



any kind you want. The supervisors of the Wheeler District are trying to encourage early seeding. The roots of the grass get better established and live through the dry season with less thining. More of the seed will germinate the first year if seeded early

Grass seed germinate better and live better when planted a half to three-quarters of an inch deep on a firm seedbed. A dead litter cover helps the new seedlings in sev-eral ways. It will protect the seedlings from wind, hold the moisture near the surface, keep the soil from getting too hot and provide plant food for the grass. It usually pays to wait a year if nec-essary to provide a good dead lit-

Federal cost-sharing for grass seeding is available through the Great Plains Conservation Program. (See the Soil Conservation Service) or through the ACP (see the ASC for details).
