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ODD FELLOWS TO ORGANIZE IN WHEELER

Vernon Hall, special district deputy of the Odd Fellows Lodge has announced plans for a special meeting to be held in the district courtroom of the courthouse. Hall explained that the purpose of the meeting is to discuss the possibilities of organizing an Odd Fellows Lodge in Wheeler.

The meeting will be held at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 28. Everyone that is interested in becoming a member of the lodge or would like to learn more about the Odd Fellows is asked to attend the meeting.

The Independent Order of the Odd Fellows was founded in Baltimore, Maryland, April 26, 1819 and since that date nearly seven million members have been admitted to its ranks.

INSECTS FOUND IN COTTON

Five cotton fields were checked Monday evening by the County Agent and the following was found: Mobeetie and Briscoe, 1% flea hoppers, light plant lice and thrip, but generally free of insects. Wheeler, 1% boll worm, with egg count showing a possible build up if weather stays damp and cloudy.

Twitty area count showed 4% and 5% flea hoppers, 1% boll worms and unhatched egg count shows a possible build up, this area is in a condition that insects could build up rapidly if weather conditions remain damp and cloudy. Therefore, Swain said, five day checks should be made to see if there is a build up of insects and if the new squares are turning brown it is a good indication flea hoppers are present and doing the damage.

Swain said right now the count does not justify spraying, but does justify a close observation of the cotton. Swain said he would appreciate being notified if there was a build up of cotton insects on any farm in the county.

DALLAS CONTRACTOR TO SPEAK AT BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD MEET

Marshall D. Barnett will be the guest speaker at the annual family night meeting at the North Fork Baptist Brotherhood Association Panfork Encampment, to be held July 30 at 7:00 P.M.

Following the supper special music will be furnished by the Wheeler Baptist Church and then the message will be delivered by Marshall Barnett, layman, Dallas, Texas.

Mr. Barnett, being a Texan, is almost by nature used to doing things on a big scale. In the last 30-odd years the Dallas contractor has erected some \$500,000,000 worth of buildings. During the last war, as commander of the 49th (Fighting) Battalion of Seabees, he helped build for the Navy a \$35,000,000 airbase on Bermuda, as well as the Guam headquarters of Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz.

In his personal faith, Barnett also has big ideas. He is a Baptist deacon, and the 63-year-old builder thinks that there are too many "don'ts" in organized religion and that it's time to stress, in good Seabee terms, the "can do's."

"We all seem to be forgetting the great commission of Jesus," he

says, "that Christians should go throughout the world and preach the gospel." Through thousands of missionaries, he believes, world peace can be insured.

His solution for getting the missionaries is direct - and to his mind easy. Merely raise \$102,000,000 annually from the more than 6,000,000 Southern Baptists for the next hundred years. And with these funds he would send out 6,000 missionaries a year. Although it seems like a lot of money, Barnett points out that it means raising only \$17 from each Baptist each year.

Funds collected would be turned over to the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Last years Barnett drew up a charter for Missions Unlimited, Inc. He insisted that anyone giving to the MU must specify that his contribution was over and above his regular church donations. Southern Baptists contribute more than \$115,000,000 a year to their convention. Barnett's scheme would call for almost double that amount from the members with each missionary being paid \$4,000 a year. (Continued on Page 8 No. 3)

Texas' 56th Legislature fizzled to the end of its third session and 180th day with its main job - providing money to run state government - still undone.

Gov. Price Daniel called a fourth session to begin just hours after the last one ended.

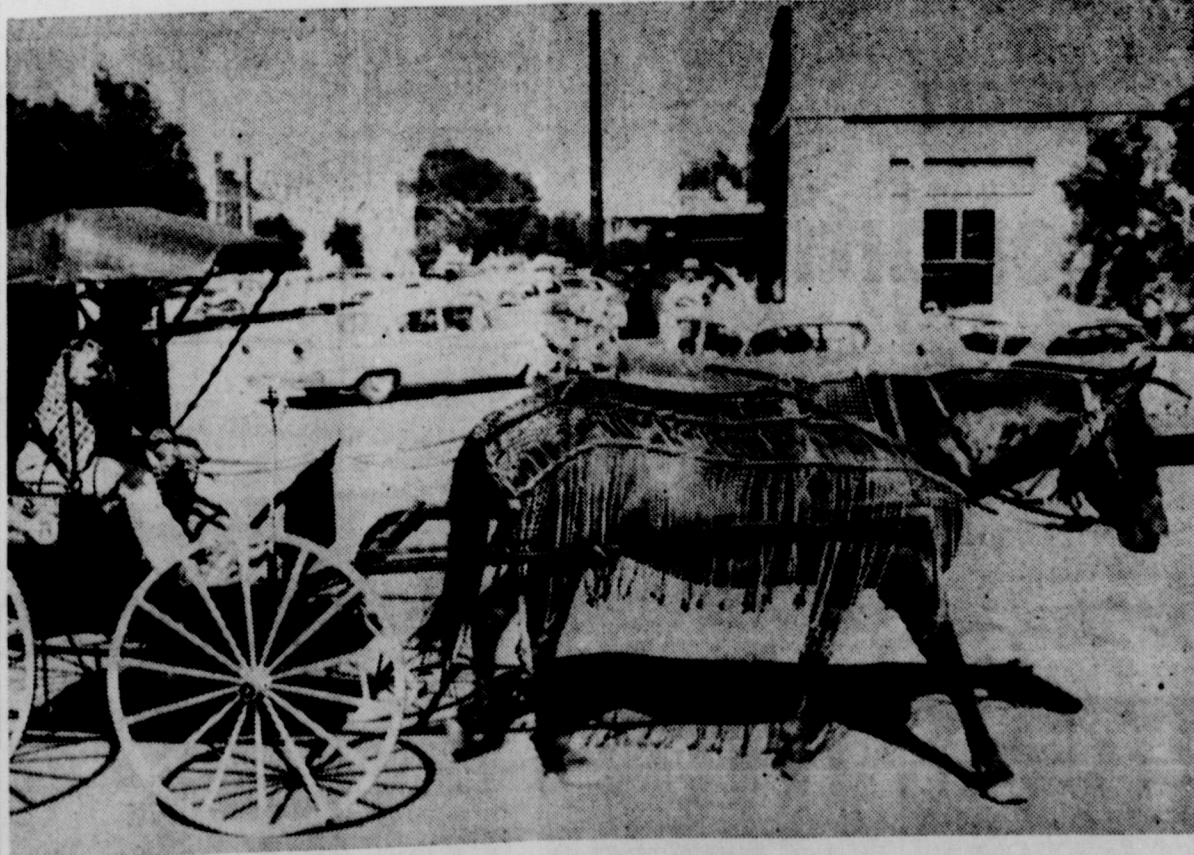
House members repeatedly voted down tax bills presented by joint conference committees of senators and representatives. Senate voted favorably each time.

First house rejection was by a vote of 8-to-64. This was on a

bill to tax tobacco, natural gas production, corporation franchisees, utilities, motor vehicles, liquor, wine, boats, motors, airplanes, radios, TVs, phonographs, cameras and liquor by the drink in private clubs.

Speaker Waggoner Carr named a new House conference group composed of members who had voted against the bill. They met with the same Senate conferees that had worked twice before.

Wheat Referendum To Be Held Today

Again, as in past years, wheat producers and their wives will determine, by ballot, if penalty on overplanting wheat allotments will be in effect and if price support will be at 75 percent or 50 percent of parity. In any event, allotments will be in effect.

With the wheat program second only to the guided missile for discussion, it seems important that every grower cast a ballot if he is interested in a wheat program.

Certainly, a light vote would indicate a lack of interest, therefore, it is important that every producer vote and register a definite opinion. Listed below are the polling places for this county:

Community "A" and "B" Court-house (Commissioners Courtroom) Wheeler.

Community "C" first door west of Atkins Grocery Store at Mobeetie.

Community "D" and "E" City Hall, Shamrock.

Approximately 4,000 people attended the 4th annual rodeo in Wheeler last week and an estimated 1,200 persons took advantage of the barbecue on the first night of the rodeo.

Bill Felts, Midland, Texas, carried home over \$200.00 and John Hart's share of the prize money was \$185.00.

Rodeo officials contribute the overwhelming success of the celebration to a number of things. Some say it was because of the top notch stock furnished by Charlie Plummer and the large number of contestants that took part in the show. Whatever the reason much of the credit should go to men like Frank Caswell, Riding Club President; Jim Montgomery and John Barr, who so very efficiently planned and served the barbecue; Vernon Lewis, Parade Chairman; and a host of other men and women that, helped prepare the food and drink for the meal, served barbecue, worked the rodeo gate, timekeepers, distribute advertising, sold ads in the rodeo catalogue, book work for the rodeo. A special thanks is due Ray Johnson who donated 1,500 loaves of bread to be used at the barbecue.

Probably the luckiest man at the rodeo was J. M. Liles, he won the horse given away by the Riding Club.

Part of the money taken in at the gate will be used to improve the rodeo grounds for next years performance according to the (Continued on Page 8 No. 7)

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WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Stubble mulching is an important conservation practice in the Wheeler District. It is a method of farming that preserves enough crop residues on the surface to protect the land from wind and water erosion throughout the year. Tillage, seedbed preparation and seeding are done through the stubble. Any drilled crop that leaves enough residue can be stubble mulched. The practice is most often used on small grains.

P. A. Martin and Grady Dodd have used stubble mulching on wheat land for several years. They like the way it holds moisture and stops erosion. Norbert Schlegel and Clarence Zybach use mulch tillage on sorghum stubble on lighter soils to control blowing. It is very effective and frequently saves emergency tillage during early spring.

Wide sweeps make the best stubble mulch tools. They bury only about ten per cent of the cover each time over. A one-way plow will usually bury about half of the residue. When stubble is unusually heavy, it is sometimes advisable to use a one-way tillage during early spring.

The ACP includes stubble mulching as a cost-share practice. Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district will be glad to furnish further information to anyone who is interested.

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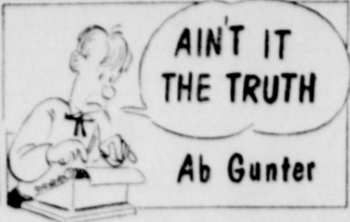

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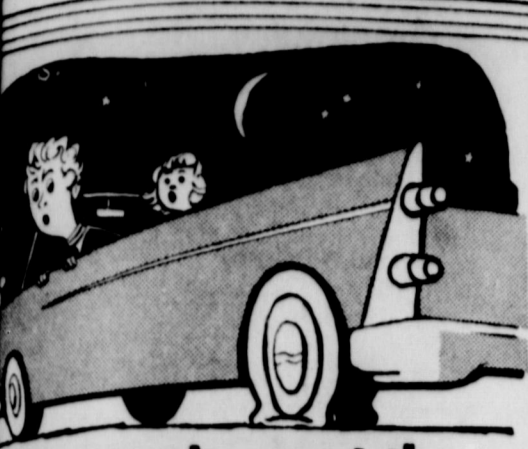

Exhibit samples consist of five pounds, shipped to Mr. Bill Grisham Jr., District Agent, Extension Service, P. O. Box 1558, Amarillo, Texas, prior to 9 a.m. Saturday, September 19, 1959, and the proper

variety listed with it according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent.

Swaim said the 4-H boys had a small seed cleaner which will be available to the men and boys of the county to clean the foreign matter from their seed. One should have at least ten pounds and hand pick five pounds of as near perfect seed as possible from this. Swaim said the seed must be free of foreign matter, uniform in size, free from disease, cracks or any type of damage to place

Performances will be held nightly August 4-8. All cowboys and cowgirls are reminded that this years show will include five rodeo performances rather than four as in the past. Entries will close at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, August 4.

Events will include Calf Roping, Double Muggin, Duldoggging, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bareback Bronc Riding, and Bull Riding. The purse of some \$5,000.00 will be supplemented by one half of all entry fees, with handsome silver buckle trophies going to the winner of each.

The colorful Cowgirl Sponsor Contest will use the standard Clover Leaf Pattern for both go-rounds, with a beautiful hand-made western saddle going to the

cowgirl with the best average time in two rides.

Much interest is being shown in the American Quarter Horse Show, scheduled for August 6 and 7 with Wiley Reynolds and Buddy Price directing activities.

The Open Cutting Horse Contest, under the direction of Guy Andis is always a very popular contest of the Pampa show.

COUNTY ASC NEWS

The Wheat Marketing Quota referendum to vote for or against marketing quotas for the 1960 wheat crop will be held July 23. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. at the following places:

Wheeler - Commissioners Court Room

Mobeetie - One Door West of Atkins Grocery

Shamrock - City Hall

All growers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat for next year will be eligible to vote. Husbands and wives are both eligible. If you plan to be away July 23, you may vote absentee at the County Office before the referendum.

Marketing quotas will remain in effect only if approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum. When wheat marketing quotas are in effect, farmers who comply with their individual wheat acreage allotments may market their entire wheat crop without penalty and are eligible for price support at 75 percent of parity. If there are no quota controls, price support is available at 50 percent of parity to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments.

National Farm Safety Week

July 19 to July 25 has been designated as National Farm Safety Week. According to a bulletin issued by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, "Nearly half of the accident fatalities associated with machinery occur during the busy farm work season - May, June, July and August." Machinery and drownings account for one-half of the fatal farm accidents. Each farm and ranch family should be safety conscious especially during these months. "Use safety know-how for each safety responsibility."

Noxious Weeds on Soil Bank Land

This is to remind all producers that noxious weeds, consisting of cocklebur and sunflower, must be controlled on soil bank conservation reserve acreage. These weeds must be controlled and not allowed to mature.

Cotton Measurement

Several cotton farms have been measured over the county. If you receive a notice that your cotton acreage is in excess of the cotton allotment, you will have 15 days in which to plow up the excess cotton and place the farm in compliance and eligible for a cotton marketing card. A fee of \$4.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each plot over one of cotton plowed up will be charged for checking the destroyed cotton.

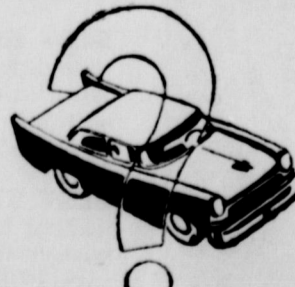

was that the private club tax was cut down and the radio and TV tax slightly increased.

House rejected it again, this time 83-to-66.

More conferences and more votes followed in the final frantic hours. All futile! None made any apparent progress toward compromising the basic bone of contention, whether to tax gas pipelines. House favors this "severance beneficiary" tax by a narrow margin. Senate is flatly against.

Along with his new call, Governor Daniel issued a sober warning. Unless a tax bill is passed and effective (requiring a two-thirds favorable vote) by Aug. 15, there won't be time or money to get Sept. 1 checks to 225,000 old age pensioners.

Carr Foes Back Down

During the tense, short-tempered days in the wind-up of the last session, Speaker Waggoner Carr was, for a time, the target for pent-up frustrations and pressure.

Carr had worked to get the House to accept the Senate-passed tax bill. When the House turned the bill down, Carr said that "obstructionists" had defeated it.

This was a red flag to members already sensitive to public criticism of a "do-nothing" Legislature. For several days they simmered. They accused Carr of trying to thwart the will of a House majority, talked of voting him out of the speakership.

In a dramatic showdown, Carr stepped down from the rostrum and challenged critics to remove him if they thought it would make things any better.

Nobody accepted his dare. A few minutes later, on motion of Rep. Joe Burkett, the man Carr defeated for the speakership, Carr was escorted back to the speaker's chair.

And the wearying legislative battle began again.

Student Fee Bill Okayed

A bill to require state college students to pay an activity fee passed both houses by very narrow margin.

Measure would allow the colleges to charge students up to \$30 a semester to support health services, book rentals, cultural and athletic events, campus publications, parking, etc.

Any college may exempt from the fee up to 10 per cent of its enrollment in cases where the charge would cause "undue financial hardship."

Bill was hard-fought. Opponents declared it would make "free public education" available only to the rich. Backers said the colleges had to have more money. It was estimated the bill could bring in as much as an extra \$1,000,000 a year.

Beach Bill Passes

Both houses passed and sent to the governor a bill guaranteeing public access to state-owned beaches.

It took a conference committee to work out the differences between House and Senate ideas on the bill.

As finally passed, the bill says the public shall have the right to come and go from public beaches. No one, it says, shall erect a fence or barrier to prevent this.

Beaches that cannot be reached by public road or ferry are exempt.

Wait, Young Lovers

Governor Daniel's expected signature on a newly passed bill will put a damper on the elopement plans of Texas teen-agers.

It will require boys under 21 and girls under 18 to wait three days after obtaining a license to get married. Also, to get the license, the youngsters must be accompanied by parents or guardians.

Need Money First

Amid the legislative tax deadlock, the Commission on Higher Education decided to stop studying new money-spending programs until there's money to spend.

Commission's job is to determine needs of the state's colleges and universities and make recommendations to the Legislature. Expanded programs and new degrees are being sought by many schools. But when the Commission met, there was no money in sight even to open the schools next fall, let alone expand them.

Commission resolved to "approve no programs which entail additional expenditures until such time as monies are provided for the programs and offerings already in existence."

Oil Quota Kept Down

Texas oil allowable will be held down to nine producing days a gain for August.

Railroad Commission ordered the same production as for July - 2,700,164 barrels a day on a nine-day schedule.

Major oil purchasing companies and independent producers were virtually agreed that production must be kept low to reduce excessive stocks.

Collect Products For Area Fairs

Bryan Swaim, county agent, said boys, girls, and adults should start now collecting vegetables, fruit, bundles of feed and heads of grain for local and district fairs.

Swaim said grain samples should consist of one gallon and then the sample may be shown anywhere. All foreign matter, cracked grains and diseased grains should be removed as well as have grains of about uniform size. Heads of grain, fruit, and vegetables should be of uniform size and at the stage of growth and maturity desired for proper use of the product including free from blemishes and good coloring.

Swaim said he would appreciate all the help he could get in collecting top agricultural exhibits and if any further information is needed anyone may check at the county agents office as to number of products and etc.

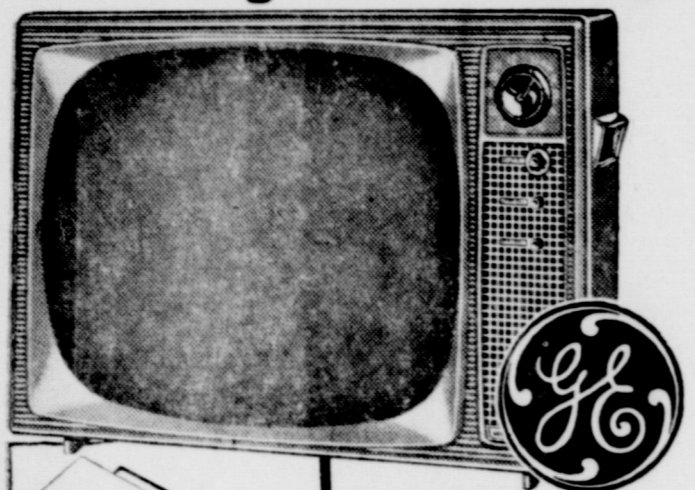

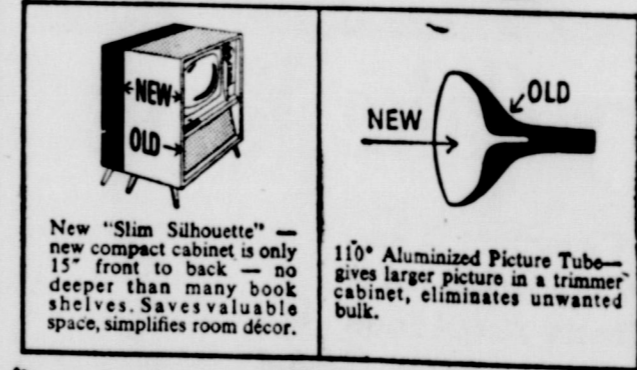

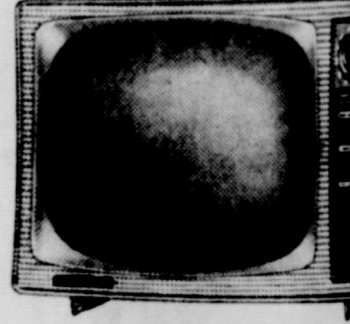
