### COMMISSIONERS BUY BUILDING IN SHAMROCK

The Hall building, corner of Wall and Second Streets, will be remodeled and converted into offices for justice of the peace, state department of public welfare, highway patrol and the Wheeler County sheriff's department, according to announcement this week by County Judge Geo. W. Hefley and County Commissioner Ernest Henderson.

County Commissioners Court made a lease-purchase agreement with the J. A. Hall estate Monday providing for construction work to cost a maximum of \$6,000. The front and exterior will be remodeled and the interior arranged to fit the needs of the four county-state departments, Judge Hefley said.

The County will pay between \$80 and \$90 per month on the rent-purchase plan, depending on cost of the remodeling. Price of the building before remodeling was quoted at \$4,000, making total cost to the county not to exceed \$10,000. The Hall estate will furnish funds for the remodeling, and will charge the county 5 per cent interest, making it possible for the county to pay off the indebtedness in 10 years.

Judge Hefley said the County is presently paying \$75 per month rent for less desirable office space. The justice of peace, highway patrol and sheriff's department are now housed in an old building south of the Greyhound Bus Station, and the department of public welfare presently rents space in the Community Building.

Construction will start on remodeling the 40x70 feet building in a few days with completion date set for late December so the transfer of offices can be made by January 1.

### Census Of Agriculture Brings Farm Statistics Up To Date For 1959

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Wheeler County will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$3,913,119.

The value of all crops sold was \$2,549,420 and included \$2,547,272 for field crops, \$1,360 for vegetables, \$788 for fruits and nuts, and no data for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,363,699 and included \$166,566 for dairy products, \$77,277 for poultry and poultry products, and \$1,119,856 for livestock and livestock products.

### WHEELER NIPS DARROUZETT IN FINAL GAME

Wheeler's Mustangs rolled to a 12-9 win over a stubborn squad of Darrouzett Longhorns at Darrouzett Friday night before a sparse crowd of shivering fans.

Darrouzett drew first blood in the District I-B contest when Jessie Fie kicked a 20-yard field goal in the first quarter, giving the Longhorns a 3-0 edge. Darrouzett saw that lead vanish in the second quarter when Marvin Cox went 10 yards for a touch-down, giving the Mustangs a 6-3 edge at halftime.

**Biographical Sketch  
Of Lyndon Johnson**

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Baines Johnson is a man of many talents. And some of the abilities he uses daily as the senior U. S. Senator from Texas are the harvest of varied jobs held as a youth.

While other Hill Country farm boys were playing baseball, Johnson was learning the sweat and toil that goes into the process of earning a buck. Lessons learned early—lessons of thrift and toil—were never forgotten.

At nine years of age, the rangy youth who was to become Majority Leader of the United States Senate was shining shoes in his hometown barber shop at Johnson City.

He finished high school at 15—in a graduating class of six. The immediate need for money came ahead of the long-range advantages of further education. For almost two years, the future U. S. Senator from Texas worked on a road-building gang, starting at \$1.00 a day. This stint was interspersed with a hitch-hiking trip to the West Coast where he worked as an elevator operator, in a cafe, and washing cars.

Then, his face tanned, muscles hardened and hands calloused,

Johnson decided there must be more to earning a living than driving a truck and shoveling gravel.

"By then it became increasingly apparent to me that there was something to this idea of higher education," he says. Johnson packed his clothes and hitch-hiked to Southwest State Teachers College at San Marcos.

He enrolled in school, and promptly got a job as janitor—sweeping the halls at night in the building in which he studied during the day. There were other jobs, including door-to-door selling of hosiery and working as secretary to the college president.

"One year I borrowed \$200," he recently recalled. But there still weren't enough jobs—and enough money—available to continue in college. So for almost a year, Johnson taught school in a small South Texas town attended by underprivileged Latin - American children. Despite his own need for money, he used his first month's check to buy athletic equipment for his students.

Study and work paid off. In 1930, at the age of 22, he received his Bachelor of Science degree from college. This meant

that in three and one-half years—including time out in which he taught—Johnson had completed three months of college preparatory studies and four full years of college work.

The fast pace he set has never slackened since then.

Johnson was born August 27, 1908, in a farm house near Stonewall, a few miles west of the town that bears his family name. His early education was in the Johnson City public schools.

After graduation from college, he joined the faculty of a Houston high school where he taught public speaking and debate.

Then came an opportunity to enter public life as secretary to Congressman Richard M. Kleberg. Johnson went to Washington. While serving with Kleberg, he also found time to attend Georgetown University law school at night.

In August, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed the hard-working young Congressional secretary as state administrator of the National Youth Administration in Texas.

Two years later, after receiving official recognition as one of the most effective NYA administrators in the nation, he resigned to enter a special election to fill the Central Texas seat made vacant by the death of Congressman James P. Buchanan of Brenham. Johnson won over a field of nine other candidates.

As a member of the Naval Reserve, Johnson became the first member of the Congress to enter active duty following the outbreak of World War II. His service earned him the Silver Star, a decoration that was personally conferred by General Douglas MacArthur in recognition of gallantry in action while on a flight over enemy positions in New Guinea.

Then, in 1948, following reelection to five successive terms in the House, Johnson became a successful candidate for the Senate. Honors and responsibilities came fast.

His Democratic colleagues unanimously named him Majority Whip in the 82nd Congress. Minority Leader in the 83rd, and Majority in the 84th, 85th, and 86th Congresses. He was the youngest man in Senate history to be elected to leadership office.

As Majority Leader, he is also Chairman of the Democratic Policy Committee, the Democratic Steering Committee, and the Democratic Conference Committee of the U. S. Senate. He is Chairman of the Senate Aeronautical and Space Sciences Committee, Chairman of the Senate Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee, and a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Throughout his successful career, he has followed the same Political philosophy. To legislative proposals, he applies the single-standard yardstick of what is best

for the nation as a whole. "I am a free man, an American, a United States Senator, and a Democrat—in that order," he once wrote.

Johnson has been a firm advocate of military preparedness and a foe of extravagance and waste—of resources as well as taxpayers' dollars.

Mrs. Johnson is the former Lady Bird Taylor of Marshall, Texas. They were married November 17, 1934, and have two daughters—Lynda Bird, born March 19, 1944, and Lucy Baines, born July 2, 1947.

**Farm Census Takers  
Have Training Course**

Census takers for the local area in the 1959 Census of Agriculture have been appointed and will begin an intensive training course on November 18th in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 21st, it was announced today by Crew Leader Vera M. Morgan, Shamrock, Tex.

The training session will be held at the Community Building, Shamrock, and will be conducted by the crew leader who recently attended a five day census training course.

The training course will cover the use of the Census questionnaire, Census definitions, interviewing, and map reading. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of locating every farm and obtaining complete and accurate information. The census takers will conduct some actual interviews as part of the training.

**Make Certain Now  
That You Have  
Social Security No.**

Now would be a good time for Panhandle farmers to make certain they have a social security number for each social security employee, according to Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

Geldon said, "Farm wages are reported on a yearly basis and the report must be filed with the Director of Internal Revenue during January 1960 for covered employees who worked in 1959." Under the law, farm wages must be reported by a farm operator if he paid cash wages of at least \$150 to a worker. If the operator did not pay at least \$150.00 in wages he is still required to report the wages paid a worker if the individual worked on some part of 20 days on a time basis; such as by the hour, or the day, etc.

Reports filed by area farmers last year showed a sharp increase in number and quality. Correct and complete reporting helps guarantee that the employee receives full social security credit for the work done.

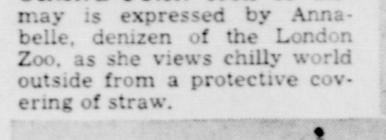

Today, tuberculosis as a killer is being curtailed in this country by modern drugs and improved patient care and rehabilitation facilities. But tuberculosis as a communicable, widely prevalent, expensive and long-lasting illness is still to be reckoned with. New cases reported in Texas the first nine months of this year were 3,375, and health authorities estimate there are more cases not reported than reported. The Christmas Seal Sale is one annual appeal of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and affiliated local associations for funds to make possible year-round efforts to curb this needless waste of human life and resources. Therefore, I do hereby designate the period from November 16 to December 24, 1959, as Christmas Seal Days in Texas, and urge all citizens to make a sound investment in their own and their fellow citizens' health by buying and using Christmas Seals during the holiday season." Leonard Alcala, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Paul Alcala, spent part of his babyhood in a tuberculosis hospital, in company with his parents. All are now recovered.

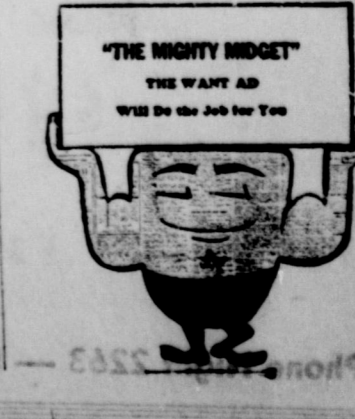

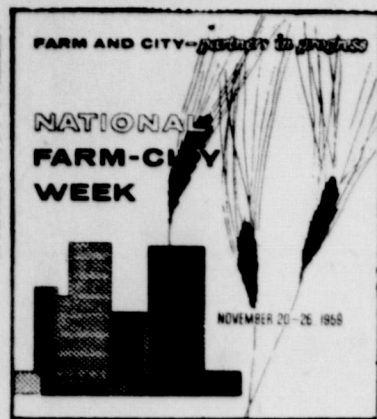

**Farm-City Week Set For November 20-26**

Rural organizations, service clubs, farm and ranch clubs, business and industrial groups across Texas are making plans to participate in Farm-City Week activities, November 20-26. Rural folks will be visiting urban organizations and many rural communities will invite their city cousins out for a visit.

County Agent, Bryan Swaim points out that as Texas becomes more highly industrialized and the total population more urban, it is more important than ever that farm-city people take the time to visit each other.

"Our nation is more mature and faces some of the problems of older civilizations. Joining hands in a partnership of understanding is essential if we are to meet our progress potential. Cooperation between farm and city residents is the pattern for progress," Swaim said.

Farm-City Week activities are aimed at developing understanding and goodwill between rural and urban dwellers and at "knocking down the barrier of misunderstanding" which modern conditions of production and distribution have raised between rural and urban communities. "It serves," said Swaim, "as a focal point around which all can gather to pursue a common objective... that of a fuller, more satisfied and enlightened way of life."

During Farm-City Week attention will be focused on the year-round progress made by sincere, voluntary efforts of many groups to understand their fellow man. The boundary line between farm and city—the rural and urban lines—are becoming less distinct. Swaim said there is an inescapable interdependence between farm and city people, and that they are truly partners in progress. Understanding and cooperation between these partners, he added,
