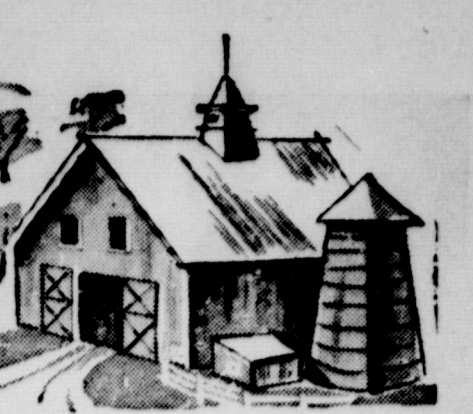

Wheeler Pool Open; Mayor Gets All Wet

Several hundred area kiddos, moms and dads enjoyed a free swim Monday night following the official opening of the Wheeler Municipal Pool. Pool manager Thomas Helton estimated that 250 people enjoyed the opening free swim.

Don Earney, president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, acted as master of ceremonies for the official opening. Speakers for the evening included R. J. Holt, president of the First National Bank in Wheeler; D. H. E. Nicholson, and Mayor Thomas Daughtry. Each of these men played an outstanding part in building the swimming pool for Wheeler.

Pool manager Thomas Helton read and explained the pool rules and regulations, and introduced his life guards.

The highlight of the evening came when Mayor Daughtry cut the ribbon and officially opened the pool. Just as the mayor clipped the ribbon three oddly dressed ruffians grabbed the mayor and all four went into the pool, clothes and all.

The mayor was completely unaware of this pre-arranged scheme to "get him wet". The men doing the dirty work were R. J. Holt Jr., Marvin McLarty and Dick DeArment.

GIANTS WIN TWO IN 1ST WEEK OF PLAY

At the end of the first week of play at the Kiwanis ball park most of the teams have had an opportunity to limber up with some of the opposing teams. Attendance has been very good at every game and will probably be even better as the teams start fighting for lead position in their division.

In the first night of play last Friday the Wheeler Rangers coached by Joe Rogers downed the Mobeetie little leaguers 16 to 5. Mobeetie is coached by Gene Guggel.

Monday night the Thunderbirds outscored the Cardinals 15 to 13 and the Giants went into an extra inning to beat the Braves 8 to 4.

Tuesday night saw the Cardinals slip by the Yankees 4 to 2 and the Giants skunked the Rangers 28 to 11.

One Section Of Farm Bureau Tower Is Up

One section of the Farm Bureau Transmitter tower is up and the concrete for the anchors, tower base and building foundation was poured Tuesday, according to a report received late Wednesday from construction engineer Odell Setliff.

Setliff said that the steel reinforced concrete required at least 72 hours to set before construction of the transmitter shack could begin. Work will resume Thursday morning on the shack or equipment building.

The 12' by 16' frame building will house all of the transmitter equipment including two U. S. T. 10-A and two R. A. 7 Amplifiers. However, the building is being

built large enough to house an additional transmitter in the event a third channel is installed at a later date by the Farm Bureau. Permits have been issued for Channels 10 and 4 out of Amarillo.

Just as soon as the "shack" is completed the rest of the tower will be erected Setliff said. The tower is being erected on land donated by Mickey Mixon in the northeast corner of the county.

Setliff has indicated that he will probably hold an "open house" at the site just as soon as the project is completed, but for the time being he is discouraging sightseers, because they are taking up valuable time and are ruining some of Mr. Mixon's pasture land.

A check with local TV technicians has disclosed that many of the Farm Bureau viewers are already converting their sets. Anyone that plans to take advantage of the Farm Bureau system is asked to make their \$60.00 contribution to one of the Farm Bureau officials.

Patrol Investigates 9 Accidents In Wheeler Area

The rural traffic accident summary for Wheeler County for the month of May, 1959, was released by Sergeant E. G. Albers, Highway Patrol Service, Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Highway Patrol investigated a total of 9 accidents of which 7 were property damage, 2 personal injury, and no fatal accidents. These accidents caused a total property damage of \$3,610 with no persons killed and 3 injured.

"Traffic accidents take no vacation," the Sergeant said, "and with the Texas and national traffic toll on the climb, to stay safe we must step up our vigilance on the road."

"During the vacation months, thousands of motorists are on the highways, and too many of them are intent on cramming as much activity as they can into one brief vacation," Sergeant Albers said. "The result is often tragedy."

He cautioned vacationers to be on their guard against speeders, drinking drivers, and drivers who disregard traffic laws. Above all, he warned them to make sure they are never guilty of such offenses themselves.

The selection was announced at the Annual State Convention held in Lubbock in May.

Harvest Begins; 15 Bushels Expected

Harvest of Wheeler County's wheat crop started this past week when F. H. Davidson cut 200 acres of 21 bushel wheat on his farm near Kelton. Davidson's wheat tested at 61 with a moisture content of 10 1/2 to 13 percent according to Cecil Richerson at the Richerson Grain Company.

The initial cutting indicate a yield of 15 bushels per acre with some wheat running as high as 25 bushels to the acre.

The wheat is testing 58 to 62 with a moisture content of 10 1/2 to 13 per cent, which classifies it as a No. 1 grain.

Richerson indicated that most of the farmers in this area will average 15 bushels per acre. However, he pointed out that many fields were damaged by hail and their average would probably run as low as 7 to 10 bushels per acre.

23,000 acres of wheat was allotted in Wheeler County this year and much of it will be placed in

the government loan which will net the producer approximately \$1.66 per bushel.

No storage problem is anticipated in Wheeler Richerson said.

111 REGISTER FOR RANGE FIELD DAY

One hundred and eleven people registered for the range management field day held on the Britt Ranch and the adjoining ranches of Pat Huff, Tobe Frye and Tom Puryear. It was a combined tour of local people and the members of the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management.

The tour was intended to cover all phases of grassland management. Much of the time was spent on brush control. Overgrazing and brush control are the two big problems in managing Texas grassland. Most of the areas visited have outstanding examples of proper use and brush control. One technician from the "Big Bend" country said that he saw more tall grass in one day than in all his life before. Several Experimental Station and Agricultural College staff members expressed amazement at the quality of the rangeland and type of management they observed.

Lunch was served on the Britt Ranch by the Briscoe Home Demonstration Clubs. These ladies did a wonderful job and are due public thanks for their contribution to a successful day.

Whatever your age and whatever the season, let your program of exercise fit your body - both its needs and abilities. And plan at some time during the year - around your birthday would be appropriate, wouldn't it? - to get an annual physical check up.

A test for TB should be included on that occasion too. TB is one of the major ailments that people may have without realizing it, because they may not feel sick. Yet the TB germs may be there and may be doing damage.

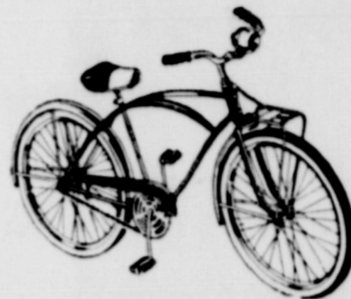

and taxes on natural resources and corporation franchises.

Senate, which heard a long string of witnesses on the dangers of shutting prosperity-making industries out of Texas, changed the ratio. In its version, natural gas and corporations pay about 18 per cent of the tab; selective sales taxes, 82 per cent.

Senate voted a 15-15 tie on its bill, with Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey breaking the tie in favor of the bill.

Named to a free conference committee to adjust differences were Sens. R. A. Weinert, Seguin; Dorsey Hardeman, San Angelo; Charles F. Herring, Austin; Jimmy Phillips, Angleton; Bruce Reagan, Corpus Christi; Also Reps. V. L. Ramsey, Beckville; W. T. Ovliver, Port Neches; Don Kennard, Fort Worth; Alonzo Jamison, Denton; George Cook, Odessa.

HOW THEY STACK: These items were hit, in varying degrees, by the House and Senate bills that went to conference committee:

Corporations — Senate, raise \$10,800,000 by hiking the franchise tax from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 capitalization. House, raise \$12,000,000 by a new two-factor tax on interstate corporations.

Natural Gas — Senate, raise \$8,000,000 by increasing the production tax from 7 to 8 per cent. House, raise \$36,500,000 by lowering production tax to 5 per cent and adding a 3 per cent severance beneficiary tax.

Motor Vehicle Sales — Both houses agreed on increasing sales tax from 11 to 15 per cent to bring in an additional \$7,000,000 to \$8,000,000.

Cigarettes — Senate, raise \$31,500,000 by boosting tax 3 cents a pack. House, raise \$10,500,000 (estimated) by a 1 cent a pack increase.

Utilities — Senate, increase the tax on water, gas and electric utilities by 20 per cent, for an estimated \$2,600,000. House, increase all other utilities to the telephone company rate of 2.3 per cent, for an estimated \$8,000,000.

Alcoholic Beverages — Senate, increase liquor tax from \$1.40 to \$1.65 a gallon, to raise \$2,000,000. House, increase it to \$2.25 a gallon for \$7,000,000.

Wine — Senate, increased tax by 20 per cent, for \$201,000. House doubled it for \$1,000,000.

Senate also tripled fees for selling beer and wine, doubled permits for liquor selling, for an estimated \$1,600,000. House bill does not include this.

Tobacco Products — Senate, would tax all such products, except snuff, by 12.5 per cent, to raise \$5,400,000. House tax is twice this.

Sulphur — Senate voted to retain present rate. House would reduce from \$1.40 to \$1.03 per ton. There is disagreement as to whether production increase would offset the tax increase in total revenue received.

Theatre Admissions — Both Senate and House lopped this by about \$120,000 a year.

Sound Equipment — Senate added a 2.2 per cent sales tax on radios, televisions, hi-fi and stereophonic sets for an estimated \$3,200,000.

Boats — Senate added 1.5 per cent sales tax on boats and motors for an estimated \$5,000,000.

PROPERTY BILL NIXED: For the second time this year, the House of Representatives has refused to sweep unclaimed property into the State Treasury.

The vote of 66-66 killed efforts in the Special Session. Vote that killed the bill earlier in the regular session was almost as close.

Gov. Price Daniel had urged the measure as a means of raising an estimated \$25,000,000 for the State's ailing general fund. It would have required banks, oil and gas companies, insurance companies and others to turn over to the state any property belonging to persons who have been missing for more than seven years.

Bank lobbyists were blamed by Daniel for defeat of the bill. He said they must accept responsibility for the state's having to raise, through new taxes the \$25,000,000 the bill would have produced.

Bankers have contended the escheat procedure would undermine depositors' confidence in the safety of their deposits.

LICENSE PLAN: Economy forces are taking a good look at whether or not the state's licensing practices might be unnecessarily expensive.

Historically the state has issued licenses annually. There's now some thinking that a lot of the licenses could just as easily be issued permanently, subject to cancellation for cause. Fees would still be collected annually, but a lot of time and money possibly could be saved by not having to type out and mail a new document each year.

Such a procedure was authorized by the Legislature in regular session for insurance companies. Some licenses probably could

not be adapted to the permanent policy. Among these would be drivers licenses, hunting and fishing licenses, and auto inspection stickers.

SEVEN FOR SPEAKER: Now the count is up to seven in the House speakership race. Seventh man in the lineup is Rep. Frank B. McGregor of Waco. His announcement was made at a luncheon sponsored by the Waco Chamber of Commerce.

Six already in the race are Reps. Ben Glasing of Kingsville, Wade Spilman of McAllen, W. T. Oliver of Port Neches, L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi, Jerry Sadler of Palestine and James A. Turman of Gober.

SHORT SNORTS: Radar traps must be test-checked for accuracy before a speeding ticket is valid, the Court of Criminal Appeals has held. Expert testimony in the case before the court had contended that as much as a 20 per cent error can occur if the radar machine is not set up properly. Lt. Gov. and Mrs. Ben Ramsey's new daughter, Mariben, born June 8, officially became "princess of the senate" in record time. By unanimous vote, the honor was bestowed when she was just one day old.
