## DE ARMENT IS PROMOTED TO 32 COUNTY LEADER

Richard DeArment, biologist for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, was promoted, effective July 1 from assistant leader to project leader over the 32 Panhandle Counties.

Dick has been assistant for the past 8 years. Under his new leadership program he will have two assistants to help with the work load. He will continue to make his home in Wheeler.

His new job will involve the responsibility of regulating game laws throughout the Panhandle counties. These regulations are based on the trends in annual game population of bob white and blue quail, whitetail and mule deer, turkey, pheasant, antelope and fish.

Trends in game population are determined by establishing census techniques. Quail trends are determined by spring whistling counts and fall blood counts over predetermined routes. Deer trends are found by counting does and fawns in the fall and aerial counts of herds in the spring. Turkey are counted by censusing hens and poults in the fall and by aerial counts over certain areas during early summer. Pheasants are censused by crowing in the spring and blood counts in the fall.

The Auodad or Barbary sheep, recently introduced into the Palo Duro Canyon, whose numbers are low, are counted in the spring by visiting the courtship grounds of the males.

## DISTRICT PTA MEETING HELD IN BORGER

An awareness of the citizens responsibility toward election, an eagerness on the part of parents and teachers to accept that responsibility, and an undercurrent of urgency in accomplishing a program of positive action were re- vealed at the fifth annual conference, District 19, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers held in Borger, Sunday and Monday of last week.

Dr. Emmitt D. Smith, Canyon, in evaluating the study sessions at the last session, recognized the same spirit in each of the six workshops: belief in importance of the P-TA program, need for information, training and study by P-TA leaders, and enthusiasm of all members to learn, to teach, to act, in order to bring to all children the highest advantages in moral, cultural, physical and mental education.

Mrs. W. E. Miller, Canyon, vice-president of the Texas Congress and state representative to the conference, also stressed the need for adult education, terming P-TA "a school for adults in the greatest job of life—parenthood".

Guests at the Banquet session of the meeting from Wheeler included Mr. and Mrs. Arling Cordell, Mr. and Mrs. Adrain Risner and Mrs. Dub Goad of Wheeler.

During the P-TA workshop the following day, Mrs. Goad was in charge of the discussion on the duties of vice presidents. Thomas Helton served as recorder during the workshop.

Those attending the workshop from Wheeler included: Thomas Helton, Mrs. Lloyd Wayne Weatherly, and Mrs. Walter Dunn.

Mrs. Dub Goad was elected as a district vice-president for the 19 district. She will serve over Wheeler, Collingsworth, Roberts, and 1/2 Lipcomb County.

At the banquet session, addressed 175 guests of the Borger City P-TA Council and the Borger Chamber of Commerce, Mrs. Miller emphasized the need for concern by every American, for the education of today's children, presenting a contrast of education in United States with that in Russia, and challenging every adult to accept his share of the responsibility for the education of the coming generation.

Mrs. James E. Lewis, Pampa, president of District 19, conducted the session, with Mrs. Doyle Alexander, Borger, general chairman, arranging the varied events.

Highlight of the concluding session was the presentation of awards for yearbooks and publicity - procedure books. First place winners were William B. Travis P-TA, Memphis, for yearbooks; and McLean P-TA, McLean, for record books.

## Campaign Nears End; Election to Be Saturday

### Money Man Cox---

Jack Cox, candidate for Governor, for many years has been closely associated with the "Freedom in Action" movement which in our opinion has an extreme right-wing Republican theory of government. Probably the chief leader of the Freedom in Action movement is H. L. Hunt, millionaire Dallas Oil man, who has been at times described as the richest man in the world. We are surely not opposed to wealth, but we think that the extremely rich sometimes lose sight of the needs of the average Texas citizen.

Mr. Hunt recently wrote a book in which he seems to suggest that the voting strength of citizens should be determined by the amount of worldly goods the voter owns. If this theory were the law of the land, Mr. Hunt could probably out-vote the entire population of the Panhandle of Texas.

Allen Shivers, former Texas Governor, is one of the strongest advocates of the candidacy of Mr. Cox. In our opinion Gov. Shivers by his record has advocated a "big business" theory of government.

When we look closely at the source of the strong support of Mr. Cox, we have grave doubts that his administration would be able to understand the problems of the average Texas voter.

## MEETING HELD TO DISCUSS WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE

A Public meeting to discuss a program leading to the state-wide conference and the White House Conference on Aging, has been called by County Judge Geo. W. Hefley.

The meeting will be held at 8 o'clock Tuesday night, May 10, in the district court room in Wheeler. The public is urged to attend.

In calling the meeting, Judge Hefley said:

"These are the days of scientific extremes . . . the best minds of our country and of all the other countries of the world are occupied now with either devising bigger and better missiles for widespread death, or with finding the causes for human illnesses.

what help we can willingly . . . even though most of us never expect to be afflicted with any of the diseases, we are helping to combat them.

But, God willing, there is a health and mental problem facing each and every one of us, providing the health-giving scientists win out over the death-dealing scientists . . . and that problem is old age.

We hear much these days about the population explosion in our State, and in our nation.

What about the population explosion that is occurring among our senior citizens? . . . and which will continue to grow as science wins its battle against disease.

## Returns Will Be Available At Election Party

Candidates for county, state and district officers were making their final pitches to voters today before the Democratic Primary, which is scheduled for Saturday, put an end to their politicking until the General Election in November.

Interest has been very casual until this week, when candidates and voters both seemed to have awakened to the fact that the Democratic Primary has almost come and gone.

Polls will open at 8:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P.M. Saturday, according to A. B. Crump county Democratic Election Chairman.

Strenous politicking by candidates and their supporters was very evident in Wheeler County this week. The many controversial issues and ideas expressed by the candidates was expected to bring out a record number of voters in the state. However, the county turnout is expected to be light.

As is customary on election day, A. B. Crump will hold an election party Saturday night, starting at about 7:00 P.M. on the west side of the courthouse.

Returns will be tabulated as received from the county election board, and made available at the election party on the courthouse lawn.

The results will also be available by telephone. The courthouse number is 5051.

Balloting will be in the customary places in all 14 precincts. A. B. Crump said in issuing an appeal for voters to go to the polls as early as possible so that counting of the votes may be tabulated and the outcome of the county races released immediately.

Wheeler County voters will be limited to passing judgement on only one county race . . . That of county sheriff. Herbert Knoll of Shamrock is opposing incumbent Bus Dorman, who will be seeking his fourth term as sheriff of Wheeler County.

Three other county offices will be filled, but they failed to draw any opposition. They are the office of Tax Assessor and Collector, Thurman Rives; County Attorney, Guy Hardin and County Democratic Chairman, A. B. Crump.

On the precinct level incumbent Shelby Pettit is a candidate for re-election as precinct one commissioner. And Clois Hanner is candidate for re-election as precinct 3 commissioner.

T. L. Gunter is a candidate for the position of precinct 5 committeeman. E. E. Johnston for precinct 1 committeeman and R. J. Holt, Jr., precinct 3 committeeman.

State races holding the spotlight in Wheeler County are those for governor and Attorney General.

## WALTER ROGERS SPEAKS AT LOCAL 'FISH FRY'

Guests from Mobeetle, Pampa, Miami, Dumas, Goldsmith, Shamrock, McLean, Follett, Wellington, Canadian, Booker, Erick, Borger, and Wheeler attended the annual Masonic "Fish Fry" held Friday night at the American Legion Building here in Wheeler. A total of 139 guests were present.

H. H. Wode, district deputy grand master of the Masonic Lodge was present at the meeting.

Cong. Walter Rogers, a long-time favorite of Wheeler County residents, spoke to the large group of Masons on "The Agriculture Problem and How It affects the Farmers and Ranchers of Texas."

"I have had some wonderful experiences in Wheeler County and it's small towns like Wheeler that are the basic stronghold of Democracy and America", Rogers said.

"This country of ours is growing over 3 millions people every year. And yet, the farmers of the United States have developed their practices so fast and so well that we have more surplus food than any other nation in the world. Agriculture is the basis on which we all make our living and we must not abuse our livelihood."

"Did you ever stop to think that after only one year without any grass crops everyone in the world would be dead? We only have a few farmers left and its small communities like Wheeler that must start the movement to put the farmers back in the earning bracket that they deserve."

"What are we going to do about the population trend? Since 1952 there has been over 750,000 farm families leave the farm. Where is the stopping place . . . If it's not reached soon, small communities and towns will continue to get smaller and the large cities will continue to grow."

"Some densely populated areas will lose their representation this year and the cities continue to (Continued on Page 5, No. 3)

Now 700,000 people in Texas who are 65 years of age or older . . . and as our population increases and life expectancy advances, there will be at least one million two hundred thousand senior citizens in Texas by 1975.

Approximately one person out of 12 has reached the golden years of life . . . and the percentage is increasing annually.

Each of us hopes to enter into those golden years proudly and with dignity, independent of help from our children, and a burden to no one.

The luckier ones of us may be able to set aside a financial reserve for just this purpose . . . but what is to guarantee that the reserve will still be there when it is needed? Most of us remember the stock market crash of 1929 . . . the bank closures of the early '30s . . . and on a more personal basis, each one of us has been faced with an unanticipated emergency at some time in our life which has punctured that "rainy day" umbrella.

In 1958, Congress authorized a nationwide study of the aging problem . . . and placed it under the direction of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare . . . each state, including Texas, has been asked to assemble facts and figures.

This study is aimed at finding the solution to several problems . . . such as this partial list:

Some of our older people, with limited incomes are unable to meet the cost of proper medical care.

Housing for the aged is sometimes non-existent, inadequate or exorbitantly priced.

Employment, in many cases, cannot be found, even by those without physical handicaps, but with experience and a willingness to work.

The financial strain is often greatest after 65 during the period of life when the income of many is at its lowest ebb.

An education and recreation program is needed for the many retired workers to enable them to fill their free time with renewed interests.

And here is where you come in, for most of the important information will be gleaned from the grass roots!

A county chairman, is being named for each county in Texas, and he in turn will organize county committees of private citizens whose varied backgrounds will help broaden the interpretation of collected information . . . and thus help determine the needs of your community's aged.

gain political support. Unless we are able to straighten out the farm problem I'm afraid our rural areas will eventually lose all their representation. Then their battle is lost forever.

"It seems to me that we should use some of the money that is being paid to foreign countries and straighten out our own farm problems. Did you know that only one dollar out of every four that is earmarked for foreign aid is actually used for foreign aid. Most of it goes to manufacturers right here in the United States."

"Why are we turning our backs on America's most patriotic citizenry? The farmer has always come forward, in the time of need. In America one farmer can feed 23 persons and in Russia it takes one farmer to feed one person."

"Russia is not interested in our war machines . . . They are interested in our farmers. If the farmers in Russia could produce as much as the farmers in America, they could turn lose 22 out of every 23 farmers and use them in their defense factories . . . Our strength lies in agriculture."

### June 1 Is Deadline For Transfer Of Area Scholastics

All parental requests for transfer of pupils, whose names are on the census roll of the home school district, must be made to the County Superintendent by June 1. These transfers are automatically made by the County Superintendent unless there is a protest filed by either the home district or the receiving district. In case a protest, the transfer application must be considered by the County Board. All such transfers carry with them all benefits-per capita, transportation and ADA.

Parental requests for transfer of pupils whose names are not on the census roll may be made at any time before October 1. Such transfers do not carry with them Per Capita funds but only transportation and ADA benefits.

Pupils whose grades are not taught in their home district may be transferred at any time during the year by the County Board, upon receipt of parental requests for such transfers. These transfers carry with them full benefits if the pupils were enumerated by their home districts. Otherwise, they receive only transportation and ADA benefits.

### CENSUS STARTS CAMPAIGN

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Clyde Cook today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures representing the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the supervisor is convinced the complete count has been taken. Detailed population figures issued in Washington last year after the returns tabulated on the census electronic computers.

The importance of a count was stressed by district supervisor H. J. Cook that the population completed in the current Federal Census. "Federal aid funds to States and State funds are allotted to counties on a per capita basis. A short count means a loss of money. Thus, it is important we have a complete count. Help of every resident is needed to reach the goal."

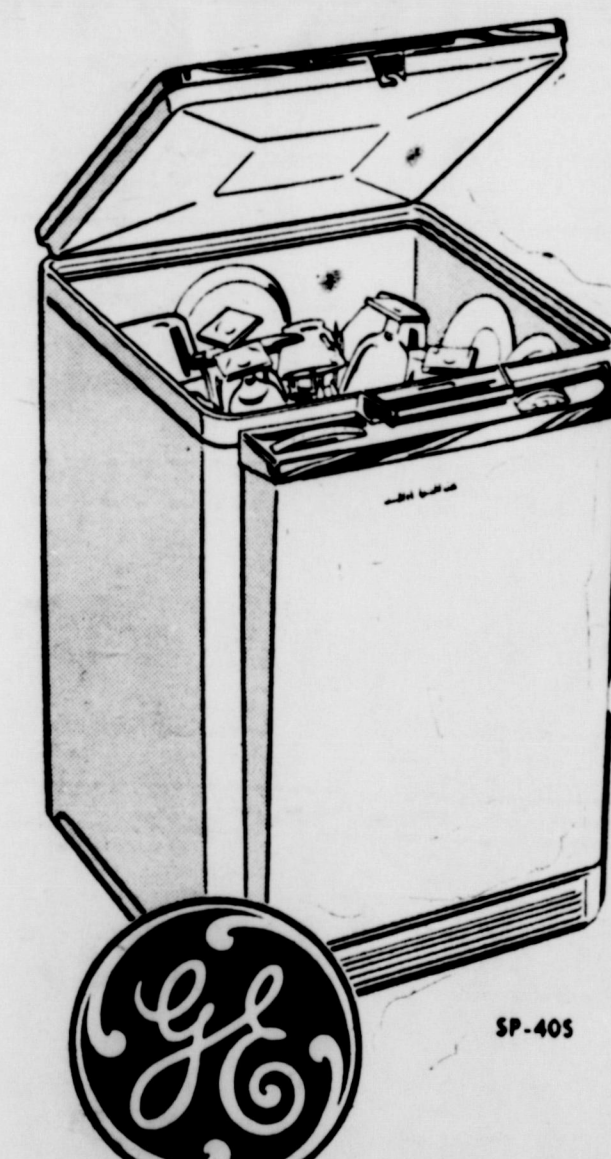

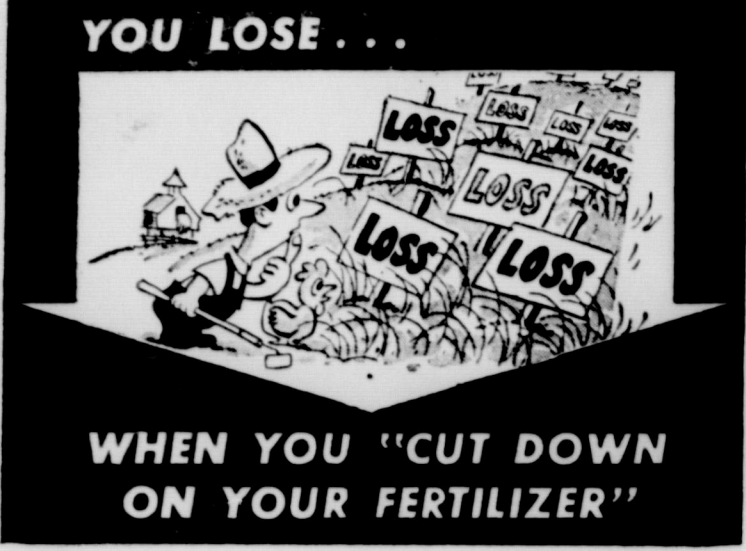

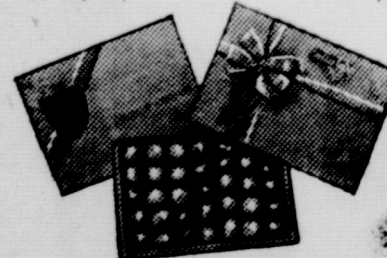

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL**

**AUSTIN, Tex. — Saturday is "speak now or forever hold your peace" day in Texas**

Or, to say the least, the voter who does not express an opinion at the polls and precinct conventions this week should hold his peace about what happens in Texas during the next two years.

A number of important decisions as to office holders will be made Saturday. Once made, they are final—for two years or even four years.

At this point in the campaigns, almost all candidates and their supporters believe that if there is a big enough turnout Saturday, their side will win handily. And those who aren't pleased with the way things turn out likely will blame it on those who don't bother to show up.

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

**NEW HIGHWAY SIGNS DUE —** New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.

Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000-mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border to border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker—a red, white and blue shield. Texas Highway Department designed the shield which later was adopted for the entire national system.

All makers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed about two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background, and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

Texas leads in the number of miles of interstate highways completed and under way. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stage of progress.

**SCHOOL'S SHARE DOWN —** Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Akin program for school improvement.

In 1958-59, says the report, Texas spent 29.67 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

During that period, public school spending more than doubled—from 156,000,000 to \$322,000,000—to keep pace with a 51 per cent increase in students and 49 per cent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel again has said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

**PROFIT PREDICTED —** When everything is finally cleared up, the state will come out with a profit of \$50,000 — perhaps more — on land involved in the Veterans Land Board scandals.

This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Alcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure."

He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Alcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.

**COSTLY ERROR —** Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for re-trial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employe of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to

the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$36,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions, but all agreed it should be re-tried.

**HO'V BIG THE GROUNDS —** State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.

Reason for the precaution is that the Legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing—absolutely nothing—could be built on the Capitol grounds without specific permission from the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

**WHO OWNS THE OIL? —** Another question under consideration by the attorney general's department is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads."

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County.

Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.
