## 1960 WHEAT MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM

A referendum of wheat farmers will be conducted in each wheat county on July 23, 1959. The designated polling places in Wheeler County for each community are as follows:

"A" and "B" Communities - Commissioner's Court Room in Wheeler, Texas.

"C" Community - First Door West of Atkins Grocery, Mobeetie, Texas.

"D" and "E" Communities - City Hall, Shamrock, Texas.

The polling places will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. All farmers and their wives, who in 1959 will have any share in more than 150 acres of wheat, are urged to take time out and vote

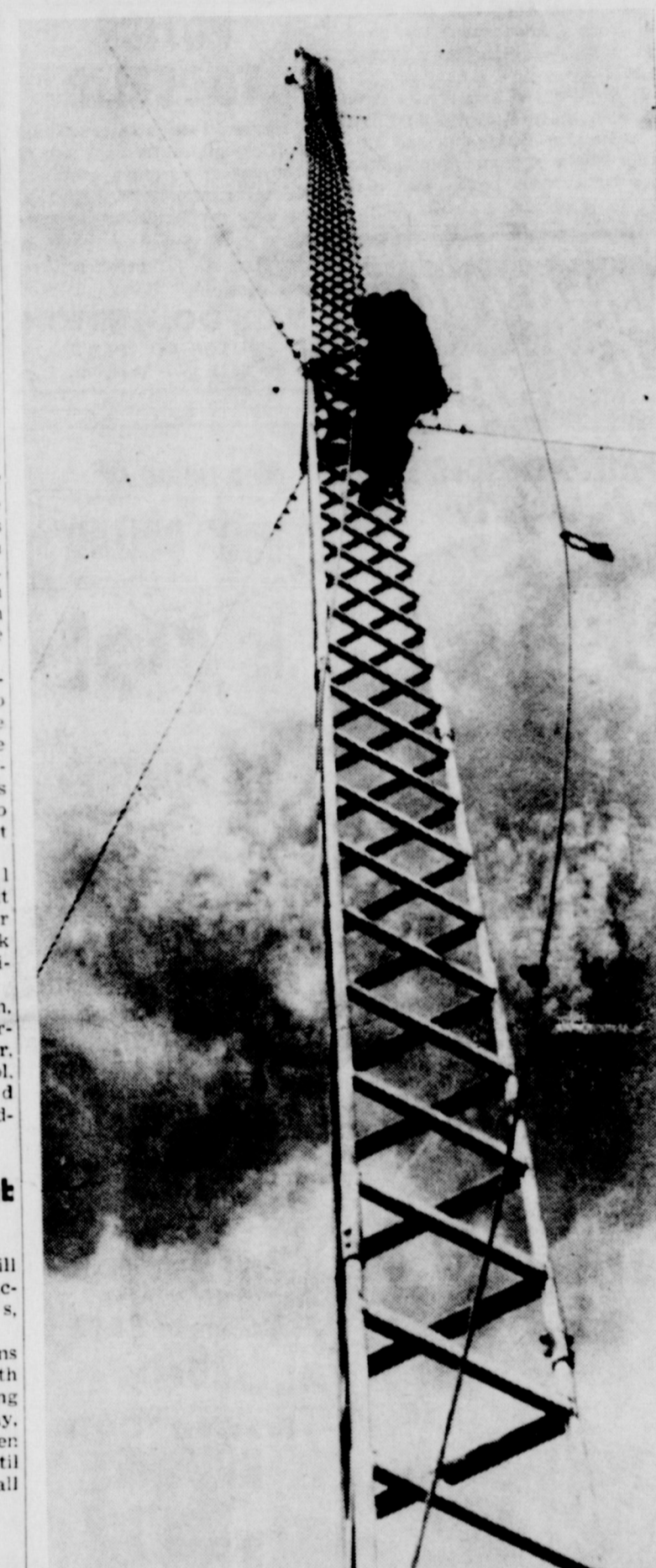
in the referendum. If more than 2/3 of those voting in the referendum in the United States vote in favor of wheat marketing quotas, the program will become effective. If more than 1/3 voters in the U. S. vote against marketing quotas, the program will not become effective.

If quotas are approved in the National Wheat Referendum, the following items will apply:

1. Cooperators may market all of the wheat produced without payment of any marketing quota penalty and will be entitled to price support.

2. Non-Cooperators will be required to pay or satisfy the pay-

## PAMPA SCHEDULES FOURTH OF JULY OBSERVANCE

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce has scheduled a full scale Fourth of July observance for the enjoyment of all residents of the 'Top O' Texas area.

The free program will begin at 7:30 p.m. July 4 in Recreation Park, East of the City. There will be good seating for the entire family and a ample parking space.

Professional entertainment by the Jockey Dogs and Prancing Ponies will follow an opening concert by the Pampa Harvester Band. The animals are former performers with the Gainesville Community Circus and have toured every state in the nation during the past six years.

Walter Rogers, representative of the 18th Congressional District, will bring a brief address and the new 49 star flag will be raised.

## WORKMEN WAIT FOR SPECIAL UHF EQUIPMENT

At press time this week the Farm Bureau Tower was up and most of the other odds and ends that go with construction of a translator system were complete. Workmen were waiting for antennas and special translator equipment to arrive from Colorado. The equipment was shipped Monday.

Construction engineer, Odell Setliff, indicated that he would be ready to monitor a signal within one day after the equipment arrived. "And just as soon as we get a good clean signal we will be ready to broadcast to the entire county".

To those who have already installed their antenna and converters we offer this bit of information. Channel four out of Amarillo will be picked up on channel 70 on the converter and channel 10 out of Amarillo will come in on channel 76.

As the first civilian 100-watt television translator system in the world nears completion it is felt that there are a number of people who have not subscribed as yet and will want to do so.

In order to provide service to everyone who wants it, subscribers again are being accepted. Also it is hoped to secure sufficient funds at this time to enable engineers to install equipment necessary to add Channel 7, Amarillo to the system. This assuring viewers facilities of the three major networks, NBC, CBS and ABC.

The Translator System will be incorporated and one share of stock issued with each \$60 subscription. . . entitling each subscriber to a vote in elections covering the Translator operation.

If needed funds are oversubscribed, the excess will be refunded on a pro-rated basis to all subscribers.

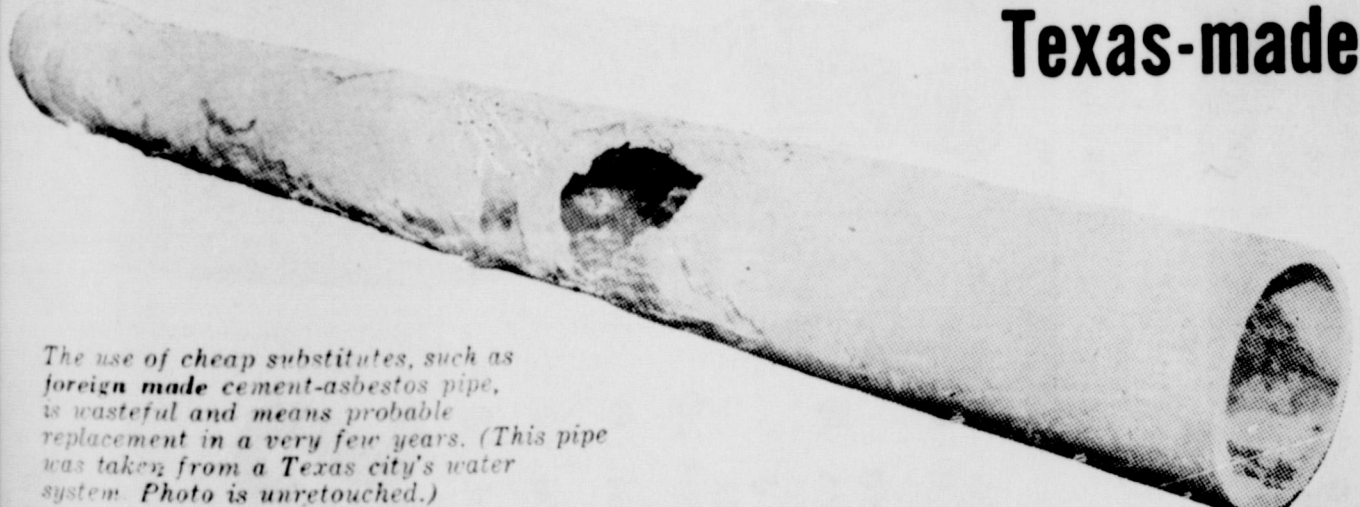

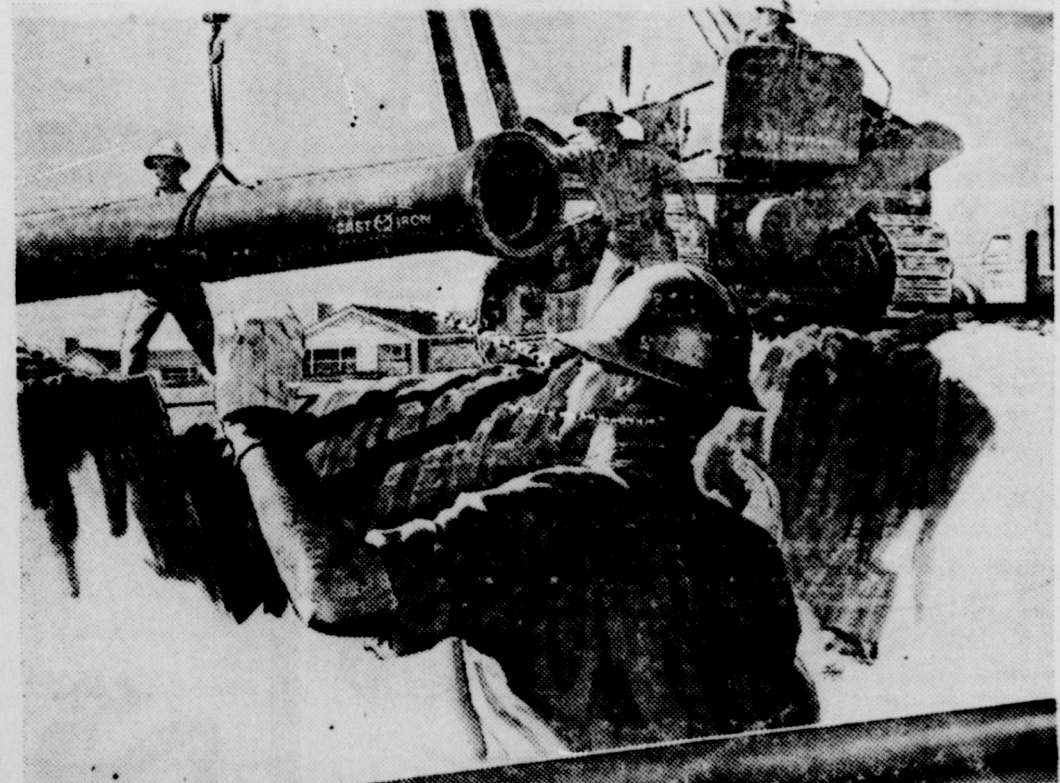
