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Capital Punishment

Capital punishment is when Uncle taxes you to get the capital to go into business in competition with you, and then taxes whatever profits you may make in order to pay his losses.

Some folks call this New Fairdealism. Others call it Modern Republicanism.

Uncle borrows your savings and promises to pay you so much per cent on his bond. But when his bond falls due, Uncle makes you kick back via his income tax from 20 to 91% of the interest he promised.

Neighbor, no other borrower has that privilege.

SCS To Construct 8 Dams In North Wheeler County

If Easements Can Be Obtained

The Washita River watershed was one of the first in the United States to be approved for upstream flood reduction works. A large part of the Oklahoma portion of the Washita River has already had control measures applied.

The Texas portion of the Wash-

ita includes parts of Roberts, Hemphill and Wheeler counties. Plans have recently been completed for watershed treatment of the Upper Washita. This includes all of the Texas portion and part of Roger Mills County, Oklahoma. In addition to conservation treatment on the farms of the watershed, the plan includes 8 flood water storage structures in Wheeler County. The planned structures include a dam, an emergency spillway, a drawdown tube to empty the detention pool and a drain valve to lower the water level in the sediment pool. The sediment pool will form a lake until it fills with sediment. The structures are designed to provide for 50 years of sediment storage. Flood reduction benefits should normally last considerably longer than 50 years.

Upon completion, the planned structures would create 8 lakes in Wheeler County from 6 to 62 acres in area. The total area of water would be 216 acres. In addition, the structures will provide temporary storage space for 7,776 acre feet of floodwater. This water will be released in a few days at a rate that is in line with the channel capacity below the dam. Farmers have already applied a large part of the needed land treatment on the watershed. The project calls for the local people to furnish easements for rights-of-way for the structures. Federal participation will be limited to construction of the structure including fencing and revegetation.

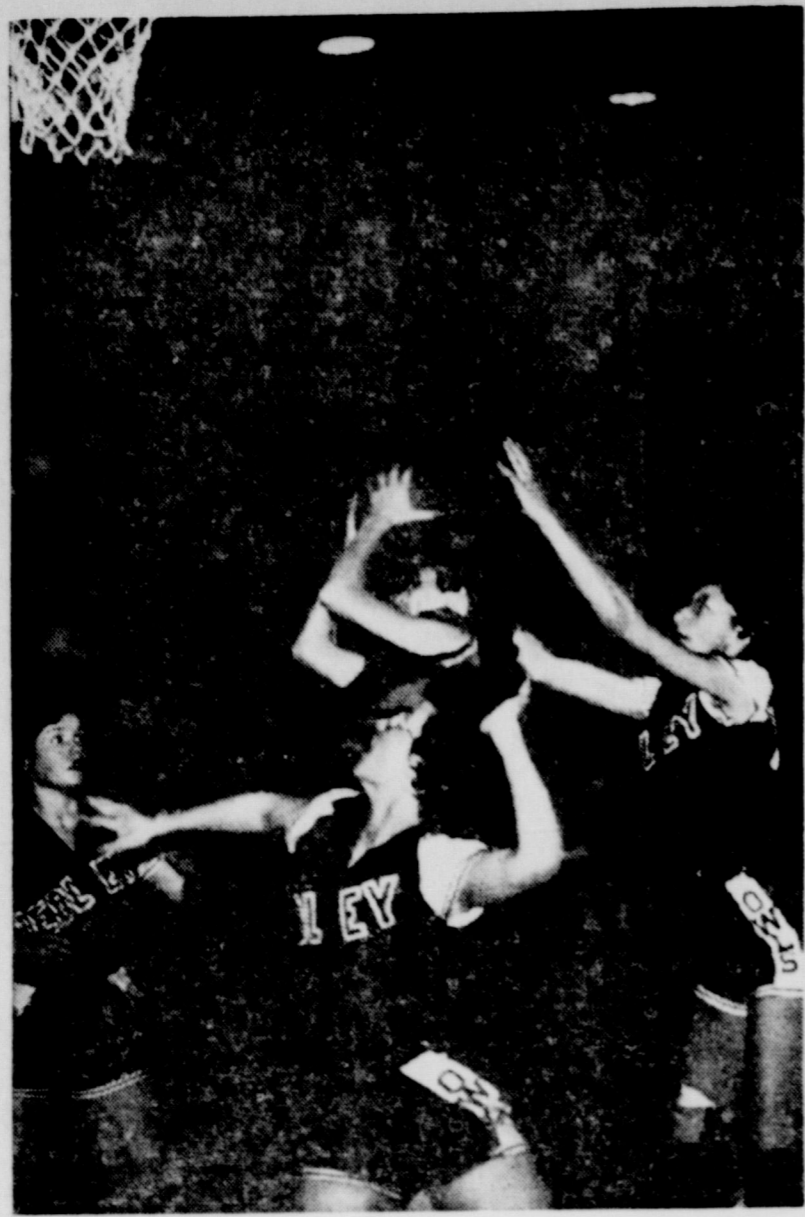

HAVE YOUR CAR Inspected NOW!

Residents of Wheeler County were reminded today that the 1959 deadline for having their motor vehicles inspected is midnight, April 15.

Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, stated today there are 5,329 motor vehicles registered in Wheeler County; of these 22% have been inspected.

Drivers are urged to have their vehicles inspected early to avoid a last minute rush. This time of year is noted for adverse weather conditions which may predominate during the next two and one-half months. As a result the number of inspection days will be cut down since stations cannot inspect vehicles under these adverse conditions.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," said Johnson. "In 1958 approximately five out of every one hundred accidents were caused by a mechanical defect; therefore, owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible."

Rep. Grainger McIlhany Reports From Austin

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of letters from Representative McIlhany, to be published in the Times. All of the bills mentioned in his weekly report are available at the Times office.)

Wheeler, Texas
Dear Don:

I am enclosing a copy of H. J. R. No. 6 which passed the House on Tuesday of this week. This resolution authorizes an amendment to the Constitution in order that the small loan business in Texas can be regulated.

The Attorney General's Department has estimated that Texans are paying out at least 50 million dollars a year in illegal interest payment. Cases have been cited where loan sharks have been charging as much as 600% on loans.

This constitutional amendment will authorize the Legislature to effectively regulate the small business so that these abuses will be stopped. Later on in this session, we will take up enabling legislation which will go into effect if this constitutional amendment is passed by the Senate and is adopted by the people of Texas.

A good deal of time this week has been devoted to the hearing of proposed tax bills by the Revenue and Taxation Committee. Several new tax bills have been introduced and it will probably be several weeks before the Committee is able to work out its tax program and submit it to the members of the House.

I am enclosing a copy of House Bill No. 31 which authorizes the establishment of districts to control the spread of brucellosis among cattle. This bill passed the House last week and is presently being considered by a sub-committee in the Senate.

I will send you some more information next week.

I am enclosing a copy of H. B. No. 29 which passed the House this week and now has gone to the Senate for further consideration.

This bill would set up a twelve man commission to investigate the various branches of our State Executive Department and recommend changes that would promote economy, efficiency, and improved services by the Departments. I think that this is one of the most important bills that we will consider at this session.

There has never been a comprehensive study made of our different departments, and I believe that this Commission can recommend many changes which will cut out duplication of services that will save the State quite a lot of tax dollars.

Our general appropriation bill should be ready for floor consideration on about the 20th of this month. This bill has not yet been completely drawn and it is too early to find out what the total budget will be for the next biennium. Our tax committee is still holding public hearings on proposed tax bills and as yet has not given approval to any specific measure.

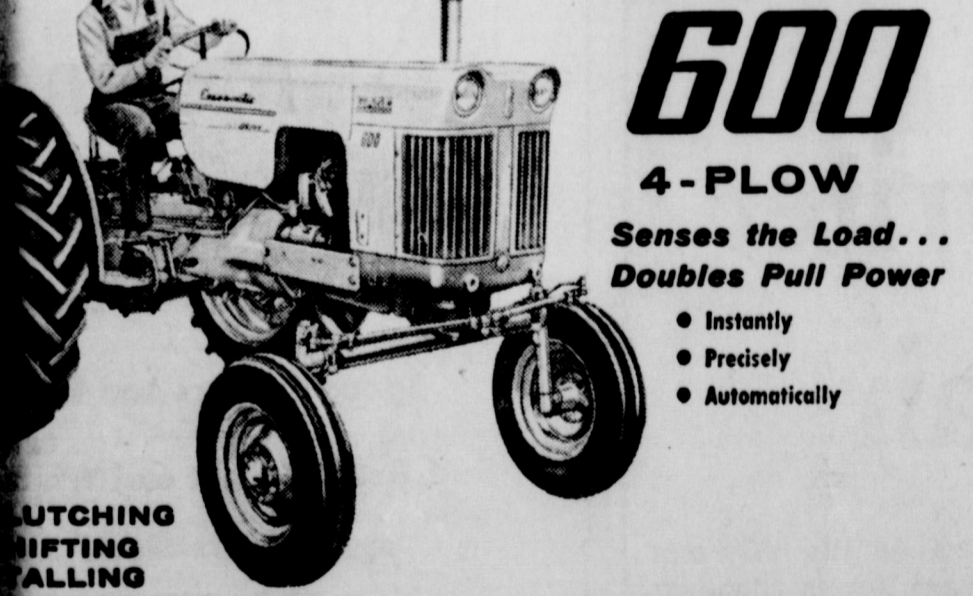
