Adams was arrested and placed in the county jail and the girls mother filed "Statutory Rape" charges against him. His bond has been set at \$5,000, and he will be held in the county jail pending action of the grand jury.

In a conversation with the girls mother it was learned that Adams had been dating the 7th-grade girl for about a week, but, "he nad been bringing her home by 10:00, the mother said. The mother became worried when her 13-year-old daughter didn't return home, she contacted the sheriffs department at 5:30 Monday morning and Deputy John l'opper found Adams and the girl in a Shamrock motel at noon Monday.
