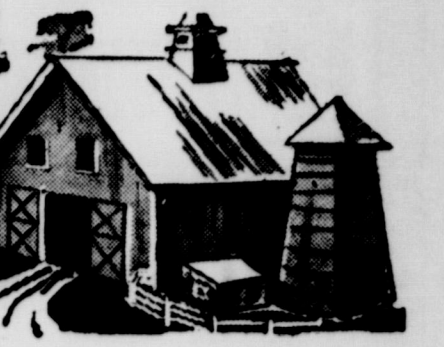

## Rep. McIlhany Is Head Of Committee On Agriculture

Representative Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler was named today by Speaker James A. Turman as Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture of the House of Representatives of the 57th Texas Legislature.

Representative McIlhany was also named as Vice Chairman of the Committee on Constitutional Amendments and as a member of the following committees: (1) Conservation and Reclamation, (2) Oil, Gas, and Mining, (3) State Affairs.

"Representative McIlhany will occupy a position of responsibility and leadership during this session," Speaker Turman said. "As Chairman of one of the most important committees, and as a member of several others, he will carry a heavy burden of work and will exert a vital influence on legislative policy. I know he will conduct himself in a manner that will reflect credit on himself and will benefit the people of Texas."

Representative McIlhany is now serving his 7th term in the Legislature and is recognized by his colleagues for his outstanding ability and his conscientious devotion to duty.

## Crump Will Be Presiding Judge In The City Election

Filing date in the forth coming city election ends March 4th with absentee voting to begin 20 days before the election. The election will be held April 4 in the city hall.

Two councilmen must be elected. The terms of Wayne Edwards and Jake Holcomb expire. Holdover officials include W. D. Mitchell, James Verden and Mayor Thomas A. B. Crump.

A. B. Crump has been appointed presiding judge and the election will be held between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M.

Election filing supplies can be secured from A. B. Crump. To be eligible to vote in the city election you must have paid your poll tax and live within the city limits of Wheeler. The city election will not be held in conjunction with the election of U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, scheduled the same day.

Aspirants have until midnight March 4 to file their applications to appear on the special Senate race ballot. Secretary of State Frank Lake announced last week.

Applications mailed but not received by the secretary of state before midnight, March 4, will not be accepted, Lake said.

William A. Blakely, Dallas millionaire, now is serving as interim senator.

The local school board election will be held Saturday, April 1. Board members will be elected to replace Harrison Hall, and Roy Ford. The filing period for the school election is not less than 30 days prior to the election.

The terms of Jack Miller and Paul Macina, county school board officials in Commissioners Precinct one and three, will expire. The county school board election will be held in conjunction with the local school board election. A county trustee at large also must be elected.

**Chapman To Give Free Sugar**

Bill Chapman, at Chapman's Shamrock Service Station, is still giving away that sugar. Last Friday Bill started giving away a free 5 lb. sack of sugar to every 10th person spending at least \$3.00 at his service station.

Bill has purchased over 100 sacks of sugar for the promotion and he plans to give the sugar away as long as it lasts.

## RUSSIA IS PLANNING TO CUT DEFENSE AND INCREASE INDUSTRY

Russia is planning to cut its defense costs and increase outlays for industry and scientific research, an evidence that the Communists will endeavor to drive a wedge into the economy of the free world.

Closely aligned with this move is the revaluation of the ruble at \$1.11, a figure which more nearly approximates the dollar of the United States. Essentially, however, international trade is still in terms of the dollar rather than the ruble, for the Russian money is not backed by gold in international transactions.

In the barter trade agreement of the Communist world, however, the ruble offers the basis of exchange.

Foreign trade is an essential part of the Russian program and to accommodate this, there needs to be increased production at home. The chief objects of the Russian drive to expand its markets will be the newly independent nations.

On previous occasions, these columns have stressed the importance of markets in an expanding economy. Goods are not produced for production's sake. They are made to sell and bought to use.

If there is no market, there is no reason for increasing production. This means that the industrial capacity of any nation or state depends upon the ability to sell.

The Russian cuts in defense spending are geared toward making more goods available to the world market, and we can depend upon it that the selling price will be very competitive. By converting expenditures from the military, the Russians can strengthen their ability to compete. Furthermore, since production comes from a state monopoly, trade agreements are likely to include a provision that the Russians will pay for goods purchased with commodities manufactured in Russia.

The free economy of the United States and much of the free world makes the purchase and sale of goods two separate and distinct transactions. The monetary exchange of both the export and import trade of the United States is the dollar.

The greater flexibility of the United States dollar gives this country the advantage of being able to engage in transactions which may benefit three or more countries before the exchange is complete.

Unfortunately, the newer countries may not realize the advantages of free trade and may think they are gaining more by using Russia's Barter method. This means that in every respect, the industries of this country must be ready to meet the competitive bids of the Russians in such a way that their offer will be more attractive than the one offered by the Communists.

The key to meeting this competition lies in greater cooperation between capital and labor as the two work together to keep open the avenues to world trade.

## 1961 License Tags Are On Sale; Must Be On By April 1

Sale of 1961 motor vehicle license plates started Wednesday, February 1.

The new plates may be purchased at the office of Wheeler County tax Assessor-Collector Thurman Rives in Wheeler or at the office of Deputy Tag Agent Lyman Benson at Benson Hardware & Furniture in Shamrock.

Tags this year have black letters and numerals set in a white background. This is the reverse color scheme of last year, Rives said.

Numbers and letters of passenger car plates run from AS 5075 through AS 8724.

The prefix on commercial trucks is the same 1-C, but the farm truck prefix has been changed from 5-B to 8-B. The dealer tax prefix has also been changed and instead of 9/N as last year will be P.

In order to purchase tags, motor vehicle operators must have their Texas Title and their 1960 Registration Receipt. These must be available when application is made for the new plates.

Owners must purchase their plates by March 31, if they expect to operate their motor vehicles on and after April 1.

Plates may be placed on the vehicle as soon as purchased.

## Area Schools To Have Meeting To Select Textbooks

**TEXT BOOK SELECTIONS**

The County Common School Districts of Wheeler County will please have their Text-Book Committee Members at my office Tuesday, February 14, at 2:00 p.m. for the purpose of selecting certain New adopted Text Books for the 1961-62 school year. Independent Schools of the county are invited to meet with this group too, if they are interested in having uniform Texts for the whole County.

The deadline has passed for enumerating scholastics but if any one is holding completed census blanks, that were signed by parents prior to February 1st, they should be turned in to the district census enumerator at once.

All Public Schools in the County will hold Trustee Elections on Saturday April 1st. In order for a candidate to get his name printed on the ballot as a candidate for the office of trustee, application must be made not later than thirty days (30 days) prior to the date of the election. (A petition signed by five qualified voters of a district will satisfy the above requirement in case a candidate does not choose to make application for himself.)
