## WATCH FOR NEW LAWS

Scores of new laws passed during the regular Legislative session ending in May go into effect this month. From here on, anyone convicted of four moving traffic violations within 12 months will be classed a "habitual violator", subject to drivers license suspension for any period up to a year. Same rule applies to anyone convicted of 7 or more violations committed within a 24 hour period.

New, tightened laws are in effect on the waterways, too. Now against the law are: operating a boat or skiing while under the influence of liquor, skiing at night and "reckless or negligent" boating and skiing.

Now required by law are: a life preserver for every passenger on a boat and a lighting system, according to size, for every boat. Boat registration fees will not be required until next April.

Another new law makes taking a ride in someone else's car without his permission a felony offense. Previously, it was hard to get more than a misdemeanor conviction for car stealing.

Ranchers and farmers will be required to fence land along state and U. S. highways to prevent cattle from roaming on the road. Law does not apply to farm-to-market roads.

Retail merchants no longer may advertise goods at "wholesale" prices. Only firms that sell only to retailers may claim wholesale selling.

Other new laws won't be noticed until later. For example, the new "stick with the party" law requires that a poll tax holder have his receipt stamped "Republican" or "Democrat" the first time he participates in a primary or convention. From then on, in effect, he's stuck with the party stamped on his tax receipt - until he gets a new poll tax.

A new program to inspect for cattle disease at live stock auctions was authorized, but is expected to be very small scale for the first two years, at least. It was given only a fraction of the money supporters said was necessary.

While attending Tech, Junior has worked at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located near Lubbock. His plans for the future include employment with the Experiment Station for the next two years as an Assistant Agronomist under Dr. Nick Karmner. This work deals with research work on grain sorghum. While working under Dr. Karmner, Junior will work up a thesis for a Masters of Science degree, take some courses at Tech that will transfer, and then complete his work for an M.S. degree at Colorado University, Boulder, Colorado.

Grace has displayed while pastor of the church, he has also proven his ability as a business man in handling the church's business.

No replacement has been named for Rev. Grace at Mobeetie.

## Cordell Is Speaker For Kiwanis Meeting

Superintendent Arling Cordell was the guest speaker at the regular Kiwanis meeting held Monday in the Fellowship Hall of the Methodist Church. Mr. Cordell spoke to the Kiwanians about the coming school term and explained the needs and requirements necessary to operate the Wheeler school under state specifications. Mr. Cordell outlined a very interesting school program which seemed to meet with the approval of his attentive audience.

## Translator To Be In Operation Within A Few Days

Construction engineers as well as area ranchers, farmers and farm bureau members were rejoicing Wednesday after learning by telegram that the long-awaited translator equipment was shipped last Friday from New York.

In a telegram from the Adler Electronic Corporation in New Rochelle, New York, construction engineer Odell Setliff learned that one complete channel, including a U.S.T. 10 watt translator and a RA 7-100 watt amplifier and transmitting antennas, was shipped last Friday.

Setliff phoned the factory Wednesday and learned that the rest of the equipment (the other channel) had been shipped Monday. The equipment was shipped via Eastern Express from New York to Chicago. International Motor Lines will transfer the equipment from Chicago to Denver, Colorado and then the Sooner Freight Line will bring the equipment into Shamrock.

"We expect the equipment to arrive either Friday or Saturday. And if it does we can have at least one channel in operation by Monday," Setliff said.

If the project is completed within the next few days as Setliff has indicated, it will be the climax of a project that has involved hundreds of people and taken thousands of man-hours to complete.

It has been a little over a year ago that Farm Bureau members began planning the almost impossible task of "bringing television to the scattered rural population of Wheeler County". It didn't seem to bother the small group of men when they learned that the system they proposed would be the first 100 watt civilian type translator in the world. Nor were they discouraged when they discovered that the cost would reach upwards to fifty thousand dollars.

Most of the men plunged into the project with as much vigor and enthusiasm as first graders display during their first few weeks of school.

Now everyone is anxiously waiting to see just how good reception will be, over the new system.

## Kelton School To Open Soon

Superintendent Joe Bailey announced today that school will begin Monday, September 7 in the Kelton community.

A general assembly will be held Monday morning and everyone is invited to attend.

Bailey explained the delay in opening of school this year was necessary because of the extensive remodeling project in progress at the school. Bailey said the remodeling will be completed in time for the September 7 opening. The project included a complete face lifting in the second story of the school. The gym and lunch room was also completely remodeled. A new piano and scoreboard has been purchased for the gym. New windows, roof, stage and doors have been added to the gym.

New lighting has been installed throughout the school and new furniture has been purchased for the classrooms.

## Firemen Answer Two Alarms

Wheeler Volunteer Firemen were called out two times Wednesday. The first alarm was sounded at 11:30 and firemen rushed to the John Lewis farm northeast of town.

Fire leaped from a trash barrel and started the fire which burned 5 acres before it was brought under control by the Wheeler Firemen.

The second alarm was sounded at 1:00 p.m. the same day. And again fire had leaped from a trash barrel and ignited dry grass around the base of the barrel. The second fire was behind the C. D. Davis home at 1004 South Canadian.

## Gas Rate Dispute To Be Settled

Case No. 108,605 in regard to the Wheeler Gas Company vs. the Railroad Commission of Texas, has been set for Monday, November 23, 1959, in the district courtroom in Travis County, Texas.

The outcome of the case will determine the gas rate for Wheeler. Approximately 3 years ago the Wheeler Gas Company asked for an increase in their city gas rate. The city officials did not approve their proposed gas rate hike. However, the city council did offer the gas company a 10 cent increase per thousand cubic feet of gas. The Gas Company refused the 10 cent increase and appealed to

the railroad commission to OK the rate increase. The Railroad Commission upheld the councils decision and said the councils proposed 10 cent raise was sufficient.

And finally on January 8, 1958 the Wheeler Gas Company got an injunction against the Railroad Commission, which gave them the permission to charge the prevailing rate. However, the Gas Company was forced to post a \$10,000 bond guaranteeing repayment to gas customers in case the final rate settlement was not as much as they are charging.

After numerous postponements and delays the final trial to settle the gas rate issue has been set for Monday, November 23.

## Wheeler Firemen Extinguish Grass Fire

Wheeler Volunteer Firemen were called to the R. J. Smith farm last Friday at 12:30 noon to extinguish a grass fire that had started on the Ben Trout farm and spread across the K. D. Ford place onto the R. J. Smith farm.

Firechief Holt said approximately 20 acres of weeping lovegrass was destroyed on the R. J. Smith farm. No damage to livestock or permanent property was reported.

## Fall From Horse Injures 9-Year-Old

Juanita Hutchinson, 9-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hutchinson of Wheeler, was injured last Saturday when she fell from a horse in her back yard. Juanita was rushed to the Shamrock hospital where she was treated for a broken arm and leg. She is reported to be improving nicely. Her physician said she will probably remain in a cast for 8 or 9 weeks.

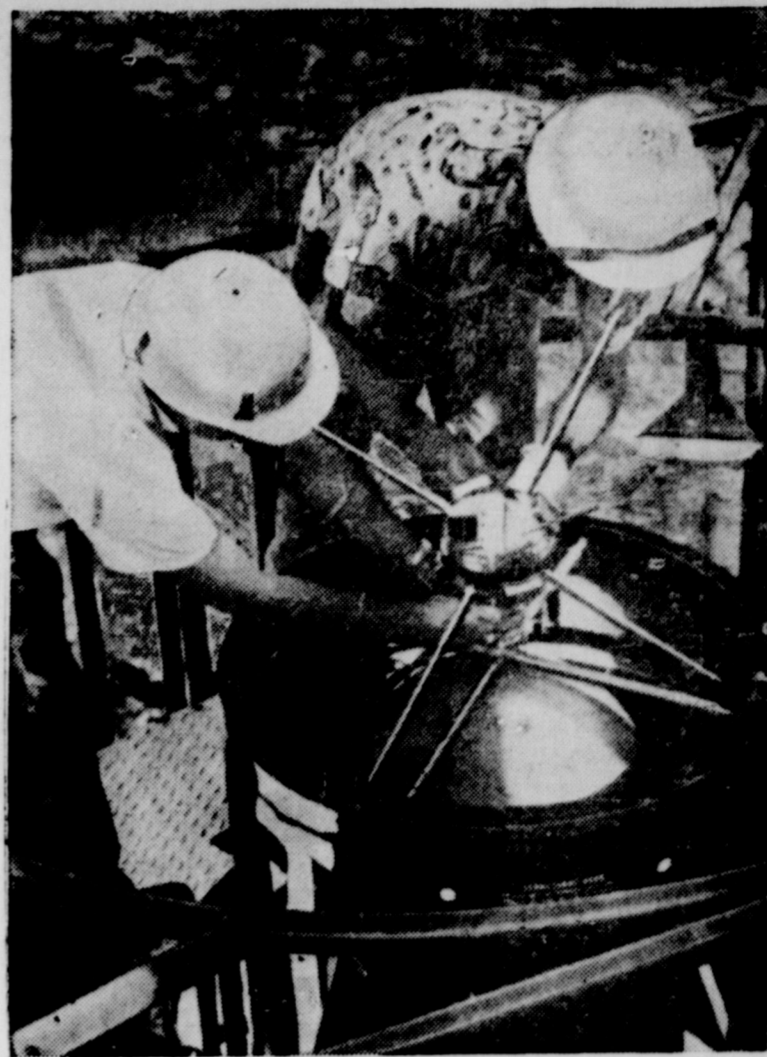

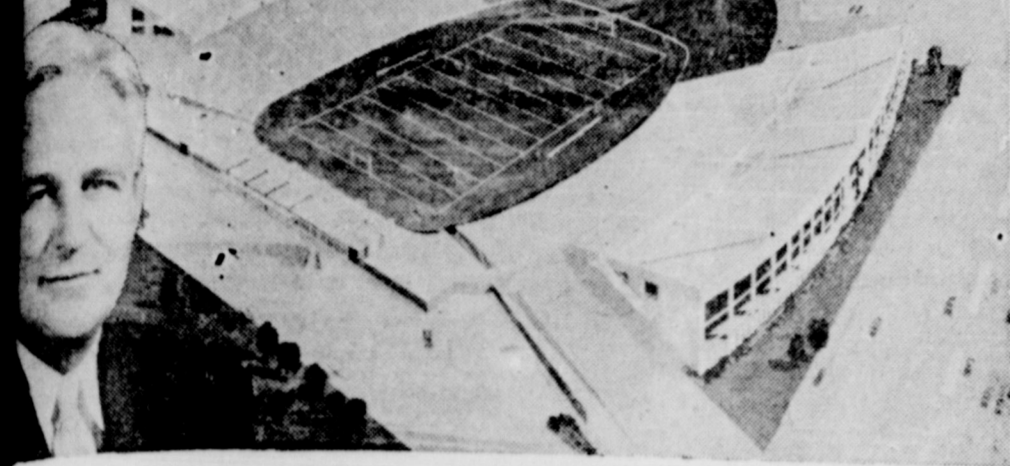

**Soil Conservation Stamp On Sale**

This is a black and white reproduction of the 4-cent soil conservation stamp now on sale at the post office here. The stamp, printed in three colors, went on sale yesterday (August 26) in Rapid City, South Dakota, at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

The stamp portrays a modern conservation farm, according to Dusan Paikon, chairman of the Wheeler District Board. Grasses in the rolling pasture, foreground, prevent soil erosion and conserve moisture. Grazing is regulated to favor growth of the best forage grasses.

A farm pond, lower right, provides water for domestic and livestock use, for fire protection, for wildlife, and for recreation such as fishing, swimming and boating.

Contour stripcropping and rotation systems, left and right center, include grasses and cultivated crops in alternating bands. The grassed strips catch and hold soil that may move out of cultivated strips during rainstorms, and they increase moisture insoak.

Trees and shrubs control erosion, provide a home for wildlife, and protect the farmstead from the hot winds of summer and the cold winds of winter.

Conservation farming, as depicted in the stamp, gives assurance of a plentiful supply of food and other products of the land for the seven-eighths of our people who live in town, symbolized in upper right.

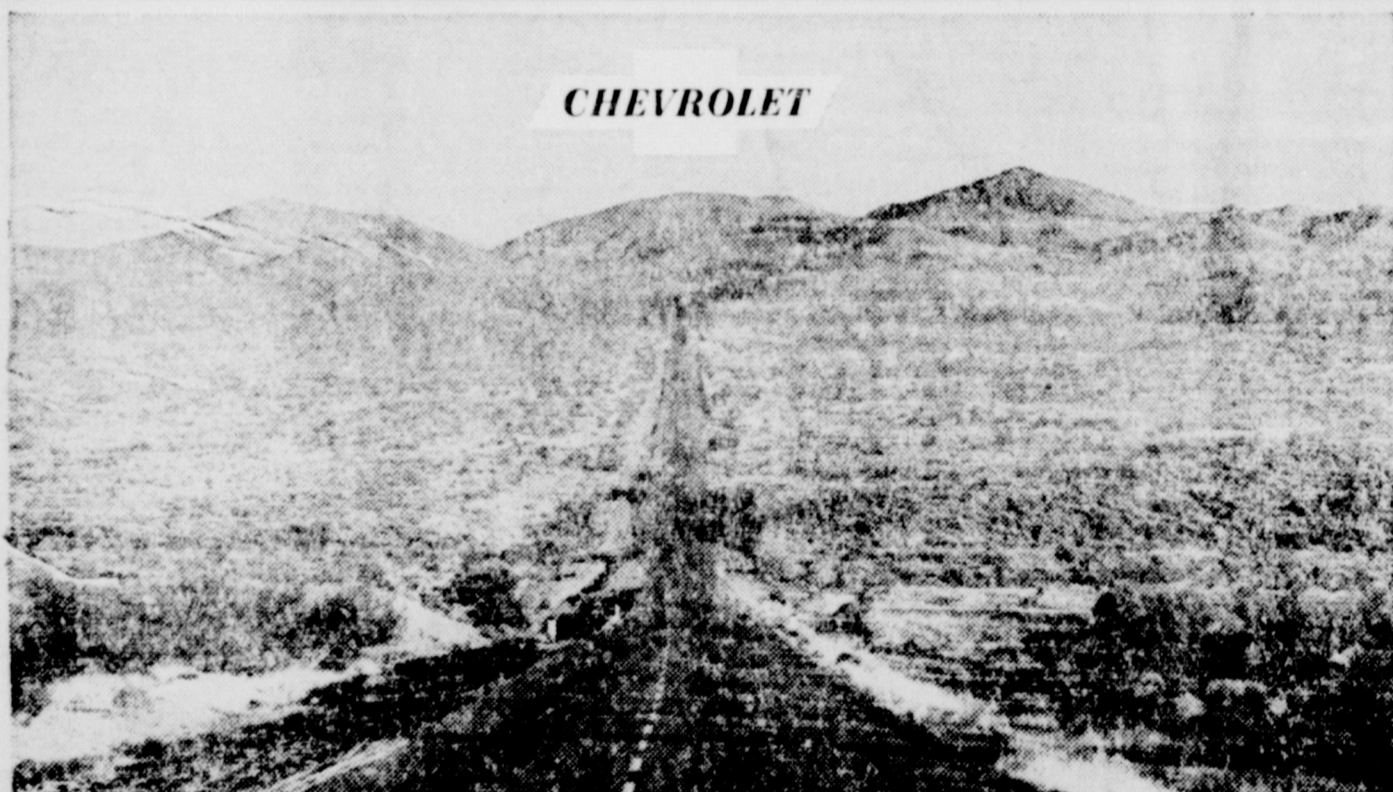

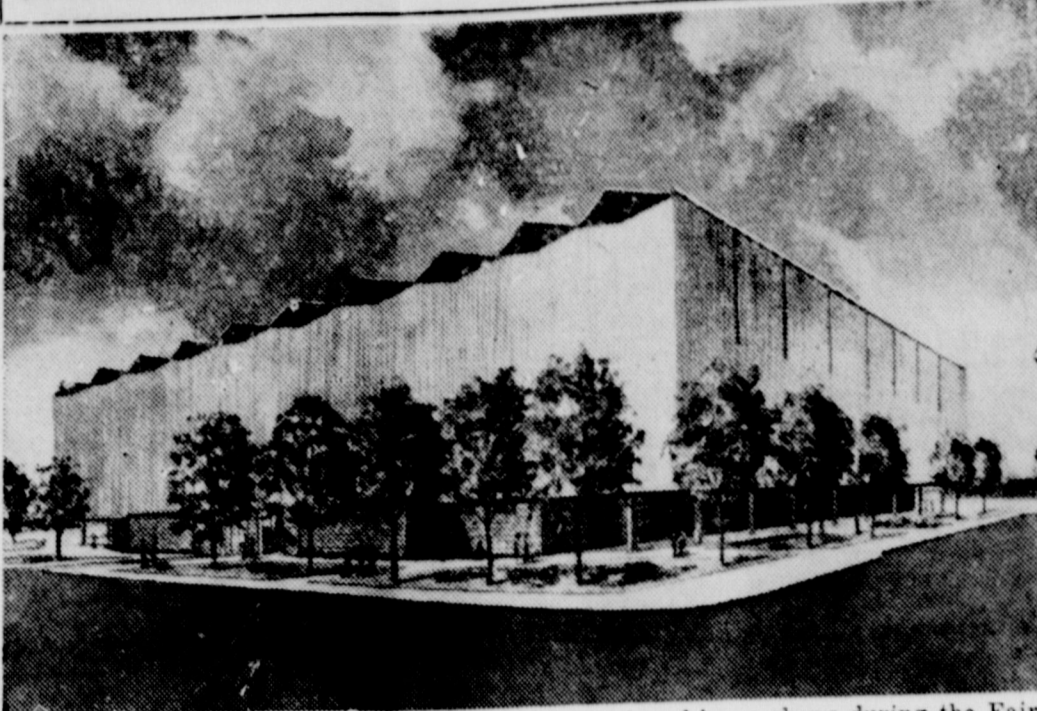
## Former Resident Dies In California
