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Rogue Theatre Has Numerous Contests For Patrons To Enter

Ronnie Cantrell, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Cantrell of Twitty, has been selected to attend annual Boys State in Austin June 5-11, Willard Glover, commander of the DeSoto-George Post of the American Legion announced this week.

Jimmy Brothers, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Brothers, was named alternate.

Both are junior students in Shamrock High School.

Boys State is a program of The American Legion, Department of Texas. Expenses of the local representative are shared by the DeSoto-George Post, the Rotators Club and the Rotary Club.

The boy to represent Shamrock each year is selected by the high school faculty. Scholarship, character, ambition, leadership ability, and the ability to go along with fellow students are the most important qualifications. Selections are made on the following basis: Leadership, 20 per cent; character and integrity, 25 per cent; and scholarship, 25 per cent.

Ronnie is a member of the Twitty Baptist Church. He played football his freshman and junior years, and was named All-District 6-AAA and this past season.

He was student council representative his freshman year treasurer of his sophomore class and is president of his junior class. He was a member of the FFA grass judging team his freshman year and was on the livestock judging team this year. The Doctor I Knew

In my opinion the people of Wheeler and Wheeler County suffered the biggest loss Tuesday morning, economically, socially and financially that they have suffered in many years.

When Dr. Harold Nicholson Jr. died Tuesday morning, many things died in Wheeler. Not only did we lose an outstanding surgeon and physician, we lost a friend, a community supporter and one of the only men left with the characteristic for "trusting his fellow man" that too few of us possess.

Perhaps you think the above statement is flattery, not so, because in the few short years I knew the Doctor I learned to love and respect him. If you don't feel the same way, perhaps it's because you really didn't know him.

The Doctor I knew wouldn't even send out a statement at the end of the month, because he trusted his fellow man to pay him. Too often we took advantage of the Doctor and used the money that was rightfully his for something else. Nevertheless, the next time we needed him, he was there.

The Doctor I knew also helped several younger men get started in business by helping them financially. He never asked them for an interest in their business. He just trusted them to pay the money back when they were able.

And the Doctor I knew was never too tired or busy to come to your home day or night. And not once did I hear him complain.

And the Doctor I knew was a proud man. And rightly so, because all of us know the very important part the local physician plays in our daily lives.

The Doctor was a young man, only 43, and in the words of a dear friend of mine, "His death was such a waste of talent and ability."

If we're lucky we will get another young doctor to fill his shoes. But in my heart and the hearts of many others it will be impossible to replace the Dr. Harold Nicholson Jr. that I knew.

In gathering the information for the story on the 30th anniversary of the Rogue Theatre we found some interesting material.

For instance: Among the files of the Rogue Theatre we found: A statement from the Andrus Publishing Company of Wheeler; And statements from W. E. Pennington and Son, Red's Cash Grocery and several now non-existing businesses.

We also learned that Nelson Porter purchased the first ticket when the theatre was opened in 1930. And the screen was in the front of the theatre instead of the back.

As part of their 30th year anniversary celebration activities will serve coffee from 2:00 till 4:00 P. M. Sunday afternoon. And they plan to offer a host of prizes and favors for those winning any of their many contests.

The rules and regulations for their contests are listed in their big advertisement elsewhere in this paper.

In the spring of 1930 the late Lem and Lee Guthrie of Mador purchased from Dr. H. E. Nicholson the Legion Theatre, which was located where the J-Lee Department Store now stands. Mr. and Mrs. Lem Guthrie and their sons Lee and Lamar, and Lee's wife Laura and small son Cooke moved to Wheeler to make their home.

The existing building was equipped for silent pictures and Nora's Cafe occupied the front. Immediately a remodeling job was underway. The floor was sloped, a stage was built. (Oh, yes, they had home talent performances at times.) The first office was placed in the center and the finest Talking Picture equipment was installed and the Rogue Theatre came into being. On opening night, June 9, 1930 the first "Talkie" was presented to the enthusiastic people of Wheeler. (Mrs. Guthrie recalls that she was scared to death her first experience in a Box Office, and Lee was as nervous as if he were handling dynamite.)

The first few months were trying. We knew nothing of the business or the equipment. There was not a maintenance man nearer than Oklahoma City. (And that's continued on Page 8, No. 5)

HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Most ardent advocates of a tax bill to pour fresh funds into the state's coffers likely will be legislative employees.

They may be hunting new jobs or working for nothing before the year is out.

Only about \$130,000 remains in the legislative expense fund for use between now and the end of the year. A good part of this probably will be needed to pay travel and miscellaneous expenses of the study committees that meet between sessions.

If these expenses run very high, the permanent legislative employees — people who keep records, staff the legislative library, etc. — may run short on salary money.

Their only course, if they want to stay on in their jobs, will be to hang on until the new legislature finds money to pay them.

SESSIONS COST TOTALED — Last year's legislative sessions —

one regular, three — special cost the state \$2,773,140.

This averages out to \$16,385 a day when the lawmakers are meeting, according to State Auditor, C. H. Cavness report.

Of the \$2,773,140 total, \$724,000 was spent by the 32-member Senate, \$1,242,000 by the 150-member House. Each member received in salary about \$5,000, at the rate of \$25 per day.

Rest of the expense is mostly for the employees to keep a session going — answer letters, keep records, print bills etc.

SALES TAX TAKE ESTIMATED — A retail sales tax with groceries, medical and other services exempted would raise an estimated \$133,000,000 a year, a legislative committee was told.

Collection costs would run about \$3,000,000 a year, a Texas Research League tax expert told the Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

If the tax covered not only finished products but raw products used by business in manufacturing, the take would be some \$80,000,000 a year more but would result in the consumer's paying two taxes on one item.

A retail sales tax would not hurt Texas' future industrial development, the Commission was told by a business expert, but a tax on manufacturing raw materials would.

Very few elective officials have come out strongly for any kind of broad-based sales tax. Some are bound to look longingly at this avenue, however, since the amount that will have to be raised next year will, if teachers get any sort of raise, be almost as much as a retail sales tax would net.

"LAME DUCK" OPINIONS ASKED — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has been asked for opinions on whether retiring lawmakers should continue to serve on two important interim committees.

Four members of the Commission on State and Local Tax Policy are "lame ducks." They are the chairman, Sen. Bill Fly of Victoria, and Rep. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio, who were defeated for re-election; Rep. V. L. Ramsey of Beckville, who ran for comptroller and lost; and Rep. Ohio Bristow of Big Spring who didn't run this year.

Three of the five members of the House General Investigating Committee also did not run for new terms. They are Rep. H. J. Blanchard chairman, and Reps. Joe Burkett of Kerrville and Carl Conley of Raymondville.

If the Attorney General rules these men should be replaced, most of the new appointments will be made by retiring House Speaker Waggoner Carr.

GAS TAX ARGUED — Court action has begun on what will undoubtedly be a long legal battle over whether the natural gas severance beneficiary tax passed last year is constitutional.

An estimated \$15,000,000 a year in state revenue is at stake.

Tennessee Gas Transmission Co., which filed a separate suit, was the first to begin argument in the Austin district court. A consolidated suit, involving 80 other companies, will be heard by the same court on June 16.

Tennessee Co. spokesmen argued that the pipelines are in the business of transporting only and should not be subject to a tax based on the value of the gas.

Case is not expected to be decided finally for many months when it has gone through all the lower courts and finally to the U. S. Supreme Court.

INDUSTRY-SEEKING BUDGET SET — Texas Industrial Commission has set up an operating budget of \$100,000, of which \$76,250 will have to be raised privately.

Legislature appropriated \$23,250 for the Commission about 10 percent of what was asked.

Between now and Sept. 1, 1961, the Commission proposes to spend about \$50,000 on printing, mailing and advertising. Remainder would be spent on salaries and office expenses.

Commission's goal is to attract 254 new industries to Texas in the next year.

Former Attorney General John Ben Sheppard of Odessa has been named chairman of a 400-member citizens advisory committee which will assist the committee by gathering information on local conditions.

JOHNSON DINNER PLANNED — A \$50-a-plate dinner by the Lyndon Johnson For President dinner committee will be held in Austin tomorrow night, June 13.

The dinner will honor Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, Speaker Sam Rayburn, and Gov. Price Daniel.

Honorary chairman is former Vice President John Nance Garner of Uvalde. Co-chairmaning the event will be Austin's Mayor Tom Miller and Congressman Homer Thornberry.

EXCESS WHEAT

Reporters are now checking in the field to determine if the destroy wheat acreage on each farm is sufficient to place the wheat allotment. It is expected that this check will be completed within the next two weeks. May 30 was the final date to destroy wheat in excess of the wheat allotment. Producers are reminded that a charge of \$4.00 plus \$2.00 for each plot over one will be charged if it is found that enough wheat has not been plowed up.

The first trip to check wheat will be free, but any additional trip to check excess must be paid for by the producer.

1961 WHEAT ALLOTMENT

Work has been started in the county office to prepare worksheets preparatory to establishing 1961 wheat allotments over the county. It is expected that

the Wheeler county allotment for 1961 will be less than the 1960 allotment.

CONSERVATION RESERVE

Producers with soil bank Conservation Reserve contracts are reminded that SUNFLOWER and COCKLEBUR are noxious weeds and must be controlled on the soil bank acreage. A visit will be made to each soil bank farm this summer to determine base acreage and check for noxious weeds. Please be sure to have these weeds under control before your farm is visited.

1960 COTTON

43 farms released part or all of their 1960 farm cotton allotment with a total of 849.0 acres released.

This 849.0 acres was reapportioned to 301 other farms in Wheeler County for 1960 only. The farms which released the allotment will get history credit for their released allotment in establishing future farm allotments for their farm.
