GROOM HANDS FIRST LOSS TO WHEELER

Intent on showing who's boss in District 1-B, the Groom Tigers scored the first two times they had the ball and rambled past the Wheeler Mustangs, 34-8, in their homecoming game played in freezing weather.

It was the third straight conference win for the Tigers, who toughened themselves against five top-notch Class A foes in early season action. The loss was Wheeler's first in league play.

Halfback Robert Reed scored three touchdowns and 195-pound fullback Steve Garmon scored two more TD's to pace the Tigers to victory.

Garmon, an all-regional guard last year, was a Tiger workhorse, picking up 168 yards in 20 carries. Quarterback Jerry Dorsey also turned in a fine performance accounting for 91 yards in 12 attempts. Aided by a stiff wind, Groom tallied in the opening three minutes of play. Wheeler was stopped cold on its first offensive try and the ensuing punt traveled only 12 yards.

With Dorsey and Garmon taking turns at totting the pigskin, the Tigers covered the 32 yards in five plays. Garmon did the scoring honors with a ten-yard jaunt through tackle.

A hard-charging Tiger line led by 235-pound tackle Don Case prevented Wheeler from getting back in the contest after the Mustangs claimed a fumble on Groom's two yard line. End Jimmy Conrad threw Wheeler for a 10-yard loss and the Tigers took over on their own 15 four plays later.

Groom launched a three touchdown barrage in the third quarter to sew up the game. Garmon capped a 60-yard march early in the period by plunging four yards to score.

Wheeler promptly fumbled at its 35 and Reed hit pay dirt on a 25-yard scamper four plays later. Garmon added the extra points for a 28-0 lead.

Reed set up the final Groom tally with a 22-yard run to the visitor's 11. Three plays later the 155-pound halfback plunged across from a yard out to score.

Wheeler's score came after the Mustangs recovered a fumble or the Groom 25 in the final quarter. Halfback Jim Jolly scooted 23 yards through the Tiger reserves to tally. Atherton concluded the scoring with a successful extra point run.

F B HOPES TO ADD THIRD TV CHANNEL

The Farm Bureau has announced plans to add channel seven antenna and translator onto their two channel system just as soon as the necessary money can be raised.

Officials of the Farm Bureau have indicated that with the revenue coming in from the new connections their is a possibility that the third channel can be added.

The application for channel seven has already been sent to the Federal Communication Commission in order to save time in the event the money is raised.

The cost will run approximately \$15,000 for the third channel.

The Farm Bureau has also made another important announcement that TV viewers will be interested in hearing. A full time engineer has been employed to service and maintain the tower and equipment. His salary will be paid from the revenue taken in from the \$12.00 per year service fee that the Farm Bureau is charging each TV viewer.

MEETING TO BE HELD SATURDAY

Friends and admirers of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson are invited to a meeting called for 4 p.m., Saturday in the district courtroom at Wheeler for the purpose of organizing a Wheeler County Johnson-for-President Club.

County Clerk Harry Wofford who was in Austin last week end conferring with Speaker Sam Rayburn and other backers of the Texas Senator's campaign, and Mayor Worley of Shamrock, both longtime friends of Senator Johnson, called the meeting.

"It is the opinion of Mr. Rayburn and other Democratic leaders that a Johnson-for-President Club organized in every county of Texas would start a grass roots campaign which would sweep the nation," said Mr. Wofford who met with party bigwigs while attending a Junior Chamber of Commerce "Citizenship Seminar" in Austin Sunday.

"Senator Thomas Dodd of Connecticut told 1,000 cheering young business leaders Senator Johnson has a greater capacity for political leadership than any other American he knows. He said Connecticut and New England would vote for the tall Texan and he believed he could be elected."

Mayor Worley said while the Senior Senator from Texas has not announced his candidacy he is certain he would accept the nomination. He discussed politics with the Senator in a telephone conversation two weeks ago and said the Majority Leader seemed pleased when told a Wheeler County Johnson-for-President Club would be organized.

Similar clubs have already been formed in 50 or more Texas counties and it is the plan of Mayor Worley and County Clerk Wofford to offer their assistance to Panhandle counties wishing to organize.

The public is invited to Saturday's meeting at Wheeler and particularly precinct committeemen and election officials, Mr. Wofford said. Recent changes in State election laws will be explained by A. B. Crump, county democratic chairman, in a committee meeting to be held immediately after the Johnson-for-President Club is formed.

The American Legion post in Wheeler has announced plans for their annual Armistice Dinner to be held next Wednesday, November 11 in the American Legion Building in Wheeler.

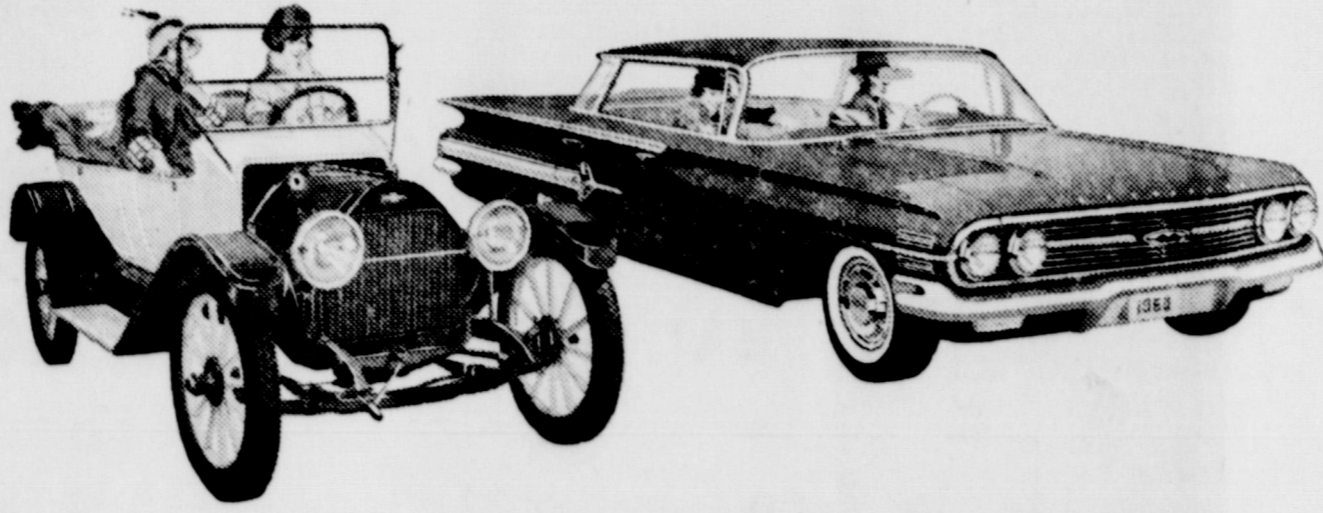
The menu includes roast beef, roast pork, hot beans, and potatoes. All Legion members are invited to attend. Serving will begin at 12 noon.
