Shipment of Translators Delayed Until August 17

Factory Blamed For Long Delay

Still no news on the Farm Bureau Translator System. Everyone seems to believe that the equipment will arrive at any moment. But as of late Wednesday afternoon the equipment definitely had not arrived in Wheeler County.

It might be a little comforting to know that Wheeler County residents aren't the only ones that are anxiously waiting for the system to be completed. The Times office has received cards and letters from practically every county in the Panhandle asking that they be informed just as soon as the system is complete.

In a letter received late Wednesday evening from Wilson Leeper of the Television Communications Engineers Inc., Fort Collins, Colorado, it was learned that the two 100 watt translators that were supposed to have been shipped several weeks, have not been shipped from the New York factory and will probably not be shipped until August 17.

The following is a copy of the letter received from Leeper:

To Odell Settiff
Wheeler County, Texas

"We have been advised by Adlers Electronics Inc. today that the two 100 watt translator systems cannot be shipped until the week of August 17th. This is due to delays in obtaining component parts and vacations of various supplier companies. I don't have to tell you how I feel about this but there is not a damn thing I can do about it. Please advise all parties concerned.

P.S. Remember that freight will take at least ten additional days on top of this."

After receiving the letter Settiff and J. T. Johnson of Mobeetie phoned the New York company to see why the equipment had not been shipped as pre-scheduled. The company official explained that the date mixup was the fault of factory personnel. He said that he would do his utmost to see that the equipment was shipped as soon as possible.

2 Patrolmen To Be Stationed In County

A Texas Highway Patrol sub-station, to be manned by two patrolmen, will be located in Shamrock, effective August 1.

Captain J. W. Blackwell, Amarillo, notified Shamrock Mayor Seibert Worley that location of the sub-station in Shamrock had been approved by the Texas Highway Patrol. Mayor Worley and

other local civic leaders, together with Captain Blackwell, had been working toward that goal for the past three years.

Dave Croslin, now stationed in McLean, will be the senior member of the local station. The other patrolman will be B. R. Rusk, who is attending patrol school in Austin. They will serve all of Wheeler County, which will be the main portion of their territory.

R. C. Parker will remain at the McLean sub-station, and a patrolman will be named to replace Croslin there.

The new station will be under the direction of Sgt. E. G. Albers of Pampa, who has charge of nine of the 31 counties in District 5-B.

Headquarters for the patrol station will be the justice of the peace office, which is also headquarters in Shamrock for the sheriff's department.

Patrolman Croslin has been with the department one and a half years and has been stationed at McLean for the past 12 months. He was a graduate from high school in Buffalo, Missouri, and attended North Texas State College, Denton. He formerly lived in Plainview where his parents still reside.

He is married to the former Maureta Horn of Briscoe. They have one son, Randy, 2½ years. (Continued on Page 8 No. 7)

TEXAS CHILDREN MAY BE DENIED NINE MONTHS' SCHOOL YEAR

Public school children will be denied a long vacation during the summer if the Legislature fails to appropriate state funds for the schools. Without state financial aid provided by the Legislature, schools will be limited to local financing. Some districts would be able to operate for only three or five weeks. Others could be closed for a semester, while a few schools might be able to complete a nine-month term.

The stark reality of this possibility apparently has not dawned upon the parents whose children attend the Texas public schools. Legislators report that they have received very few communications from their constituents.

Here are the facts: If the Legislature should fail to pass a general appropriation bill and enact

a new tax bill to finance that bill, the State Treasurer would be unable to write a single check for any purpose. The public schools would not receive any state funds, and their financing would be left completely to local property taxes, many of which are already at the legal limit.

September 1 is the deadline date. If the Legislature has not solved these problems by that time, the public schools and all other state services will cease receiving state funds.

Since the state guarantees 80 per cent of the Minimum Foundation Program and the local district 20 percent, the loss of the state share could result in denying Texas students educational opportunities for the next school year. This would be a step backward, at a time when Texas schools need to move forward.

In addition, old age pensioners could not receive their checks which are so vital to their exist-

ance. No state employees could be paid. State supported colleges and universities would be unable to pay their teachers and other employees. No food could be purchased to feed the inmates and patients of the various institutions. Prison guards could receive no remuneration. The highway department would default on payments to contractors, who in turn might have to curtail operations which would result in widespread unemployment. The state highway patrol would cease to function. Every state service would come to a stop.

This is the situation which confronts the proud state of Texas. Its solution rests in the hands of the members of the 56th Legislature.

Members of the Legislature will welcome suggestions from their own constituents and indications of support for themselves if they vote the taxes needed to prevent this financial catastrophe.
