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Crump Heads State Convention Delegates

A. B. Crump was named chairman of the Wheeler County delegates to the state-national convention to be held June 15 in Austin and the state convention which will be held September 20, in San Antonio, Texas, and Lyndon B. Johnson got the endorsement of the county democrats to be nominated for President at the county convention held here in Wheeler Saturday.

Crump will head a group of four delegates and four alternates who will attend the conventions.

Aside from Thompson, other voting delegates chosen were Harry Wofford, Thurman Adkins and Roy Scribner.

The alternates are E. J. Holt, Jr., H. M. Wiley, Sebert Worley, and Guy Harden.

The group overwhelmingly voted to back Johnson, for nomination as the next President.

A. B. Crump, county chairman of the Democratic Committee, opened the meeting asked that a permanent chairman be elected for the convention. Thurman Adkins of Shamrock was elected for this position.

Loss Is Serious

The barber shop philosophers and prophets of doom have been busy during the past few weeks discussing the pros and cons of the recent population announcement which listed Wheeler County with a total population of less than 8,000.

To the church this means a drop in attendance; to the business this means a loss of 25% of his prospective customers; and to a few politicians the future is really cloudy.

When the population of a county drops below 10,000 the office of County Tax Assessor and Collector and the office of County Sheriff are automatically combined unless a special election is held and the voters decide to do otherwise, according to county judge Geo. Hefley.

And when the population of a county drops below 8,000 the county clerk automatically takes over the duties of the district clerk. Some say the change must be made at the first of the year and some say the district clerk will stay in office until the current term expires.

At first, local officials thought the office of County Superintendent would be affected by the population loss. Not so that office is regulated by the number and size of rural schools in the county.

I just can't feature the offices of county sheriff and tax collector being combined, especially since they are two of the biggest offices in the county. In fact I would go so far as to say that it would be almost impossible for one man to efficiently execute the duties of both offices. However, unless the taxpayers rally to the rescue, the offices will be combined.

Do some serious thinking about this problem, because next week we plan to take a pole of our readers and see how they feel about the situation.

SUPERINTENDENT

A WORD TO PARENTS:

We appreciate your fine cooperation this year. You have been so kind to my wife and to me. We feel that we have an ideal community in which to live and work. Our students have been among the best and it has been our pleasure to teach and to supervise. The following are some suggestions for improving our students ability to learn.

Last Spring, our school gave a series of tests to our seventh grade students. These were two types: Mental Ability and Achievement.

Mental Ability Tests seek to give us a score from which we can determine a pupil's ability to learn. These scores are based up-

on 100 as the average. Most pupils will fall in the 95-105 range, which we call normal. Those 105-115 will have superior intelligence; and those 115-130 very superior; a very few above 130 may be classified as on the genius level.

There is also a grade placement figure for each pupil based upon the grade in which the pupil has the ability to learn. When we take this grade placement and place with it the pupil's achievement, we can readily see if he is doing the best work that he is capable of doing. For example, suppose John has a mental ability score which gives him a grade placement of 8.5 which means he has the ability to do work in the middle of the 8th grade; and that on the other hand he has a Grade placement of only 7.5 on his achievement tests. We can see that he is not doing his best. We need to help him use his abilities better. Perhaps he needs more time to study.

These tests were also given to all Seventh graders this fall and they are now being considered with concerning their scores.

In addition to the above, we have given aptitude tests to our freshmen. These tests tell us where the pupils have the best chance to succeed. They cover Reading, Vocabulary and Comprehension, Number facts and number reasoning; Language usage and punctuation; applied Science and social relations; Ability to analyze and reason. We find that these pupils are weakest in reading vocabulary, comprehension and language usage. In other words we need to help them learn to read and understand better. This is the basis of any good education. We can add to library facilities here a school and encourage in every possible way a love of good literature. You can also do a great deal at home by providing good reading materials, time in which the child can sit quietly with a good book, and enjoy it, and above all, help them to add to their knowledge of words by providing a good home dictionary and insist upon their use of it.

We are now counseling with the Juniors on their Intelligence tests. We have given advanced achievement tests to our Seniors. These scores have shown us some rather glaring weaknesses, mostly in the same fields as the above reading comprehension and language usage. Our grade placement for seniors run from a high of 115.5 which means such a pupil could do work on a college level as a fourth years student, to a low of 8.5 which means that such student can only read and understand on the level of the 8th grade. These Seniors can overcome to a great extent the weakness. They have by intensive study. There isn't one of them that would have to fail as a college freshman provided they do something about it while they have the time and opportunity to do so.

POPULATION DECREASE NOTED IN COUNTY

County has experienced population of 2,401 in 1950 and there were 1,155 in 1960. Of the 16 Texas Panhandle counties reported on by Mr. Cook, 10 had lost population and only six had gained. Seventeen cities in those counties showed substantial gains, opposed to 14 cities that registered relatively minor losses.

Counties gaining population include: Sherman, Hartley, Roberts, Oldham, Hutchison, and Swisher. Those showing losses are Motley, Dallam, Briscoe, Armstrong, Wheeler, Hemphill, Childress, Collingsworth and Hall.

Cities that gained are: Stratford, Texhoma, Channing, Silverton, Claude, Wheeler, Miami, Adrian, Vega, Paducah, Samnorwood, Dodson, Borger, Fritch, Stinnett, Kress and Tulia.

Losses were recorded at Matarador, Roaring Springs, Texline, Quanah, Canadian, Childress, Wellington, Phillips, Estheline, Lakeview, Memphis, Turkey, Shamrock and Happy.

Of the 16 counties surveyed, all of them having agricultural economies except Hutchison, the county-wide population dropped from 116,929 in 1950 to 104,712 in 1960 or a county population loss of 12,217.

While the overall population of the counties decreased, the overall city population gained 6,206 people—a trend pointing to a population shift from country to town. In 1950, there were 62,837 people living in the 31 cities in the counties canvassed, but in 1960 the total is 69,043.

City with the most substantial population loss of the 31 was Childress where the population dropped from 7,619 in 1950 to 6,795 in 1960. Losses in other cities were slight, however, such as Texline which dropped only 10. Canadian suffered a substantial loss of 481 and Wellington a loss of 550.

Livestock Survey Cards To Be Distributed

Postmaster Virgil Jamison announced today that Rural Mail June 1, 1960 Livestock Survey carriers will begin distributing cards to patrons on their routes about May 19.

This mid-year livestock survey is the first of three which your Post Office and U. S. Agriculture Departments cooperatively make each year. The June 1 survey provides basic information to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin for estimating the 1960 calf crop, what the spring pig crop actually numbered, and a preview of farrowing intentions for the fall season.

Also, poultrymen will get information on number of chickens raised during the spring. Those chickens will be the coming fall and winter's laying flock.

To be sure our community is well represented in this survey, Postmaster Jamison urges each patron receiving a card to fill it out and return to his mail box. Rural mail carrier working on this project is William A. Goad, Jr., Route One.

Deadline Near For Transfer Of Scholastics

All parental requests for transfer of pupils, whose names are on census roll of the home school districts, must be made to the office of County Superintendent Geo. A. Weems by June 1.

"These transfers are made automatically by the county superintendent unless there is a protest filed by either the home district or the receiving district," Mr. Weems said.

"In case of a protest, the transfer application must be considered by the county school board. All such transfers carry with them all benefits — per capita, transportation and ADA," the superintendent said.

Parental requests for transfer of pupils whose names are not on the census roll may be made at any time before October 1. Such transfers do not carry with them per capita funds, but only transportation and ADA benefits.

Pupils whose grades are not taught in their home district may be transferred at any time during the year by the county board, upon receipt of parental request for such transfers. These transfers carry with them full benefits if their home districts. Otherwise, they receive only transportation and ADA benefits.

Questions And Answers On

BRUCELLOSIS

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease, but this is modified by the fact that under Texas climatic conditions, it is spread primarily from animal to animal to lick or touch another and no source of common ground water.

Is running stream a problem?

Constantly running streams usually present no problem as dilution of infected material dropped in such a stream prevents sufficient concentration of infective material building up.

Does all new animal health laws depend upon vote of the people, or just brucellosis?

The brucellosis control law is the only one of the seven laws that require a petition to put it into effect in a given county. All others became effective 90

days after passage. Some, like the market inspection law, will require additional time before enforcement starts.

If a county fails to qualify first time, how long before second tests will be made?

If a county fails to reach certification standards on the first test a retest will be run within 120 days and at intervals thereafter until certification is accomplished. Each retest will be started as soon as the previous county test is completed.

Who pays for tests?

The State and Federal Government covers the expenses of all test, vaccination identification of animals, and enforcement of rules under a Type II program. If a man has 5 or 10 cows will only 20% be tested?

Small herds will be tested entirely. If a herd consists of more than 20 animals, only 20% will be tested in addition to registered and dairy animals. However, if the owner so desires, the entire herd can be tested.

In Type II program, after waiting 90 days, following posting of proclamation what is effect of moving cattle in or out?

Once the program actually goes into effect, any movement of cattle in or out of the county must be in compliance with the terms of the regulations (see rules and regulations, Sec IV and V).

How long before the program becomes compulsory?

The law passed by the Texas Legislature does not fix a date for mandatory compliance. Each county will enter the program as they see fit.

Can landowner move cattle from a non-control county to a county under control where he owns land?

Yes, such movement is possible if the provisions of Section IV of the regulations are complied with.

Does the law provide that a penalty be assessed for non compliance?

The law provides that in a county where the necessary majority of cattle owners have petitioned for the program, all cattlemen must abide by it or be subjected to fine.

Who will do patrolling boundaries?

During the period in which a county seeks certification the State will have the major responsibility for border protection; once certification is accomplished, local enforcement officials will bear the major responsibility.

If a county becomes a control area can cattle be shipped out without permits?

In a control area during the time testing is in progress all breeding cattle will move under permit. However, permission for shipping cattle out of the area will be granted in all cases where the premises of origin is not quarantine, and the cattle are destined to a state he will accept them.
