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## Mobeetie School To Have Open House

The school will be open from 1:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. Saturday and from 2:00 until 5:00 Sunday. Refreshments will be served and someone will be on hand all day Saturday and Sunday to show visitors through the new building, Reeves said.

Construction of the new building was started in February of this year and was completed in time for school to start in May.

The new building has seven classrooms including a library and study hall. It has a very impressive exterior appearance as well as a light, attractive interior. It has a large lobby and office area with plenty of book storage and working area. All of the equipment throughout the school is new.

## IRISH DEFEAT WHEELER TEAM

The luck of Shamrock' Irishmen changed Friday night as they tamed the Wheeler Mustangs 30-0 for Shamrock's first win in five tries.

Coach Eural Ramsey's Irish caught fire in the last minutes of the first quarter on their home field when Fullback L. H. Tucker loped 35 yards over his right side for the first tally.

In the second quarter, Shamrock kept up the pace with 40-yard TD runs by Fullback Jerry Campbell and Quarterback Alva Htnderson, and an 8-yard run around right end by Jerry Jernigan. Switching to the halfback slot in the third quarter, L. H. Tucker wrapped up the Irish scoring on a 1-yard TD plunge.

Football Queen Miss Huberta Black was crowned during halftime ceremonies as Shamrock celebrated its homecoming game before a crowd of approximately 1,000 fans.

The Wheeler Mustangs will meet Texline Friday night here in Wheeler at 7:30 P.M. for their first conference game of the season.

Coach Boynton says the Mustangs are in "very bad shape". Only 17 boys have been reporting for practice. Practically the entire backfield is out with injuries. Levitt, Jolly and Watson have ankle injuries. Hill has an injured leg and Cox and Tremble will be out for several weeks with injuries.

## Scout Budget Explained; Finance Campaign Begins

Dick Tweed, chairman of the Adobe Walls Boy Scout Finance Committee, has announced that some thirty-one communities in the Council will kick off their Boy Scout Finance Campaign on October 20th. The Adobe Walls Council includes twelve counties in the eastern Panhandle of Texas and three counties in the Panhandle of Oklahoma. The Council is a member of seven United Funds in this area. In all other communities, the council will conduct an independent campaign for funds.

The budget of the Council for this year is \$86,843.71. The Council maintains a professional staff consisting of seven trained Scout Executives who live in Guymon, Borger, Perryton, Wellington, and Pampa. In addition, the Council maintains an office located in which provides services for all of the Cub Packs, Scout Troops, and Explorer Units in the area. Four full-time office employees man this office service station, maintaining registration records and advancement records on every boy in the Council area. Also included in the budget is money needed for the organization of new units and the training of volunteer leaders in the Council. Another important part of the budget is the item which takes care of providing camping facilities and the promotion of activities for Scouts in the area. Almost 6,000 Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers are active in the Council at this time.

The Council maintains a Scout Camp located at Canadain, Texas, which is open each year to Scouts from all over the Council area. Here Scout units have the opportunity to put into practice Scouting skills such as rowing, canoeing, swimming, life saving, marksmanship, and pioneering.

Finance campaigns in each town are being organized by local volunteer leaders and the funds raised in these campaigns will go towards the over-all Council budget.

Our local leaders here for the campaign are Don Earney, Thurman Rives, Pete Burton, Virgil Jamison, N. D. Ware Jr. and Max Wiley.
