ONE KILLED AS CAR OVERTURNS

Earl L. Scroggins Jr., a 36year-old Cheyenne, Okla., funeral home manager, became Gray County's sixth highway fatality Sunday evening.

Scroggins died about 8;50 p.m. when his 1954 Buick plunged off State Highway 152 into a 30-foot deep culvert about one mile east of Laketon.

The accident occured on a stretch of highway currently under improvement from Laketon to the Wheeler County line. No warning signs or lights were posted on the highway at the point of the accident, according to high-5.00 way patrolmen.

Investigating Patrolmen Travis 10.00 Underwood and Standley Schneistribution to Harry der said Scroggins had just passed over a small hill headed toward Pampa. Unable to make a curve near the bottom of the hill, the Scroggins car went off the road, flipped and landed on its top and then made one complete rollover.

Scroggins was thrown from the car and was pinned halfway under the rolling car.

The wreck was discovered minutes later by a passing motorist, Ted Atwood, 409 Magnolia. Atwood drove to Pampa and reported the accident to Underwood.
