THE LAW IS THE LAW IS NUTS

Evetts Haley Jr. owes the government \$506.11 because he harvested 473 bushels of wheat without the government's permission. And he'll have to pay, or else, because the Supreme Court has just brushed off his argument that he had a right to grow grain to feed his own cattle.

Out in Michigan another farmer still owes the government \$2,643 in fines for raising his own chicken feed. (The government already has grabbed his \$1,701 bank account.) So this farmer, Stanley Yankus, is selling his farm and taking off for Australia, where he hopes he can run a farm his own way.

This punishment for small farmers is being levied under the same law which permits the government to pay out nearly \$1.5 million to a single corporation farm to prop up the price of the rice it produced. It is the same law which got a California corporation farm \$854,450 in 1957 for growing cotton - and the same corporation another \$125,942 for not growing cotton.

It is the same law which in 1957 gave sums ranging from \$10,000 to \$322,000 each to 2422 large-size farmers who took land out of production.

The farm bloc diehards who insist on keeping this anti-consumer, anti-taxpayer, anti-farmer law on the books loudly proclaim it is for the benefit of the "little" farmer.

A small farmer in Indiana had his tractor seized because he planted 16 more acres of wheat than the government said he could. A small farmer in Pennsylvania was fined \$404 for raising 24 acres of wheat to feed his cattle, and threatened with sale of his farm if he didn't pay. Mr. Haley is being socked for raising 43 acres of wheat and Mr. Yankus is leaving the country because the government wouldn't let him run his egg farm the best way he knew how.

It's the law, all right, but it's crazy.

First Step Taken To Bring Industry To Wheeler

Chamber Plans To Print Brochure

The first steps were taken Tuesday night at a Chamber of Commerce meeting to entice industry to locate in Wheeler. For as many years as local observers can remember, the residents and businessmen of Wheeler have talked about bringing industry to Wheeler. But talk, is about all that was ever done. Even as far back as 1934, copies of the Times show where businessmen were talking about bringing a canning factory to Wheeler.

Nevertheless the small group of men that met Tuesday night decided to do something more than just talk. They decided to act and act now. The possibility of bringing industry to Wheeler is not nearly as vague as some may think.

The first step to be taken will be to compile information that can be submitted to prospective manufacturers. Information such as, housing, transportation, tax structure, recreation, fuel, building sites, churches, educational facilities, available labor, weather conditions, water supply, and many other characteristics which manufacturers will consider.

Questionnaires have been given to Chamber members to help in compiling the information. When all of the information has been turned in and the figures tabulated, a brochure will be printed giving the important data. In addition to the statistics the brochure will contain picture stories depicting the growth and plans of Wheeler for the future. Pictures of our bountiful fruit crops, our cattle, our water supply and the many advancements made in Wheeler during the past few years. Such as paving, television systems, business buildings, and many other points of interest in the Wheeler area will be included in the brochure.

While the majority of the members are working to compile the information, another group will be making a list of manufacturers throughout the United States. In addition to the brochure each manufacturer will be mailed a letter inviting them to inspect "our town" and facilities and offering them as many concessions as possible to locate in Wheeler.

In addition to the 8 large rooms, the ranch style home has 3 bathrooms, 4 linen closets, 5 clothes closets, a pantry in the kitchen and an attached two car garage. All total it has more than 2200 feet of floor space, not including the double garage.

The Wheeler Lumber furnished the material for construction of the home and Clarence Robinson, local contractor, built the house. Ernest Lee Hardware supplied the carpet and furnished one of the bedrooms, the family room, living room and dining room.

Visitors at the open house Sunday will see an ultra-modern kitchen with built-in oven and surface unit surrounded by beautiful birch cabinets with copper trimming. The kitchen floor is flattered with an armstrong embossed linoleum. The entire house is heated by two big coleman wall heaters.

The master bathroom is walled

with plastic tile and the fixtures are all colored. The other two baths have white fixtures.

Air conditioning ducts open into each room. The house is air conditioned by a huge 8500 CFM air conditioner mounted on top of the house. The birch doors throughout the house add much to its lively appearance. All of the closets have sliding doors.

A redwood bookcase divides the family room and the breakfast room and a big picture window adds brightness to the roomy living quarters.

Visitors will find that Wheeler county now has one of the most beautiful homes in the Panhandle.

Contract Awarded For Water-Sewer Project

The climax of a project started in January of 1955 was reached in Wheeler today, when Mayor Thomas Daughtry and his city councilmen accepted the bid and awarded the contract for construction of the water and sewer project in Wheeler.

The H. B. Jordan Company Inc. of Amarillo, submitted the low bid of \$98,361.60. Actual construction of the project will begin within 3 weeks according to Mayor Daughtry.

To some of the newer council members and younger businessmen the awarding of the contract was indeed important but the real swell of pride came from the men that started the project back in January of 1955. Men like Virgil Jamison and Thomas Daughtry, they were the men appointed on a chamber of commerce committee

in '55 to "investigate the feasibility, possibility and advisability of extending the water and sewer facilities in Wheeler".

In June of that same year these two men made their first preliminary report to the Chamber on their findings. They presented the Chamber with facts, figures, cost estimates and a complete breakdown of the project. The chamber voted unanimously to support the issue and a city-wide election was held and carried by a margin of 2 to 1.

Then came the first delay ... Following the election the bond market changed and one delay led to another and finally on April 2 of 1957 the city council apparently decided they needed a vote of confidence, because a referendum election was held. Again the peo-

Judge Is Speaker At Kiwanis Meeting

County Judge George Hefley was the guest speaker at the regular noon luncheon of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club Monday.

Hefley spoke to the group on the "Financial condition of Wheeler County". He told the group that by October of 1959 the county would owe less than \$30,000. However, he pointed out that a state law was going to make it mandatory that county jails have at least forty square feet per cell for each prisoner. And the dormitory or run-around must have at least 18 square ft. per prisoner, and other suitable facilities as is required by the state health department.

These improvements must be made by 1961 according to Hefley.

Hibler Is President Of School Board

The newly elected school board members met last Tuesday in Wheeler with the hold over members of the board and re-organized and elected officers for the coming year.

Archie Hibler was elected president of the board, succeeding Lyndon Sims; Harrison Hall, vice - president, succeeding Bill Owens; and Harold Kenady was elected again this year as secretary of the board.

Bill Owens and Lyndon Sims both retired from the board this year. They didn't file for re-election. Sims has served on the board for 12 years and Owens has been on the school board for 9 years.

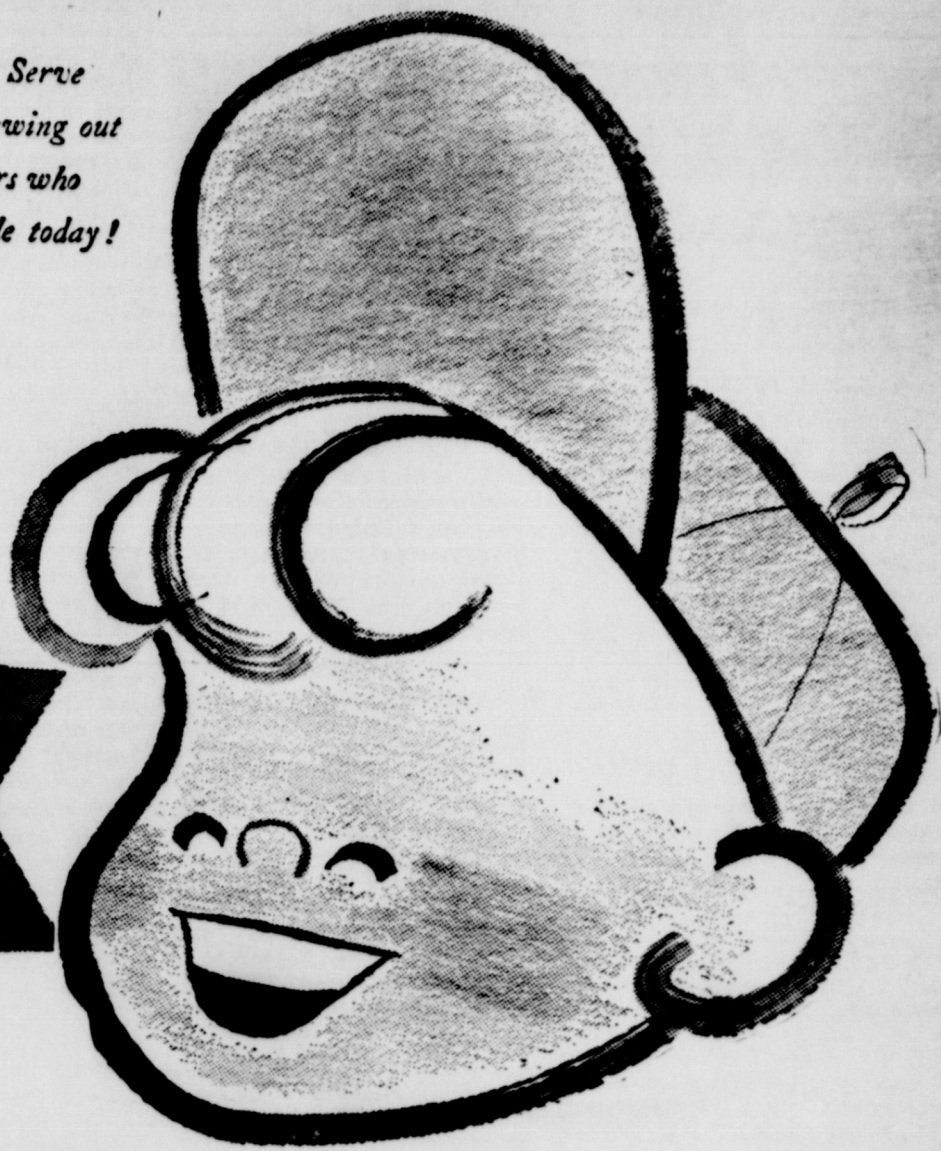



ple voiced their approval of the water and sewer improvements. However, the bond market was still unfavorable and the project was again delayed. But finally, following the election of Thomas Daughtry as mayor (he was one of the original planners of the project) the effort to sell the water and sewer bonds was renewed.

Finding no satisfaction through regular channels, Daughtry approached the Housing and Home Finance Agency on the possibility of purchasing the bonds. Not only did he sell them on the idea but he got as good an interest rate on the bonds as had been customary back in the '37's and '38's.

And finally after several months of red tape and necessary government delays the project was ready to advertise for bids. And the climax of the entire project came Wednesday afternoon when Mayor Thomas Daughtry and the city councilmen opened bids from 8 different Texas contractors and let the contract to the low bidder.

In mentioning the names of Virgil Jamison and Thomas Daughtry it is not meant to imply that these men are completely responsible for the water and sewer project. All of the forward and progressive merchants of Wheeler must be commended for their loyal support and patience in backing the project.

Other than the obvious advantages to be derived from the improved water and sewer system, Wheeler residents will have an additional 1200 new building locations as a result of the project. Water and sewer facilities will be available to approximately 200 families in Wheeler that either had no facilities or inadequate ones. An adequate and ample supply of water will now be available for the south part of town. The loop system in the major water mains will enable the fire department to fight local fires more efficiently. The new system will place almost everyone in Wheeler within a 500 ft. radius of a fire plug, this will, of course lower fire insurance rates in Wheeler. It will provide 100 per cent more at source storage of water. It will also provide adequate sewer facilities and improve the present facilities to almost everyone in Wheeler. It will enable prospective builders to secure adequate financing to build new homes. And finally the extended water and sewer facilities will bring additional revenue to the city.

After thinking seriously over the potential growth and future possibilities that has hinged upon the completion of the project... It's no wonder that some of Wheeler's guardian angels were swelling with pride after the contract was awarded.

FAMILIES WITH FHA PLAN FARMING

Wheeler County farmers who borrow from the Farmers Home Administration have completed making their farming plans for this year. And many are already putting new ideas into operation which should boost their 1959 farm income. John L. Manning, the agency's local county super-

visor, said this week.

Better farming practices which some FHA borrowers will be putting into operation include (1) using farrowing stalls to save more pigs per litter, (2) planning two litters of pigs per year, (3) raising hogs on legume pasture to cheapen cost of gains, (4) testing soils and applying recommended kinds and amounts of fertilizer, (5) buying steers or calves to graze excess grass, (6) planting hybrid and certified seeds, grain sorghum seeds, (7) planting storm proof cotton seeds, (8) expanding operations to family size units where they are getting too small. During the past three months all FHA borrowers have analyzed their 1958 farm and home records. These records showed what had been planned and what had been accomplished. On the basis of the records, the families were able to determine the strong and weak points in their operations and recognize further improvements that could be made in their operations.

As proof that good farm planning pays off, Mr. Manning points out that nearly 30 percent of the FHA borrowers in Wheeler, Roberts, and Hemphill Counties have repaid their FHA loans during 1958, and are now able to get all their necessary financing from local banks or cooperative lenders.

There are several farm families building new homes with Farm Housing loans from this office. We are proud of them and hope more families will also improve their farmsteads with new homes and out-buildings or remodeling. Information on housing loans can be obtained in the Wheeler FHA office.

Charles Gragg of Shamrock, was elected as Assistant Director of Civil Defense Health Services, Emergency Welfare Services, and Special Weapons Defense. G. P. Davis of Shamrock, was elected as Assistant Director of Law Enforcement Service, Fire Service, Plant Protection, and Warden Service - Organized Self-Protection. Doug Rives of Shamrock, was elected as Assistant Director of Shelter Protection Service, Engineering Services, and Rescue Service. Joe Rogers of Wheeler, was elected as Assistant Director of Civil Air Raid Warning and Civilian Auxiliaries to Military Activities. Thurman

Rives of Wheeler was elected as Assistant Director of Administration, Training Service, Supply Service and Personnel Service. It was understood that these men might appoint anyone they so desired to work under them and aid in the execution of the various phases of their work.

The organization then elected Don Earney of Wheeler, to be in charge of the Publicity Committee, and to appoint anyone he so desired to work with him.

Ernest Henderson of Twitty, was elected by the group to be Administrator or Custodian of all the equipment which this organization may obtain or be responsible for in the future.

Judge Hefley announced that meetings would be held quarterly, and then the meeting was adjourned.

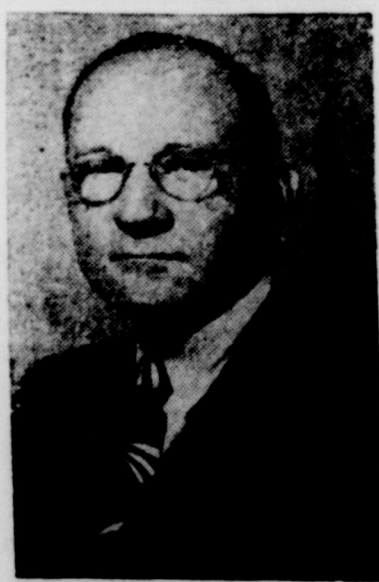

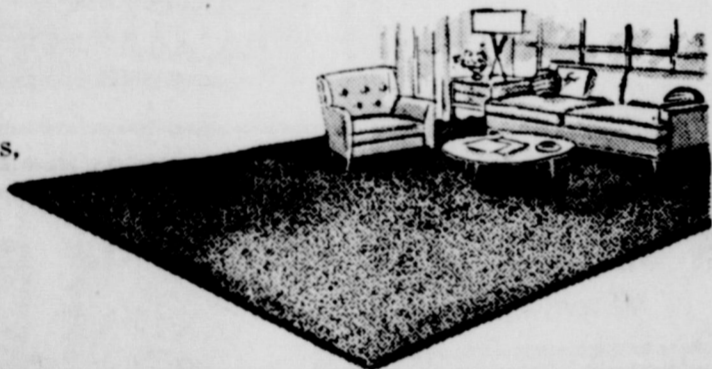

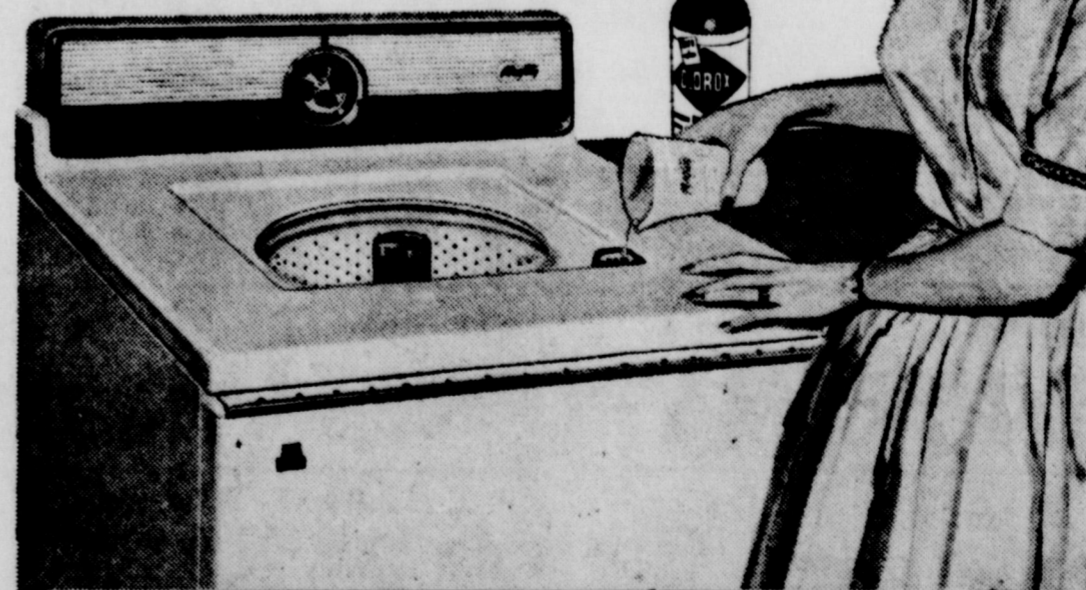

THE AIR FORCE academy out at Colorado Springs has been making print in many different media the past week and we think the Wall Street Journal gave it the most cheerful twist of all. So, we're reprinting the Journal's article, "How to Build an Airfield", and see if you get that cheerful feeling.

"The conard, uttered in some military quarter, that Air Force officers are only fly-boys deficient in such higher things as strategy and tactics can finally be put to rest by their brilliant success in the battle of Colorado Springs.

"Congress, you may recall, gave the Air Force \$136.9 million to build an academy. The air generals considered this inadequate to give them the magnificent plant they wanted. Problem: How to rout Congress and capture a bigger appropriation.

"It was brilliantly solved by taking the \$136.9 million and building, first off, a set of dormitories that turned Army and Navy green with envy. Then they installed such vital military equipment as a \$3 million sports field-house, a \$500,000 club for non-commissioned officers, 22 garden pools, 18 basketball courts, a \$5.1 million social center (including two ballrooms), and 18 hole golf course and a \$53,642 lavatory for visitors, such as Congressmen.

"So by the time the money ran out, they had everything but an airfield on which to teach the budding Air Officers how to fly.

"Now even an Army strategist can see how hopeless the Air Force's position would have been had they built things in reverse order. If the Officer in Tactical Command of Spending had built the airfield first and then want-

ed extra money to build garden pools, golf courses and \$53,000 washrooms - well, even the most liberal of the spending Senators would have clipped the Air Force's wings.

"But now Congress is right where the Air Force can zero in. Here's this wonderful academy, showplace of the Rockies, full of future officers being trained by the country to fly. And there are facilities for teaching them everything - but flying.

"How many Congressmen, do you suppose, can stand up and say they will be so niggardly in defense of their country as to refuse to appropriate a few more millions needed to let a flying academy teach flying?"

"There's one cheerful note in all this. We are pretty confident now that the Russians haven't got a chance against the strategic planning of our Air Force operations staff."

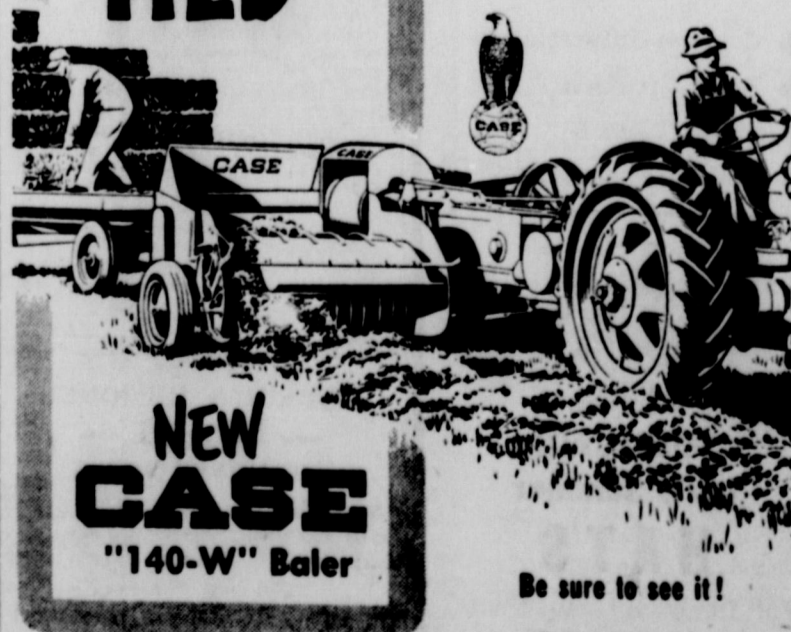
