
#### 4-H Council Plans County Contests



In order to be qualified to vote in important, county, city, state and special elections held in 1960, you MUST pay your Poll Tax before January 31, 1960.

Your Poll Taxes are NOT assessed with your property tax as they used to be and it is necessary that you pay them separately in order that you may be able to vote. Many of you who have paid your property taxes may be under the impression that you have paid your poll tax also, but you have not unless you specifically stated that you wished to pay them. Please CHECK your tax receipts and be sure that you have your POLL TAX RECEIPT, otherwise you may not be able to vote in important elections coming up this year.


