Local FFA & 4-H Members to Exhibit Top Animals at 2000 Houston Stock Show

45 FFA and 7 4-H members from Wheeler County will be joining other FFA and 4-H members from all over Texas for intense competition in the show ring at the 2000 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Feb. 18-March 5, at the Astrodome in Houston.

The junior show, which showcases the animal projects of these FFA and 4-H exhibitors, is held during the second week of livestock competition, beginning Feb. 24. Professional breeders and ranchers will compete for top prize money and global recognition in the livestock industry during the first week of the Show, which kicks off Feb. 18.

Entries from both the open and

junior shows, along with the horse show, combine to make the Houston Livestock Show the largest event of its kind in the world.

Allison FFA will be represented by Allison Bray, Bronwyn N. Dukes, Kelly Ray Lane, Christopher Newsom and Levi Swafford, showing Junior Market Barrows.

Showing Junior Market Barrows and representing Wheeler FFA will be Patrick Burrell, Casey Childress, Keri Marion, Brad Masters, Kyle Masters, Hadley Mitchell, Morgan Nall, Garrett Rhine, Rafael Robles and Chris Umsted. Drew Emmert will be showing Junior Breeding Beef. Morgan Nall will also be showing a Junior

Market Steer and a Junior Breeding Beef. Thirteen animals will be shown by the Wheeler FFA students.

The Ft. Elliott FFA will be represented with the showing of three Junior Market Barrows. Showing will be Marlana Helton, Amber Maddox and Jennifer Maddox.

Shamrock FFA will have a total of 29 animals in the exposition. Showing Junior Market Barrows will be Tim Allen, Dustin Biggers, Gary Cogburn, Sheldon Cornett, Tyler Jernigan, Lindsey Killingsworth, Kaitlyn Kuehler, Aaron Kuehler, Seth Kuehler, Justin Lee, Seith Lee, Jackson Lisle, Jay Morlan, Brad Poage, Cameron Reed, Evan Reed, Jacob Seymour, Derek Stone, Sarah Sweatt, Cade Vinyard, Cole Vinyard, James Wischkaemper, Meagan Wright and Will Zaiontz—24 animals. Showing Junior Market Steers will be Michael Pate, Cameron Reed, Evan Reed and Jonathan Robertson. Michael Pate will also be showing a Junior Breeding Beef.

Representing Wheeler County 4-Hers will be Garrett Hampton, Savannah Hampton, Kendra Beth Lane and Chris Simmons, each showing Junior Market Barrows; Haley Hipkins, showing a Junior Market Lamb, and Brad and Kyle Masters, showing Junior Breeding Beef.

More than 14,000 entries, representing 1,014 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, will compete in this year's junior show. A wide variety of animals will be shown in both the junior and open divisions of the livestock competition, including market steers, market barrows, market lambs, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding gilts, breeding sheep, goats, llamas, ostriches, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories (steer, lamb, barrow and poultry) represent animals raised by exhibitors for food sources. The finest animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. In 1999, the Houston Livestock Show's junior market auction sales totaled \$5,399,375, including a record \$550,000 for the Grand Champion Market Steer.

"We're always looking to improve our Show," said John Sykes, assistant general manager, Agricultural Exhibits and Competition Department. "We're proud of being the world's largest livestock show, but we also want to be the best. Due to the overwhelming interest, we have ex-

Brad Masters To Participate In Calf Scramble At Houston Stock Show

Brad Masters will compete in one of the most exciting events of the 2000 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo—the calf scramble. A 14-year-old 4-H member from Wheeler, Brad will scramble Saturday, Feb. 19, 2000, during the evening rodeo performance.

The son of Belinda and James Masters, Brad will scramble during a star-studded rodeo performance that includes seven PRCA and WPPA rodeo events and entertainment by Jo Dee Messina.

During the calf scramble, 28 4-H or FFA members will attempt to catch and halter one of 14 calves that are released into the 1.86-acre Astrodome arena. With the drop of a hat, the calves will dart into the arena and

the challenge will begin. With youngsters and calves scattered about and moving every direction across the Astrodome floor, the calf scramble is often one of the most chaotic and heartwarming events of the Show.

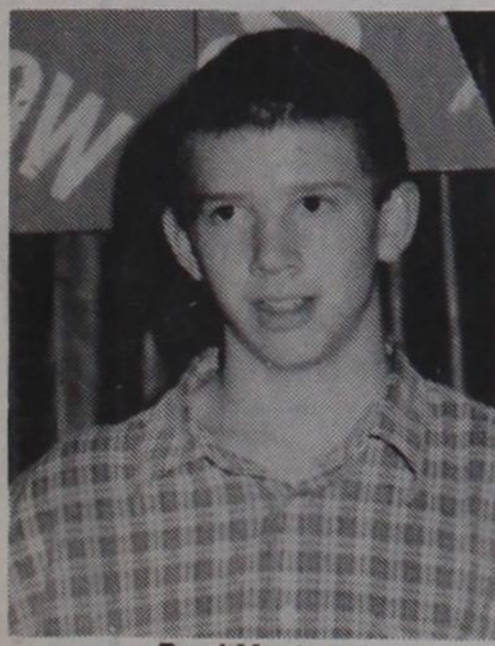
For those that successfully catch a calf, the hard work is just beginning. Each winning individual is awarded a \$1,000 certificate toward the purchase of a registered beef heifer.

Additional "hard luck" certificates are presented to individuals who don't catch a calf but are recognized for their efforts.

The purchased heifer then becomes a year-long project for the scrambler - feeding, grooming and providing all the care necessary to raise and show a beef animal. Supervised by an agricultural science teacher or county extension agent, winners must keep accurate and detailed records of the animal's progress, submitting records to both the Show and the donor to chronicle the heifer's development.

More than 360 calf scramble certificates are awarded each year. Since the calf scramble program began in 1942, a total of \$5,777,000 has been awarded to 14,980 young people.

The calf scramble program is just one of the Show's educational opportunities for the youth of Texas. Since awarding its first scholarship in 1957, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has committed more than \$68 million to scholarships, endowments, research programs and educational programs.

An immunization clinic sponsored by the Texas Dept. of Health will be held THURSDAY, Feb. 17, 2000, from 10:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. in the Wheeler I.S.D. Auditorium. The following immunizations will be available: DTP, Oral Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hib, Td and Hepatitis.

They will be charging a fee to pay for the cost of the vaccines. Please bring Medicaid card if applicable. No one will be refused treatment regardless of income.

Each child MUST be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Please bring immunization records if possible. This clinic is open to all individuals.

The Texas Dept. of Health will offer the hepatitis vaccine to all children from birth to age 19.

Buckle Up Those Children

February 13-19th has been designated as "Child Passenger Safety Week." Therefore, let us as good parents, grandparents, caregivers become aware of the importance of protecting our clients, childrens and grandchildren by properly restraining them while riding in a motor vehicle.

It has been estimated that in 1998 a total of 41,471 traffic or vehicle related fatalities occurred in the United States, one every 13 minutes. Of those fatalities the 0-14 age group accounted for 2,549 of those related fatalities, 1,772 fatalities of children under age 15 were vehicle occupants. You may be asking yourself why are the stats so high? Sadly, it is due to children either not being restrained in car seats or improperly being restrained.

For your information, listed below are the guidelines for properly restraining your children, while riding in a motor vehicle.

Infants until at least one year of age and at least 22 lbs. should be in a rear-facing child safety seat. Never use a household carrier.

Toddlers over one year old and between 22 and 40 lbs. can be in a forward facing child safety seat.

Children between 40 and about

60/80 lbs. (usually 4 to 8 years old) should be placed in Booster seats.

Usually kids over 80 lbs. can fit in lap/shoulder belts.

Our children are our future and it is our moral duty regardless of our position in life to do what we can to protect them Show your love - buckle up your children.

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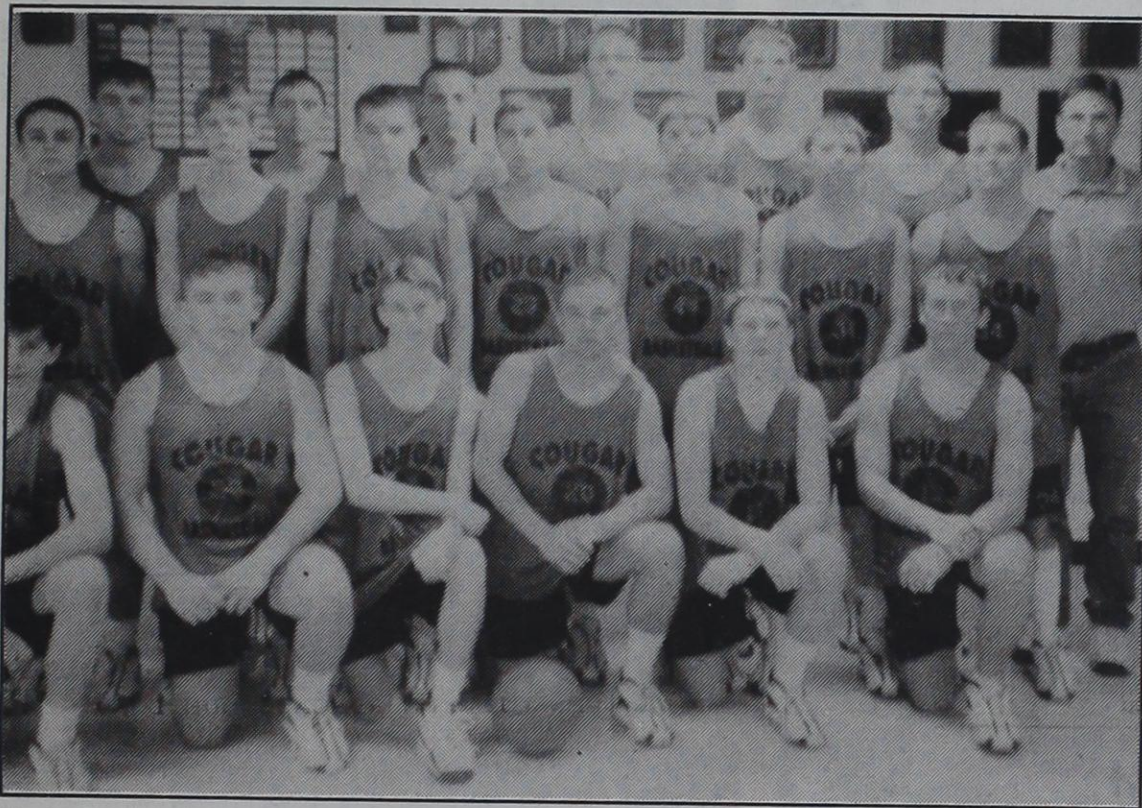

panded the steer show to three days, March 1-3, and have increased market barrow premiums, which will award an additional \$127,000 to exhibitors."

In addition to world-class livestock competition, the Show plays host to one of the premier horse shows in the country. The Houston Cutting Horse Contest kicks off 20 consecutive days of horse show competition beginning Tuesday, Feb. 15. The National Cutting Horse Association championship finals follow Feb. 17-20, as well as competition in seven different breeds of horses: Appaloosa, Arabian, Half Arabian, Miniature, Paint, Palomino and Quarter Horse, plus donkeys and mules.

Sleep Disorders Impact Life for Parents, Kids

Sleep disorders impact quality of life for parents and kids.

A child's sleep disorder can impact the quality of life not only for the child, but the parents as well.

"A sleep disorder generally can be described as a problem maintaining or getting adequate sleep," explained Dr. Daniel Glaze, medical director of the Sleep Laboratory and the Children's Sleep Disorder Clinic at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

"At night, symptoms might include loud snoring, frequent arousal, the occurrence of unusual behaviors such as sleep walking and waking up screaming," he added. "A rested child not only gets the right amount of sleep but the right quality of sleep."

Glaze said sleep disorders that young children may experience include sleep apnea (cessation of breathing) and behaviors in which a child associates certain responses, such as rocking, with going to sleep.

"Although sleep walking and night terrors occur more frequently in young children, they can be problems at all ages," he noted. "For teens, an inadequate amount of sleep or sleep-scheduling problems are most prevalent."

Glaze pointed out that quality sleep has many benefits.

"It has been suggested that sleep restores brain function, supports learning and memory, and may allow for the biochemical agents accumulated during wakefulness to be destroyed," he said.

At all ages, sleep disorders can impact daily function and health, Glaze stressed.

"In adults, there is a growing body of information that sleep disorders contribute to the development of medical problems such as hypertension, stroke, heart attacks, accidents and even death," said Glaze, an attending physician at Texas Children's and associate professor in pediatrics and neurology at Baylor College of Medicine.

"In children, the daytime consequences of sleep disorders are less well defined but may contribute to poor school performance and behavioral problems. Childhood sleep disorders result not only in daytime sleepiness but in fatigue, irritability, school failure, mood changes, decreased performance and memory function, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and growth failure."

A childhood sleep disorder can be evaluated through diagnostic tests which may include a sleep study, consultations and a plan for management. For some sleep disorders, medication or surgery may be recommended.

In general, Glaze advises the following steps for good sleep:

Establish a regular bedtime and awakening time.

Develop a pre-bedtime routine.

Use the bed for sleep, not homework or watching television.

The bedroom should be cool, quiet and dark and the mattress should be comfortable and supportive.

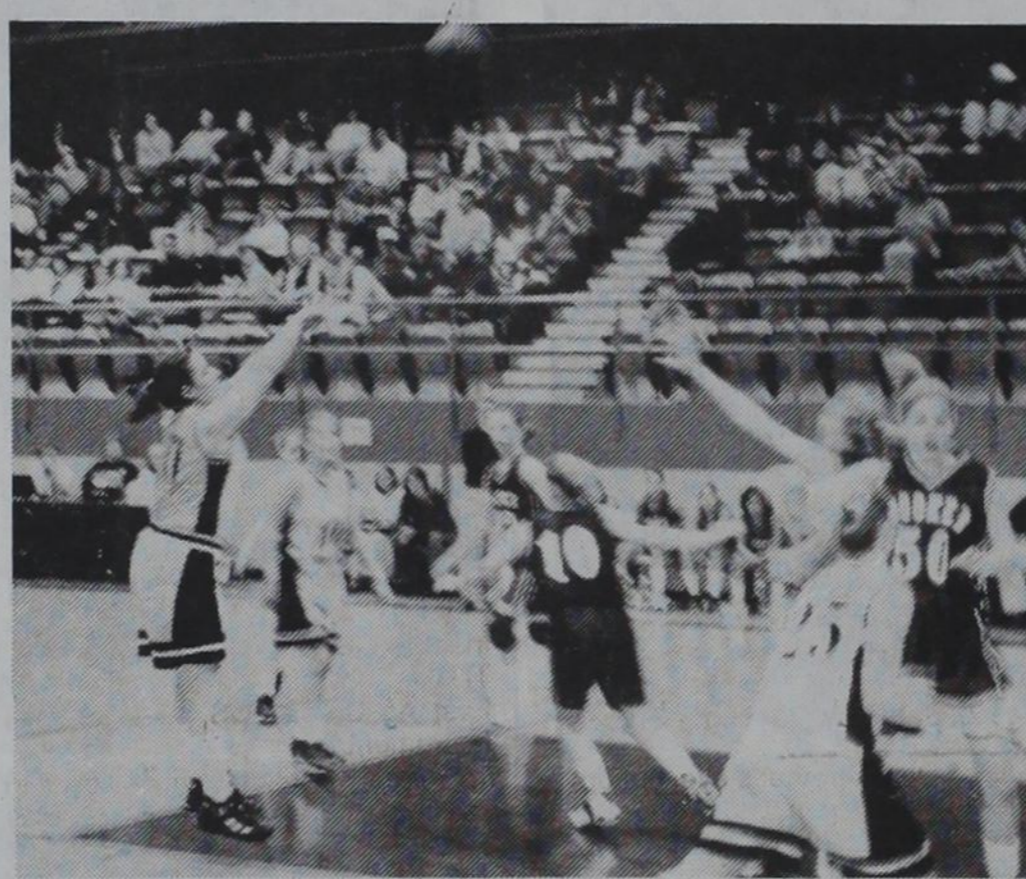
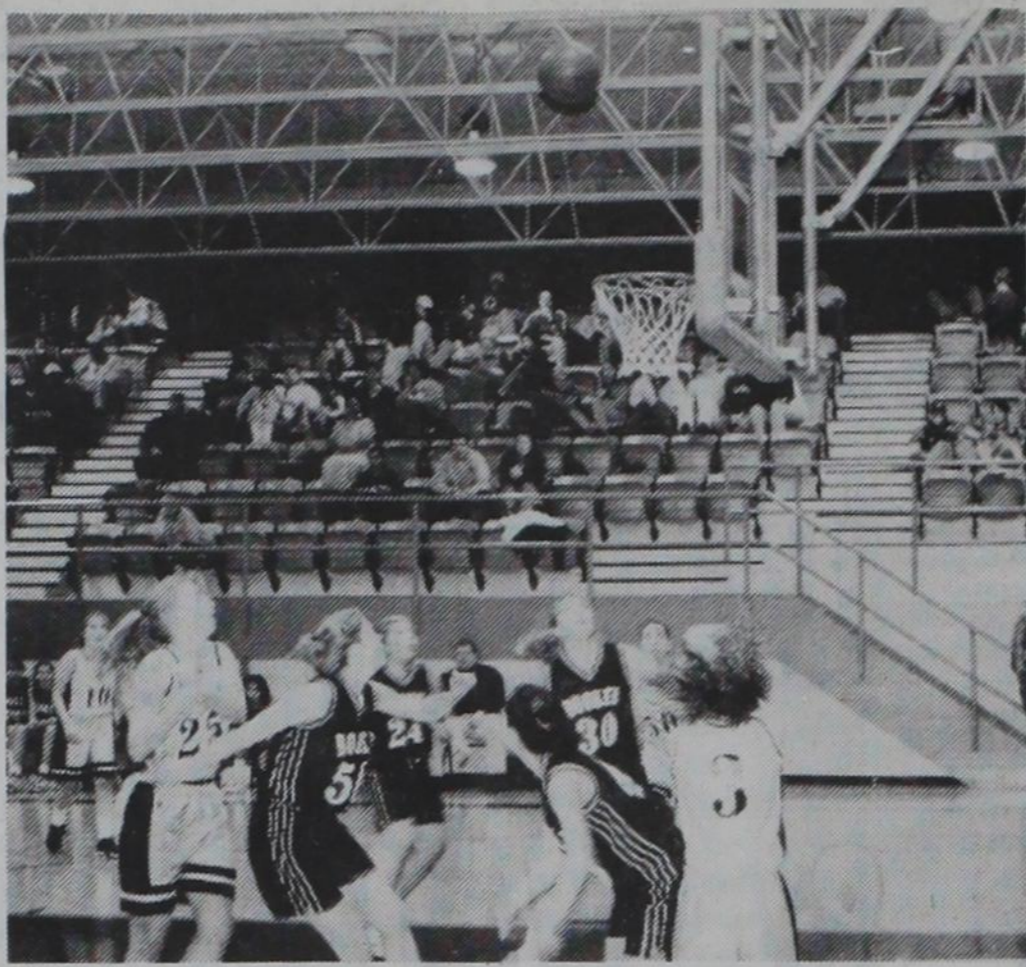
Schedule "thinking" time and unwind in the early evening.

Avoid the bedroom clock.

Take a hot bath two to four hours before going to bed.

Eat a light snack before going to bed.

Stay away from bright light before bedtime. Bright light exposure in the early morning promotes an earlier sleep time.

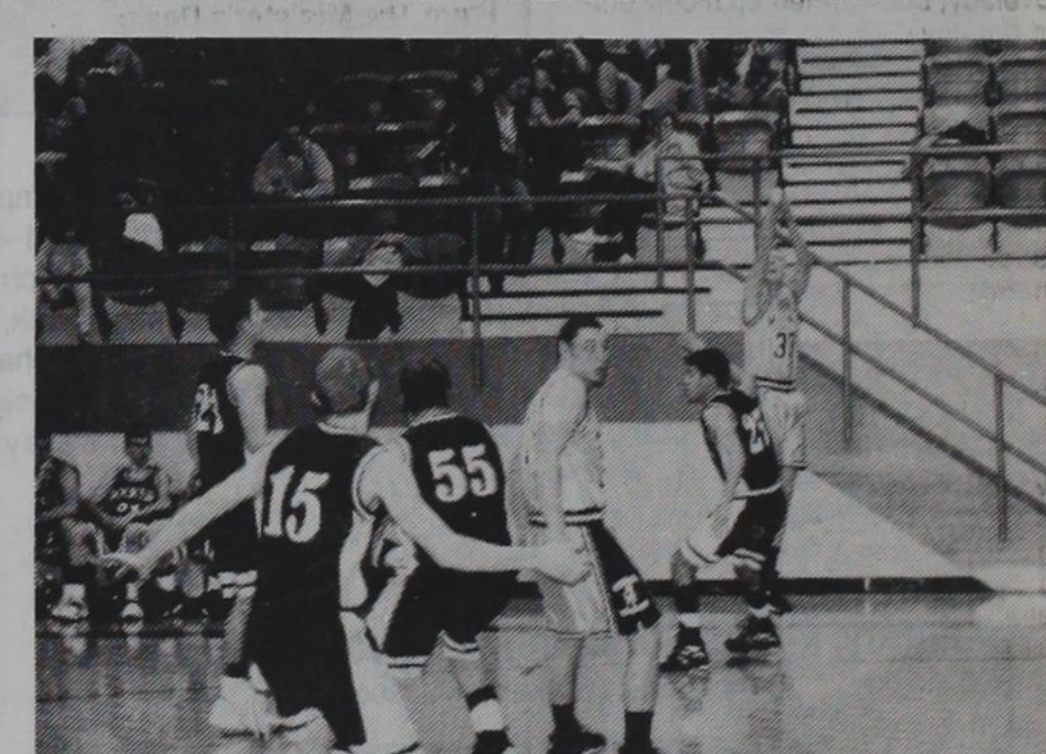
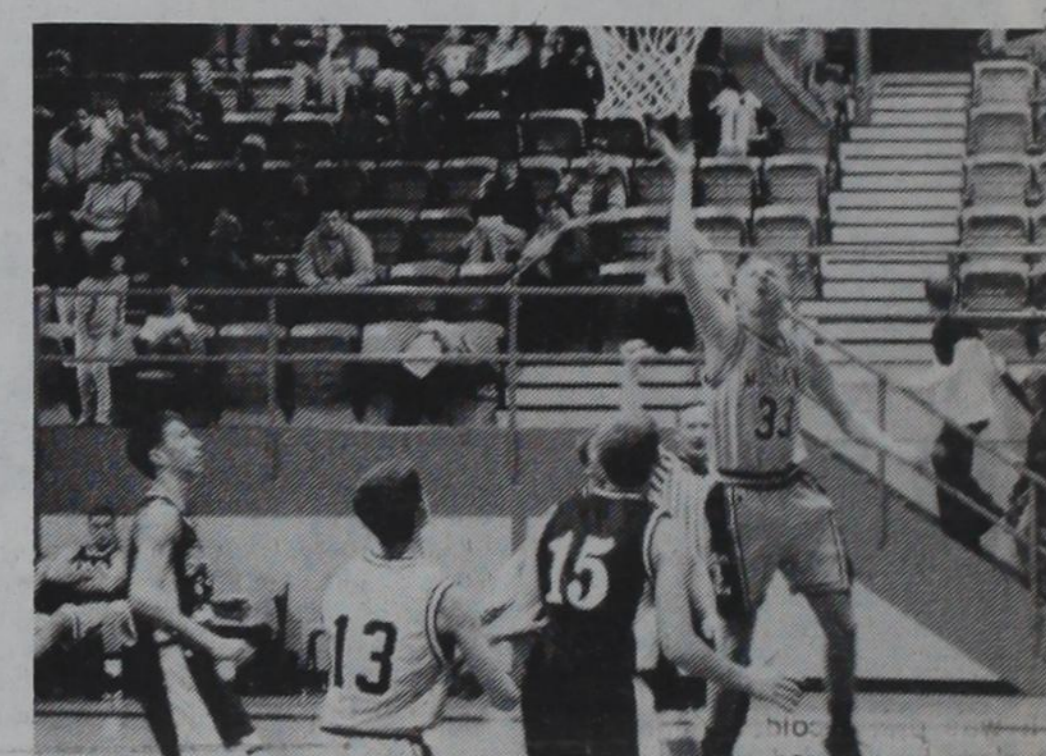

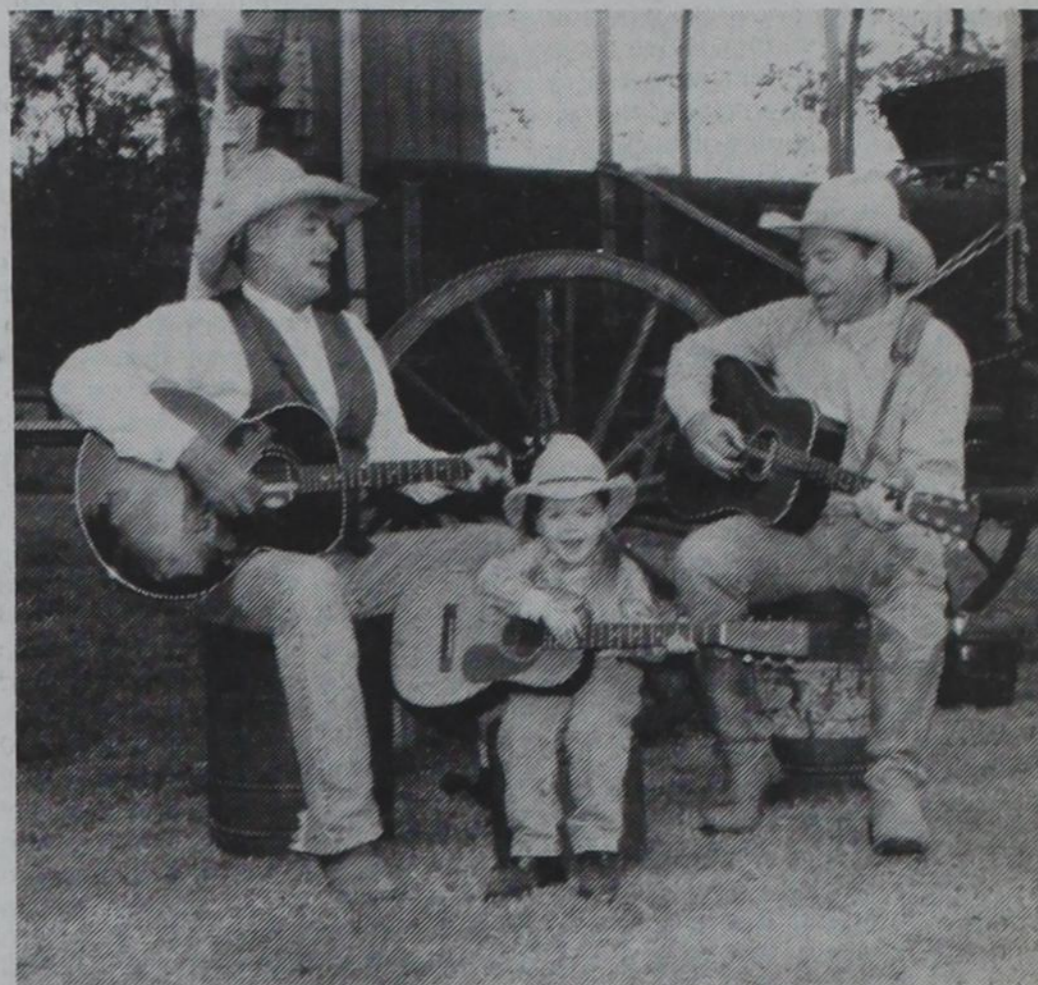

Stephanie Markham, Cade and Toria, Elk City, were out Sunday to visit Ray and Doris Smith.

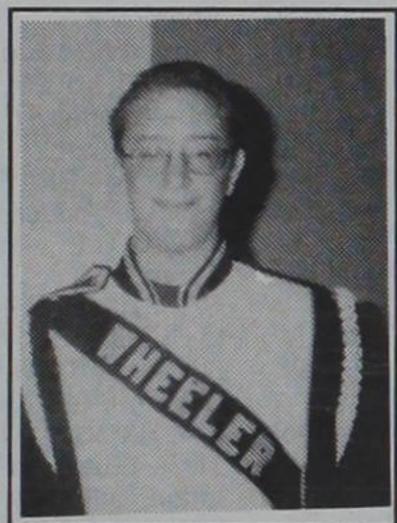
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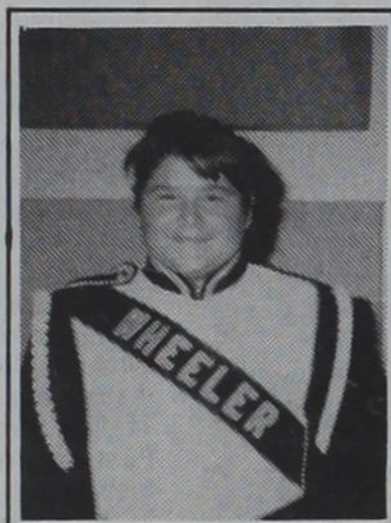
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Old Mobeetie Tex. Assoc. Conducts Business
