## AREA CHILDREN ARE INVITED; OVER 80 PRIZES TO BE GIVEN

Probably the biggest Easter Egg Hunt in the history of Wheeler County will be staged by the Wheeler Riding and Roping Club in Wheeler this weekend. Children from all over the county are expected to join in the fun of the hunt. Approximately 6,000 candy and hard boiled eggs will be hid on the 8 1/2 acres of grass around the Rodeo Grounds in Wheeler.

Frank Caswell, president of the riding club and committee-men Coy Revious and Buster Callan, said more than 80 prizes will be given to the kiddies finding the "lucky eggs."

Six grand prizes will be given, (two grand prizes for each age group.) Three of the grand prize eggs will be worth \$10. each and three will be worth \$5.00 each to the lucky finder.

In addition to the grand prize eggs, practically every business in Wheeler has agreed to give a prize to the youngster finding an easter egg with their name on it. In other words if a youngster finds an egg with J-Lee Department Store's name on it, he will be presented with a certificate whereby he can claim his prize the following week at J-Lee's.

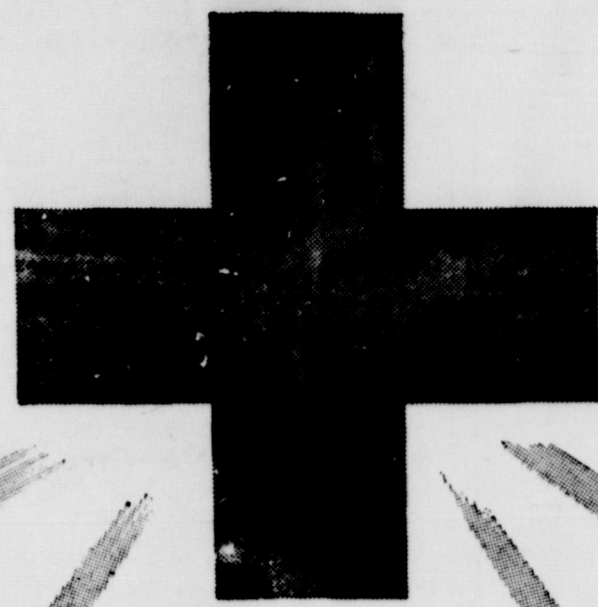

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Terracing and other types of earth moving practices are a little slow this year. Wet soil prevented construction from mid-December until about the first of April. 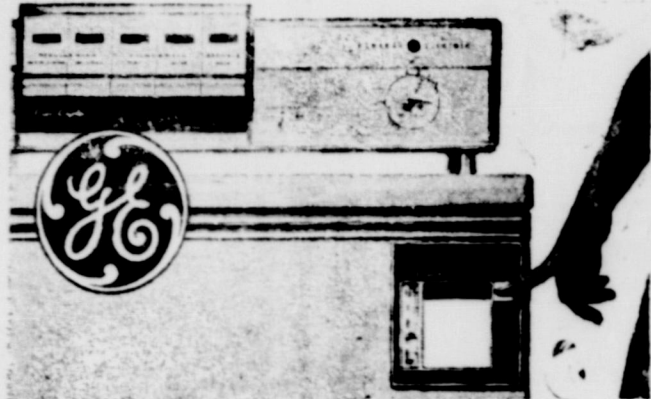

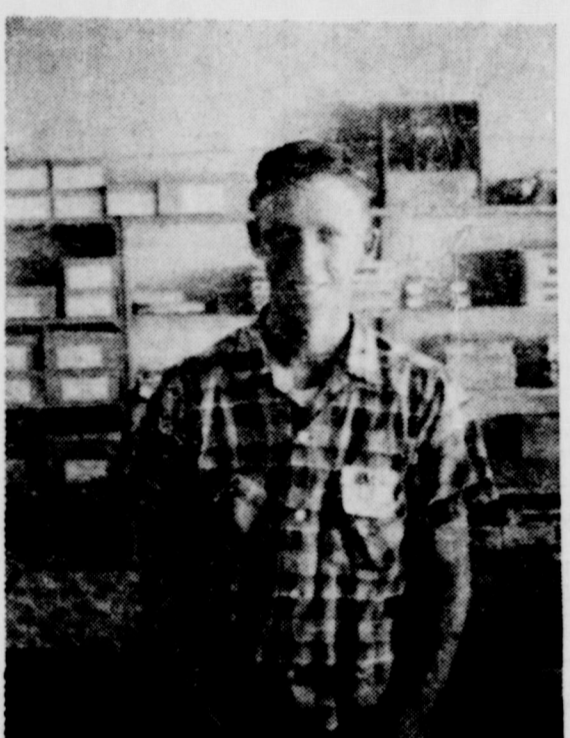

## MORE COTTON PLANTED IN 1960 ACCORDING TO COMPANY AGENT

Texas farmers' choices are in and the eye is cast for the 1960 cotton crop acreage. Cotton farmers made a decision to plant an additional 509,528 acres over regular allotments as a result of selecting Choice B in the 1960 cotton program. This means there is a total of 1,783,228 acres on Choice B farms, according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent.  
Swaim said the acreage on choice A farms adds up to 5,543,000 acres according to Mr. G. F. Osburn, state administration officer, A.S. C. College Station. 283,194 acres are under Conservation Reserve contracts, and this will decrease Choice A acreage by the stated figure.  
In 1959 Texas Cotton farmers planted an additional 438,121 acres over regular allotments under Choice B with a total acreage of 1,059,751 on Choice B farms. The total acreage on Choice A farms was 5,782,848 acres. Over 190,000

acres of this was under Conservation Reserve Contracts.  
Total Acreage for choice A and B farms in 1960 is 7,326,228 acres. In 1959 the total for both choices was 6,842,599 acres.  
The 483,629 acres increase in cotton acreage for 1960 is due primarily to the fact that those farms with larger regular acreage allotments selected Choice B plan.
