More Money Needed To Operate As **Top Notch School**



The Wheeler Board of Education together with a committee on property valuations has been actively engaged for several weeks in attempting to reach a reasonable and uniform appraisal of the property in Wheeler School District. Members of the committee were: George Gandy, George Taylor, Nelson Porter, Dorsie Hutchison, and Loubet Moore.

"In order to meet the needs for an increasingly complex economy, our children need the very best education it is possible for us to give them. It is planned to make available to each student four years of mathematics, four years of English, four years of science, four years of commercial subjects, and vocational training in agriculture and homemaking. It seems to us that these are the very core of an adequate educational program," superintendent Cordell said.

"In order to meet these needs, the school needs more money, and this can only come from the local taxes," according to Cordell. We feel that by using 32% of the assessed values instead of the 25% figure which has been in use in the recent years. This figure will bring in approximately \$6000 per year more than for the 1958-59 valuations, and will enable us to equip fully for our advanced science courses, add to our grade and high school libraries which are very inadequate; and redecorate our buildings extensively; including boiler repairs
