Matched Roping Contest To Be Held In Wheeler Saturday Night

Shelby Pettit Is Busy Man

While visiting with Commissioner Shelby Pettit this reporter was surprised to learn that county workmen are still working around the clock trying to complete area projects and road work.

The picture below is just one of the 37 projects that commissioner Pettit has undertaken. The washouts and road damage came from the excessive rains like the 7 inch rain on May 25, 6 1/4 inches

on June 22, 6 inches June 30, 4 inches July 10, 1 1/2 inches on July 12, 2 3/4 inches on July 20 and numerous other light showers.

"Although there has been extensive damage to the roads and crops by the heavy rains, we feel that the benefits reaped by the drought breaking rains will greatly outweigh the losses", Pettit said.

"Area crops are looking good

and the federal government is helping to defray the expense involved in rebuilding numerous county roads", he continued.

"I only hope that the people of my precinct understand that because of the additional projects undertaken, we are behind in our regular maintenance work on county roads. Most of the projects are progressing rapidly and we are scheduling our work for the earliest completion," Pettit concluded.



TIME TO CLAIM REFUND ON FARM-USED GASOLINE

Farm operators have until September 30 to claim a refund of the federal gasoline tax on all gasoline used on the farm, according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent.

The refund applies to the three cents per gallon federal tax on gasoline which was purchased from July 1, 1958 through June 30, 1959. Those who filed a claim for refund in 1958 will receive form 2240 through the mail. Others who wish to make a claim should ask the Internal Revenue Service to send them one, or come by the County Agent's office.

The claim should be sent to the Office of the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, Texas. Claims made after September 30 will not be paid and no more than one claim can be filed for the twelve month period.

Farmers who file claims for a refund should keep sufficient records to certify the accuracy of the refund claimed. The records must show the purchase dates, the gallons bought and the gallons used

on the farm during the twelve month period. Also the gasoline used by custom operators doing custom work for a farmers should be recorded and can be included in the claim for refund, Swaim notes.

Excise taxes paid on diesel fuel or special motor fuels for farm

purposes can also be recovered. The farmer should ask the dealer to repay the taxes on the fuel bought. The dealer should be furnished a signed statement, showing the name and address of the purchaser, the date of purchase and gallons purchased, add Swaim.

These workshops will be held on August 26-27.

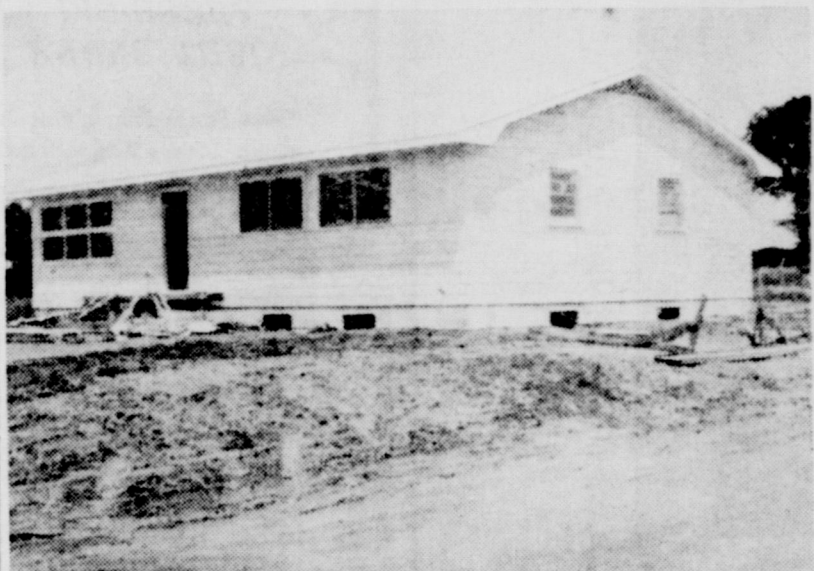
