MUSTANGS WIN FIRST GAME THIS SEASON

The Wheeler Mustangs picked up their initial win of the season last Friday night by downing the Erick Bearcats, 19-6. The game was played at Erick and a throng of Wheeler boosters made the trip.

In the opening quarter, it seemed as if the Mustangs were in for another rough time. The Bearcats gained possession of the ball shortly after the kickoff by recovering a Mustang fumble, but the Mustangs held for downs deep in their territory and took over the pie skin. Lady Luck turned the other way the next time Erick got the ball. The Bearcats put on a sustained march and racked the first six points on the scoreboard. The try for the extra point failed and the score was 6-0.

Before the quarter ended, the Mustangs went ahead for the first time this season. Jim Jolly broke loose and went 35 yards to a touchdown which tied the score. Holcomb kicked the extra point and the Mustangs went in front 7-6.

Wheeler scored again in the second period on a 30 yard pass and run play from Atherton to Holcomb but the extra point try was no good and the teams left the field at halftime with the Mustangs ahead 13-6.

Both ball clubs put together good drives in the third quarter but neither scored and the Mustangs still had the 7 point advantage going into the final period of play.

The Bearcats narrowed the margin early in the 4th quarter as they scored their final TD of the night but the try for point failed and the score was 13-12. Mustangs favor. The most spectacular play of the evening came a short time later as Jolly broke into the clear once again and raced 65 yards to paydirt. Wheeler attempted to kick the extra point but a fumble nullified the try and the score rose to 19-12. The Mustangs held the Bearcats after that and the final score read Wheeler 19 - Erick 12, and the Mustangs had their first victory of the season.

It was quite noticeable, to all who saw the game, that the Mustangs were a much improved ball club over the two preceding games. The blocking and tackling was much sharper and the offense moved a lot better with the varied attack that Atherton used throughout the contest.

Coach Boynton was very pleased with the boys play against Erick but said this week that some of the boys were not coming to practice as they should and (Continued on Page 8 No. 7)

MCWHORTER HAS FIRST BALE OF COTTON

L. A. McWhorter, who farms 1 1/2 miles East of Wheeler, ginned the first bale of 1959 cotton in Wheeler on Monday, September 14.

The initial bale arrived six days later than the one last year which was brought in by C. C. Crowder.

The cotton was ginned free of charge by the Paymaster Gin. And the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce awarded Mr. McWhorter \$50.00 for bringing in the first bale of the new season.

McWhorter arrived in Wheeler at 12:00 noon Monday. The cotton weighed 1950 pounds and ginned out a 530 pound bale. Fat Jones, gin manager, purchased the 900 pounds of seed at a price of \$38.00 per ton.

The cotton was of the Northern Star Variety and was planted during the last week in May.

McWhorter said he paid pullers \$2.25 per hundred to have the first bale pulled.

The second load of cotton arrived at the gin early Tuesday morning. T. J. Cole Jr., Wheeler, collected the \$25.00 prize money for the second bale. Cole ginned 2,000 pounds of cotton to get a 600 pound bale with 850 pounds of seed.
