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Easements Signed; Dams To Be Constructed In Wheeler County

Commissioners Court Agree To Maintain County Structures

Five million dollar flood control project in area is nearing reality. A gigantic five million dollar flood control and water conservation project on the Upper Washita River watershed in Texas and Oklahoma is nearing reality.

The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County and the Board of Supervisors of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District have signed the joint agreement for maintenance and operation of flood prevention structures on the Upper Washita Watershed, according to SCS supervisor George Taylor. These agreements have been sent to the Soil Conservation Service to be considered in the next budget for construction.

A major effort was made during the past few days to complete sign-up of easements for thirty-seven dam sites in Hemphill and Wheeler counties before April 15, so that actual construction on the project could be started during the next fiscal year.

Plans call for construction of 37 major dams in the two Texas counties; and twenty-four more along the upper Washita in western Oklahoma. Part of the Oklahoma project has already been accomplished.

Several tributaries to the Washita in Oklahoma are in the process of construction. The amount of money allotted to the upper portion will depend on the overall appropriation and the immediate needs on other tributaries.

Two of the planned structures in Wheeler County will be delayed until other dams above them are completed. The amount of conservation applied to the contributing watershed above the dams will be a large factor in determining priorities of construction. Landowners above a structure can help speed up work on any dam by working with their conservation district to apply as much conservation to the land above the dam as is possible. The useful life of each structure can be greatly extended by control of erosion on the contributing watershed area.

There are a few more jobs to be done by the local people before construction can begin. These jobs do not have the immediate deadline as was faced in completing the maintenance and operation agreement. All but two of the Wheeler County dams have a large part of their watershed in Hemphill County. This will require close cooperation between the two soil conservation districts to get the work applied in an orderly manner.

The earth-fill dams, when completed, will impound lakes covering at permanent capacity, about 17 acres in the case of the smallest (No. 6 on the Johnnie Young ranch in Hemphill County) to about 62 acres in the largest (No. 21 on the Finsterwald ranch in Wheeler County).

Average size of the lakes at permanent (draw-down) stage will be about 30 acres; although all of them are designed to hold considerably more water at flood times.

Plans call for building the structures over a five-year period. Six of the dams in the Texas area are to be built during the first year. They are Nos. 1 and 2 on the upper Washita (on Wallace Locke and French Arrington ranches) and Nos. 16, 17, 17-A and 17-B on the upper Gageby.

The second year construction schedule calls for building of dams Nos. 3-4-5 and 6 on the Washita, and Nos. 18-19-20 and 21 on the Gageby.

Third year construction will include Nos. 7-8-9 and 10 on the upper Washita; and Nos. 22-23-24 and 25 on the Gageby.

Fourth year plans call for building of dams Nos. 11-12-13-14 and 15 and 26-27 and 28, all on the Washita.

Last dams to be built (in the fifth year of the program) will be Nos. 29-30-31-32-33 and 45.

The project will control floodwaters affecting more than 471,000 acres in Texas and western Oklahoma . . . 301,440 acres in the three Texas counties, and (Continued on Page 4 No. 5)

Formby Tells Masons Berlin Crisis Serious

The Berlin crisis is serious and the people of the free world should be greatly concerned. Somebody is going to have to back down and what happens on May 27 may determine whether Russia will start acting like a civilized nation or whether we will have a Third World War. This is in summary of what Marshall Formby, Plainview attorney and former Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, told his audience at a meeting of the Wheeler Masonic Lodge Friday night.

Formby was in Germany during World War II where he made a thorough visit in Berlin, Bonn and Frankfurt four years ago with a group of radio and newspaper editors from the United States.

Formby pointed out Khrushchev

continues to say that Russia is going to withdraw its troops from Berlin and is demanding that England, France and the United States withdraw their troops from the city. The speaker said that if this happens, the Communists will eventually, and maybe soon, take over the entire city of Berlin, and this could be the beginning of the taking over of all Germany by the Communist Party.

"It is impossible to make a free city out of Berlin, as Khrushchev demands," Formby said, "because the Eastern part of Berlin is already incorporated into the Eastern Zone of Germany, which is Communist and run by orders given by Moscow. It is unfortunate that the city of Berlin is located in the Russian Zone, which means that cars and trucks and

trains all have to pass through the Russian Zone to carry food supplies into the city of Berlin. In 1948, when the Russians stopped trains and trucks from carrying foodstuffs, the United States, with its famous airlift, supplied Berlin with food. This made the United States many friends in Berlin, Germany and Eastern Europe."

The Plainview attorney said that he wished that every person who flirts with Communism could go to Berlin and see the difference between East Berlin and West Berlin. He said that the Eastern part of Berlin, run by the Communists, is in a sad condition. People are largely unemployed, wages are low, nothing is being rebuilt, inflation is running wild, and the people have a look of failure on their faces. Just across the street, over in the Western Sector operated by the British, French and Americans, the people have a democratic form of government and there is prosperity. The streets are full of cars, there are plenty of goods in the store windows, churches, apartment houses, department stores and hotels are being rebuilt or new ones are being constructed. The people look happy and prosperous. In this one city, it is very easy to see the difference in people who are ruled by Communism and those who rule themselves.

"I am usually an optimist," Formby said, "and certainly I am not an alarmist, but I am concerned over the Berlin crisis. I do not think America can back down from the Communists at all. If we withdraw from Berlin and let the Communists take over the entire city and eventually Western Germany also, we will have lost everything in Western Europe. Let us hope that the prayers of the Christian people of the world will be answered and that some way there will be found a way to settle the Berlin situation without a war."

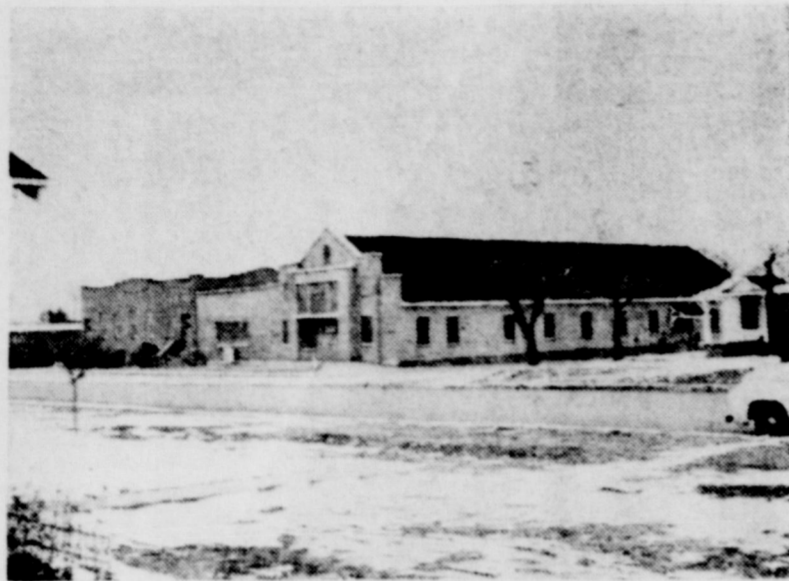

RELIGION

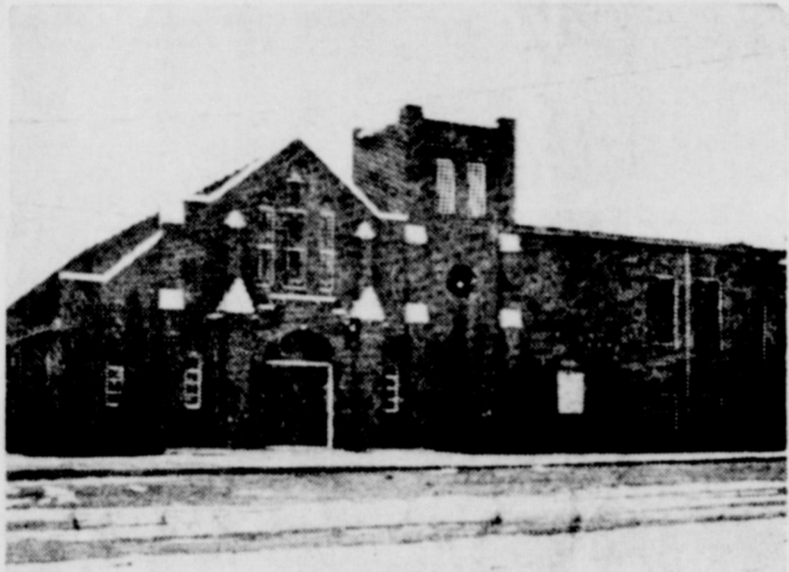
According to Webster, religion is "any system of faith or worship of a supreme being," but TRUE RELIGION is the worshipping of the one true and living God through channels given by Jesus Christ. The noun "religion" occurs six times and the adjective "religious" two times in the New Testament. God has from the beginning given man a revelation to guide him, but now He speaks to us through His Son who sealed His teaching with His precious blood. It is not something that can be caught, like a disease, not something that can be obtained by overworked emotions, but it is something that we do. Notice James 2:26-27 "If any man among you seem to be religious, and brideth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

Religion is not something to put on on Sunday and take off on Monday. It must enter into our private and social life as well as our devotional. True religion must truly become a part of our every-day life. Since religion is something that we do, then it must of necessity come from the heart, or be heart felt to be right and proper in the sight of God. 1 Cor. 13:3 "And if I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and if I give my body to be burned, but have not love, it profiteth me nothing." (American Standard Version). If we are to profit by our religion, then we must allow love to guide our actions. Our love must be a thing of action guided by the love that is in our hearts.

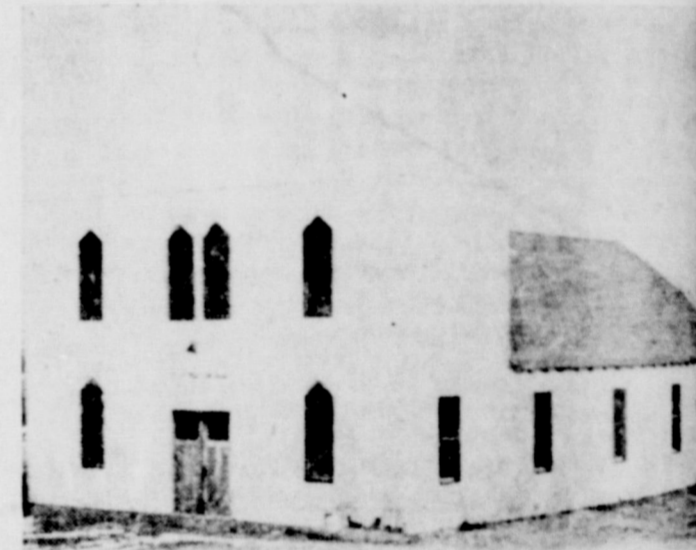
Within the six times that the word "religion" appears in the New Testament, it gives us some wrong religions. The Jews religion denies the divinity of Christ, therefore we must leave it alone, along with the entirety of the Old Covenant which was to these Jews. The Pharisees religion was also mentioned and must be avoided by true worshippers today, and consisted of tradition and customs which were handed down to them rather than the commandments. Vain worship was also mentioned and must not be engaged in by those who would save their souls. To do something in vain means to fail in the endeavor. Matt. 15:8-9 gives a picture of vain religion or worship. "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men."



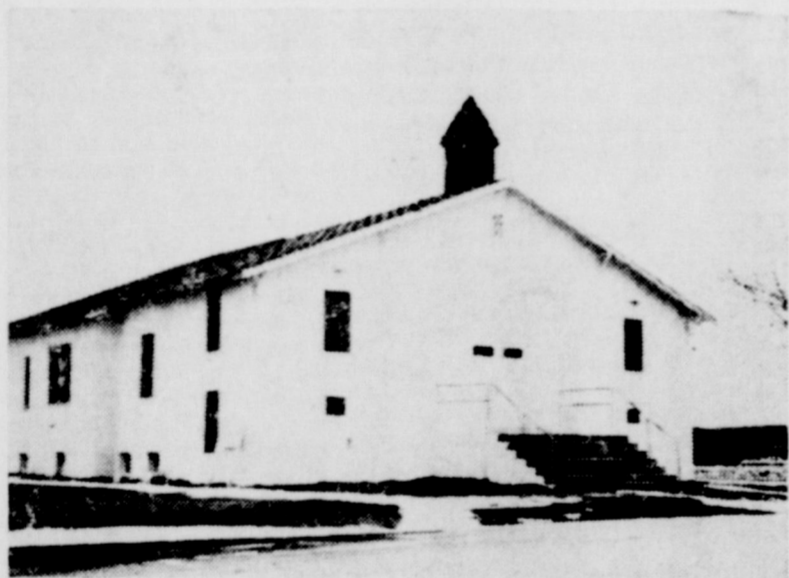

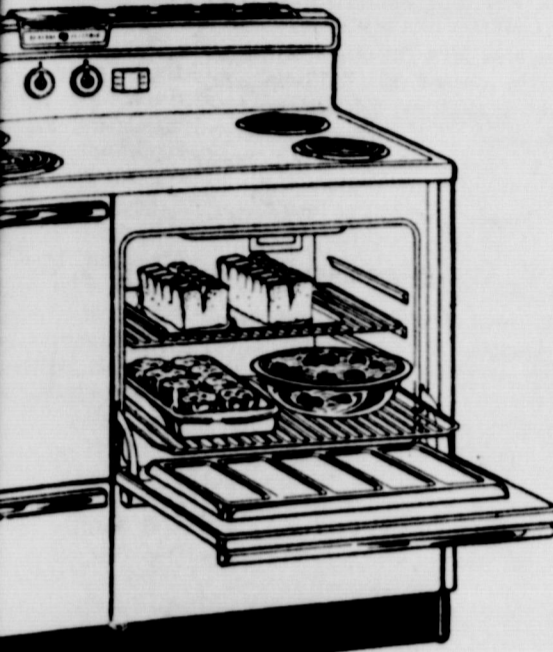

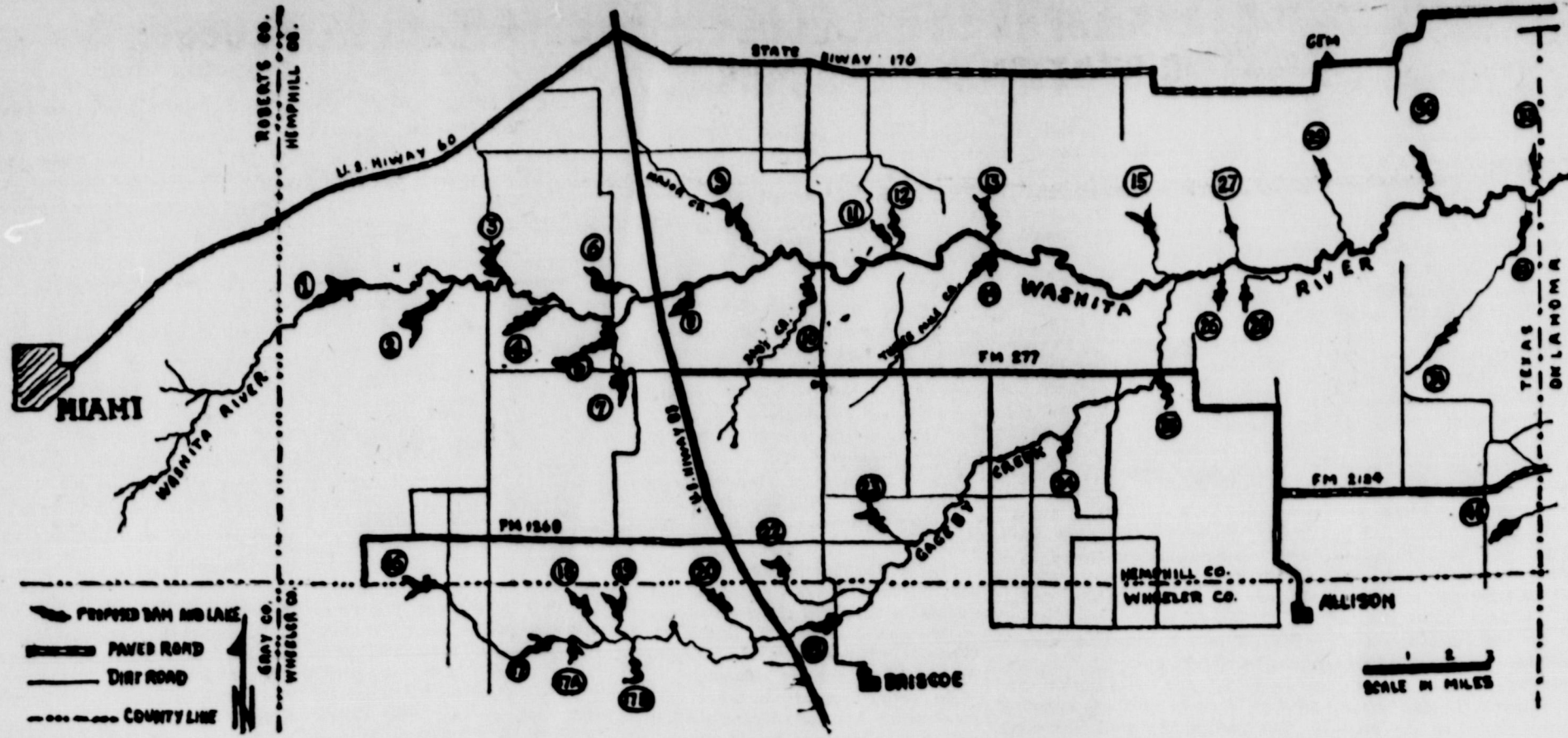

Study Club Has Regular Meeting

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AREA FARMERS TO HAVE COTTON CLASSING STATION AT MEMPHIS

Directors of the Rolling Plains Cotton Producers Association adopted by-laws for the organization at a meeting in Memphis last Wednesday and took the final steps to place the organization in full operation. J. R. Hefley, Wheeler County Director, stated.

The organization will furnish a building and equipment for a cotton classing office to be located in Memphis. The office will serve a 12-county area including Motley, Cottle, King, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Hall, Wheeler, Briscoe, Aromstrong, Gray and Carson Counties, and also some foreign area counties which are not major cotton producers.

Approval for the office was received from the U. S. Department of Agriculture on March 25. Work toward the establishment of the sub-office began back in December of 1958 when over 300 farmers from several counties met in Memphis and discussed the possibility of establishing such an office.

Frank C. McClendon of the Dallas office of the Agricultural Marketing Service met with the farmers at that time and explained the procedure necessary for the establishment of such a sub-office.

A director from each county was selected and the board of directors began work. County agents in each of the areas conducted a survey for the Dept. of Agriculture to determine the desires of the farmers in relation to establishing the office in Memphis.

The results of the surveys showed that the farmers were overwhelmingly in favor of a sub-office in Memphis.

The Department of Agriculture will furnish classers for the office and will pay the utilities during the time of the year the office is in operation Hefley explained.

The Rolling Plains Cotton Producers Assn. will furnish the building, equipment and take care of the maintenance.

The board of directors of the organization has decided that the best way to finance the operation is with a charge based on the bale basis which will be collected by the various gins in the area, the president stated.

Average production during the past five years shows that by paying 25c per bale this year, the entire cost can be paid and still have money left for operation, Hefley added.

At present directors of the organization are contacting gins to secure the money in advance in order that the office will be ready for operation this fall.

The classing office will be the most modern possible with the best equipment, lights, air conditioning, and humidifier.

The by-laws adopted last week by the directors are similar to those of other such organizations within the state.

Among other things they provide for an annual meeting of the membership and for the election of half of the board of directors each year, with one member of the board from each county.

Present directors are: J. W. Reed, Quitaque; Dudley Chewing, Cee Vee; Dutch Hunter, Childress; Dick Sweatt, Wellington; J. H. Wood, Lelia Lake; J. R. Hefley, Wheeler; B. K. Blankenship, Quitaque; A. J. Garland, Clarendon; Leamon Andrews, McLean; L. B. Collis, Panhandle and V. C. Durrett, Lakeview.

Work is expected to begin in the near future on remodeling of a building which will be used for the classing office.

Philosopher Discusses Education This Week

(Editor's note: The Sweetwater Creek Philosopher on his shinnery farm on Sweetwater Creek discusses education this week, which is sort of a novelty.)

Dear Editor:
A lot of people are worried these days about the public education system, that is, as I understand it, the adults are pretty well satisfied with the amount of education they have, but are worried about the amount the kids are getting.

What us grownups really want is enough bright kids with enough scientific education to perfect enough weapons to protect us from the mess we've gotten the world into, and as a result a lot of people are giving a closer look at the schools of this country.

As I understand it, the parents say their kids aren't furnished enough smart teachers, and the teachers say they aren't furnished enough smart kids, and the solutions range all the way from eliminating small schools to raising salaries to putting up more buildings to calling on Congress, provided it doesn't raise taxes.

One solution that I read about in a newspaper last night said since it is impossible to find enough really excellent teachers to

go around so every pupil could have the top-notch authority in every subject, from finger painting to tire changing to mathematics to physics to all the other sciences, arts, literature, etc., the thing to do is to use television. All you'd need is about 25 teachers for the whole country, sitting in a studio in Washington and telecasting to all the school houses in the nation. All the local teachers would have to do is stay in the class rooms to see the picture was in focus, a tube hadn't blown, keep the kids in order, keep them from throwing things through the windows when they're shut, etc. You have to have class rooms, it wouldn't do to let the kids stay at home to watch, or otherwise you couldn't have a PTA or even a pep rally.

When you have class rooms, as for examinations, the old-fashioned grading system would be thrown out, only the 23 teachers at the top would be qualified to grade, and they'd never get around to grading 15 million papers or whatever the number is, and in its place they'd use a

punch-card system to punch a hole in a card what answer right, the cards in Washington, run the mass-circulation system when you've made the right number of educated and ready explaining why they never got off the

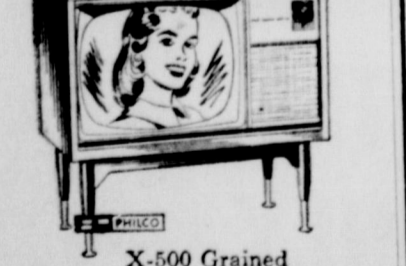

Your Representative

This week the House of Representatives passed H. B. No. 216 which is the General Appropriations bill. This bill covers the entire spending program needed to operate the State of Texas during the next two years. The bill as it passed the House calls for an increased spending of General Revenue money to the extent of about 40 million dollars. Most of this increase goes to the State Hospitals and Special Schools for modern treatment of patients and to the colleges of the state.

Representative Scott McDonald from Fort Worth made an attempt by amendment to delete the 15 million dollar appropriation each year for Farm-to-Market roads. Since I think our present Farm-to-Market program is vitally needed by our rural sections of Texas I spoke against his amendment, and we were able to defeat it by about a two to one vote.

The Appropriations bill will now go to the Senate and then to a joint conference committee of the two bodies which will re-examine its provisions and then make a final conference committee report to both Houses for adoption or rejection.

The Revenue and Taxation Committee has now studied about fifty proposed tax bills. Apparently, none of these bills will be adopted by the Committee which will instead write its own tax bill made up of ideas carried in some of the bills that have been introduced. I understand that this Committee will report its tax ideas during this next week. Apparently, the Committee will not report a general sales tax or income tax but rather a combination of natural resources and selective sales taxes.

Last week we passed H. B. No. 53 which modernizes the Comptroller's bookkeeping system and will reduce his paper deficient by around 30 million dollars. This is another way of saying that his present system does not accurately picture the funds on hand at the end of each year because he has not been counting cash receipts for the month of August which is the end of the State's fiscal year. I supported H. B. No. 53 because its enactment gives a clearer picture of the State's financial condition and reduces the need for new taxes by this 30 million dollar figure.

Last week, Governor Daniel signed H. B. No. 99 by me. This bill modifies the law requiring dual wheel trucks to have mud flaps. The old law had loopholes which made it unenforceable, and

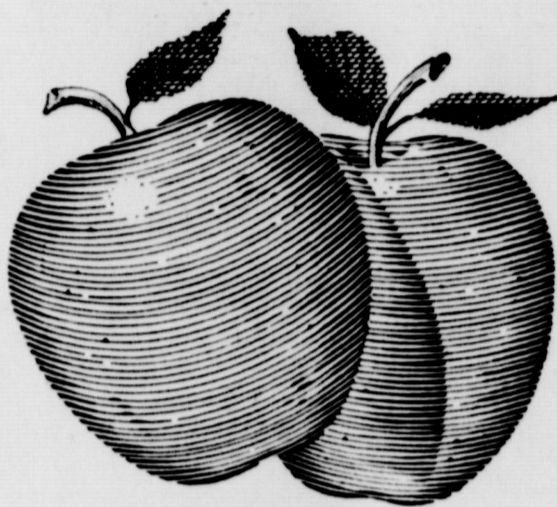

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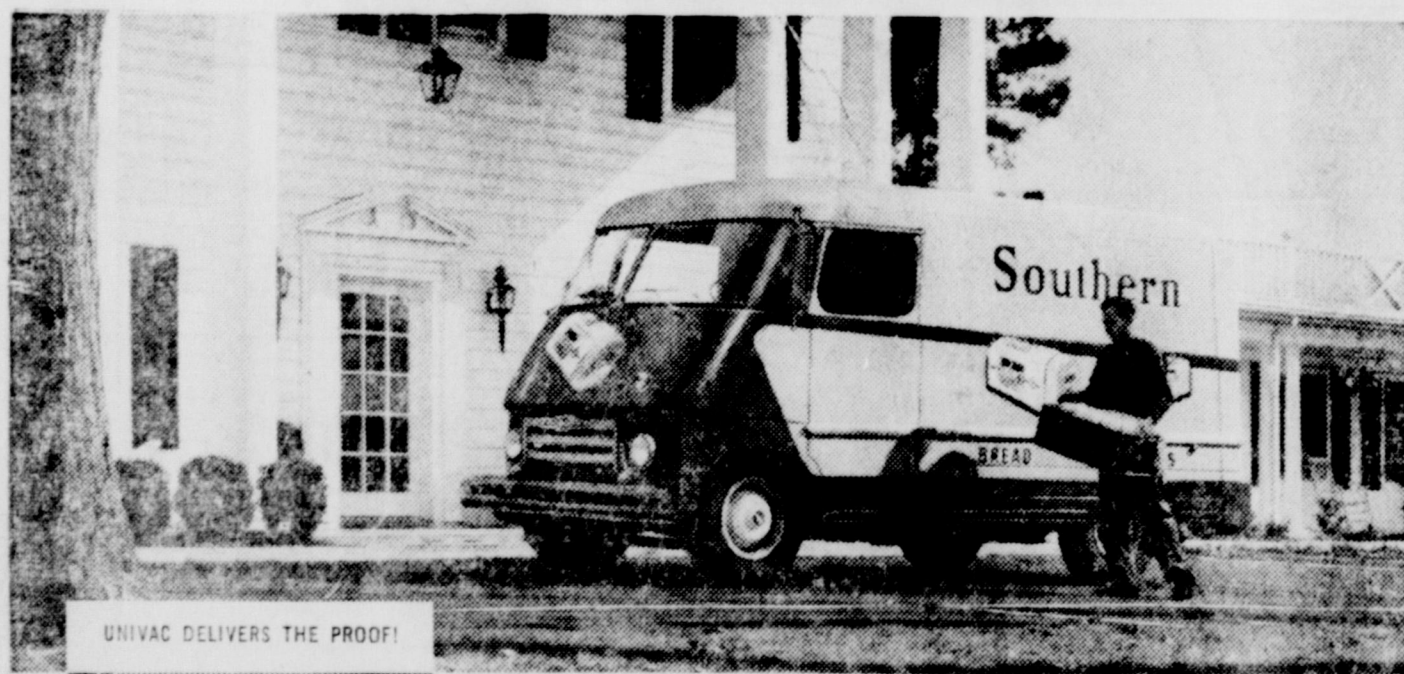
