CORDELL TO HEAD SCHOOLS IN WHEELER

In a special school board meeting recently school officials voted unanimously to accept Arling L. Cordell's application for superintendent of schools in Wheeler.

Cordell will replace Earl Brown who resigned as superintendent of the Wheeler Schools.

Mr. Cordell was graduated from Southeastern State College, Durant, Oklahoma with a B.S. Degree in math and general science. He taught in the Bryan County, Oklahoma school for thirteen years, then became the high school principal of the Colbert, Oklahoma schools for five years, after which he was superintendent for eleven years.

He received his M.S. Degree in public school administration from North Texas State College in Denton, Texas and has since been working toward the Doctors of Education Degree in school administration.

Cordell has a minor field in guidance and counseling, which is quickly becoming a very important part of the public schools of today. He has completed approximately one-half of the requirements for the doctor's degree.

Everyone is invited and the more the merrier. Don't forget the time 3:30 P.M. sharp Sunday, March 29.

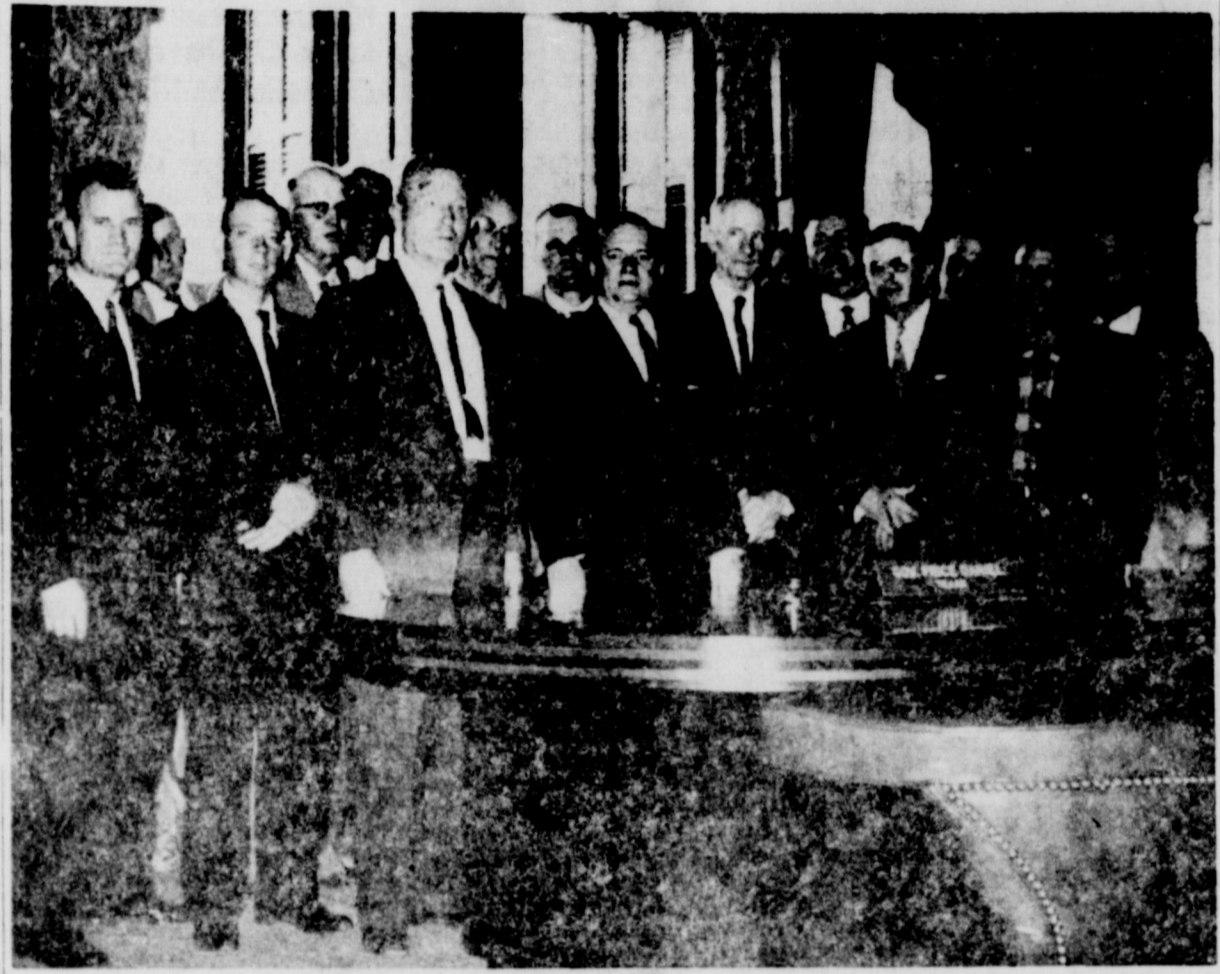

Caswell And Mills Lose Grass

Twitty Mill Damaged By Fire Tuesday

Wheeler volunteer firemen were kept busy again this week as they answered one alarm Monday and two Tuesday. The first alarm was turned in at 3:30 Monday afternoon and firemen rushed to Frank Caswell's farm southeast of Wheeler. The fire had started on the George Williams place and spread onto Caswell. Approximately 75 or 100 acres of grass was lost in this fire.

About 4:15 Tuesday afternoon a fire was reported on the Mills ranch some 20 miles southeast of Wheeler. It was a big one and the 40 to 50 mile-per-hour winds made it spread quickly. Approximately 800 acres of grass land was ravaged before the firemen from Wheeler, Shamrock and Sayre halted the blaze.

Minutes after the firemen were called to the Mills ranch, J. M. Tindall reported that his oil mill at Twitty was on fire. The few remaining firemen in Wheeler

First 100 Watt Civilian Station In U. S.

Tower To Arrive This Week For Translator

O. L. Setliff, construction engineer, for the Farm Bureau Television Translator System in Wheeler County said Tuesday morning the television tower should arrive in Wheeler sometime this week, perhaps Thursday or Friday. However, the Federal Communication Commission has

not issued a permit for the station and it will probably be another 45 days before they do so. The delay in issuing the permit stems from the fact that the station to be constructed in Wheeler County is the first civilian 100 watt Translator Station to be erected in the United States. Setliff is confident they will issue the permit, but like most government offices, the red tape is never ending.

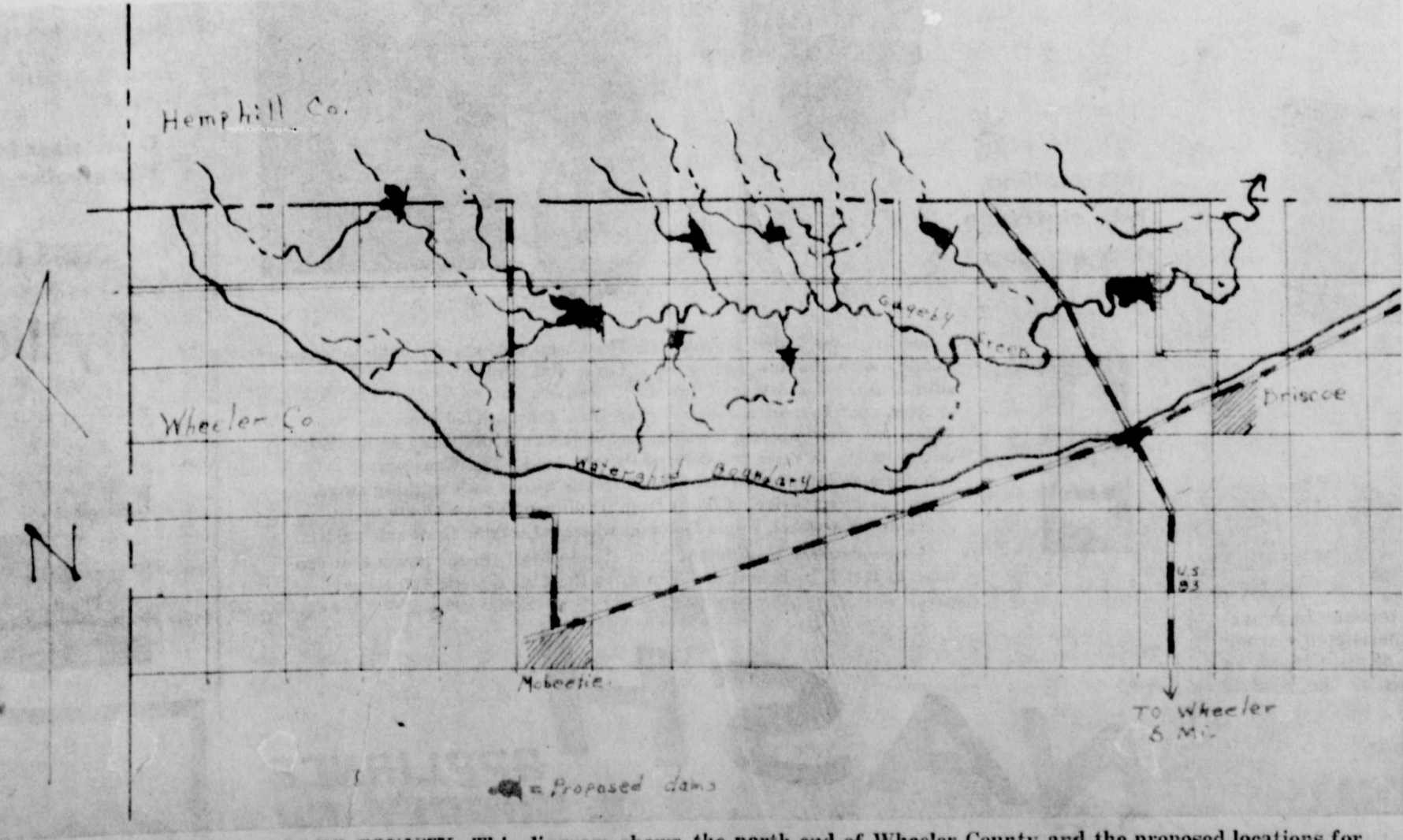
FCC regulations on translators read to the effect that a translator station cannot be constructed until the permit is issued. However FCC will allow us to setup a VHF test and monitoring station. (This simply means that we can begin immediately to setup the test station). "And in all probability be ready to broadcast over the translator within 10 to fifteen days after the permit is issued," Setliff said.

The three 10 ft. anchor holes have already been dug and the power supply is now available at the site. A local machinist is building the anchor plates and concrete workers are ready to build the base and set the anchors. The base of the tower will be set in five feet of concrete. 12 guy wires of 9/32 airplane type cable will support the 150 ft. tower.

"ACCESSORIES"

Are you planning your Easter outfit? Many persons are able to acquire a complete new wardrobe each season but the are many more persons who can only add a new accessory to the basic dress they have.

During the next week we would like to summarize some basic fashion information on accessories. This information is taken from a new bulletin "Accessories Around the Clock" which was written by Extension Clothing Specialists. We would be glad to give women these guides if you will come by the County Home Demonstration Agents office.

This week the accessories discussed are shoes and handbags.

Shoes present temptation to any woman. They dream of a vast shoe wardrobe containing all kinds and colors of shoes. Watch it, girls! Even with modest desires, shoes can take a good percentage of your clothing dollar. Most women need at least four kinds of shoes plus bedroom slippers and galoshes. This includes shoes for:

1. Street, travel or business.
2. Church and afternoon.
3. Parties and after-five.
4. Casual and spectator sports.

The number of pairs of shoes in each category will depend on the woman's activities and how much she has to spend.

These is much exciting news in shoes. Although the pointed toe predominates, the most exciting news comes in the gently rounded toe. In general, toes are tapered but not needle-pointed. There are pumps and T-sandals with a light open look with cut-away sides and vamps. Heels are slender high, oval and mid-high. Patent leather is still a spring and summer favorite. A sensational new crack-resistant finish for patent leather has been developed. This improved leather has a deeper luster and can be washed with soap and water without harmful effect.

Shoes are offered in brocade, embroidered crepe, linen, and satins and other fabrics. A high note is to have a fabric shoe dyed to match the dress or suit.

If you are partying in a basic color, your shoes might provide a dramatic accent to your outfit. For the suit and for casual wear, look for the clean-cut, modified toe and heel.

The handbags which you carry this spring will have a ladylike look. It has been scaled down in size.

The silhouette for handbags will vary from long and slim, both vertical and horizontal, to small and pouchy. There will be soft gathers, contoured corners and a generally flattened silhouette. This does not mean that those wonderful big handbags for travel are not. But even though they have taken on a new appearance of slim flatness, they hold as much as they ever did.

Decoration is held to a minimum. Where it does appear it serves a purpose. Eye-catching treatments are achieved through draping, seaming or folding of the leather.

As always, black, navy blue and brown are well chosen colors for handbags. Along with the basic colors will be found neutrals of bone and beige. For spring and summer many handbag manufacturers are concentrating on such colors as azalea, Paris Pink, avocado and buttercup yellow.

Black patent leather is one of the leading materials for bags. Tanners have developed a new black patent that will neither crack nor scuff. Smooth calf will

low heel. The height and shape of the heel may depend upon the individual, occasion and the costume to be worn. Suede or calf skin are suitable fabrics for the casual or spectator shoe.

It is most important for your health and disposition that your shoes fit accurately. Each time you buy shoes, have your foot measured for both length and width. Don't tell the clerk your size. Let him tell you. Test the shoe by standing and walking in them.

Although the pointed toe continues to predominate, the most exciting news coming in is the oval toe. This shoe is slender thin in profile and gently rounded at the toe.

In general toes are tapered but not needle-pointed. One manufacturer has developed an "ultra-new, squared-off toe." This shoe is a slim streak with the very tip of the toe squared-off.

Pumps and T-sandals with a light open look with cut-away sides and vamps are favorites.

Heels are slender high, oval, and mid-high.

As always for spring and summer, patent is popular. The outlook is for patent as a year round shoe leather. A sensational new crack-resistant finish for patent leather has been developed. This improved leather has a deeper luster and can be washed with soap and water without harmful effect.

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still be very popular. Other materials to be seen this spring and summer are grained calf, silky suede, textured straw, hopsacking and burlap.

1. What kind of Handbag Do You Need?

The bag for your outfit should be suitable for you and the occasion. It should blend in line, color and texture with the costume you wear.

The bulletin, "Accessories Around the Clock", which is available from the county home demonstration agent's office, will tell you the kind of handbag you will need for church, for travel, or for the after-five social.

2. Do You Plan to Buy a Handbag?

Before buying a handbag:

- a. Try it with the costume it will be worn with.
- b. Check the security of the closing.
- c. Is the handbag easily carried?
- d. Is the lining well made and durable?

Handbags of good leather are considered an investment and they are the mark of a well-dressed woman.

The bag with handles is almost a "must" for travel. The handles this spring are slim and less dominant. Look for the secure closure. We find closures unusual and concealed with leather. Slide fastener compartments add to the convenience and safety of the handbag for street and travel wear. A leather lining adds to the original cost, but it also adds to the durability of the bag.

To be smartly dressed for street or travel the material of the handbag should be the same as the shoes or harmonize with them. Select one of the basic colors for this accessory.

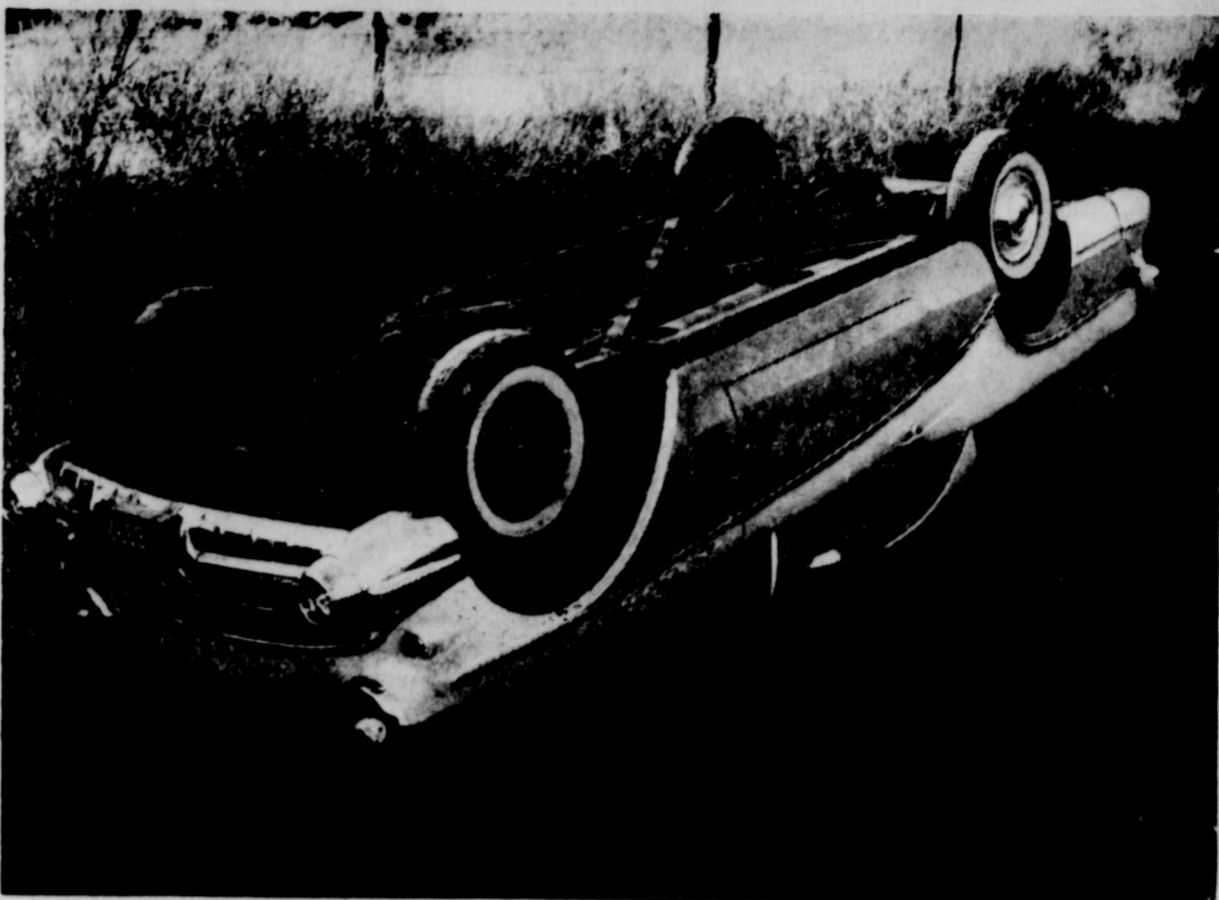

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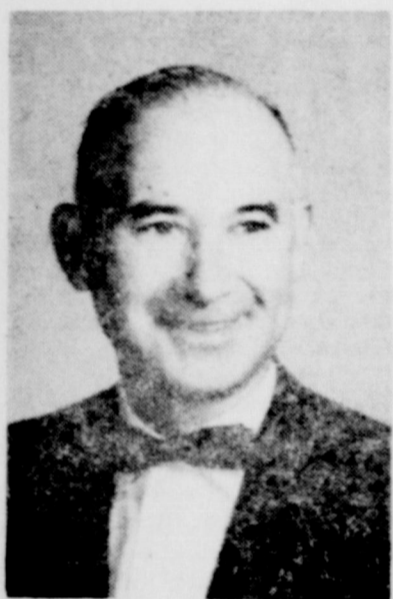

We speak of a "favorable climate" for many things, among them a "favorable climate for industry in Texas". To help bring this about, how about a "favorable climate for education in Texas"?

How much industry would be attracted to a state which had inferior schools? Inferior highways? Inferior hospitals, or the many other services expected in a modern state? Services cost money. The only way to provide money is through taxes.

One of the principal things new industry looks for in a community where it locates is a good school system. The influx of industry, greatly accelerated since World War II, simply compounds the need for public schools which produce youngsters with minds and hand prepared for the larger ideas and opportunities of a smaller world. From a purely selfish standpoint, industry needs good schools.

There is another, more fundamental, aspect to consider. Who are the consumers of goods produced by industry? How much do they spend? Studies show that better educated people earn more

money during their lifetime, and therefore spend more. Education, then, is economic power.

Britain had millions of potential customers in her colonial territories. But they were unable, individually, to buy and incapable of using much of what Britain had to sell. They had little earning power because they had little education.

Nobody likes to pay taxes. After taxes are taken out of a teacher's pay check, there is less left to spend than there is for those who have larger take-home checks. But Texans have for a long time paid lower taxes than many other states. We can still pay more, remain competitive with other states, taxwise, and provide the schools and other services which are needed and wanted by the people.

HAVE YOUR CAR Inspected NOW!

Residents of Wheeler County were reminded today that the 1959 deadline for having their motor vehicles inspected is midnight, April 15.

Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, stated today there are 5,329 motor vehicles registered in Wheeler County; of these 55% have been inspected.

Drivers are urged to have their vehicles inspected early to avoid a last minute rush. This time of year is noted for adverse weather conditions which may predominate during the next few weeks. As a result the number of inspection days will be cut down since stations cannot inspect vehicles under these adverse conditions.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," said Johnson. "In 1958 approximately five out of every one hundred accidents were caused by a mechanical defect; therefore, owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible."

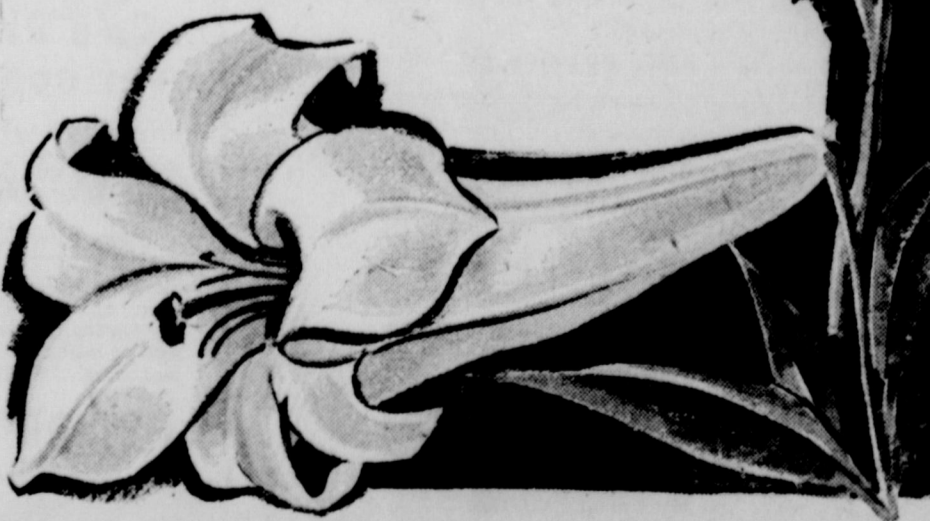

EASTER MEAL IDEAS

By Elizabeth Litsch
Ham is a very popular main dish during the spring time. Most everyone likes ham, but it can be served the same ordinary way until everyone tires of this favorite. We have some sauces that we hope you will serve with the Easter ham.

Here is some basic information on selection, amounts to buy, and storage of hams. Decide whether or not you need a fully cooked ham or a cook-before eating ham is needed. The wrapper will carry this information. A fully cooked ham may be sliced and served cold without further heating or heated through. It will be easy to use a roast meat thermometer to cook your ham. Some hams require a shorter cooking period due to method of processing. Hams that have the bone removed would end any waste problem.

A guide for buying ham is necessary. Usually 1/4 pound per serving of boneless ham and 1/2 pound per serving of bone-in ham, keeping in mind that those with hearty appetites may want more than one serving.

Homemakers usually buy enough ham to be used as the main meat plus enough for sandwiches and casserole dishes on following days.

Cured and smoked ham should be kept in the refrigerator and used soon after purchase. To enjoy ham at the peak of quality and flavor, whole hams should be used within 7 days after purchase, and ham slices within 3 days. Freezer storage is not recommended because rancidity tends to develop more rapidly than it does in meats that have not been cured and smoked.

Roasting ham with a low temperature generally shrink less and are more tender and juicy than those cooked at higher temperatures.

Guide For Roasting Ham
Fresh whole ham will need to be cooked to 185 degrees F. internal doneness. Roasting temperature should be 325 or 350 degrees, allowing 30 to 35 minutes per pound.

Cured whole hams should be cooked at oven temperature of 300 degrees F. for approximately 18 to 20 minutes per pound. Internal doneness will register 160 F. on roast meat thermometer.

SAUCES
Cranberry-Raisin Sauce
Combine in saucepan - 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch and 1/2 teaspoon ground clove.

Gradually stir in - 1 cup cranberry juice cocktail, 1 tablespoon

lemon juice, and 2 tablespoons raisins.

Cook until thick, about 5 to 7 minutes. Yields 1 1/2 cups, serve hot over ham.

Orange Pineapple Sauce
Drain 9 oz. can (1 cup) pineapple tidbits and combine in saucepan - the pineapple juice, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/4 cup water, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/8 teaspoon salt, and 1 tablespoon cornstarch.

Stir and cook on low heat until thick, about 10 minutes.

Peel, section and slice an orange.

Add to sauce and heat - pineapple tidbits and orange bits.

Stir in - 2 drops almond extract.

Serve hot over ham.

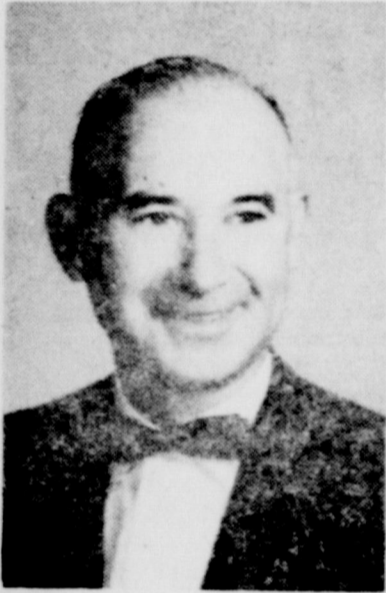

A FAVORABLE CLIMATE IN OUR SCHOOLS

We speak of a "favorable climate" for many things, among them a "favorable climate for industry in Texas". To help bring this about, how about a "favorable climate for education in Texas"?

How much industry would be attracted to a state which had inferior schools? Inferior highways? Inferior hospitals, or the many other services expected in a modern state? Services cost money. The only way to provide money is through taxes.

One of the principal things new industry looks for in a community where it locates is a good school system. The influx of industry, greatly accelerated since World War II, simply compounds the need for public schools which produce youngsters with minds and hand prepared for the larger ideas and opportunities of a smaller world. From a purely selfish standpoint, industry needs good schools.

There is another, more fundamental, aspect to consider. Who are the consumers of goods produced by industry? How much do they spend? Studies show that better educated people earn more

money during their lifetime, and therefore spend more. Education, then, is economic power.

Britain had millions of potential customers in her colonial territories. But they were unable, individually, to buy and incapable of using much of what Britain had to sell. They had little earning power because they had little education.

Nobody likes to pay taxes. After taxes are taken out of a teacher's pay check, there is less left to spend than there is for those who have larger take-home checks. But Texans have for a long time paid lower taxes than many other states. We can still pay more, remain competitive with other states, taxwise, and provide the schools and other services which are needed and wanted by the people.

HAVE YOUR CAR Inspected NOW!

Residents of Wheeler County were reminded today that the 1959 deadline for having their motor vehicles inspected is midnight, April 15.

Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, stated today there are 5,329 motor vehicles registered in Wheeler County; of these 55% have been inspected.

Drivers are urged to have their vehicles inspected early to avoid a last minute rush. This time of year is noted for adverse weather conditions which may predominate during the next few weeks. As a result the number of inspection days will be cut down since stations cannot inspect vehicles under these adverse conditions.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," said Johnson. "In 1958 approximately five out of every one hundred accidents were caused by a mechanical defect; therefore, owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible."

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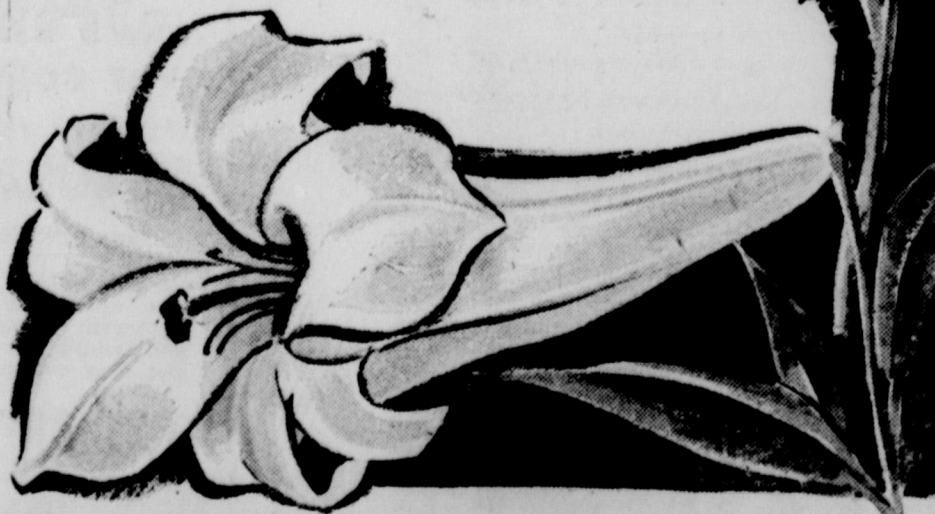

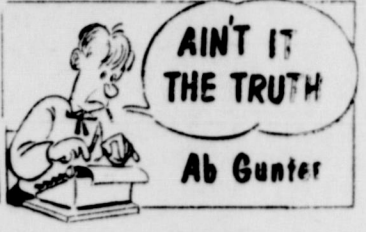

The only difference is that out here it's easier, you don't have to take a cab to the airport, you're not bothered by the roar of a jet engine, your chair here is just as comfortable as the ones they have on those planes, and at the end of the four hours you're at home instead of being 3,000 miles away. You're also saved \$300.

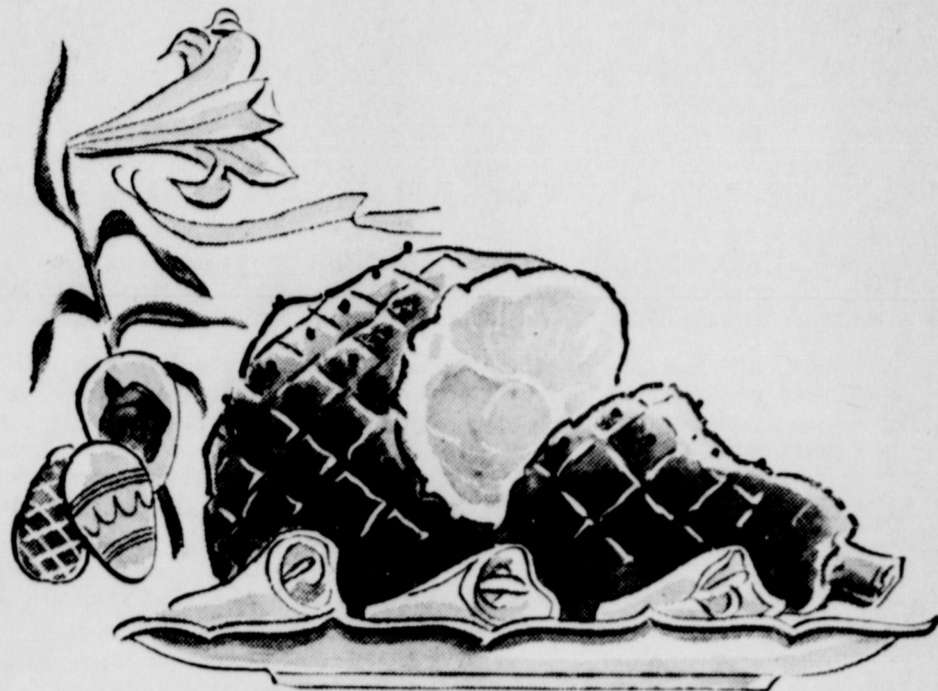

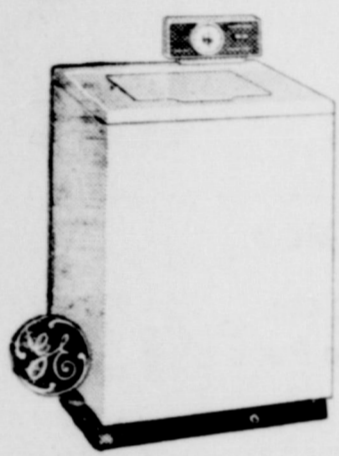

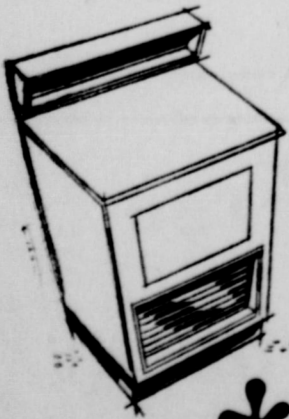
