The actual blacktopping will take only a few days after the completion of the bridge, accord-

ing to Price. The bridge will be the second largest in Wheeler County and is being constructed just 1000 ft. upstream from the old Magic City bridge which was washed out sev eral years ago.

The 1200 ft. bridge has a 24 ft. roadway. It has a concrete piling foundation with 2 columns and a web wall with a concrete cap substructure. It has an eye bean span with a concrete deck. The concrete pilings are buried from 30 to 40 feet into the bed of the river. When the project is completed approximately 1600 yards of cement 249,725 lbs of reinforced

steel and 452,749 lbs of structural steel will be used in the project. Wheeler Chamber of Commerce officials are planning a big ceremony to celebrate the completion of the bridge, which will open a vast new trade territory to the merchants of Wheeler.






