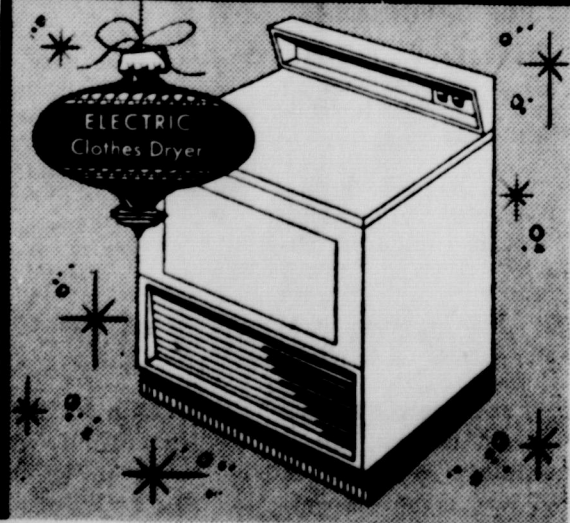
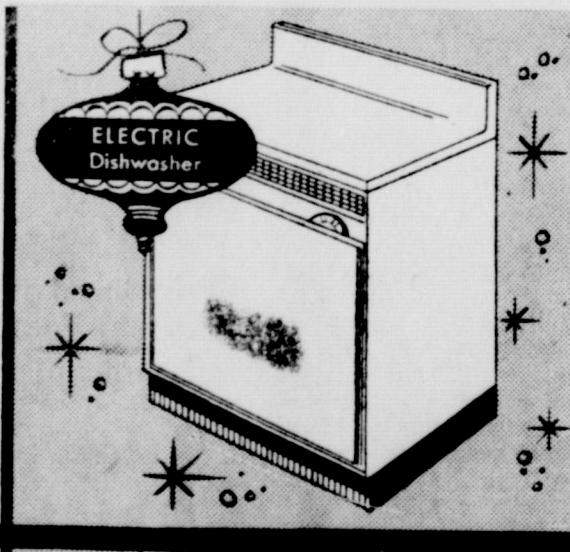

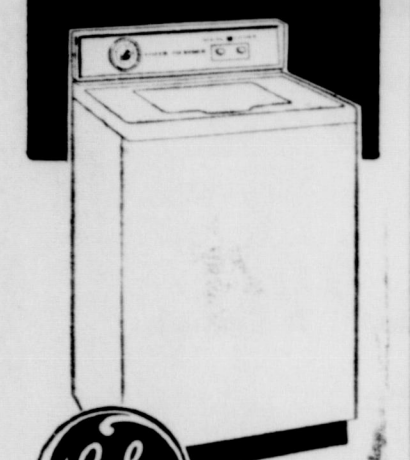

New Variety Of Vetch Should Provide Better Cover

Lana, Auburn and Oregon wollypod vetch are three comparatively new vetch introductions, Swain, County Agent said, R. J. Hodges, extension agronomist, reported the only difference between Hairy vetch and these new varieties is that they produce a larger percentage of their total growth during winter and early spring.

Swain said, in our area this earliness should provide more winter cover and green matter to turn under preceding spring planted crops than is possible with Hairy. But, he notes, even though the wollypod vetches are early producers, their total green matter production for a full season is equal to or only slightly better than Hairy.

Due to this one advantage of producing more growth during winter and early spring it would be recommended in Texas where Hairy is grown. But, he adds, seed are not available in Texas except in very limited quantities and at high prices.

Tests have been conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station since 1950 with Auburn and Oregon wollypod. Tests of Lana began in 1955, the wollypod vetches, regardless of variety, have been at or near the top in yield and total nitrogen production per acre in all tests. They proved equal to Hairy in winter hardiness and total forage production. Swain said, we will probably be hearing more of these varieties as seed becomes more available.

Farm Census Half Completed In Area

The 1959 Census of Agriculture in this area, it was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

The Census official stated that he was well pleased with the cooperation the census takers are receiving from farmers in the area and has high hopes of completing the canvass within the next ten days. He pointed out that the field canvass of farms is one of the larger costs of the census and that cooperation of farmers in completing questionnaires promptly will be a vital factor in keeping down the final cost of the undertaking.

Quick completion of the census will not only help in keeping costs down but will aid in prompt publication of the results, the field director said. He urged local farmers who have not already done so to complete the census questionnaire and have it ready when the census taker calls.

ment of F-M roads built early in the farm road building program begun in 1949. Many of these, Commission Chairman Herbert C. Petry Jr. pointed out, were built narrow and light in order to get as many miles of new roads as possible built quickly. These roads are showing wear and tear and need re-working to protect the investment. Third phase of the operation is the day-to-day maintenance in a system now totaling 33,143 miles. To finance the program the Department will use the 330,000,000 appropriated every two years by the Colson-Briscoe Farm-to-Market Road Act and \$20,000,000 from gasoline tax revenues available for the betterment of the state road system.

SURE, BUT—A majority of legislators, according to reports, have told Gov. Price Daniel they favor a pay raise for school teachers. But from there on their statements—at least those that have been made public—contain little to encourage either the governor or the teachers. Some say they would favor the raise only if it did not mean passing this, that or the other kind of tax. Some point to what they call the "improbability of success." Almost all the lawmakers, it seems, would be more than willing to vote a teacher raise if the governor can come forward with a money-raising plan on which general agreement can be reached. But talk has been mostly of taxes, like the abandoned property tax and three-factor formula franchise tax, which ended in hopeless wrangling in the four sessions this year. Some Capitol observers are predicting that Governor Daniel might pass up calling another session and out the blame on the legislators for not being willing to pitch in. This might be coupled with a challenge to the people to elect a different Legislature next time.

Here is one that our friend Leroy Dotson handed us.

"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled or where the door of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions, and spends himself in a worthy cause; who, at the best, knows the triumph of high achievement; and who, at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who knew neither victory nor defeat."

The Philosopher from Brewery Gulch says:

I cannot help but be disappointed with the governor of New York, Mr. Nelson Rockefeller, who appears to be giving serious thought to becoming a candidate for president next year. He apparently has "delusions of grandeur", since on his first entry into politics (as far as we know) he was elected governor by an overwhelming majority as a Republican in a Democratic year. He must think that he is pretty hot stuff. As I understand it, a man becomes a candidate for high office in order that he may "serve the people," because he has a high sense of duty to his state and nation. A year ago the governor was elected to a four year term with the expectancy of serving the people of his state, but with less than a full year gone, he apparently would like to be promoted to the biggest job in the world. What of his obligation to the people of New York, or did he have his fingers crossed when he asked for the job? Isn't he trying to shirk his duty? Regardless of that, just how much administrative experience does he have? His qualifications for the more important job can hardly be determined until he has shown what he can do after another three years as governor. Right now he's a mere amateur, sort of apprentice. In the minds of some politicians he has one fine qualification, millions of dollars, and the willingness to spend them freely to help him achieve ambition. That's a big consideration with some of the politicians who would like to help themselves out of that war chest, help spend it, no matter what the result, win, lose or draw.

METHODIST FOUNDATION TO BE MILLION DOLLAR ORGANIZATION

Dr. Monroe Vivion, Executive Secretary of the Texas Methodist Conference Council, Houston, Texas, has been selected Executive Director of the newly organized Texas Methodist Foundation, which is expected to be a multi-million dollar investing institution of the six Methodist conferences of Texas.

Patterned after private and other denominational foundations, the Texas Methodist Foundation will not only invest on a voluntary basis the funds entrusted to it by Methodist institutions, but will accept gifts and bequests from individuals to be invested and administered to designated and non-designated Methodist institutions in the state of Texas.

Dr. Vivion will assume full-time duties as Executive Director of the Foundation June 1, 1960, but will direct the affairs of the Foundation as a part of his present duties until that date. The state office for the Foundation will be located in Austin after June 1.

Prior to occupying his present position, Dr. Vivion has served as pastor of some of Texas Methodist Conference's largest churches including First Church, Texarkana; First Church, Lufkin; and Marvin Church, Tyler. He has been Superintendent of the Beaumont and Longview Districts of The Methodist Church.

Born in a minister's home at Lee's Summit, Mo., Dr. Vivion graduated from Southwestern University, Georgetown, and Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas. He received his honorary doctor's degree from Southwestern University. His wife is the former Rowena Easterwood of Athens, Texas.

Pledges totaling several thousand dollars toward the first three-year budget were announced and the first will drawn in favor of the Foundation was described to the trustees of the organization at their recent meeting in Dallas, as being valued at more than a half million dollars. 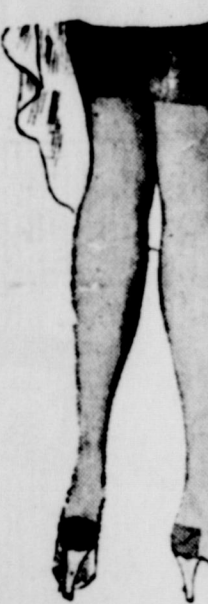

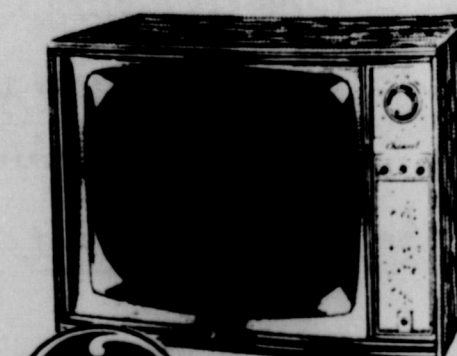
