Nicholson Donates Hospital To Town

Wheeler, Nov. 27—The Harold E. Nicholson, Jr., M.D., Memorial Hospital came into official existence here this afternoon in formal dedication ceremonies.

The hospital, formerly owned by Dr. Harold E. Nicholson, Sr., is now a non-profit organization. Dr. Nicholson turned the hospital over to a corporation which will use profits to aid needy students in Texas A&M College and Baylor Medical School.

The institution was re-named in honor of Dr. Nicholson's son, who died May 31 of this year. He was a co-partner with his father in managing the hospital.

Dr. Nicholson today gave three reasons for his decision to surrender the hospital to the two schools.

"First and foremost," the doctor said, "it is to be a memorial to our boy. Second, we wanted Wheeler to have a hospital without burdening the community with a bond issue."

"And third, the funds must be used for assisting needy students in the two schools. This is one of the more important reasons."

The official change in administration of the hospital came during the afternoon program in the high school gymnasium. A. O. Nicholson of Shamrock, president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, presided.

Representatives of the Baylor Medical School, practicing physicians from Dallas and other major cities attended the dedication ceremonies.

Serving as master of ceremonies for the program was Paul Wiley of Pampa, who introduced the new board of trustees. They are Dr. Nicholson, Sr., and his wife, Annette; A. O. Nicholson of Shamrock, Max Wiley, Ira Passons, R. J. Holt, Jr., and Rep. Grainger McIlhenny, all of Wheeler.

The Rev. Bob Ely, pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church, read the scripture and Don Earney, editor of the Wheeler Times, presented a reading, "The Doctor I Knew." Invocation was given by the Rev. Frank Ross, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler, and benediction by E. M. Borden, minister of the Wheeler Church of Christ.

The hospital, constructed in 1936, contains 22 beds, and usually operates at about 50 percent of capacity, Dr. Nicholson said. Eight nurses including dietitians and an engineer are employed on the staff.

Dr. Nicholson said he plans to continue as physician here, but is now trying to locate an associate physician to assist him.

Dr. Nicholson's son attended both Texas A&M and Baylor, the two schools to benefit from operation of the hospital.

"My wife and I thought it out. We just gave the hospital away. We have no claims to it now. There was no pressure applied to us. The only stipulation is that all funds must go to assist needy students through college," Dr. Nicholson said.

The hospital is equipped for major surgery, keeps a complete stock of medical supplies and has an iron lung. A tour of the hospital was given visitors after the ceremonies and reception.

Guthries To Install Micro - Wave TV

The equipment has been purchased, engineering has been completed and the F.F.A. had already issued a permit to the Vumore Company of Okla. City to begin construction of a Micro-Wave Television System to serve Wheeler, Shamrock, and Canadian. The tower and equipment will be erected at a cost of \$90,000.00. Wheeler has signed a five year lease agreement with Vumore for use of the system.

The 400 ft. tower will be erected 12 miles East of the Pampa Airport on the Bowers Ranch. That will place tower exactly 68.3 mi. from Amarillo. It will be 28.3 miles from Wheeler; 33.5 miles from Canadian and 38.6 miles from Shamrock.

Engineers from Vumore figure the project will be in operation within the next two months, placing completion date at about Feb. 1st.

All three of the Amarillo stations channel 4, 10 and 7 will be micro-waved into Wheeler and a resident engineer will be available at all times.

Mrs. Guthrie and Corky, owners of the Wheeler Television system, announced that no additional charges will be made for the Micro-Wave Television. "We are just trying to offer our customers better television," Mrs. Guthrie said.

To those who are familiar with Micro-Wave Television, it is the same system as used by the telephone companies to transmit telephone calls across the ocean. And is supposed to be the most perfect system ever to be developed.

Timely Tips . . .

On Livestock Feeding

Boost Cattle Profits with winter feeding — "Supplements used with home-grown roughage affect the profit margin in beef cattle operations," says the Oklahoma Extension Service. For proper, yet economical supplement feeding with dry grass, they recommend two to two and one-half pounds of 41 percent protein per cow per day. In most cow-and-calf operations, the most economical winter beef cattle ration is dry grass supplemented with protein and minerals.

Salt-meal mixtures make a practical, economical supplement—Because of the widespread interest of cattlemen in meal-salt mixtures, the university of Arizona conducted a study to determine their productivity for beef cattle. Tests gave reliable evidence that a high salt diet during pregnancy and subsequent lactation has no harmful effect on cows or their calves. It was found that high salt intake should be accompanied by a corresponding increase in water consumption. E. B. Stanley and W. J. Pistor, who conducted the tests, commented that cottonseed meal is the logical choice to use with salt since it has served an important role in range cattle supplementation. In addition to needed protein, it provides both phosphorus and readily available energy-producing nutrients. Al Lane stresses the advantages of salt-controlled supplements for rangers with widely scattered operations.

Protein supplement called cat-tlemer's surest investment — The best investment a cat-tlemer can make this winter is to make sure his cattle are fed the extra pro-portionment they need, according

to Dr. T. J. Cunha, head of the Florida Experiment Station's animal husbandry department. Experiments have shown that for every dollar spent for needed protein supplementation during the winter a cat-tlemer can expect two dollars in increased returns. Carle in-creased protein loss weight do not produce regularly, and even smaller calves which means less re-turn to the producer. Protein sup-plementation increases the appetite of cattle and causes them to graze more. The forage they consume is better utilized because of the extra protein they are getting.

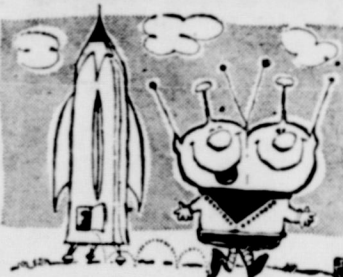
Supplements more than pay their way—When cattle and hogs are fed protein supplements while grazing cornfields, the gain in weight is more than enough to pay the cost of the supplements, according to Livestock Specialist G. R. Carlisle of the University of Illinois. He cites one trial in which cattle gained 3.4 pound per head daily when they received a protein supplement. Each dollar spent for supplement returned \$2.85. The average of 13 Corn Belt tests showed that pigs receiving supplement gained 1/2 pound more daily when grazing cornfields; each bushel of corn produced 4.5 more pounds of pork when supple-ment was fed; and each pound of supplement saved 6.4 pounds of corn. Thus, Carlisle says, if corn in the field is only 50 cents a bushel, a supplement must cost more than \$6 per hundred pounds before it is too expensive to feed.

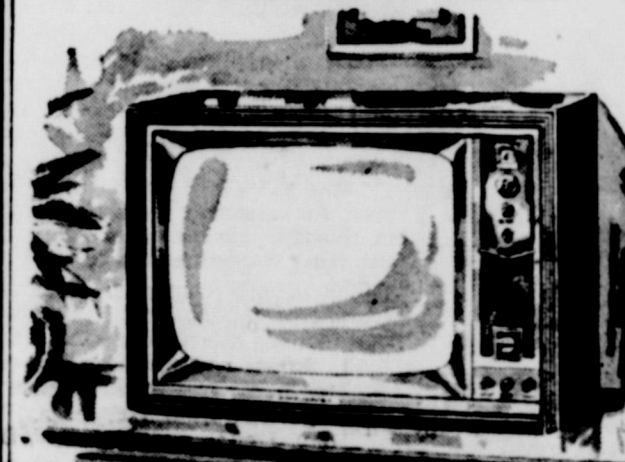

Giant Eye' Symbolizing Research Hope Visited by Small Birth Defects Victim

The lights dim, and in the darkened high-ceilinged room a somber-faced little boy stares at the pilot light of a towering microscope.

This is the electron microscope at Ohio State University Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, a magnifying eye nine feet high, capable of magnifying the human cell 100,000 times.

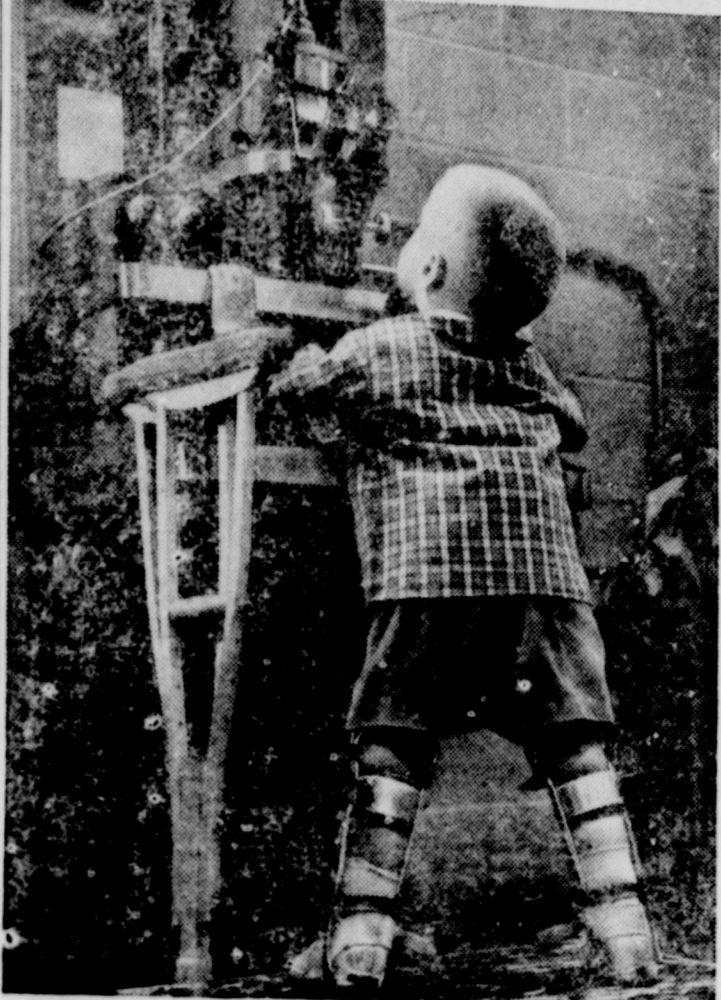
The small boy with the sad little face is Kevin Sharp, 3½ years, of Grove City, Ohio, who wanted to see the magnified version of the microscope given him on his birthday by his doctor. He is paralyzed from the neck down and cannot play or indeed play much at all.

Such mobility as he has is made possible by his crutches. Kevin is one of the significant birth defects the cause of which is being pursued today by The National Foundation for the March of Dimes. Congenital malformations afflict 250,000 infants annually in the United States and are responsible for the deaths of 34,000 babies each year who are stillborn or die within four weeks of birth. The health organization's expanded program also includes genetic and continued work.

In his excitement while looking through the eyepiece of the vast instrument, Kevin probably didn't know that in the ultra-powerful lens of such electron microscopes, scientists are some day to pinpoint the cause of the savage embryonic malap that crippled him before he was born. By comparing normal and abnormal cells under tremendous magnification, researchers hope to discover, for example, why Kevin's spine never fused during his mother's pregnancy, or why other little boy or girl is born with excess fluid on the brain—another baffling birth defect which The National Foundation is studying.

"At his birth, doctors gave him only a few hours to live," says Mrs. Gerald Sharp, his mother. "In addition to his open spine, he had two clubfeet which are now much improved due to surgery and physical therapy. He is a brave and happy little fellow even if he smiles so rarely. My husband and I thank God that today wider research is being done into birth defects."

She adds somewhat wistfully: "My husband Gerald and I met in an orphanage in Xenia, Ohio. We became childhood sweethearts. Like other young

people, we longed to raise a family, and a healthy one. "Why should this unaccountable accident have happened to us? But we count our blessings. Perhaps fewer Kevins will be born to the next generation. We certainly pray so."

The lights return and, supported by his crutches and braces, solemn little Kevin struggles back from the microscope. But at that moment looking up at his mother there's the suggestion of a smile around the corners of his mouth.

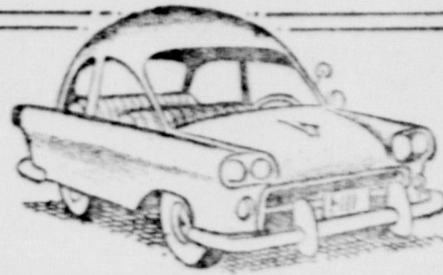

Good News For Businessmen

A new and mighty hunter of delinquent accounts receivable that can bat in the clean-up position on any credit and collection team hits a sizzling \$40 when it comes to bringing back to life accounts previously thought "dead."

The name? Direct Collector, and he's busier than ever these days of buy-now, pay-later, credit card living Delinquent accounts are yielding to the fresh pay-now approach of the new system offered by the National Mercantile Clearing House of Miami, Fla.

The system has proved 84 per cent effective in collecting overdue instalment or single payment bills.

This method, based soundly on repetition of demand, psychology and a gentle reminder of relief by court action, brings in money a creditor might otherwise have written off. It salvages many a waning account, strained to the breaking point by a "bad debt" classification.

The method is simple and economical. On legal sheets a creditor buys five demand forms carrying the National Mercantile Clearing House (NMCH) world-wide service insignia. First demand form is mailed with the customer's statement. Following clear layman's directions and handled with regular billings, numbers two, three and four go out at 10-day intervals. Since payments are all made directly to the creditor, account identities are unknown to NMCH.
