building new schools, but won't that increase taxes." Sure a tax increase will be necessary, but did you know that Wheeler has one of the lowest tax rates in the state? Take for instance the 17 county seat towns in the Panhandle. Thirteen of these towns have a higher tax rate than Wheeler. And of the 42 schools located throughout the Panhandle 34 have higher tax rates.

Surely we aren't going to deprive our youth of one of the few remaining great American heritages... Their EDUCATION.

County Rifle Team Has Regular Weekly Meeting

County 4-H rifle team instructors Gene Mack and Don Earney met Monday evening with 17 county 4-Hers in their weekly practice meet.

The meeting Monday night was the third such meeting held this year to prepare the county rifle enthusiasts for scheduled rifle meets with Pampa, Childress, Canyon and Perryton.

Following the meeting Monday night total scores for the three practice sessions were tabulated. The top 8 boys will be selected from the group. These boys will begin a rigorous training schedule to condition them for the forthcoming meets.

Alternate Method For Figuring Earnings

Self-employed farmers may use an alternate method for figuring their earnings from their farm Harold S. Geldon, District Manager of the local Social Security Administration office, and Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, reminded farm operators today.

Director of Internal Revenue pointed out that self-employed farmers may figure their earnings for social security in several ways.

(1) If your gross income from agricultural self-employment is not more than \$1800, you may count as your net farm earnings either your actual net or 2/3 of your farm gross income;

(2) If your gross farm income is more than \$1800, and your net farm earnings are less than \$1200, you may use either your actual net or \$1200;

(3) If your gross farm income is more than \$1800 and your net farm earnings are \$1200 or more, you must use the actual amount of your net earnings.

Director of Internal Revenue added that use of the option enables farmers with gross income as low as \$600 to obtain social security protection for themselves in their old age and for their survivors in case of death. However, he emphasized that regardless of the way in which you figure your net earnings, you must have net earnings of at least \$400 (from farming alone, or in combination with other self-employment earnings) in order to get social security credit for the year.

In addition to the revised optional method, the law provides social security coverage to some farm owners who received cash or

Judging of all Breeding Cattle will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 P. M. with Milton England, head of the Agriculture Department, Panhandle A & M College of Goodwell, Oklahoma, doing the judging.

The sale will be held on Wednesday, March 4th, at 1:00 P. M. with Colonel Walter Britten of College Station, Texas, Auctioneer. Forty head of bulls from the top herds of this area will consist of consignment cattle for sale.

The Top O' Texas Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be held along with the Breeders Show. A total of 225 hogs and 76 steers are entered in the Junior Show. The Junior sale will be held on Wednesday morning, of the 4th.

There is still a shortage of basic equipment but the band members with their spirit high, take time about practicing on the equipment in order that all of them might be prepared to present themselves at public performances this spring. It is their hope that if they make a creditable effort that the necessary equipment may come about.

The band members are sincere enough in their work that they are meeting one hour before school starts in the morning. Many could not work the band into their tight schedule during school hours and stated they would be willing to meet in the early morning in order that the band might be expanded with other high school students. The response has been excellent and a mature high school band is shaping up for the very near future.

Size of the band has increased to the point that they are short eleven uniforms in addition to the other equipment. But they are confident that if they do their part and prepare to present themselves and represent Wheeler in a creditable manner that they will have the support that has long been given them.

More room was needed at the school for the expanding program, and another storage room was cleared out and put to use for the pupils. MCILHANY TELLS OF PROGRESS IN AUSTIN

(Editor's Note: The following is the first report from State Representative Grainger McIlhany. We hope to have many more in the coming weeks.)

Most of the work in the House of Representatives so far has been done by the committees who must first study all bills before they come up for consideration by the House. However, there are now enough bills approved by committees that we will start having full sessions each day.

The Revenue and Taxation committee has the hardest job in trying to find enough new money to balance the budget. At the present time the state is spending about 65 million dollars more each year than it is collecting in taxes. Since about 92% of the spending of the state is for roads, schools, hospitals, and old age pensions, it is hard to cut many items from the appropriations bill, which places the burden on the tax committee to find new income. Many tax bills have been introduced but the committee plans to study all of them before reporting out any tax bill to the Legislature.

The House Livestock Committee of which I am chairman has been busy since we have been studying 9 bills endorsed by the Texas Animal Health Council to cut down livestock diseases in the state. Eight of these bills have been approved by our committee, and six of them have been passed in the House.

The most important bill of this group allows the stock raiser of an area to create a district for the control of brucellosis or bangs disease. These areas may be set up when 75% of the cattle owners petition the Livestock Sanitary Commission for its establishment.

Wheeler Band To Have Busy Schedule of Activities

Members of the Wheeler Mustang Band are diligently preparing for their coming Spring Activities. First on their list of activities is the trip to Shamrock to participate in the annual St. Patrick's Day celebration and represent Wheeler there. Majorettes are beginning to loosen their finger muscles, Drum Major Kitty Hibler is going over her signals for the band, band members are preparing their individual parts; all planning to represent Wheeler in a fine way.

Next on their agenda is an all day Clinic with Dr. Don W. Morton, head of the Music Department at Tarleton State College in Stephenville. Dr. Morton will bring a member of his staff and they will instruct and help band members with their individual playing problems.

A big day is planned for April 3rd, the date of the Band Festival at Roosevelt, Oklahoma. It is the only one of its kind in the country. It is for smaller schools only, therefore small schools will compete with other small schools. Solos will be entered from Wheeler, and competition in the concert and marching will also have the Mustang Band in participation. Twirlers will also vie for First Division medals. The band will play two numbers on the concert stage and will have to march for a period of three to six minutes in competition.

A concert is planned for this spring, but the date has not been set, but should be announced shortly.

Black Face Play To Be Presented At Allison Tuesday

The Allison P. T. A. is sponsoring a Black Face Play to be held in the school auditorium, Tuesday March 3.

The play will begin at 8:00 P.M. Admission is 25 cents for 6 to 12 year old children and 50 cents for everyone over 12-years of age.

The County Swine Show will be held at the Show Barn, behind the fire station, in Wheeler, Saturday, February 28. Hogs must be in place by 9:30 A.M. The show is open to all 4-H or F. F. A. boys in Wheeler County and the animals will be judged by C. J. VanZandt of Mobeetie. The show is sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club, and Farm Bureau of Wheeler County.

There will be three classes as follows: One Gilt Class, any breed; Heavy Barrows Class, and Light Barrow Class.

The prize money will be as follows: Gilt Class; Champion and first place gilt, \$5.00; 2nd place \$3.00, 3rd place \$2.00 and a dollar for each place thereafter. Heavy and Light Barrow Classes; Grand Champion, \$5.00; Reserve Champion, \$3.00, 1st place Barrows, \$3.00; 2nd place \$2.00 and one dollar each place thereafter. Ribbons will go to the top ten of each class with champion rosettes to each champion in the three classes.

The swine will be released by the Superintendent of the Show, James Verden. All swine must remain in place until officially released in order to receive prize money.

Both boys were thrown clear of the car and neither received any serious injuries. The auto was a total loss.

County 4-H Boy Wins Trip

(Editor's Note: Bob Martin of Wheeler, who recently won an all-expense paid trip to Chicago, tells of his interesting tour in the following article.)

I won this all expense paid trip to Chicago on my 4-H grain marketing record. It is sponsored by the Chicago Board of Trade, Co-operative Extension Service, and National Committee of Boys and Girls Club work.

The trip began when we boarded the train at Liberal, Kansas, at 8:45 p.m. January 11, 1959. We arrived in Chicago at 1:00 p.m. January 12th. Our reservations were at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, which has 3,000 rooms and is 29 stories high.

Tuesday morning, January 13th, all assembled in room 660 on the 6th floor of the Board of Trade Building. This building is 43 stories high. Two boys and their chaperon from 13 states were represented. Mr. T. W. Thompson, Service Director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, presided at the meeting. The welcome was given by Robert C. Liebenow, President of the Chicago Board of Trade.

The Chicago Board of Trade is an Association of Members - at present 1,422. The price of membership has ranged in recent years from \$5,000 to \$10,000. The trading is officially opened by the ringing of a large gong that has been in use for more than 70 years. Before this gong sounds at 9:30 a.m., no trading can be done. Trading ceases at 1:15 p.m. when it booms again. Between these hours, the trading floor is the scene of feverish activity, as there are five to six hundred traders trying to complete their buying and selling transactions.

On each side of the visitor's gallery, several hundred feet of blackboards carry statistical and price information. Board-markers rapidly record each change in commodity future prices as fast as they occur.

The Board of Trade has its own wire room which is best described as a giant "nerve center". The customer's future orders are handled by phone, wire, and letter. Still others by direct contact with a non-member of the board who has been watching the quotations from the room. Morse and teletype instruments click constantly, transmitting a stream of information.

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mation between the main office and its world wide branches. These orders take only minutes to make the round trip.

We heard talks on "Buying Grain at Country Points", and "The Processor and Terminal Concentration of Grain." A tour of the General Mills plant was one of the high lights of the trip to me. The elevators were in operation where they receive the grain to make cereals and flour. The making of different kinds of cereals, cake flour, flour, and cake mixes was watched with great interest.

Wednesday, January 14th, we visited the Observatory Board of Trade and heard a talk on "Future Trading." Trades made in futures fall under the heading of either "hedging" or "speculation." Hedging is a form of insurance to minimize loss due to price changes.

On a guided tour of the trading floor we saw the grain trading pits. A trading pit is a series of steps in an octagonal shape. Different steps in the pit designate different delivery months. About each pit is a raised "pulpit" from which two or more Board of Trade employees call quotation changing of prices that are different from theirs.

"The Role of the Speculator" and "Importance of Future Markets to the Economy" were talks enjoyed during the afternoon.

Mrs. T. W. Thompson discussed the background of the 4-H grain marketing program. It started with four states taking part and now there are 13 states participating. We learned the importance of the 4-H grain marketing program. It helped us to understand the procedure the grain goes through from the time it leaves the farm until it is a finished product.

There was a panel discussion on "How can we stimulate more interest, participation, and cooperation in our County and State 4-H Grain Marketing Programs." Thursday, January 15th, we visited the Museum of Science and Industry. Very interesting to see was a German Submarine that was captured during World War II. Under this Museum of Science there is a coal mine. We were shown how it was tested for poison gas and how the coal was loaded on cars.

I would like to encourage all 4-H boys interested in grain production to keep their records and try to make this trip, as it has been highlight in my life. I feel this award is worth working for as it is an educational pleasure to see how such a big business operates and how we, the producers, fit into this program.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

When it rains faster than water will go into the soil, some of it must run off. Terraces can hold most rains but even they will get too much at times. The only way to avoid serious damage in large rains is to provide a safe place for the water to get away.

Many fields have extra water coming onto them from higher land. If this water cannot be diverted around the field a waterway should be provided that will take it across without damage. Waterways work best if they follow a natural drain. Embankments can be built along the sides to keep the water from spreading over too much land. The strip can be planted to some permanent grass that will hold the soil and make grazing or hay.

Waterways serve as a safety valve for terraces. A lot of expensive repairs could be avoided by giving the water a place to go when the big rains come. It is going to go somewhere and it will not always pick the place you want it to go.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Soil Conservation District will design waterways to care for the acreage draining into them. Cost-sharing for shaping and grassing is available from either the ACP program or the Great Plains Program.
