RESUSCITATOR PURCHASED BY LOCAL FIREMEN

Always alert to the needs of the community, the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department has added another to its list of services available for residents of this area. And someday this additional service, a Stephenson Minuteman Resuscitator, may mean the difference between life and death for you or a member of your family.

The resuscitator is used when accidents causing breathing failure occur - accidents such as drowning, electric shock, smoke suffocation, gas poisoning or shock from an automobile crash. It is also put to use for patients struggling to breathe after a heart attack or a bad spell of asthma.

The Wheeler Fire Department is asking for donations to help cover the approximate cost of \$500.00 for the resuscitator. The machine is on display at the First National Bank and contributions may be made there or to the Fire Department members directly.

California Men Arrested For Car Theft

What was believed to be just another "speeder" turned out to be a trio of California men wanted by the F. B. I. Highway patrolmen R. C. Parker and Dave Croslin were cruising between Shamrock and McLean Tuesday morning when they spotted a 1959 Impala Chevrolet speeding west on highway 66. The patrolmen stopped the speeding automobile and after questioning the men they learned that the auto had been stolen in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Arrested were: James Edward Williamson, 18; Reggie Walter Griffin, 20; and Ray J. Labrum, 19; all three were on parole from a California prison.

A check with the F. B. I. disclosed that the auto had been stolen from the Southland Security Life Insurance Company of Little Rock, Arkansas. The men are being held in the Wheeler County jail until the F. B. I. can pick them up.

All-Male Jury Deliberates Four Hours; Hare Guilty Of Rape

After deliberating for 3 hours and 58 minutes the all male jury returned to the courtroom and read the following verdict to James Franklin Hare. "We the jury find the defendant (James Franklin Hare) guilty of rape, as charged in the indictment, and assess his punishment at twenty five (25) years."

Only a handful of spectators were on hand to hear the verdict and watch as county officials quickly returned Hare to the county jail where he has been held since his arrest in November of 1958.

District Judge Lewis M. Good-

rich indicated it will be at least two days before Hare will be sentenced. The two day waiting period is necessary in the event the defendant wishes to appeal the case.

In an interview following the trial Hare indicated that he will appeal the case "and continue to appeal it until the truth is brought to light". When asked if he thought he got a fair trial Hare said, "Considering the testimony brought out against me I think I had a very fair trial and an excellent jury. However, I am not pleased with the sentence and will probably appeal the case".

Hare was charged by indictment with the offense of rape upon Jean Frances Hare, his 13-year-old daughter, alleged to have occurred in the county of Wheeler on or about the 8th day of November, 1958; and to said charge, the defendant entered a plea of not guilty.

This is not the first time Hare has been sentenced to serve time in a penitentiary. His record shows two previous penitentiary offenses.

Hare was originally from Shelbyville, Indiana, but was working as a truck driver for a gin in the Twitty community at the time

of his arrest.

Hare was picked up on Saturday, November 8 by three Amarillo men who had spotted Hare's truck parked on the farm to market road to Kelton. The trio passed Hare's truck southeast of Wheeler, realized something was amiss, turned around and caught Hare and the 13-year-old together.

The defendant was first arraigned on December 1, 1958 and his trial set for January 19, 1959. However, the court granted him a continuance when they learned that his wife was in an Amarillo hospital at the point of death. She died February 3, 1959.

A special criminal session of the district court was called for May 11 and a 120 name venire was picked. And by 6:00 p.m. Monday the jury was complete and sworn in and the trial began at 10:30 Tuesday morning in the district courtroom of the Wheeler County courthouse.

Those picked to serve on the jury were: H. J. Finsterwald, Henry Johnston, Clyde Dickey, J. H. Scribner, Henry Lee, Claude C. Cox, Charley Whitelaw, Donald R. Barber, P. A. Martin, Curtis Lancaster, J. C. Holcomb and L. K. Fulks.

Following Hare's trial three parole violators were sentenced in the district court by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich. They were E. M. Francis, W. H. Dees, and W. E. Stove.

Francis was convicted of "Fondling with the breast of a female child under age 14" in June of 1958. He pled guilty to the charge and was given a 5 year pardon to the sheriff of Wheeler County. When a defendant is given this type sentence it is required that he report at least one time each month to the county sheriff. He must also refrain from drinking, carrying firearms or any other act which might lead to criminal action on the part of the parolee. Francis reported only one time to the county sheriff. The judge sentenced him to serve the five year term in the state penitentiary at Huntsville.

Two other parole violators were sentenced to serve time in the state pen. They were W. H. Dees and W. E. Stove, both will serve 6 years.

Rev. Gene Grace, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Mobeetie, brings the message of the week in the thirty-third of a series of commentaries by ministers of the area and presented on this page through the cooperation of the firms and individuals listed below.

A PRAYING MOTHER

"She . . . prayed unto the Lord." I Samuel 1:10. As we study the life of Hannah, we are impressed that she was a patient, gentle, faithful, devoted, ambitious, industrious, and sacrificial mother. But perhaps the thing about her that impresses us the most is that she was a praying mother. Notice these things about Hannah's prayer.

1. Hannah Prayed to the Right Source. "Prayed unto the Lord." Hannah prayed to God. Because she recognized in Him the source of all life, the Creator of all things, the sustainer of all life, and the giver of every good and perfect gift. Had she prayed to any other source, her prayer would have been in vain. Prayer must be made to God through Christ who makes intercession for us.

2. Hannah Prayed a Definite Prayer. "Wilt give unto thy handmaid a man child." Hannah prayed not only for a child but for a son. Her prayer was definite and specific. Other prayers recorded in the Bible teach us this same lesson. Hannah made a vow unto God in the prayer that she would give the son to the Lord all the days of his life and that she would do all in her power to help him grow into a perfect man. Hannah's life was in accord with her prayer. Prayer to God should be definite, intelligent, and in faith.

3. Hannah Prayed an Earnest Prayer. "I have poured out my soul unto the Lord." "She spoke in her heart; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard." Hannah wept as she prayed. She was most earnest. Her soul was in agony. Any mother who can pray before God as Hannah did will reach the Heart of God. Our land needs mothers who will spend much time before God in earnest prayer about the family and the home.

4. Hannah Prayed a Persistent Prayer. "She continued praying before the Lord." Hannah multiplied her prayer. She seems to have said, "Lord, I cannot leave thee or let thee go until thou hast blessed me." In our day and age, we need to be more persistent before the Lord in earnest prayer.

5. Hannah's Prayer Was Answered. "Hannah bore a son, and called his name Samuel, saying, Because I have asked him of the Lord." A prayer is complete when God speaks. Hannah heard God speak, and she had assurance and joy. The Lord gave her a son, and she kept her vow, and Samuel became one of the greatest men of God of all ages.

If all mothers would pray like Hannah, our people would be better, our homes would be sweeter, our schools more successful, our churches more influential, and our nation more godly. "Lord, teach us to Pray."
