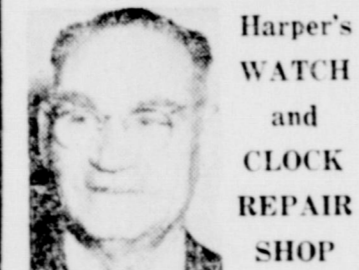

## Appointment Of Farm Census Crew Leader Announced

Appointment of Mrs. Vera W. Morgan of Shamrock, Texas as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mrs. Morgan will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Gray, Wheeler and Collinsworth Counties. Before assuming her post she will go to Lubbock, Texas where she will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing her training, Mrs. Morgan will return to her district where she will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

## QUAIL HUNT TO BE HELD IN PANHANDLE

AUSTIN Oct. 28--Another quail hunt is scheduled for the Panhandle this year on the Gene Howe Wildlife Management area, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Dates for the hunt are Dec. 5, Dec. 19, Jan. 2, and Jan. 16.

Applications now are being received for these hunts and permits will be issued after a public drawing to be held at 8 a. m. Nov. 13.

No preference can be given as to dates. All hunters will be required to hunt in pairs, with 13 pair each day, for a total of 104 hunters. Only persons 17 years of age or older can be considered in the drawings for these hunts.

According to all reports, hunting will be good on the area this year. The quail population is high and hunting success should be very good, if dogs are used.

Those receiving permits are urged to take their dogs to the hunt, to prevent loss of birds. Because of the heavy vegetation this year, the loss of cripples and dead birds will probably be high, unless dogs are used.

Each man whose name is drawn will be permitted to hunt one day and will be entitled to the maximum of one day's limit, 12 quail.

Applications for the permits should be mailed to the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Walton State Bldg., Austin, in time to be there by the Nov. 13 deadline.

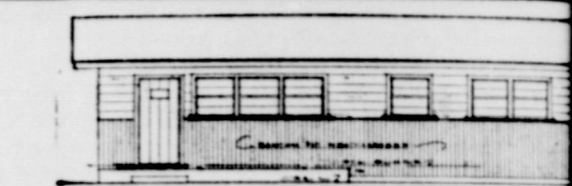

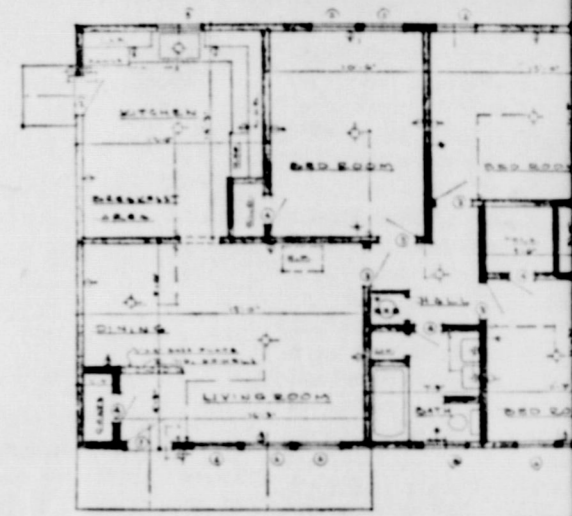

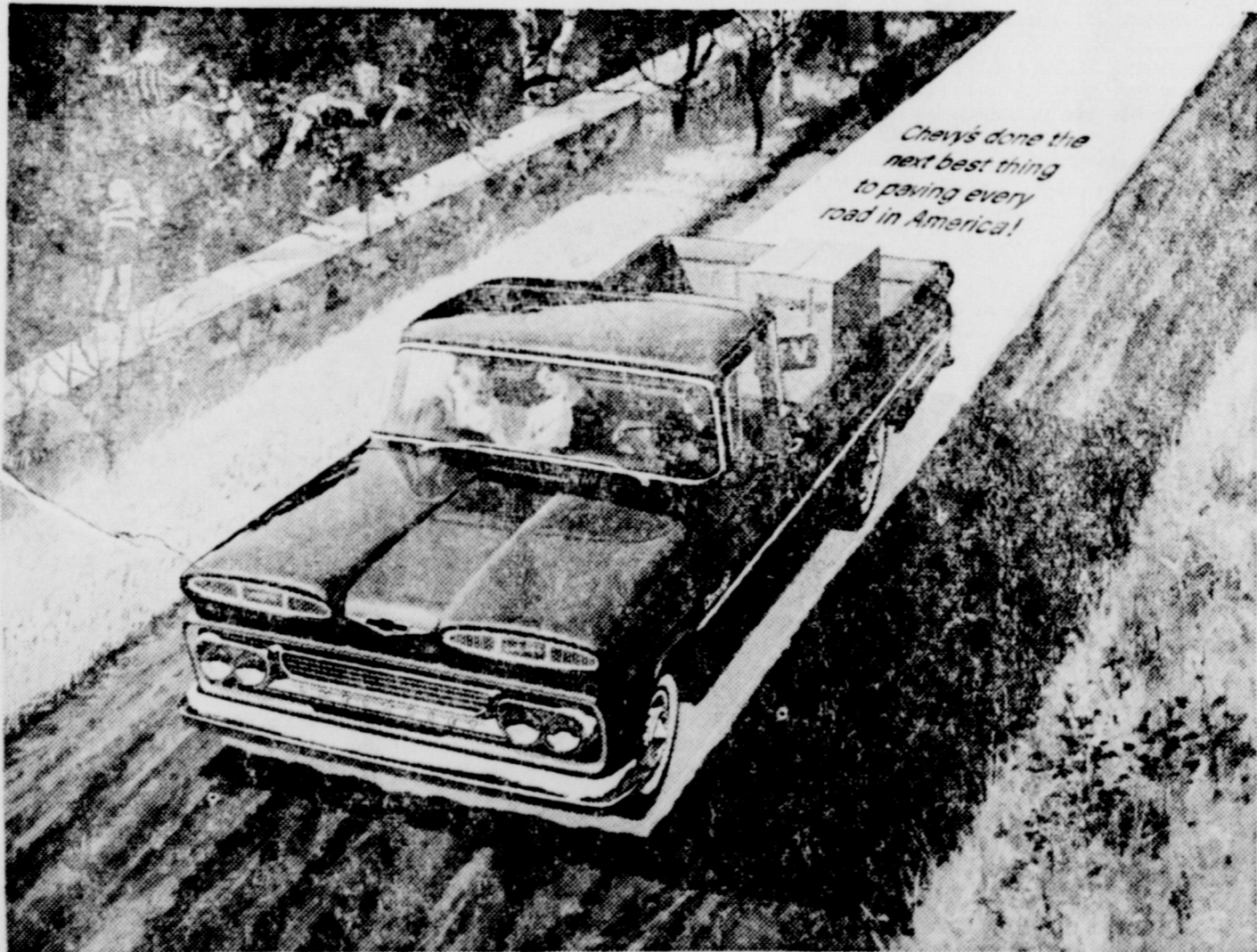

## Boat Owners Must Apply For Registration Number

The Texas "Water Safety Act" was enacted by this past Regular Session of the Legislature. In addition to safety requirements, the owner of a motorboat must apply for a registration number to be painted on or attached to each side of the bow of the boat. The applications are available at the tax assessor-collectors office in Wheeler.

Motorboats of ten (10) horse- power and less are not required to display a number; however, if the owner desires to obtain a number he may do so but will be required to pay the regular fee depending on the class of motorboat involved.

"We are anxious to register as many motorboats as possible at an early date in order to avoid a backlog of applications in this office immediately prior to the dead-line date of March 1, 1960. We would sincerely appreciate your help in this matter," Tax Collector and Assessor Thurman Rives said.

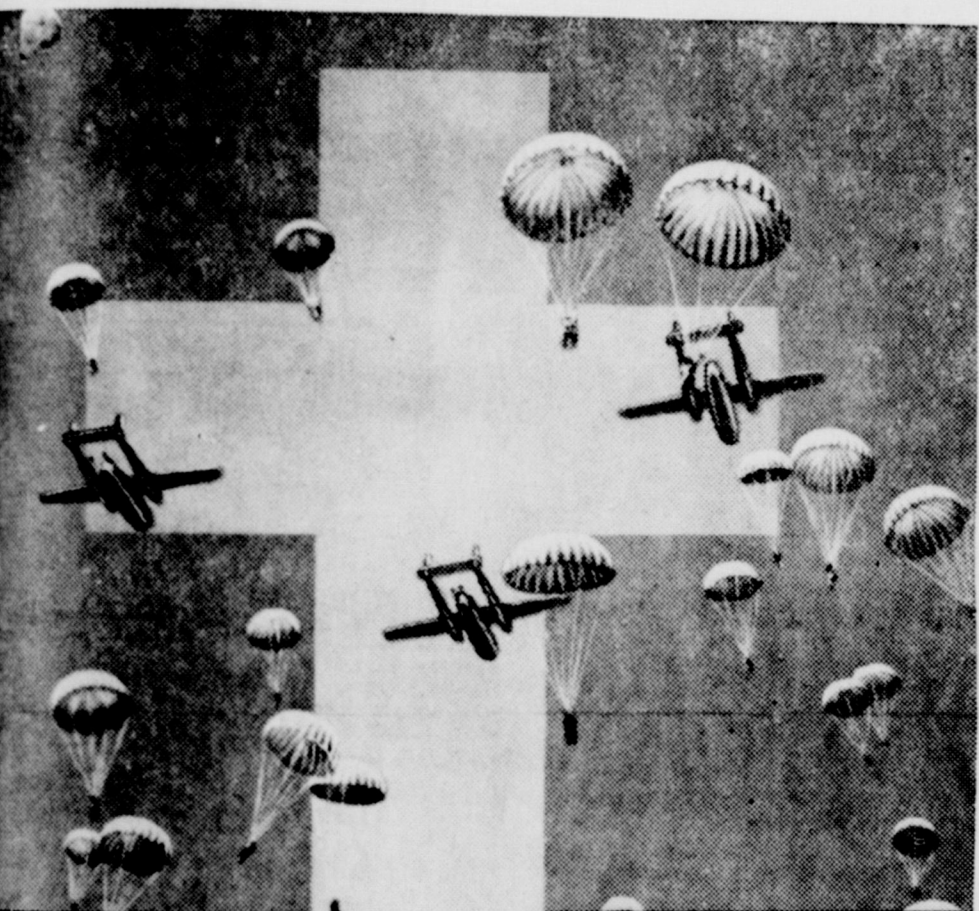

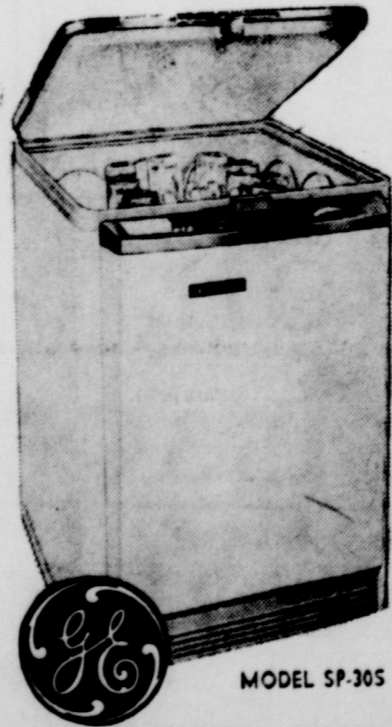

Executive Committee meets.  
March 28, 1960 — Five-member Primary Committee of County Executive Committee meets to prepare ballot for First Primary.

March 31, 1960 — Tax Collector shall deliver to Election Board certified poll list before April 1.

April 6, 1960 — Former non-residents or minors who shall have since become eligible to vote by reason of length of residence or age, shall not later than 30 days before election (first primary) obtain exemption from the County Tax Collector.

April 17-May 3, 1960 — Absentee voting for First Primary. Persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 days nor less than 3 days prior to election.

April 27-29, 1960 — Period for filing of sworn statement of campaign account by candidates.

May 4, 1960 — Former minors and former non-residents who have become eligible to vote after January 1 by reason of age or length of residence, and who wish to vote in the Second Primary, may obtain exemption certificate from Tax Collector not later than 30 days before election (second primary).

May 7, 1960 — FIRST PRIMARY ELECTION.

May 7-8, 1960 — Votes must be counted within 24 hours after closing of polls.

May 14, 1960 — County Convention meets on the first Saturday after primary election day.

May 15-31, 1960 — Absentee voting for Second Primary. Persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 nor less than 3 days prior to election.

May 17, 1960 — Last day for candidates to file supplemental sworn statements for first primary.

May 25-27, 1960 — Sworn statement of campaign account for Second Primary must be filed by candidate not less than 7 nor more than 10 days prior to date of election.

June 4, 1960 — SECOND PRIMARY.

June 14, 1960 — State Convention.

June 14, 1960 — Last day for candidate to file supplemental sworn statements for Second Primary.

June 18, 1960 — State Executive Committee meets.

July 11, 1960 — National Democratic Convention.

September 20, 1960 — State Convention.

October 8, 1960 — Former minors and former non-residents who have become eligible to vote by reason of age or length of residence may obtain exemption certificates from Tax Collector not later than 30 days before general election.

October 19-November 4, 1960 — Absentee voting for General Election.

October 29-31, 1960 — Sworn statement of campaign account must be filed by opposed candidates not less than 7 nor more than 10 days prior to the date of election.

NOVEMBER 7, 1960 — GENERAL ELECTION DAY. First Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

November 18, 1960 — Last day for candidates to file supplemental sworn statement.
