

Mustangs Smash Crowell, 47-0

You wouldn't have thought the wind chill factor was hovering at close to minus 10 degrees last Friday night at Fair Park stadium in Childress because the Wheeler Mustangs were hot as they outclassed the Crowell

Wildcats 47-0 and moved into the quarter finals this week against Munday. Only the true football fan braved the bitter cold but they were treated to a lesson giving by the Mustangs to the

Wildcats and with less than six minutes elapsed in the game, the Mustangs were ahead 14-0 and Crowell could have loaded on the bus and headed south. Friday night's performance by the

Black Machine was perhaps their best game of the year as they played practically errorless ball and scored every time but once that they had the ball on offense in the first half as they cruised to a 38-0 margin. The Mustangs offense was awesome and they rolled up 451 yards total offense but the defense didn't take a back seat at all as what has become known as Black Death held the vaunted Wildcat offense to a paltry 126 yards with 52 of those yards coming on one run by Gerald Dorsey, **Continued Page 11**

Show Stock To Be Validated Dec. 7

Saturday, December 7, is a very important date for all Wheeler County 4-H & FFA members who plan to exhibit livestock in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show. All of the lambs, hogs, and steers that are to be shown in the county show must be validated on that day to be eligible according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

The animals must be brought to the county show barn at Wheeler between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. to be eartagged and classified. Steers that were eartagged in June do not have to be brought in unless they are to be shown in the English Breeds & Crosses division. Hereford, Angus, and Shorthorn steers not classified that day will be shown with the Other Breeds & Crosses.

FmHA Issues Loan Assistance Regulations

Temple, November 1, 1985. The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has issued new regulations which spell out, in detail, the various loan-servicing alternatives which may be available to farmers who are having economic difficulty, according to Texas FmHA state director J. Lynn Futch.

"All borrowers are expected to pay back their loans according to a planned repayment schedule," Futch said. "However, when that is impossible, we want borrowers to be aware of what kind of assistance may be available and under what conditions."

The servicing alternatives available to eligible borrowers include a deferral of a portion of payments for five years, reamortizing payments over a longer period of time, restructuring the debt, or subordinating FmHA's lien position on security to another lender.

The regulations spell out how FmHA determines eligibility for various loan servicing alternatives and under what circumstances FmHA would propose to take steps to resolve delinquency or other problems.

Borrower's appeal rights are detailed as well as FmHA's agreement to continue the release of sales proceeds until final loan servicing has been determined.

The new procedures were developed to give FmHA borrowers with delinquent and problem loans clean, consistent and predictable guidelines on how their accounts will be serviced by the agency, Futch said.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

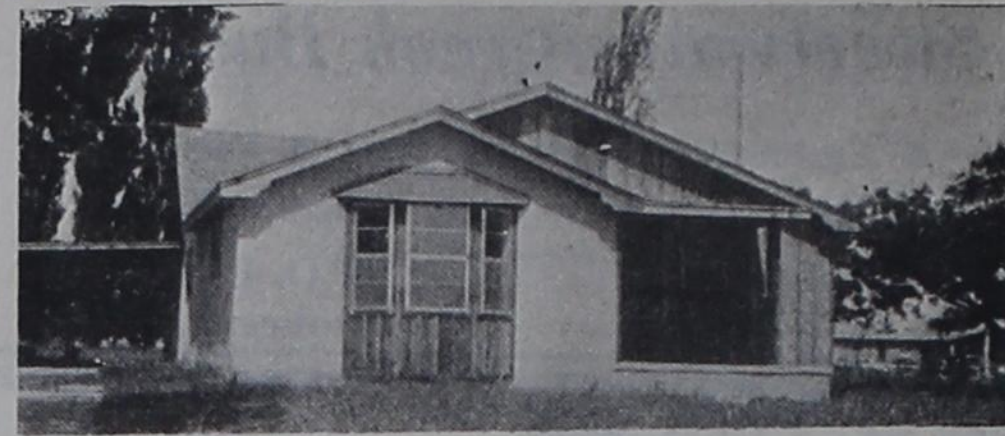

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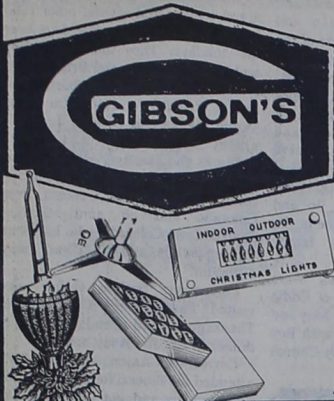
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Mustang Mania

TEAM Results

Results from the first testing of the Exit Level T.E.A.M.S. test have been received by the Wheeler School District. The Exit Level T.E.A.M.S. is the state mandated test that students must pass before they may graduate. The test will be given annually in the Fall and Spring beginning the junior year so that a student will have four attempts to pass. The test consists of two sections: Mathematics and Language Arts.

The junior students who took the test administered in October have been given their results. If a parent has not seen the results yet they may ask their student about them or contact Cecil Thomas at the high school.

Different level of the T.E.A.M.S. test will be given to grades 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9 in the Spring.

Panhandle Quilters

Salute Anniversary

An ancient art form which was an important part of pioneer life in West Texas will play a key role in the Panhandle's salute to the Texas Sesquicentennial in 1986.

Quilters in three Extension districts will match their craftsmanship and sewing skills as they design blocks for a commemorative quilt honoring the state's 150th anniversary. Contests will be held in 26 counties in the three districts, with the winning blocks being assembled into a quilt which will join the displays at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on the West Texas State University campus in Canyon.

Each hand-applied block will feature a motif indicative of the county's historical, agricultural, geographical, or other feature, and the county name.

County home economics agents are coordinating the contests in their counties. Certificates and other awards will be presented county winners. The blocks will be judged on appearance and workmanship.

When the winning blocks are assembled, a public quilting party will be held at the museum February 22-23 to fashion the commemorative quilt. Each quilting participant will be registered and this list will become part of the historical record kept with the quilt.

Those submitting the winning quilt blocks will be guests April 27, at a reception to open the "Lone Stars: A Texas Legacy Quilt Exhibit", featuring 30 of the state's finest quilts made prior to 1936.

For early settlers of the Panhandle, quilting was both an art form,

 the heralded Wildcat running back who was treated rather rudely by the hard hitting Mustangs.

In their win over Vega, the Mustangs big gun was fullback Dickie Salyer. Last week, Toby Collins ran roughshod over the Wildcats with scoring runs of 53, 21 and 72 yards in route to a 189 yard night. The three touchdowns by Collins raised the senior tailback's career total to 78.

Collins put the Mustangs on top for good with the 53 yard run at 8:55 of the first quarter when he powered over right tackle and left Crowell tacklers on the icy turf in an impressive run.

Wheeler had won the toss and elected to play defense and it paid off as the Wildcats could only gain four yards and had to punt into the strong wind that was quartering to the Mustangs back. The Mustangs took over on their 39 and on the third play, Collins broke loose.

Crowell could muster only 3 yards after the kickoff and were forced to punt from their 6 which gave the white clad Mustangs good field position at the Crowell 41 and like a broken record, three plays later were in the end zone. Salyer got his only TD of the game when he broke off left tackle and cut back against the grain to score from 30 yards out and the Wildcats were whipped.

The Mustangs didn't have to go the air to win but each quarterback, and the Mustangs used three, tossed one aerial and Augie Hennard got the only completion and it was good for a 21 yard touchdown to Bubba Smith in the third quarter as the Mustangs starters in the backfield stayed under wraps on the sideline the entire second half. You are not supposed to be able to clear your bench in playoff games but Coach Preston Smith did. In fact, # 3 quarterback, Lee McCasland was the game's third leading rusher with 61 yards on just five carries.

Collins got his second TD on the Mustangs third possession of the game when he capped a 55 yard drive in 6 plays. His 21 yard run put the Mustangs on top 20-0 when Richard Smith was wide on the extra point kick after booting true on his first two attempts. Smith, who incidentally played a tremendous game from his linebacker post, got into the touch-

down act when he intercepted a Crowell pass at the Wildcat 36 and had clear sailing to the end zone.

The ground eating runs of Collins and Salyer were made possible throughout the first half as the Mustangs forward wall, made up of Buford Meadows, Stephen Meadows, Ted Moore, Carl Knutson, David Jones, Richard Smith, Danny DeBose

and Ed Ellison, just completely dominated the trenches.

Smith's interception return for a touchdown came on the first play after the kickoff following Collins 72 yard jaunt. Collins just outran the pursuit

for the last 40 yards and maybe Coach Smith was right when he said, "Toby seems to get faster come game time."

With everyone seeing action, the Mustangs just put 9 points onto their total in the second half. Besides the TD pass from Hennard to Bubba Smith, the Mustangs downed Wildcat signal caller Mark Graves in the end zone for a safety in the fourth quarter.

The Mustangs other scoring effort in the game came on a reverse to split back Dale Hazel and Hazel, who is perhaps the fastest Mustang, broke loose for a 47 yard run to paydirt.

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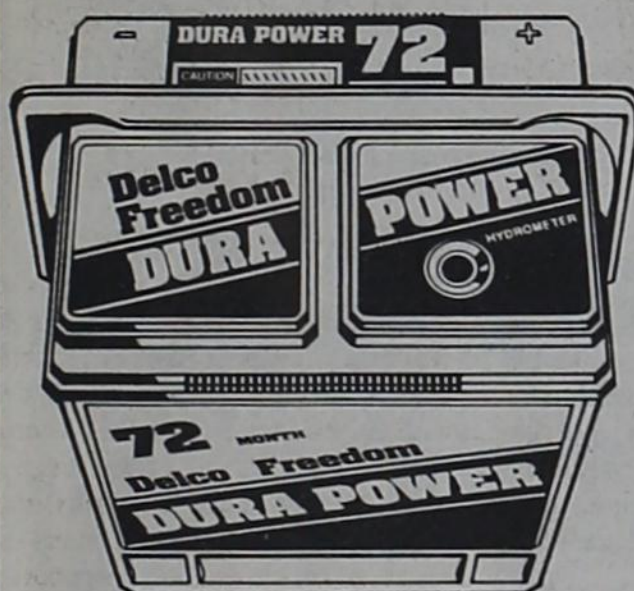
