According to the Health Insurance Institute, city children suffer from acute health conditions about half again as often as do youngsters raised on farms, and "rural" children March 13, 1961 who do not live on farms fall somewhere in between the two. The Institute uses a U.S. National Health Survey as the basis

Moreover, the Institute suggests the difference in city and farm children's health records could be because farm youngsters do not live so close together as the city children and are therefore less exposed to communicable diseases. This theory would be better founded had not the Institute pointed out that the U.S. National Health Survey included everything "from chicken pox and sore throats to appendicitis and bro-

Living in close proximity. as do city children, may account for their having more "chicken pox and sore throats" but surely our rural children can hold their own with appendicitis and out-strip the city youngsters in the broken leg department. The survey folks may know whereof they speak but we suspect growing up in the rural scene is equally, if you gave them in the sale. not more so. attributive to broken legs. Childhood in the country calls for climbing trees, jumping from hay rafters, may well be safer than exploring abonded warehouses, hitchand leaping across ditches. 


