Did You Know Wheeler Has A Small Industry?

Bring an industry into Wheeler! How many times have you heard this phrase? . . . Many, many times I'm sure. Perhaps the people of Wheeler are like the man who couldn't see the forest for the trees. Did you know that right here in Wheeler we have a manufacturer which supplies a ten county area with Cattle Cubes, Hog Feed, Chicken Feed, Dairy Feed, Horse Feed, Dog Food and Minerals. And in addition to this does custom mixing for area farmers and ranchers?

And in addition to the plant in Wheeler he has opened a similar operation in Pampa and is thinking in terms of bringing new industry to this area? In the Wheeler plant alone there is more than \$70,000 worth of equipment. Two grain trucks are on the road at all times and 2 or 3 men are employed even during the slack season. During the peak of the year, as many as 11 men have been employed in the Wheeler plant. In the event you haven't guessed the place I am speaking of, it is Lawrence's Feed mill. Mr. Lawrence has been in the feed business for the past 20 years and has become quite an authority on livestock feed to the farmers and ranchers in the Panhandle area. To many laymen in and around Wheeler a tour of Mr. Lawrence's Mill would be exciting as well as educational. In the 15,000 square feet of building area Lawrence has thousands and thousands of pounds of cotton seed meal, alfalfa, milo, corn, bran, salt, minerals and molasses which he uses as ingredients in the feed he makes. The Meal is trucked in here from Lubbock; Alfalfa and Bran from Kansas; Molasses from Fort Worth; and Milo is home grown. Perhaps the residents and merchants of Wheeler need to be thankful and show their appreciation for what they have instead of looking for the proverbial pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. I wonder what sort of concessions the people of McLean or Canadian would give to get a similar industry in their city. . . . Mr. Lawrence has grown with Wheeler and he loves Wheeler. . . . The least we can do is show our appreciation to him.

Magic City Bridge To Be Completed July 1

Almost a quarter of a million dollars will be spent by the state on the 1200 ft. bridge across the Red River and the 6 miles of paving which ties into Farm-to-Market road no. 1267.

T. A. Mussett and his 20-man bridge crew have discovered that Panhandle weather is certainly a deciding factor in regard to the length of time necessary to complete such a project.

Since the project began several months ago the men have worked through almost 30 days of snow, 8 or 9 days of rain, several

sand storms and a half dozen hail storms.

Regardless of the delays due to the inclement weather, construction superintendent T. A. Mussett, tentatively set completion date at July 1, 1960.

Hal Price and his 10-man road crew are making rapid progress on their portion of the project. They are paving 5 1/2 miles on the north side of the river and 3/4 of a mile on the south side. Price said his crew is about finished with the road base work. After the base work is complet-

ed the road crew will be moved out of Wheeler until the bridge is completed and then another road crew will move in and run the single asphalt surface treatment on the flexible base of clefts.

The actual blacktopping will take only a few days after the completion of the bridge, according to Price.

The bridge will be the second largest in Wheeler County and is being constructed just 1000 ft. upstream from the old Magic City bridge which was washed out several years ago.

The 1200 ft. bridge has a 24 ft. roadway. It has a concrete piling foundation with 2 columns and a web wall with a concrete cap sub-structure. It has an eye beam span with a concrete deck. The concrete pilings are buried from 30 to 40 feet into the bed of the river.

When the project is completed approximately 1600 yards of cement 249,725 lbs of reinforced steel and 452,749 lbs of structural steel will be used in the project.

Wheeler Chamber of Commerce officials are planning a big ceremony to celebrate the completion of the bridge, which will open a vast new trade territory to the merchants of Wheeler.

Pakistani Conservationist Visits In Wheeler-County

Abdul Aziz Khan, District Conservationist from Gujrat District of West Pakistan is spending the week in Wheeler. Mr. Khan came to the United States in February to study soil conservation methods used here. His district is near the city of Lahore in the low rainfall area.

Khan is a graduate of the University of Punjab and has worked for the Agriculture Department of his country for 20 years. Five years of this time has been spent on soil conservation work.

Khan will be in Pampa area until April 8. He will then spend two and one-half months at Oklahoma State University and another two months with the Soil Conservation Service in Oklahoma.

At home, his greatest problem is a shortage of all kinds of agricultural products. His country is not yet self-sufficient in the production of food. The land he is working with receives 7 to 26 in. of rainfall per year. The soil is sandy and clay loam. They have a problem of wind and water erosion as severe as we had in the

SWINE CLINIC TO BE HELD

The ninth annual Swine Clinic will be held at College Station Monday and Tuesday, April 4 and 5. This is open to all swine breeders over the state of Texas and is a short course on Swine Husbandry, Carcass Contest and Tested Boar Sale according to Bryan Swaim, County agent.

The Carcass Evaluation Contest will be the major highlight. One hundred and twelve pigs were entered by Texas producers and placed on feed at Texas A. & M. January 2 to the 15. All hogs have been on self-feeders and will be killed for carcass evaluation.

The Tested Boar Sale will be held on Monday afternoon, April 4. These boars were placed on test in October and November and all boars sold will have satisfactory rate of gain, feed efficiency and meat type records.

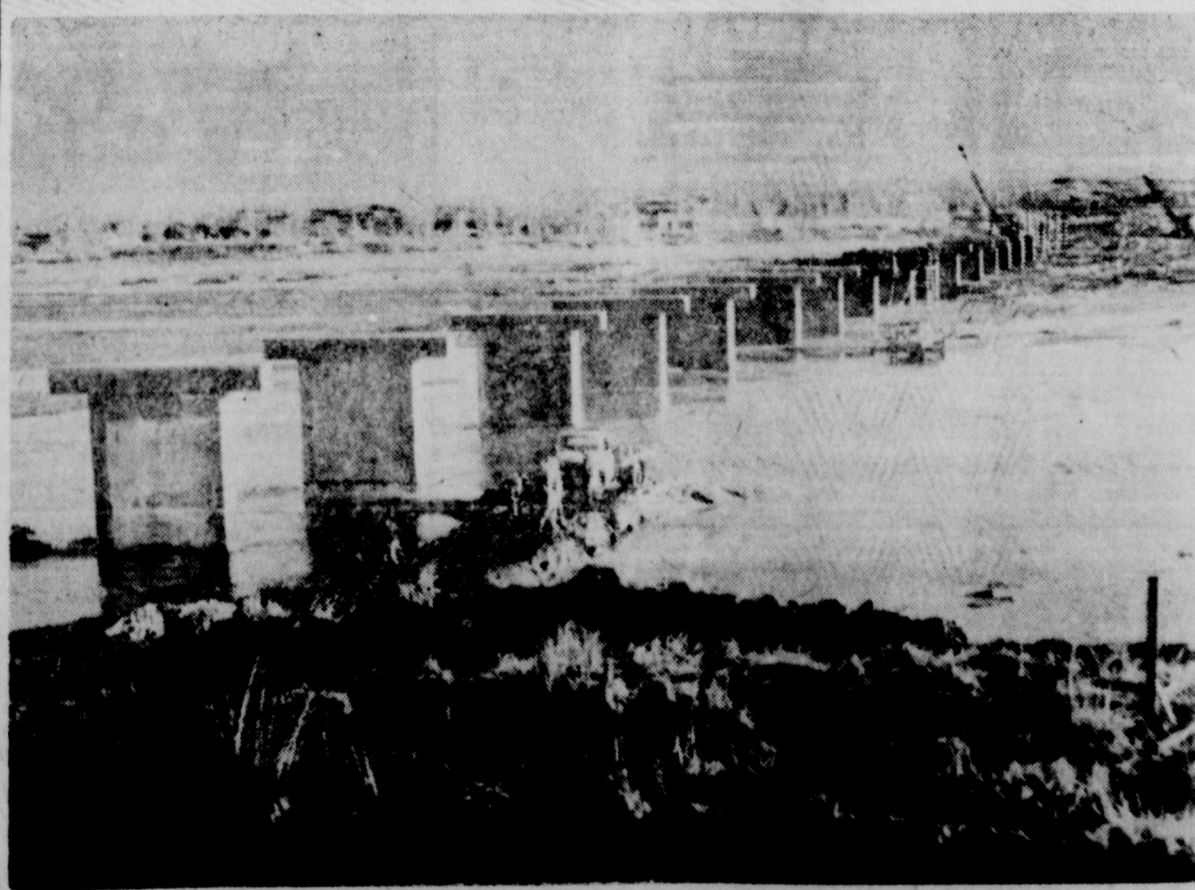

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council in July 1956 were considerably lower than the rates requested. It was explained at that time that while the granted rates did provide an improvement in earnings, they did not provide adequate earnings for the investment in the exchange. The Company, however, was willing to operate at these rates for a reasonable time, but an additional adjustment would probably be needed in the future.

"It is today's cost of money which determines the adequacy of earnings. If we are to attract investors' savings for further expansion and improvement then our current earnings must produce a rate of return which is in line with the cost of new capital. The historical cost of our capital through 1958 was approximately 7%. Interest rates, as you know, increased again in 1959. In the fourth quarter of last year, the cost of new money averaged out at approximately 7.5%. The rate of return in Wheeler should compare favorably with this cost if adequate earnings are to be realized. Costs of operation have increased each year since our last rate adjustment in Wheeler. They continue to rise today—equipment, materials and wages in particular. We have attempted to offset the effects of these increased costs on economies in operation and by adding to our revenues through an active marketing and sales program. The point is reached, however, where these operating economies and added revenues cannot keep pace with the rising costs of doing business. This, plus the fact that a lower schedule of rates was granted in 1956, makes it necessary for us to seek a further rate adjustment at this time."

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex.—It's nine months until the 57th Legislature comes to Austin to pass laws, appropriate money and, probably, enact new taxes. But the major decisions are being made now.

Whether it's the warmer weather or the dwindling time—(first primary is only a little more than a month off)—the deciding process is now going full tilt.

Candidates have their literature off the presses and their campaign organizations in action. Challenges and promises are being made, mostly centered on one issue—meeting the state's in-the-red financial predicament.

In most areas legislators are being forced, if their announcement platforms aren't clear, to say pretty specifically what sort of new tax they would favor.

On the statewide level, it's the same. Jack Cox, with the backing of Former Gov. Allan Shivers, has come out for a 2 percent sales-tax for education. Gov. Price Daniel has consistently maintained that the state's financial problems are not so great they cannot be solved by other means.

Jack Pickle is leaving his post as director of organization for the State Democratic Executive Committee and will work in Governor Daniel's campaign. Jack Jacobson, former Daniel aide, will head the Daniel headquarters.

RANCHERS EXPECT GOOD YEAR—Reflecting the age-old Texas philosophy that everything depends on rain, most Texas ranchers are wearing a smile this spring.

Members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association meeting in Austin said, yet weather had put a "season" in the ground. Prolonged cold meant a lot of expensive feeding, but, in general, the cattlemen look to this year as one of the best ever.

Amid the optimism, U. S. Sec'y of Agriculture Ezra Benson warned against too-rapid expansion of herds. It will almost certainly result in a sharp drop in prices, said Benson.

Benson noted that in the past two years cattle in the U.S. had increased by almost 4,000,000 head a year, double the rate he felt the consumer market can easily absorb.

He estimated there were a record-breaking 101,000,000 head of cattle in the country at the start of the year. This is "not yet excessive," said Benson, but he urged that future increases be "moderate."

Governor Daniel warned the cattlemen to watch the import situation. Governor's Exhibit A was the Texas oil industry which was suffering crippling setbacks from the competition of lower-priced imports.

Secretary Benson opposed raising import barriers. He suggested that losses would offset gains in that a \$4,000,000,000 export business in hides and tallow would be choked off.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, former legislator, was elected president of the cattle Raisers Association. **CATTLE MEASUREMENTS URGED**—Cattlemen voted to seek governmental action in these areas:

1. State and federal agency help to enable railroads to operate more efficiently and economically.
2. Legislative enactment of a stronger trespass law to protect landowners.
3. Full authority for the Texas Animal Health Commission to direct the brucellosis eradication

program begun under a law passed by the legislature in 1959.

4. Legislation by the U. S. Sec'y of Agriculture of the Association's right to carry out its brand registration and inspection program.

5. Launching by the USDA, as quickly as possible, of a screw-worm eradication program in the southwest similar to the dramatically successful Florida program.

HIGHER COLLEGE COSTS—Next legislature probably will be asked to appropriate about 23 percent more for support of Texas state colleges and universities.

Ralph Green, director of the Commission on Higher Education, said an estimated \$31,400,000 more than present allocations would be needed for the 1961-63 biennium.

This is some \$15,000,000 a year more than the \$65,000,000 being spent this year. Green told a legislative Economy Committee the extra funds would be needed to meet increased enrollments and improve faculty salaries.

Green reminded the lawmakers that part of increased cost results from the legislature's having made a junior college into a senior college—against the Commission's recommendation.

MORE YOUTH AID ASKED—Texas Youth Council has announced it will try again to get a paid parole supervision system for juveniles released from state training schools.

Legislature failed to enact this last session.

Council also outlined need for establishing a home for dependent and neglected Negro children and expanding other state schools for young people.

Other two members of the Council refused to add their support to a wide-scale delinquency prevention program proposed by Chairman W. C. Windsor Jr. of Dallas. It included such recommendations: compulsory, keeping schools open to 5 p.m. for students with special needs, working with the Texas Employment Commission to provide more job opportunities for youngsters, more emphasis on child and family guidance centers, etc.

Louis Henna of Round Rock and Robert Knebone of Houston said Windsor's program invaded the fields of other state agencies.

SAFETY LAWS OUTLINED—Brad Smith, director of the Texas Traffic Safety Commission, has proposed a four-plank platform for cutting Texas' traffic toll. Planks are:

1. Provide driver education for every public high school that wants it.
2. Revise the 20-year-old drivers license requirements.
3. Set up statewide chemical test for suspected drunken drivers.
4. Set up a system of traffic courts.

BRIDGE WORK SET—Texas Highway Commission has announced plans to spend \$5,216,500 in strengthening or rebuilding more than 100 bridges.

They are bridges regarded as not strong enough to take the increased 72,000 lb. load limit authorized by the last Legislature. At present these bridges are "zoned" to prevent use by trucks loaded to the limit.

prepared." Maybe having a class with 55 students had something to do with not being prepared. Now, I ask you—what would one teacher do with 55 third graders?

But she lived through it and went back to Canyon and received her degree two years later in "Home Making."

Now it was time for a vacation—so she and four other girls made a trip to California. This was good trip, lots of fun, and many experiences that linger long in her memory, mine too—because I remember her going—at this time she lived with us, and I always said when I grew up I was gonna get a job, and take me a long long trip.

When school started the following year, she had her sleeves rolled up and was ready for the classes of the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. But guess she must have changed her mind again—because I was there in that class also—and before the term was over one of the teachers quit and she went into the class she had prepared for that of "Home Making" in the next year she helped with the plans and our present Home Making cottage was built—the year was 1933.

Really! I got carried away, didn't intend to tell you all of this—what I wanted to tell you was this time she lived with my folks, we had such good times! That was about the time that another good friend of mine came along—and he was a "he" I remember one time he came to see US (you notice I say us?) any way I knew he was coming so I baked a cake...

After this year she resigned and in 1938 they had their first baby—a boy. Now that they were a family it was time to buy a place of their own, so through the government program they bought a farm near Wheeler where they still live and here a little daughter came to them. This was the year of 1941.

For a few short years my "buddy" worked and played with her family. As the years rolled along it was decided that she would go back to teaching... so in 1953... back to the "Home Making" cottage she went, and her work was there... the cottage had to be painted, new drapes had to be made, so she and her girls did this job—and what a job it was!

In 1957 my friend was elected "Woman of the year" for Wheeler and was presented a certificate by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. She has taught a Sunday school class for many years and I might add she is one of the best in this department, too.

Now that I've told you so much about her—I'd like to tell you a wee bit more... I remember way back... I walked the two and half miles, took my lunch and went to see my friend, from her house we took two horses (her dad's) the horses were so big and fat our legs stuck almost straight out, but it was like sitting on a big soft rocking chair—and we were on our way over the hills and through the plains and down into the canyon—we rode, we played, we jumped, hooped, and galloped... the fun we did have. Now see how much "real fun" you can have in such a few short hours.

Our visit has been nice and now it's time to tell you that my friend is Bennie Mae Williams Whitener and my "he" is her husband of some 26 years so, both of them I love very much. Good-bye for now—go visit with a life long "buddy" it's fun!!
