## How Much Is A Billion?

"The Mangled Math Department is back on duty with 'how big our national budget is', reports Editor W. M. Courtney of THE WYNNE (Ark.) PROGRESS in his (not so) CASUAL CHAT column.

"Load each of 212 big trucks with five tons of dollar bills," he continues "and you've got a billion bucks. Lay those bills end-to-end and they'd circle the earth four times, but we're sending it overseas faster than that.

"The truck caravan is hauling only ONE billion dollars. We are spending ten times that much every year ABOVE what we take in.

"To haul the entire Federal budget for one year in dollar bills would take 16,536 five-ton trucks loaded to capacity.

"On a ton-mile basis, it would take around 1,654 gallons of gasoline to move this load one mile.

"A dollar bill doesn't weigh much, but the Federal budget in dollars would weigh 82,680 tons, or 165,360,000 pounds."

And as long as we are on the subject, we might also quote from an article by Frank L. Remington in a recent issue of ETHYL NEWS, published by the Ethyl Corporation and edited by Richard F. Cook:

"Just how much is a million?"

"Since it takes 1,000 millions to make one billion, don't get the idea that one million must be a measly amount: only three quarters of a million DAYS have passed since Julius Caesar ruled the Roman Empire.

"... Try counting a million one-dollar bills and you'll really appreciate what a huge chunk of cash it is. Tally at the rate of 60 bills a minute for a full eight-hour day, five days a week, it would take almost seven weeks to do the job."

Mr. Remington ask us to bear in mind that a BILLION dollars which comes next on "the astronomical figures tour" is only one-seventieth of the present annual budget and one two-hundred-and-eightieth-part of the national debt.

"How do you reach a billion?" he asks. "Here's one way: Ride on the propeller of an airplane traveling at a speed of 300 mph and you'll go around a billion times - if the propeller spins constantly 24 hours a day, seven days a week, for two whole years."

And if you are not yet dizzy - and a little scared - we might as well give up at this point.

## FORMBY TO SPEAK AT MASONIC MEET

The Wheeler Masonic Lodge will hold its annual brotherhood meeting in the school cafeteria Friday, April 10.

All Masons in the vicinity of Wheeler are cordially invited to attend. The meal will be served at 6:45 p.m. and the program will start at 8:00 p.m.

The principal speaker is Marshall Formby of Plainview. He is the former Chairman of the State Highway Commission, and was born near Como, Hopkins County, and attended the public schools at McAdoo and Spur in Dickens County.

Formby holds a BA degree from Texas Tech and a Master's degree in Journalism from the University of Texas. He attended Baylor University Law School and is a licensed attorney.

Mr. Formby retired as Chairman of the Highway Commission on March 16, 1959. During the six years and one month he served as Commissioner, the state spent \$1,500,000,000 improving the highway system of Texas. Mr. Formby visited every area and practically every county in Texas during his term of office, traveling nearly a half million miles.

Mr. Formby's business career has included publishing newspapers and owning and operating radio stations in West Texas. He was president of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association from 1939 to 1940. He was County Judge of Dickens County from 1937 to 1940 and was State Senator from the old District 30 in the Lubbock area from 1940 to 1945. During part of his Senatorial term, he was a member of the Armed Forces.

He served four years with the Corps of Engineers during World War II.

In 1946 he married the former Miss Sharleen Wellis of Seale, Alabama. They have a daughter, Frances, and a son, David.

He has interest in Radio Station KPAN at Hereford, KFLD at Floydada, KTUE at Tulia, and is owner of KSML at Seminole.

He is 48 years of age, is a Baptist, a Rotarian and a Shriner.

He is a practicing attorney at Plainview and is frequently mentioned as a possible candidate for Governor of Texas in 1960.

## More Than Half

# Land Owners Agree To Sign Easements For Dam Construction

More than half of the landowners involved in the flood prevention project on Gageby Creek have expressed their willingness to give easements for the detention of flood water. This includes the large structures on the main stem of Gageby Creek and the largest of the structures on the tributaries. It is expected that many of these commitments will become written easements within the next few weeks.

A lot of detailed work remains

to be done before the project is ready for construction. Funds for this work are appropriated in a lump sum with Washita River development funds. Money for the coming fiscal year will be allocated about July 1. The report on the Upper Washita, including Gageby Creek, must be submitted soon if it is to be included in the next years work.

Unforeseen delays at this time would not necessarily kill the project. Delays of a few weeks at this stage could, however, postpone operations for a year. Since funds are allotted only once each year, work to be done each year must be designated in advance.

Landowners involved have had many questions concerning this project. The Wheeler Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors or the Soil Conservation Service will be glad to supply answers if at all possible.

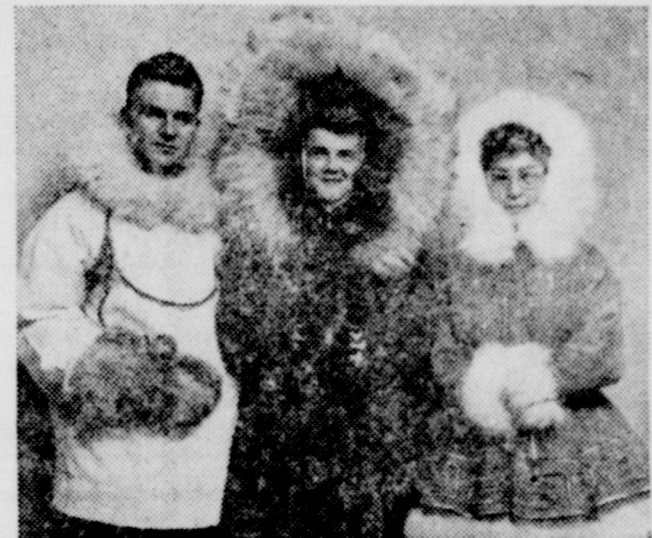
Income tax and bookkeeping service will also be available Rives said.

## ALASKAN MISSIONARIES TO SPEAK AT ASSEMBLY OF GOD CHURCH

An "old-fashioned" revival meeting will begin Sunday, April 5 at the Wheeler Assembly of God Church, according to the pastor Al Montgomery.

During the first service Rev. and Mrs. A. E. Capener, together with an Eskimo girl, will represent their missionary activities among the Eskimo people of Northern Alaska. The Capeners have worked among the Eskimo people in Alaska for the past 14 years, having established the most Western Assembly of God Church in this hemisphere at Nome, Al-

aska and the most northern Assembly in North America on the northern tip of Alaska, known as Point Barrow. The village of Barrow, Alaska on the Arctic ocean and 350 miles north of the Arctic Circle is the largest Eskimo village in the world, with a population of about 1400 Eskimo people. Mary Anne Kittick, a 16 year old Eskimo girl from Barrow, who is traveling with the Capeners had never seen a tree, paved streets or sidewalks and had never ridden in an automobile until in this hemisphere at Nome, Al-

## Workmen Discover Broken Guy Wires

As workmen arrived at the tower site of the Wheeler Community Television System to install the new channel 10 and 7 antennas Monday morning they discovered two broken guy wires on the big 400 ft. tower, according to the owner, Mrs. Lee Guthrie.

"As soon as the guy wires are replaced the two new antennas will be installed," Mrs. Guthrie said.

# Tower Arrives For County Television System

Sixteen 10 ft. section of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau Translator tower arrived in Wheeler Monday afternoon and is being stored in the A-B Farm Supply building until workmen can transfer the equipment to the tower site near Mobeetie.

O. L. Setliff was in Wheeler Tuesday afternoon to inspect the shipment and make arrangements for transportation of the tower to the site.

Originally Setliff had planned to begin work on the tower Monday (of this week). However, a slight delay was necessary to complete last minute detail planning and construction will not begin until Monday or Tuesday of next week.

Setliff indicated again Tuesday that the Federal Communication Commission will probably take another 30 days before they issue the permit to construct the trans-

lator system in Wheeler.

The system in Wheeler County is the first 100-watt civilian station in the nation. Being the first such project, "It will naturally take longer to clear the red tape," Setliff said.

According to FCC regulations the construction of the translator system cannot begin until a permit is issued. Nevertheless, "We can set up a test station and when the permit is issued we can be

in operation within 10 or 15 days," he continued.

The three 10 ft. anchor holes have already been dug and the power supply is now available at the site. A local machinist is building the anchor plates and concrete workers are ready to build the base and set the anchors. The base of the tower will be set in five feet of concrete. 12 guy wires of 9/32 airplane type cable will support the 160 ft. tower.

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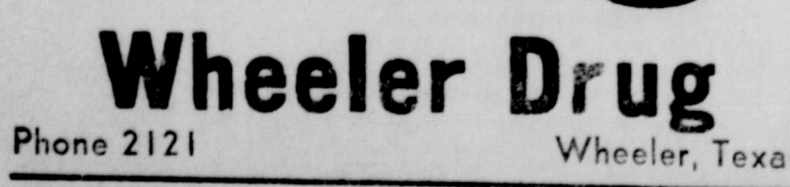

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WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS. Fire is one of the greatest enemies of conservation. District cooperators have worked hard for a number of years to produce the grass we now have in our pastures. One moment of carelessness can destroy many hours of grass planting, proper use, brush control, fencing and other property. We have witnessed all the evils of fire this spring. Fire prevention is a community project. To be effective it will require the participation of every person. Fire fighting is a poor substitute when we have good grass stretching for miles. 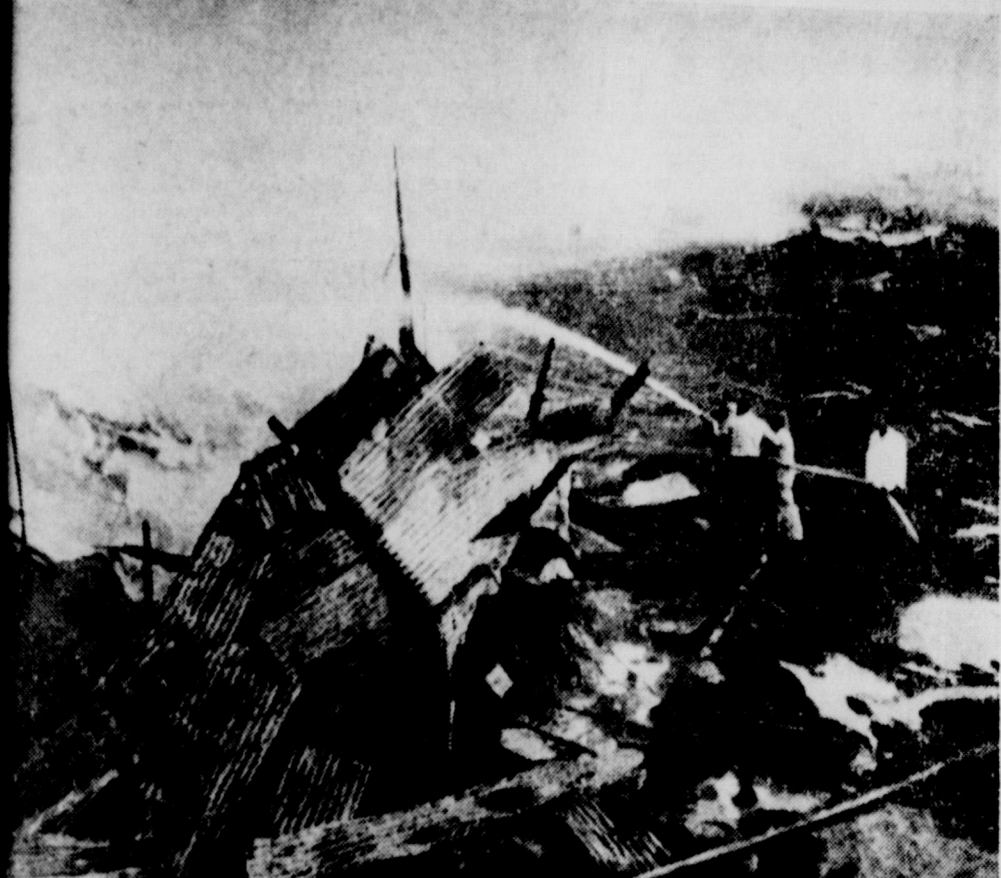

Some childish pranks by local teenagers has cost the business men of Wheeler several dollars in revenue, and given the city of Wheeler a black eye that will take several years to overcome.

Late Friday night 15 or 20 area youth gathered around a little trailer house (located across from the city park) and yelled threats at the two negro occupants. In addition to the threats, the teenagers threw rocks at the trailer and fired a 22 rifle several times in their attempt to "scare" the negro men. And according to the construction boss Bill Wegner, they (the negroes) are both top men and have invaluable experience in the construction of a gunite pool. In fact, "without

these men construction of the pool could easily be delayed for several weeks", Wegner said.

The teenager's "scare" mission was apparently a success. The negroes returned to their homes in Lubbock Saturday and refused to return, unless their trailer house could be moved to a "safer" place. And when no one in Wheeler would agree to let the negroes live on their property, the only alternative was to move to Shamrock.

Consequently Wegner had to move his entire crew to Shamrock.

THE TRUE CHURCH

In any discussion of this subject, we are lead to three natural divisions, viz: What is it? Of whom does it consist? And who are it's officers?

Well, what is it? It is definitely NOT the Kingdom, because: FIRST, the Kingdom is earthly (Ps. 89-3; Lu. 1:31-33); the Church is Heavenly (Phil. 3:20); SECONDLY, the Kingdom was known of and prophesied about throughout the Old Testament (Jer. 33:17-26); the Church was a mystery until the days of St. Paul (Eph. 3:1-11). It was still future in Christ's days on earth (Mt. 16:18).

It is definitely NOT a building, because Jesus told the woman of Sychar that the true worshipper should worship the Father in spirit, not in a designated place (Jn. 4:20-26); the Kingdom is centered at Jerusalem (Ps. 2:6; Isa. 2:2-4).

And of whom is it formed? It is formed of all believers (Mt. 18:20; Jn. 5:24; Ro. 10:9; Col. 1:17-18). It has a foundation and building blocks (Mat. 16:18; 1 Cor. 3:9-11; Eph. 2:19-22; 1 Pe. 2:1-8); hence all, regardless of the denominational name, that meet the requirement of believers form the Church upon Christ as the foundation and themselves as the building blocks.

And who are it's officers? According to Scriptures; they are Pastors, Evangelists, Teachers, Exhorters, Ministers, Deacons, Elders and Bishops. Each has his place. They were not ordained of men but of God. They were not called by congregations but by God. Christ was the head, the Holy Spirit the guide. The Bible defines the qualifications of Bishops and Deacons (1 Tim. 3:2-13). The Elders seemed to have been older persons who, because of their spiritual maturity and experience, were looked up to as leaders and advisors. In 1 Tim. 5:1-2, Paul warns Timothy against rebuking an elder. The Bishops seem to have been elder advisors to whom had been assigned the office of Bishop.
