Brad Masters Shows Junior Champion Female Shorthorn At S.W. Exposition

Brad Masters, a 4-H member from Wheeler, exhibited the Junior Champion Female in the Junior Shorthorn Show at the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show. This outstanding event was judged by Dr. T. D. (Dusty) Rich of Albuquerque, New Mexico. There are 2,105 head entered in the Junior Heifer Show.

The Stock Show's Junior Division this year is hosting a record 8,800 entries by youth of Texas as the culmination of yearlong agricultural educational projects in various areas of livestock production. Junior premiums will exceed \$63,850.

The junior entry list is part of the overall count of more than 22,000 head of cattle, sheep, swine, horses, mules, donkeys, llamas, goats, poultry, pigeons, and rabbits. The 104th annual Stock Show, underway at the Will Rogers Memorial Center in Fort

Worth, will continue through Sunday, February 6. Total prize and premium money for the show will be in excess of \$800,000.

For the Stock Show and the City of Fort Worth the move into the year 2000 is a major opportunity to showcase the livestock industry as well as a growing metroplex. The 800,000 visitors to the show during its 17-day run will include many people from nations outside the United States. Last year the show hosted visitors from 73 other countries.

Tickets to the family oriented event are available at the Will Rogers Box office at the center's north entrance. Ground admission is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children 6-16. Rodeo tickets, which include admission to the grounds, are \$16 for weekday matinees and evenings, and \$18 for Friday nights and all weekend performances.

Property used in the commission of a crime will be seized and sold. The funds obtained therefrom will be returned to the district (when possible) for use by taxpayers and appropriate government entities.

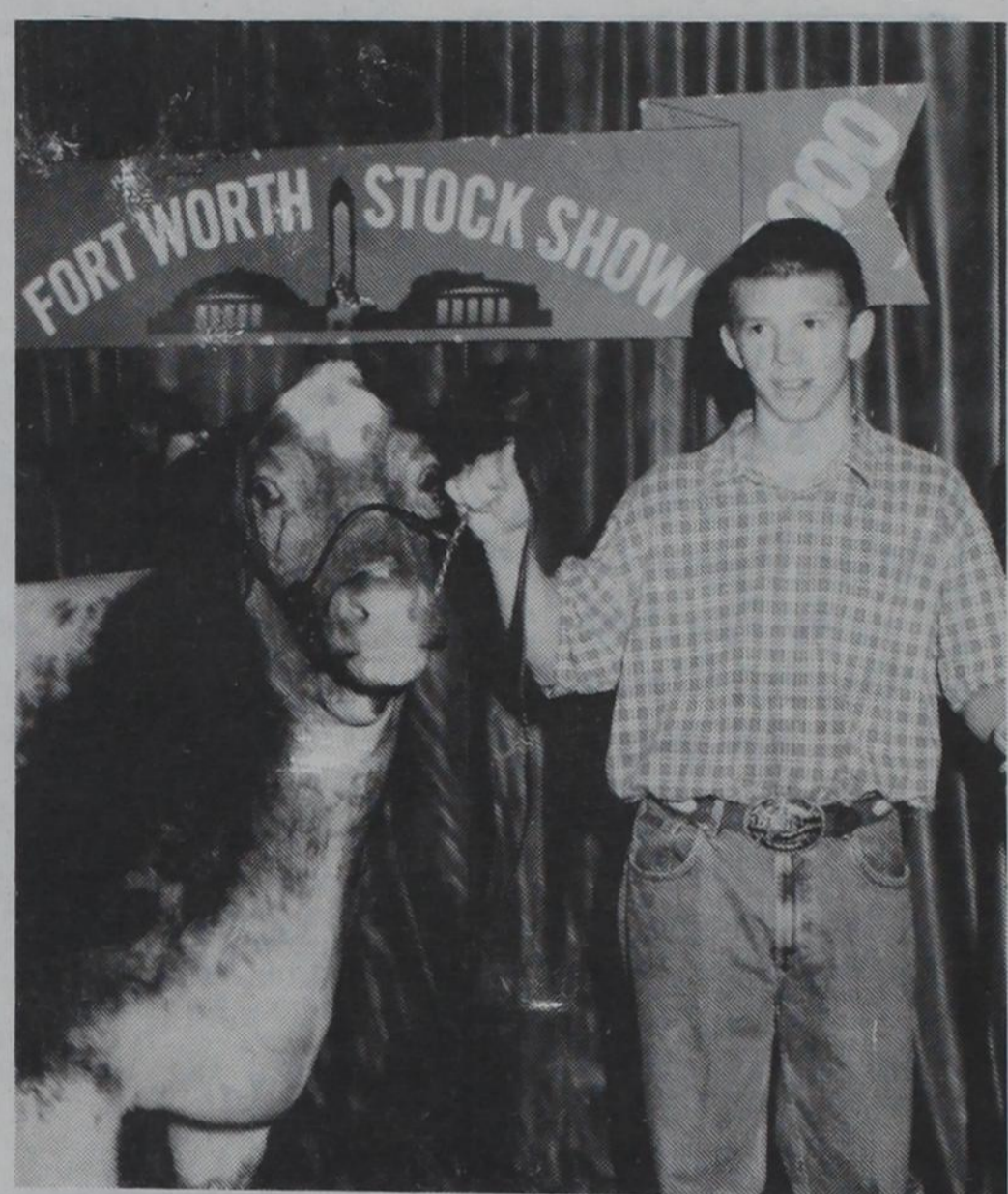

Time to Begin Planting CRP Native Grasses

Your local Natural Resources Conservation Service would like to inform all CRP participants in CRP sign-up 15th, 16th and 18th to begin planting your grass. Producers who have yet to plant a forb or legume must also begin planting. Please notify Fred and Calvin before during anything so that we can record in the technical notes.

It's that time of year once again to begin planting grass on new CRP's that are set-up for 2000 crop year. The key to getting a stand of grass is a nice and slow settle rain, seedbed preparation, good seed, patience and little bit of luck. There are around 2500 acres set-up to be planted to native grass mix this fiscal year.

Native grasses are adapted to the mixland soil sites and sandy sites. An example of native grass mixture, would be a little bit of Switchgrass, Indiangrass, Sideoats grama, Little Bluestem and Sand lovegrass. There are other native grass mixes a producer could consider before planting. A native grasses are define as original inhabitant of that area. Your local NRCS recommend seeding native grass mixes into a covercrop. The seeding dates for planting a native grasses is around the 1st of December thru June 1. Please consult with your local NRCS office on your native grass mixes before planting. Fred and Calvin can be telephoned at this number 826-3565 between 7:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

Extension Update

Did you know drinking tea on a regular basis may help reduce your risk of stroke?

The National Institute of Public Health in the Netherlands tracked the diets of 552 men, ages 50 to 69 for 15 years.

The researchers were trying to see if flavonoids found in black tea protected people by preventing LDL or "bad" cholesterol from oxidizing, which would help reduce the risk of heart disease and stroke.

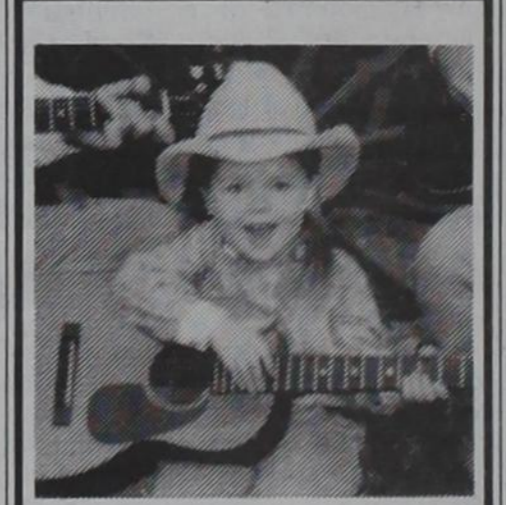
Their finding published in the Archives of Internal Medicine revealed men who drank more than 4 1/2 cups of tea a day had a reduced risk of stroke by 69% compared with men who drank less than 3 cups a day.
