## Swimming Pool To Open Monday at 6:30

Mayor Thomas Daughtry announced this week that the Wheeler Swimming Pool will open Monday, June 15 at 6:30 P.M. And "We want to extend a cordial invitation to everyone to attend the official opening of the pool," Daughtry said.

Special opening ceremonies have been planned by the Chamber of Commerce. An aquatic demonstration will be given by some of the area scouts. Dr. H. E. Nicholson, Mayor Thomas Daughtry and R. J. Holt will each make a few remarks in regard to the opening of the pool. Pool manager Thomas Helton will explain the rules of the pool and introduce his life guards. And the official ribbon cutting will be done by Mayor Daughtry who has ramrodded the project since its beginning last year. Don Earney, president of the Chamber of Commerce will act as master of ceremonies.

Following the opening program, which will last about an hour, the pool will be opened for a free evening of swimming.

Season tickets can be purchased at the pool office Saturday afternoon from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. and Monday morning from 9:30 until 12:00. Season tickets for children 12 and under will sell for \$9.00. General admission will be 25 cents. Students and adults from 13 and up will pay \$15.00 for a season ticket and 50 cents for general admission. For those who wish to take swimming lessons, 10 one-hour lessons will be given for \$10.00 payable in advance.

## PROJECT TO BE COMPLETED BY JULY 1ST

In a telegram received Monday from Congressman Walter Rogers it was learned that the FCC had definitely promised to take action this week on the Wheeler County Farm Bureau's application for a permit to construct a television translator system in Wheeler County. Area television viewers and Farm Bureau members have been waiting for the permit since their financial campaign ended back in February.

Late Wednesday afternoon a second telegram was received from Congressman Rogers. It read as follows:

FCC today granted two applications for TV translator systems to serve Wheeler County.

Best regards Walter Rogers, Member of Congress.

To those who may be wondering about the "two applications" mentioned in the telegram, Odell Setliff, construction engineer, explained that for each channel desired, FCC must grant a permit. The permits will enable the Wheeler County system to transmit channels 4 and 10 to area viewers.

Setliff also indicated that he will be in Wheeler Thursday to start making arrangements for construction of the system. Actual construction work will begin Monday and with any luck whatsoever we will have the project ready to go by July 1 Setliff said.

The three 10 ft. anchor holes have already been dug and the power supply is now available at the site. A local machinist has completed the anchor plates and concrete workers are ready to build the base and set the anchors. The base of the tower will be set in five feet of concrete. 12 guy wires of 9/32 airplane type cable will support the 150 ft. tower.

The tower will be erected on the Mickle Moxon farm northwest of Mobeetie. And according to all reports it is the first 100 watt translator system in the United States.

## LAST RITES HELD FOR A. E. CONNELL

Funeral services for A. E. Connell, 58, of Wheeler, were conducted at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.

Mr. Connell died at his home, 510 Comanche Street, Wheeler, about 7 o'clock Saturday morning. He had been in ill health since February. His condition had grown worse during the past week, but his death was sudden.

He came to Wheeler County in 1928, residing two years at Magic City. He lived in Shamrock from 1930 until 1946, and since that time had made his home in Wheeler.

Mr. Connell united with the Baptist Church at Magic City a number of years ago, and his membership was in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler at the time of his death.

## 14-Year-Old Hurt In Tractor Mishap

A tractor mishap 1 1/2 miles West of Mobeetie last Thursday afternoon hospitalized a 14-year-old Mobeetie boy with severe cuts, bruises, back injury, broken jaw and one of his ears severed from his head.

Charles Ray Risner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Risner of Mobeetie was traveling West on a farm road out of Mobeetie when the H. Farmall tractor he was driving hit a stump at the edge of the road and threw him to the ground. Tracks at the scene of the accident indicate that the youth may have swerved the tractor to miss a car and crashed into the stump.

A short time after the accident, Bill Godwin found the youth and immediately rushed him to the Highland General Hospital in Pampa. Physicians say the boy is improving nicely but as yet he has been unable to remember exactly what happened.

## Food Handling School Scheduled June 15-18

Two short courses in Food Preparation and Services — one in Shamrock and one in Wheeler — will be conducted this month, according to County Sanitarian Charles Gragg.

The courses will be taught by Harry A. Smith, public health instructor, Division of Public Health

Education, Texas State Department of Health.

There will be no tuition fee, and everyone who has anything to do in preparing, serving or handling food is invited to attend, Gragg said.

The four-day school in Shamrock is scheduled for Tuesday, June 9, through Friday, June 12, in the high school auditorium. Two sessions will be held daily: 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The course in Wheeler is slated for Monday, June 15, through Thursday, June 18, in the grade school auditorium. Two classes will be held daily: the morning session from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and the afternoon session from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Arrangements for the courses were made by Sanitarian Gragg through the cooperation of the Texas State Health Department.

Managers, supervisors and all other employees of eating establishments are the primary objectives of the course. However, the same principles apply to all public and private food handlers — whether housewife or restaurant employee. (Continued on Page 8 No. 3)

## MCILHANY AND ROGERS HONORED WITH APPRECIATION BANQUET

An Appreciation Dinner was given Tuesday night in Austin honoring legislative leaders who have labored to keep Texas in the forefront in the livestock industry. Honored were Senator Andy Rogers of Childress and Representative Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler, sponsors of three of the most important animal health measures passed by the Regular Session of the 56th Legislature.

These were the livestock auction marketing inspection bill, the veterinarian's reporting bill, and the measure designed for the control and eradication of brucellosis in Texas.

The dinner was given by the Animal Health Council, composed of thirty-one groups dedicated to the advancement of agriculture and livestock in Texas.

Summer camp programs for Boy Scouts of the Adobe Walls Council is underway this week at Camp Ki-o-wa. ## 20 Years Later . . .

## SAME STATION—DIFFERENT WAGON



The setting is the same as 20 years ago but, otherwise, these pictures tell a graphic story of two decades of station wagon development. The photograph at top was taken at the Wyandotte, Mich., New York Central station in 1939 as Chevrolet introduced its first station wagon model—a unit featuring a body made of wood and steel. In contrast below is a 1959 all-steel Nomad with luggage rack, wraparound windows, folding seats, electrically operated tailgate window, dual headlights, etc. A further note on station wagon history . . . in 1939, less than seven out of every 1,000 cars built were station wagons. Today, about every sixth car is a wagon. Five of Chevrolet's 15 passenger car models are station wagons.

ly, fluently, effortlessly, and with  
reasonable speed throughout the  
pattern. Failure to follow the pat-  
tern will be considered a fault  
and scored accordingly.

4. Scoring will be on the basis of  
50-50 with 50 denoting an average  
performance. (50 on appearance  
of horse and rider and 50 on the  
performance of the horse running  
the pattern.)

5. Ribbons will be awarded to  
the top thirty contestants in or-  
der of their placings.

6. Pattern will be set in ad-  
vance and marked with line as  
follows: Start from end of arena  
and make a semi-circle of the  
arena between the lines. First half  
at a walk and the last half at an  
open gait or gallop from the  
marked half way line. Pony show  
Chairman will take the name of  
the contestant as they leave the  
starting point and number the  
contestants in the order of their  
performance.

This picture was made recently when Governor Daniel signed into law Senate Bill 419, which was co-authored by Senator Andy Rogers and given strong support in the House by Representative Grainger McIlhany. The creation of this Authority is a definite step forward in the development and conservation of the waters of the Red River and its Texas tributaries lying above the northeast corner of Bowie County. One of its main purposes will be the prevention and correction of salt pollution, and also the institution of a badly needed mapping program, the development of drainage systems and the distribution of hydro electric power. The bill recognizes all existing agencies and districts and fosters the creation of additional ones and provides for full cooperation between them and the Authority. It also specifically preserves all rights to underground water to the owners. The Federal Government has already provided funds for such purposes and is expected to provide an additional one million dollars. The Red River Authority will be financed by revenues derived from sales of its water, power and electric energy. That it will be a self-supporting agency is insured by the fact that it is denied any taxing powers. It is felt that the creation of such an Authority will result in great material benefits not only to the territory involved but to the entire State of Texas and will effectively promote the conservation of our natural resources.

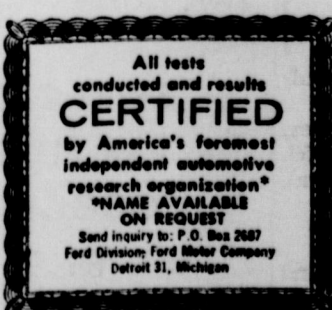

### Mrs. Carroll Adams Is Attending Aquatic School At Ardmore

A student at the National Red Cross Aquatic and Small Craft School June 3-13 on Lake Murray, near Ardmore, is Mrs. Carroll Adams, who lives at Wheeler, Texas.

Students from all over the nation are at Lake Murray to study small craft, aquatic skills or first aid. Approximately 110 men and women are on the school roster. This is the Southwest's first National Red Cross Small Craft School. H. H. Gilliam of Brownwood, Texas is director. John Greenwood of Fort Worth, Texas is dean of small craft, and Joe Racz of Oklahoma City heads the aquatics division.

While there Mrs. Adams is studying the following courses: Small Craft, Swimming, First Aid, Life Saving, and Leadership. Aquatic and small craft schools are being held at several points across the nation to stress Red Cross safety skills.

### Number Three

Discussions deal with the causative agents of communicable diseases: virus, bacteria, protozoa and worms; the source of these organisms (sick people, people who are carriers, and sick animals); the mode of transmission from the source to susceptible persons; and the ports of entry.

Discussions bring out that there are at least 75 different communicable diseases existing in the United States today, of which 30 or so can be transmitted through unsanitary food production, processing, distribution, preparation and service.

Emphasis is placed on the fact that if people are properly vaccinated, and thereafter practice sanitation, personal hygiene, and food refrigeration, the majority of these diseases could be greatly reduced or stamped out.

The Division of Public Health Education provides State Department of Health publications used in the course.

There is no denying the value of these sanitation courses to the health of restaurant goers and everyone who buys any food prepared by a human being.

Generally speaking, Gragg said, the course is conducted for the following purposes.

1. Provide instruction in proper food handling methods to food service employees.
2. Provide refresher instruction in proper food handling methods to old employees.
3. Provide an opportunity for interchange of ideas between health authorities and the food handling industry.
4. Show the public the safe guards being employed for their health protection.

Attendance to one session daily completes the course.

reach a peak by June 25. Normal in-migration of men and machines is expected and no shortages are anticipated.

Indications are that in the Northern Panhandle, north of the Canadian River, wheat is progressing according to forecasts. Showers have been received in some areas, but have not caused any damage and prospects remain good. A shortage of combines, trucks and extra workers is expected to develop when harvest gets underway in some fields about June 15, reaching a peak by June 25.

The Oklahoma bulletin dated June 5 reports harvest activity has now reached 26 counties in the wheat belt. Adequate men and machines in all areas.

Kansas reports in a bulletin dated June 5 that machines are adequate in the harvest area for beginning operations, but demand should increase as a result of wide-spread operations in the area as wheat ripens.

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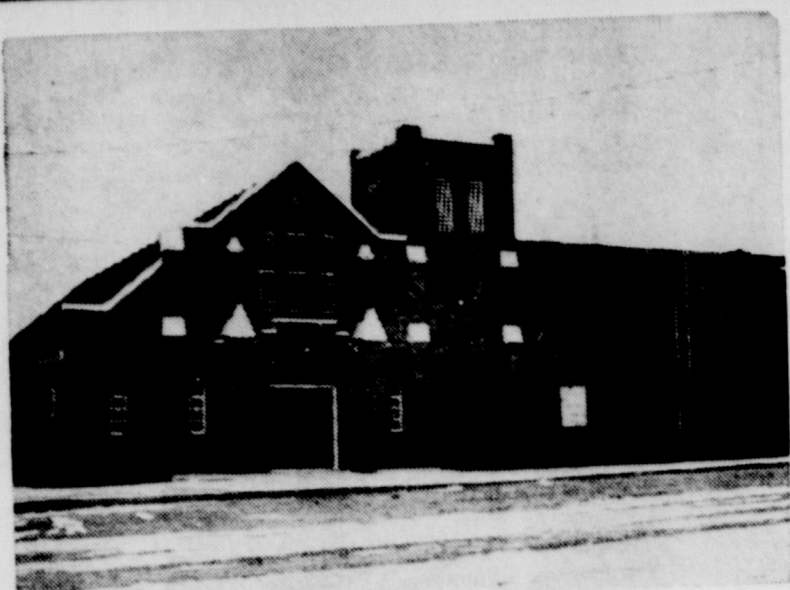

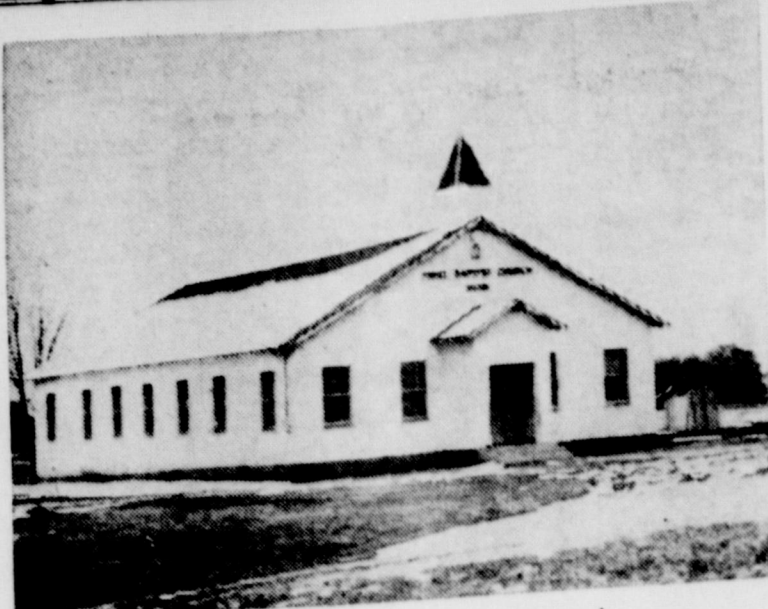

#### GOD AND HIS WORD

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." 2 Timothy 3:16.

Every individual that professes to be a Christian realizes the need of and desires communion and fellowship with God.

Through prayer we talk to God. We talking, God listening. Through the study of God's Word this communion becomes a two-sided affair. We may even say a two-sided conversation. Through the Bible God talks to us. God talking, we listening.

It is sometimes difficult to imagine those who never pick up a Bible to read and to study, to have ever become acquainted with God through His Son, Jesus Christ.

Some Christians read the Bible as a duty, if they read it at all; but as soon as a man or woman sees Christ as the "chiefest among ten thousand," the Bible becomes the revelation of the Father's love and becomes a never-ending pleasure.

A great many people seem to think that the Bible is out of date, that it is an old book, and they think it has passed its day. They would have you think that it was good for the dark ages, and that there is some very good history in it, but that it was not intended for the present time; the atomic age; we have outgrown it.

One might just as well say that the sun, which has shown for so long a time, is now old and out of date, that whenever a man builds a house he need not put any windows in it, because we have a newer light and better light; we now have the electric light. If a man is born of God, he can not thrive without God.

There are persons who tell you that Christianity is not what it has been recommended to them; that they have found it is not all that we claim it to be. These are people who never open their Bibles, who never study the scriptures and become offended and wonder why they seem to be having such a hard time. The real trouble is they have not done as the Lord has told them to do.

They have neglected the Word of God.

If we are living with God in His Word then we know that there is no situation in life for which we cannot find some word of consolation in scripture.

If you are in affliction, if you are in adversity and trial, there is a promise to you. In joy and sorrow, in health and in sickness, in poverty and in riches, in every condition of life, God has a promise stored up in His word for you.

If you are impatient, sit down quietly and commune with Job.

If you are strong-headed, read of Moses and Peter.

If you are weak-kneed, look at Elijah.

If there is no song in your heart, listen to David.

If you are a politician, read of Daniel.

If you are getting sordid, read Isaiah.

If your faith is low, read Paul.

If you are getting lazy, watch James.

If you are losing sight of the future, read in Revelation of the promised land.

The study of God's Word will secure peace.

The Bible is the Guidebook to the Christian's home. If a man is traveling and does not know where he is going to, or how he is going to get there. He will have a good deal of trouble, and will not enjoy the trip as much as if he had a guidebook at hand. It is not even safe traveling.

The Bible is the guidebook in the journey of life. The only book that points the way to heaven. "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path."

May I leave this thought with you. In Proverbs, chapter 6, verse 22, speaking of the Word of God we find, "When thou goest, it shall lead thee; When thou sleepest, it shall keep thee; When thou awakest, it shall talk with thee."

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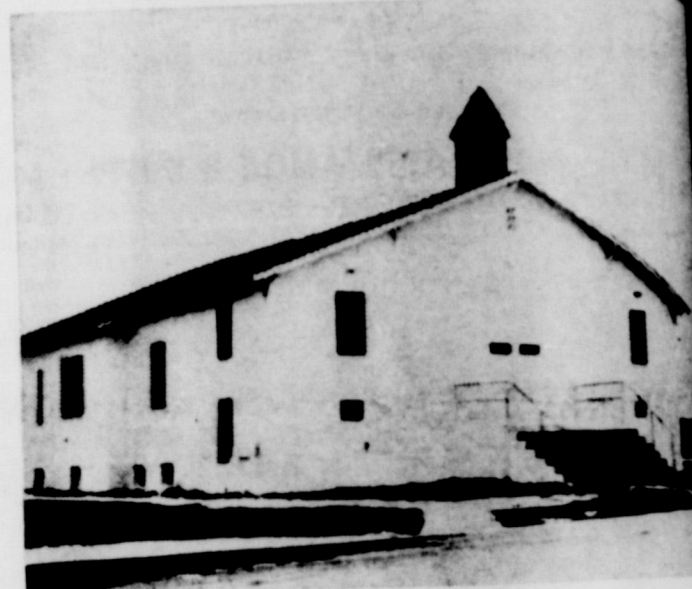
