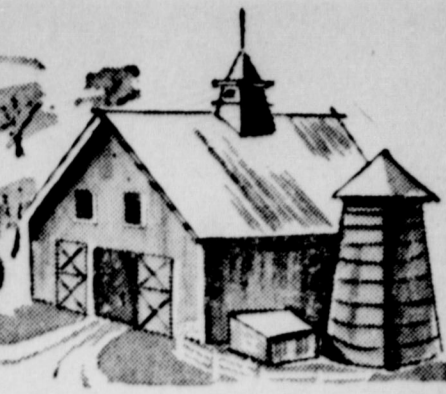

MASONS TO MEET FRIDAY IN WHEELER

All of the necessary preparations have been made for the annual Masonic Brotherhood meeting to be held Friday night in the school cafeteria.

The principal speaker is Marshall Formby of Plainview. He is the former Chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Formby holds a BA degree from Texas Tech and a Masters degree in journalism from the University of Texas. He attended Baylor University Law School and is a licensed attorney.

Mr. Formby retired as Chairman of the Highway Commission on March 16, 1959. During the six years and one month he served as Commissioner, the state spent \$1,300,000,000 improving the highway system of Texas. Mr. Formby visited every area and practically every county in Texas during his term of office, traveling nearly a half million miles.

Mr. Formby's business career has included publishing newspapers and owning and operating radio stations in West Texas. He was president of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association from 1939 to 1940. He was County Judge of Dickens County from 1937 to 1940 and was State Senator from the old District 30 in the Lubbock area from 1940 to 1945. During part of his Senatorial term, he was a member of the Armed Forces.

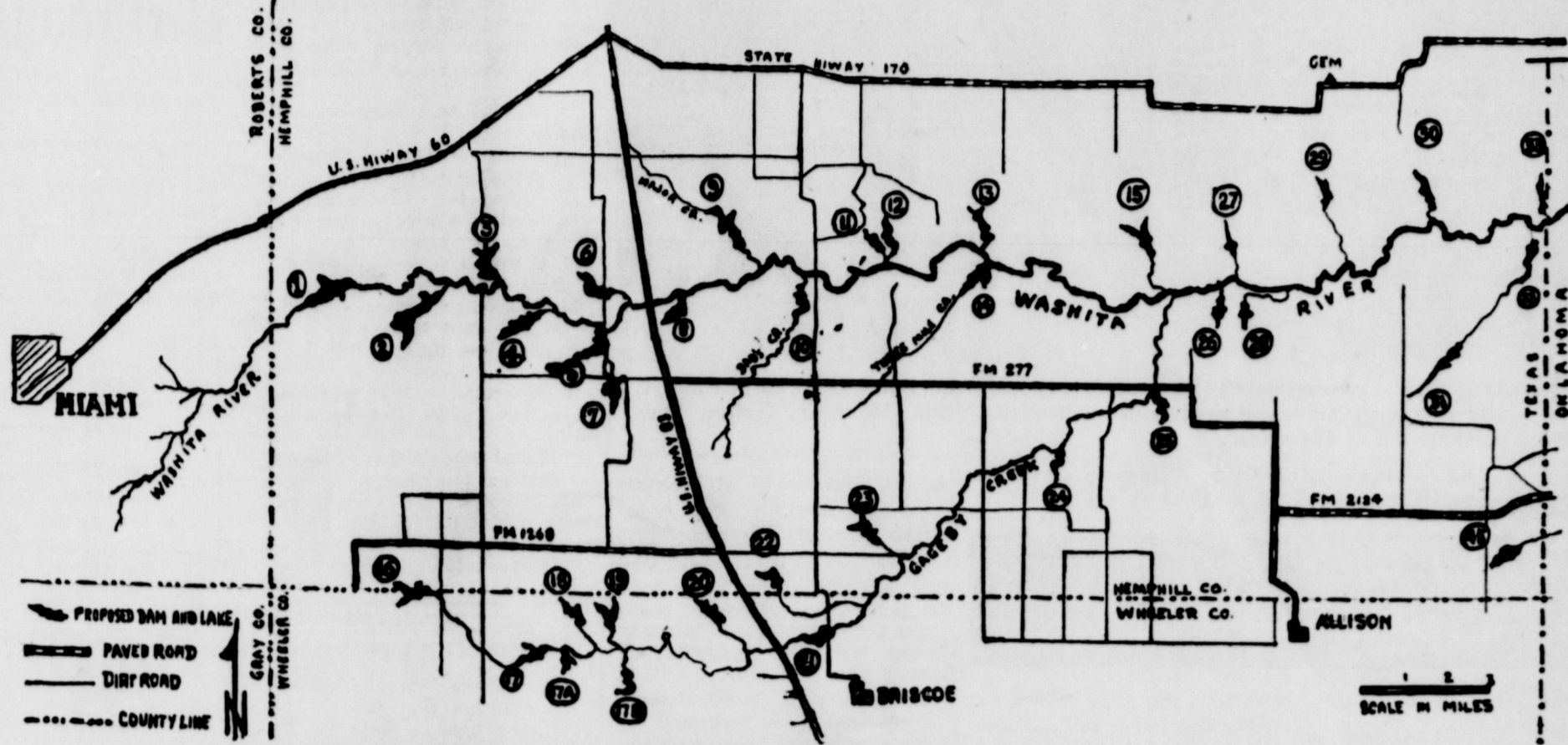
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Collom Fined In Traffic Mishap

Rapid Progress Needed To Assure Dam Construction

Easements Must Be Signed By April 15

Considerable progress has been made in securing the easements for the flood prevention project in Wheeler County according to SCS supervisor George Taylor. Three of the sites are cleared with all easements in. Several other sites lack only one easement. Two sites will require some survey work to determine water lines before further action can be taken.

George Taylor, Harry Wofford, Clifford Walser and Clarence Zybach have done most of the leg work to date. They deserve a lot of credit for the progress that has been made on the easements.

The County Commissioners met with the District Board of Supervisors Tuesday evening to re-

view progress and determine what further action is necessary. The Board is trying to have all easements complete by April 15. Recent rains have delayed the survey work but the Soil Conservation Service still hopes to complete the few hours technical work needed within the next two or three days.

The Washita River watershed was one of the first in the United States to be approved for upstream flood reduction works. A large part of the Oklahoma portion of the Washita River has already had control measures applied according to George Taylor.

The Texas portion of the Washita includes parts of Roberts, Hemphill and Wheeler counties. Plans have recently been completed for watershed treatment of the Upper Washita. This includes

all of the Texas portion and part of Roger Mills County, Oklahoma. In addition to conservation treatment on the farms of the watershed, the plan includes 8 flood water storage structures in Wheeler County. The planned structures include a dam, an emergency spillway, a drawdown tube to empty the detention pool and a drain valve to lower the water level in the sediment pool.

The sediment pool will form a lake until it fills with sediment. The structures are designed to provide for 50 years of sediment storage. Flood reduction benefits should normally last considerably longer than 50 years.

Upon completion, the planned structures would create 8 lakes in Wheeler County from 6 to 62 acres in area. The total area of (Continued on Page 5 No. 3)

TV VIEWERS CAN NOW SEE CHANNEL SEVEN

Another channel has been added to the community television system in Wheeler, according to the owners Corky and Laura Guthrie. A channel seven antenna was mounted atop the big 400 ft tower Monday and almost immediately television viewers began receiving near-perfect reception from the Amarillo station.

The channel 10 antenna was also installed Monday, but high winds and darkness prevented the special technicians from completing the tie-in. The Guthries hope to have channel 10 in operation within the next few days.

With channel 4, Amarillo and Channel 9, Oklahoma City already in operation this provides television viewers with broadcasts (Continued on Page 4 No. 5)

5,000 Bales Of Hay Burned On Batton Farm

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department was called to Cecil Batton farm early last Thursday afternoon to extinguish a grass fire. Fire Chief Bob McNeil said the fire apparently started on the Everett Smith farm and spread to the adjoining property owned by Batton and A. D. Eads.

5,000 bales of hay was burned on the Batton farm in addition to several acres of grass. The tires were burned off of a baler on the A. D. Eads farm.

Furniture Factory Branch May Locate In McLean

The possibility of adding another large industry to McLean loomed this week with the announcement that a furniture manufacturer from California is planning a new plant in this area.

City manager Dan Mize said the owners of Allied Upholstery Manufacturing Company had been contacted, and would consider McLean as a possible location for the new branch.

Mize said the owners, Vincent and Carl Knowski, had planned a branch of their industry in Texas and would make a definite move toward this within the next two or three months.

One of the owners will be in Texas in two weeks and will meet with McLean officials at that time, possibly arriving at some decision concerning the branch site.

The total number of votes cast, according to Crump, was 130.

Arthur M. Smith, an Inkster, Michigan Republican attorney practicing in Detroit, was nominated to succeed Worley as an associate justice.

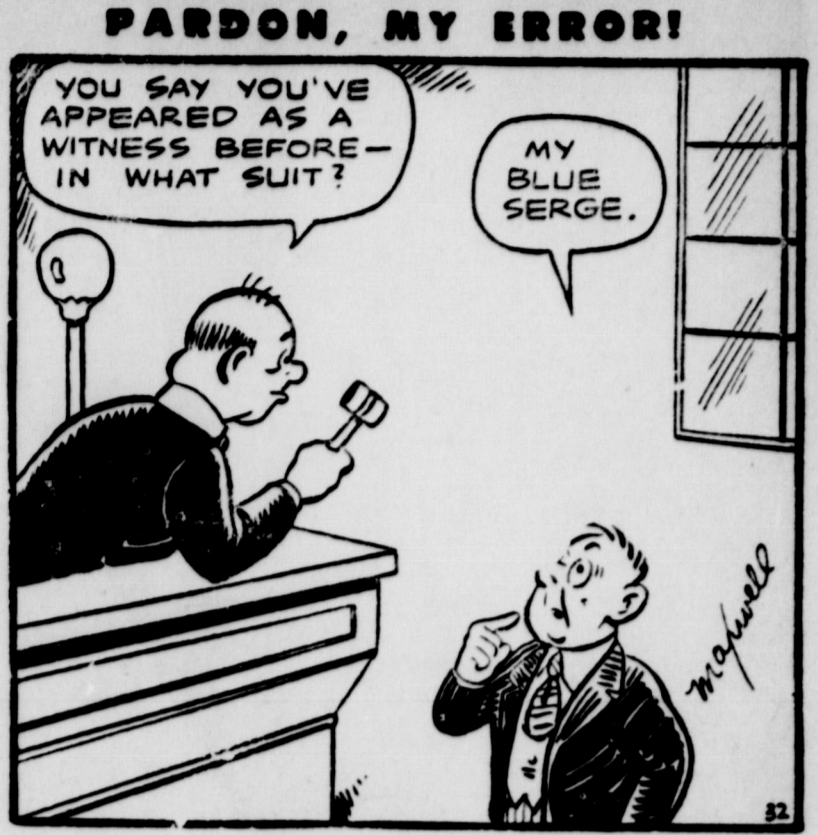

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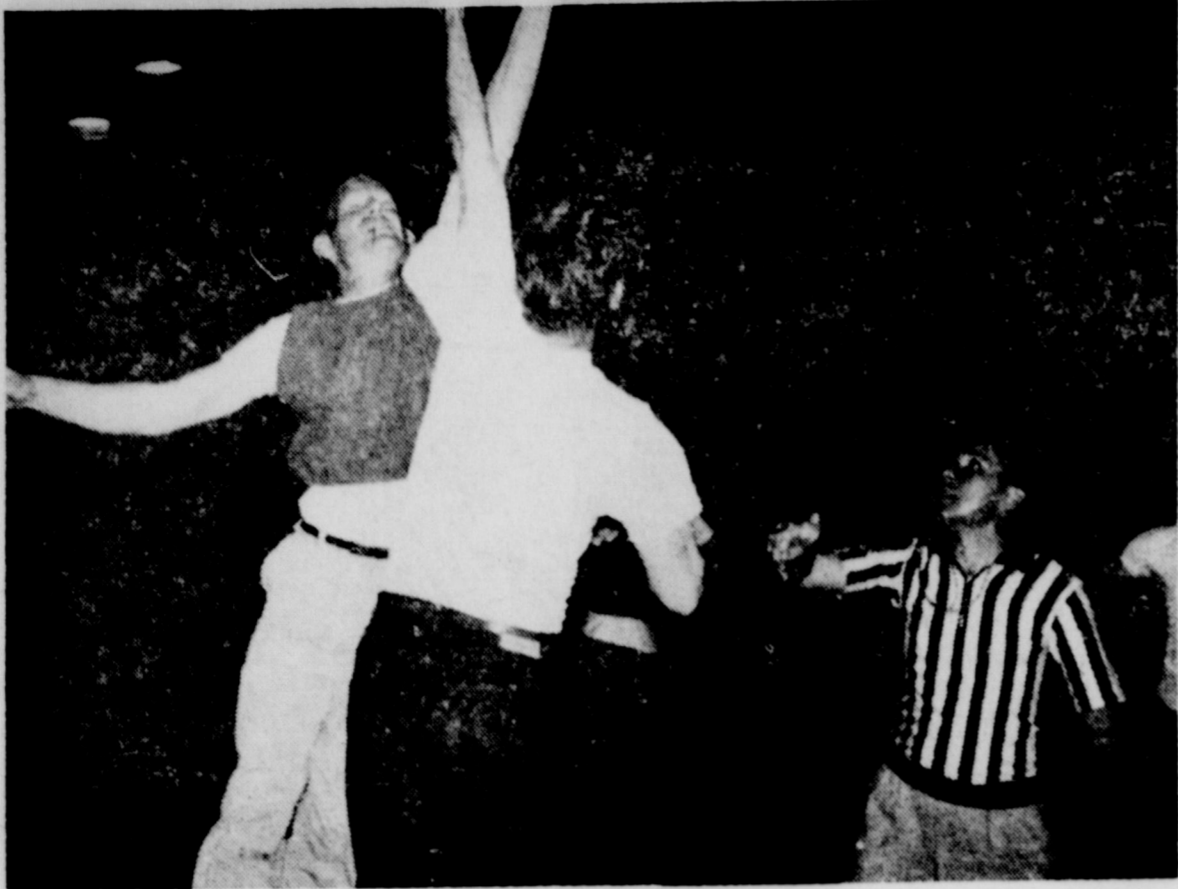

APRIL 14 WILL BE CANCER CONTROL DAY IN WHEELER COUNTY

Beginning at 7:00 P.M., more than 90 volunteers of the Wheeler county unit of the American Cancer Society will knock on every door in its annual Cancer Control Day drive. A minimum quota of \$1125.00 must be raised locally to support community and state cancer control programs as well as to strengthen the national ACS program of research, education and service.

Watson Burgess is County Chairman for the Crusade. Harry Clay of Shamrock is Vice-Chairman. Community Chairmen are: Roy Snyder of Twitty, Bernice Hall of Wheeler, J. R. Lawson of Kellerville, L. R. Reeves of Mobeetie, D. L. Mallin of Allison, and Lee Barry of Briscoe. Headquarters in Shamrock will be Lewis Motor Co. and Hall's Flower Shop in Wheeler.

"The 'C' stands for cancer and control," Mr. Burgess, spokesman of the Cancer Society said today. "Our objective is two-fold - to control and lessen, here and now, the tragic waste of life from cancer; and to conquer the disease, as other diseases have been conquered, for future generations."

"Our C-Day Crusaders will ask you to give all you can to help fight cancer, and they will also give you the facts of America's number two disease killer. The leaflets may one day save your life or the life of someone dear to you. One of the facts is that a periodic health checkup is your best safeguard against cancer, because only in that way can the disease be detected early enough

to give you a fifty-fifty chance." The American Cancer Society Crusade is not just a drive for funds, Watson Burgess, County Chairman of the Wheeler County Unit said today.

"To knock out cancer we will need a 'one-two punch,'" he said. "The number one goal of the Crusade," he explained, "is to save one out of two of those who develop cancer. That is the number who could be saved by broad application of present knowledge and skills instead of one out of three we are now saving."

"The second target of the crusade is for funds urgently needed to step up the society's nation-wide research program which offers a promise of solving the cancer problem. That promise has never been as great as it is today. Until that final goal is reached we must apply every bit of knowledge and skill to saving lives today."

"At least 2500 life-saving leaflets will be given away in our house-to-house canvas here," Mr. Burgess said. "They will also be available at American Cancer Society information booths. The leaflets are designed to save lives that might otherwise be lost to America's number two disease killer by alerting those who receive them to the dangers of neglect and delay."

Mr. Burgess explained that the Society's slogan this year is "Guard Your Family - Fight Cancer With A Checkup And A Check."

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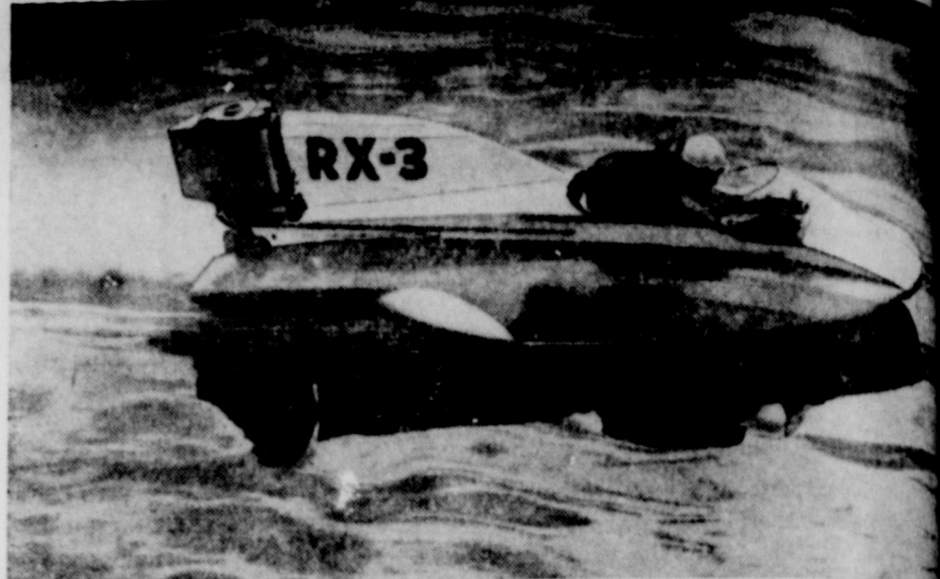

SEATTLE, WASH. — Skimming across the one kilometer course on Lake Washington here, a specially designed boat powered by a production 60 horsepower Mercury set a new world's speed record for outboards of 107.8 miles per hour. This is the highest speed ever achieved by an outboard-powered boat, and brought the world mark to the United States for the first time since 1927.

Seattle's Hugh Entrop was at the wheel of the highly streamlined craft as it captured the Union of International Motorboating (UIM) Class X Outboard Hydro world mark. Entrop became the first American ever to exceed 100 miles per hour in an outboard. He also broke the old record of 100.3 miles per hour, set in 1956 by Italian Massimo Leto Di Priolo on Idroscalo Lake outside of Milan, Italy. Di Priolo's boat, however, was powered by a specially 4 cycle Leso engine in comparison with Entrop's 59.6 cubic inch 60 horsepower 6 cylinder Mercury. Fastest American time before Entrop was 78.121 miles per hour by Clint Ferguson of Boston in 1938.

Mercury's Mark 75H powered a craft Entrop built from an early design of Ted Jones. It is the competition version of the six-cylinder-

in-line outboard which was introduced years ago by the Kiekhaefer company, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. Only it set a new endurance record when family models each completed a continuous run in 68 days at an average of 30.3 miles per hour as certified by the Auto Club.

Entrop's record performance came months of effort. The craft was built at 109.120 miles per hour and then came back over the course of 106.522 for its record average. Observed and timed by the American Boat Association, the new international is subject to UIM official certification world sanctioning organization in the field.

Commenting on the record, Ted Mercury president Carl Kiekhaefer said that information gained by this engine "would aid in future design of more recreational craft for the higher speeds which are inevitable in the near future." He stated that the high speed of the engine confirm design solutions to problems that had not been possible to check at

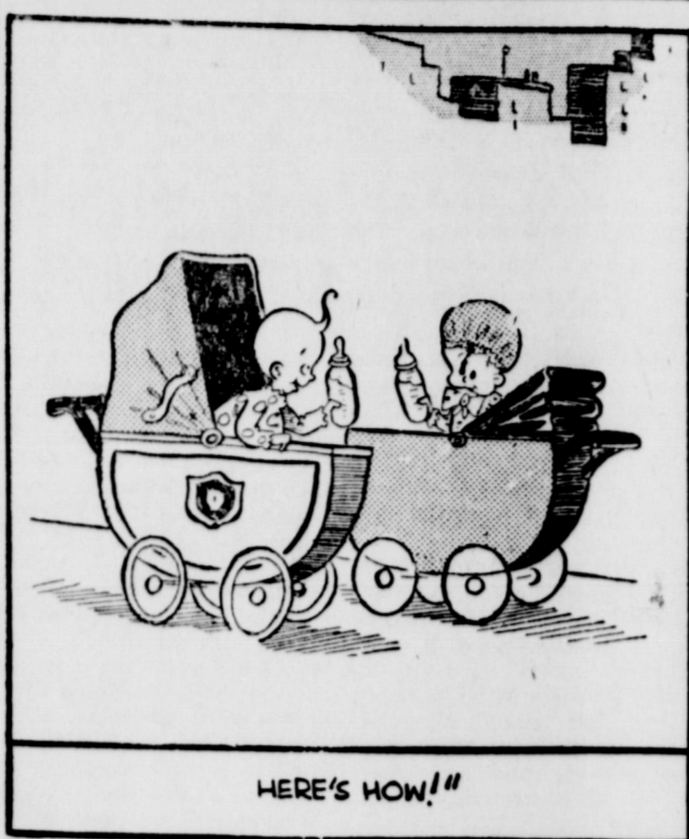

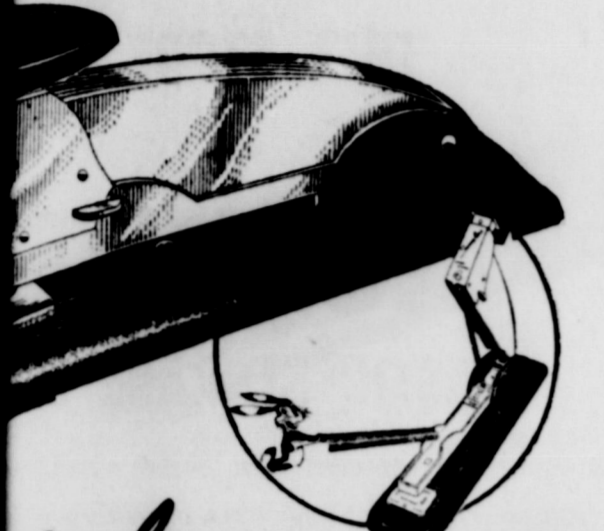

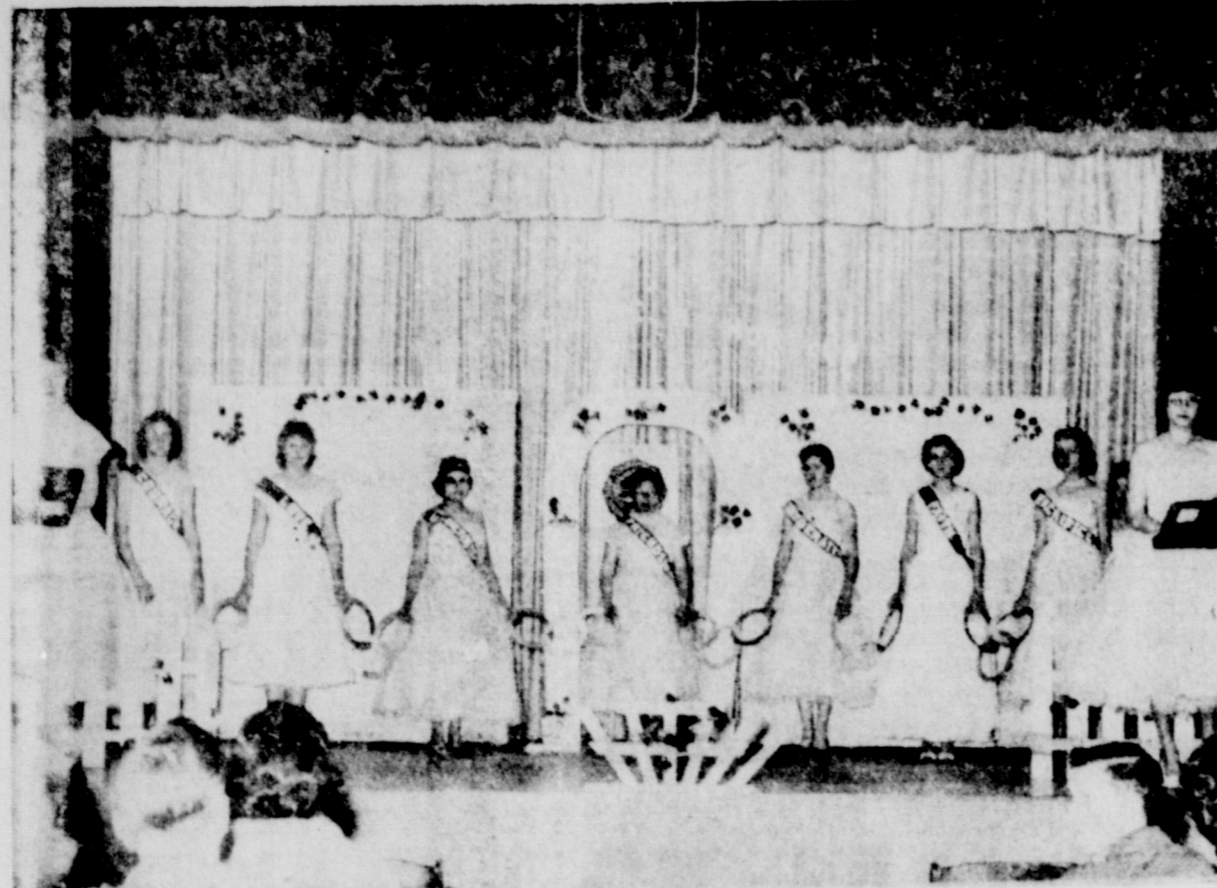

Number One

For members to "pass it or kill it." No more playing the waiting game. Less juggling of the parliamentary ball.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr gave this "get with it" mood a strong shove by taking a firm stand on tax goals. "There is no Santa Claus," Carr told House members. Texas must raise \$300,000,000 in new money to meet its obligations, he said. On "how to do it," the Speaker made these suggestions and observations:

1. A bill is needed "which will include a broad array of selective taxes - including, but not confined to - selective sales taxes."
2. A general sales tax is "out." Lawmakers will - and should - keep their promises not to pass it.
3. "Broad" taxation would include upping levies in areas suggested by the governor - natural gas, liquor, cigarettes, corporations - but at a lower rate than suggested by the governor. In addition, many new items would be added, in keeping with the "spread thin, hurt little" principle.
4. "Piece-meal taxation" is unfair, inadequate to the present challenge. State government should not "reward political favorites." New taxes should be "spread across as much of the Texas economy as possible."
5. Likewise on appropriations. If college professors and state employees get a raise, public school teachers should, too.

Carr's speech was regarded as a public announcement that he is taking the reins of leadership to get a tax program passed.

Gov. Price Daniel's comment on Carr's statement was in the vein of "why didn't you say so before?" Daniel said, "I am in agreement with much of it and only wish it had been made 30 days earlier."

House Taxation Committee Chairman V. L. Ramsey of Beckville named a five-man committee to write a tax bill and have it ready early next week.

Kelton Teacher Receives Science Institute Appointment

William W. Wheeler, math and science teacher at Kelton High School is among 43 winners of appointments to the National Science Foundation Summer Institute at West Texas State College according to Dr. W. D. Compton, institute director. The winners are all high school mathematics or science teachers from throughout west Texas.

Winners will attend the institute for 12 weeks, opening June 2 and continuing throughout WT's regular summer term, which closes August 21. Each will receive a weekly stipend of \$75, plus an allowance of \$15 a week for each dependent.

The institute's program will include classroom and laboratory work, field trips, and lectures by visiting scientists, and includes work in chemistry and physics and mathematics. Work during the first and second terms in mathematics includes "Survey of Modern Mathematics" and "Basic Principles of Electronic Computers."

Offerings in chemistry for both terms include "Principles of Chemistry for Teachers" and "Topics in Chemistry for Teachers." The work in physics is titled "Fundamental Physical Concepts."

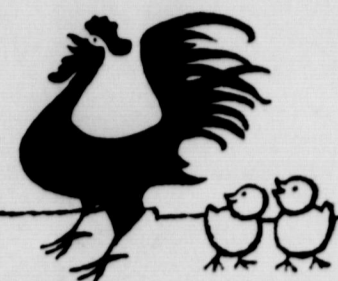
