Several hundred Wheeler basketball fans crowded into the new gym in Wellington Tuesday night and watched Coach Helton's Mustang girls down the Hedley Owls 53 to 46 and win the By-District championship.

Two minutes after the starting whistle blew Wheeler had a comfortable 10 to 1 lead over the Hedley Owls, but as the quarter drew to a close Hedley's aggressive ball playing reduced the lead to a mere 3 points. Final score at the end of the first quarter was Wheeler 14 and Hedley 11.

The second quarter saw the Mustangs blow their lead and drop behind with a one point deficit. At the end of the half Hedley was leading the Mustangs 21 to 20.

# CITIZENSHIP

I come to you in the name of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau, my subject is citizenship. In the beginning the meaning of citizenship was an inhabitant of a city. Born there or moved there, you were a citizen of the city in which you lived. The word now has a much broader meaning. It is applied to any one living in a town, city, county, state or nation and carries with it much more than just living there. Citizenship implies rights and privileges, duties and obligations, love and respect with a willingness to serve, guide, guard and improve. Defend even with your life.

Citizenship and character are inseparable. They go hand in hand and are based on honesty. Honesty has its foundation in the home. Honesty may be influenced by the church, school or association, but it has little chance to bloom and bear good fruit unless it is well anchored in the home. If your parents do not take an active part

in elections then it is more difficult for you to be a good active citizen.

In a republic a good citizen must understand the working of the government and know the character and conduct of our representatives. It is our duty to let them know the portion of their conduct we approve or disapprove. A good citizen must have the confidence of his fellowcitizen. To merit this one must think, act and deal honestly.

A good citizen must obey the law. To disregard or violate a law because we consider it unimportant or necessary is to engender disrespect for law. We glide along the highway at a clip no animal was ever known to go. We can travel the oceans on the surface or beneath the surface. Man in a submarine can stay under water longer than any known air breathing animal ever could. We can travel through the air higher, faster and farther than any bird has ever been known to go, yet we are stalled at living, mixing and mingling with other people. Good citizens should live in harmony.

An intelligent citizenship is the life of a democracy therefore every child should have good educational opportunities. College heads, superintendents of larger schools, members of the state board and the personnel of the educational agency, tell us that the Texas program is inadequate for small schools. The remedy they offer is the destruction of all small schools. The only school that could be made adequate for rural children.

It is now your duty to serve as witness if your testimony is needed to uphold the law and deal justly with an accused person. In three short years you older students will have the privileges and duties of citizenship. You others will follow in rapid succession. As the wheels of time grind steadily onward members of your age group will be serving as soldiers, taxpayers, jurors, peace officers, attorneys, judges, legislators, governors and president of these United States. As a citizen you have done well if you are prepared and willing to serve your country in any capacity in which you are needed.

To you boys I suggest you establish and maintain a home. Without limiting your earning capacity you can serve your community, county, state and nation. If your dealings are fair and just

you will be a guiding light for your own and other children.

To you girls, in my judgment, to bear, train and develop a good citizen is more noble than to be one. Being a good citizen is second to being a mother. There is no substitute for a mother's love and care. Be a mother first then a citizen if time will permit.

We, of the United States, have the best form of government that is known to man. The population is intelligent and well formed. Our government is just as good and sound and will endure as long as the citizenship is prepared and willing to serve with judgment, justice and mercy.

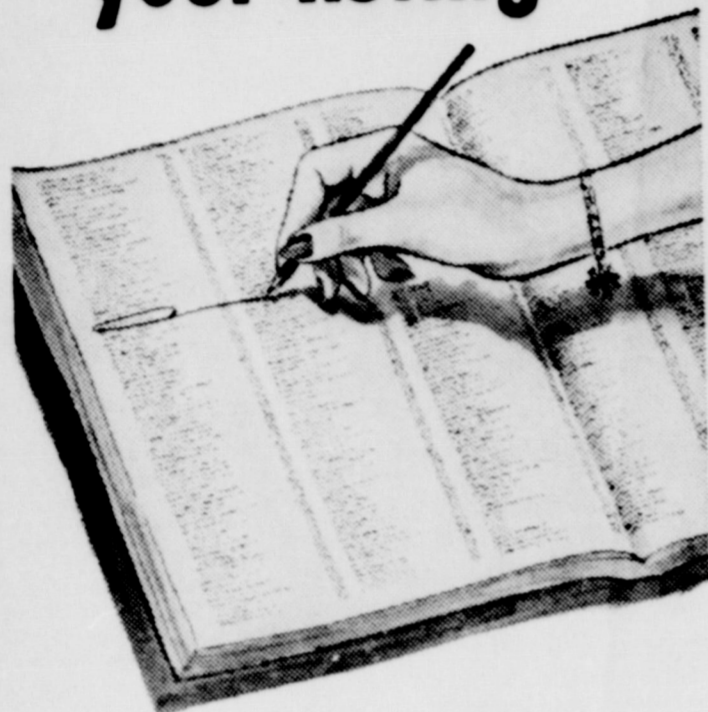

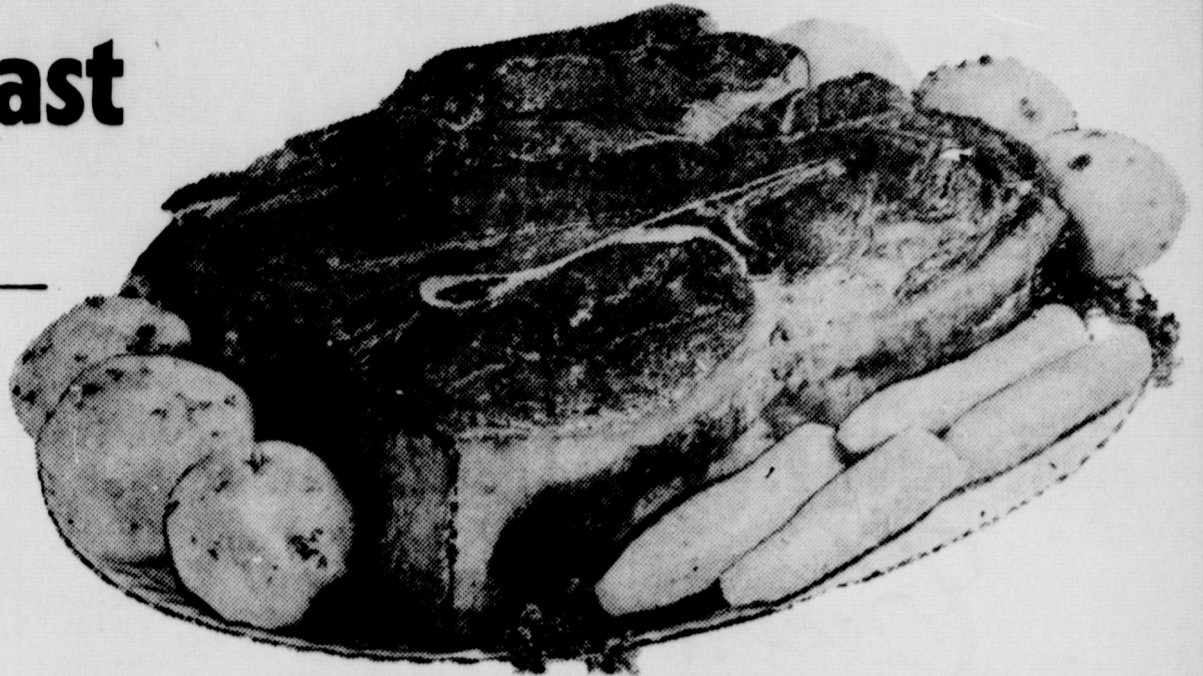

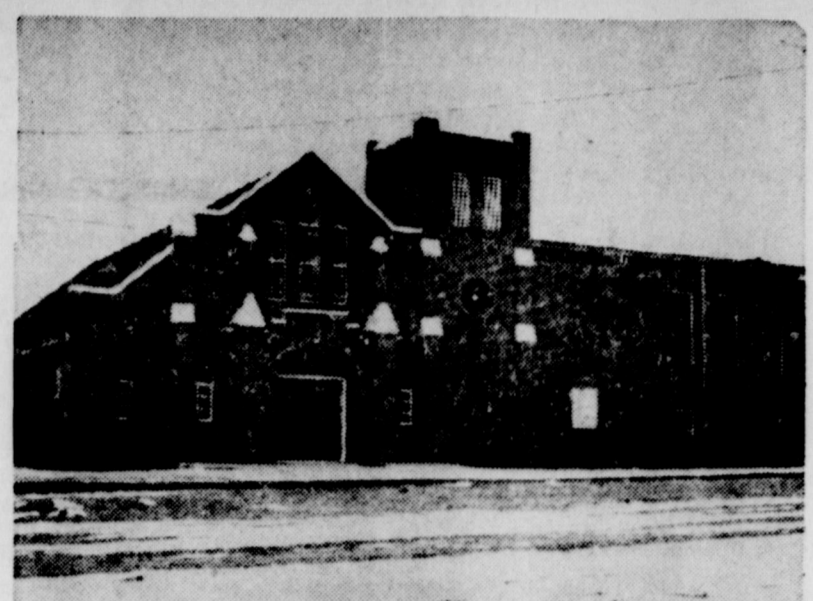

**LIFE'S OPEN DOOR**

Revelation 3:8. "Behold I set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it."

Are there doors in your life which no man can shut? Or do people and circumstances actually have control of all the doors in your life. There are doors which are controlled by people and circumstances in the lives of all of us. Take serious illness for example. That certainly shuts the doors to some things for people. A person trying to regain his health after serious heart trouble will have the doors of many activities shut to him. Life sometimes hems a person in with dramatic suddenness. There are also times when people shut doors. The writer of our scripture had the doors to many things shut to him. He was on the Island of Patmos. A Prison Island to which Rome sent those guilty of gross crimes or professed Christian discipleship. The sea bound him in on every side. Undoubtedly there were many things which he wanted to do that he could not do. Only those who have been separated from loved ones and friends by the sea know of John's loneliness on this island. Circumstances and men have a way of shutting doors which we desire to have open. We do not know when or how and so often we can not see why, but we know it happens.

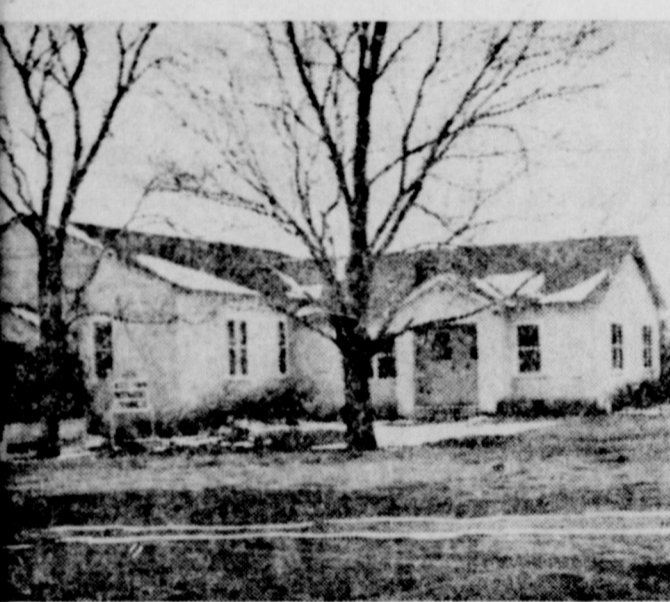

John knew a secret about doors. He did not learn all he knew on Patmos, but undoubtedly that prison experience taught him more. In writing to the seven churches he said (speaking for God) "Behold I set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it." That is to say there are doors open to each one of us which no man can shut if we want them open. Doors which are located in a man's soul. What are these doors? How may we learn of their use? Are they really available to me when men and circumstances have shut the doors upon me? John from his Patmos experience cries, "Yes."

One such door is the door to spiritual growth. Often our minds ponder the questions of sickness, hardship, tragedy, death, suffering and other great burdens which are a part of the common lot of man. The only answer I have found satisfactory is that by allowing circumstances to shut these doors God opens doors to greater discoveries than we would have made otherwise. Have you ever noticed how easy it is to become dissatisfied with material things? How often around Christmas time do you hear people say, "When I was a child we were happy with a few nuts and some fruit, but it is not so anymore. Children do not appreciate the many things they receive." And it might be added, "Grown-ups don't either." We have all known people who are well acquainted with pain who live radiant, worthwhile, helpful lives. While there are others with hardly a toe ache who go bitterly down their selfish little roads. No one can shut the door to spiritual growth except yourself.

Look at the opportunity for spiritual growth John had. The opportunity to forgive. The opportunity to be like his Master, Jesus Christ. The Roman government could put John on Patmos but it could not keep him from being a better man because he was there. Tradition says that later when John was an old man living in Ephesus he would call the church together and say, "Little children. Love one another." He is called the apostle of love. All of the Roman legions could not stop this.

Dr. Daniel Poling's son Clark visited his parents before leaving to go overseas as a chaplain in World War II. He said to them, "When you pray for me do not pray that I will be safe. Pray only that no matter what happens I will be adequate." As his ship found its way across the North Atlantic it was struck by a torpedo and sunk. Clark Poling, a Jewish chaplain, a Roman Catholic chaplain, and another Protestant chaplain gave their life jackets to enlisted men who did not have one and joined hands, and went down with the ship. The prayer was answered. He was adequate for the hour. The door of spiritual growth is God's door. It is always open. No man can shut it.
