RANGELAND AND WILDLIFE MIX

The playground for the "deer and the antelope" is in poor condition on more than half of the Nation's Federal and privately owned rangeland and this is cause for great concern, said Wilson Scaling, Chief of USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Wildlife share with livestock the almost one billion acres of rangeland that is an important asset to agriculture, to the economy, and to the quality of our environment.

Although some of the poor condition is caused by shallow soil and low rainfall, much of the rangeland productivity can be improved by good management, Wilson emphasized.







Legislature Passed **New Child Support Laws**

The 69th Legislature passed Senate Bill 1175, the first state law in the nation to require automatic wage assignment for the payment of courtordered child support, Deborah Dale, Director of the Child Support Project of the National Conference of State Legislatures calls the new Texas law "exemplary."

Under SB 1175, all court-ordered child support awarded after September 1, 1985 will be paid by MANDA-TORY wage assignment (unless both parties agree to another method or other good cause is shown). Even if noncustodial parents live in other states, their employers must deduct the support payments from wages and forward them to Texas. The mandatory wage assignments apply to the employers at the time of the court order and to all future employers as well. (Non-custodial parents who are self-employed must make arrangements for automatic monthly pay-

ments out of their disposable income.) SB 1175 also provides that childsupport court orders that were effected prior to September 1, 1985, and were awarded under the terms of the IV-D (AFDC) program, will be changtoo severly disabled for regular ed to wage assignment if the payments are in arrearage for any amount

and for any length of time. In addition, SB 1175 provides that non-AFDC court-orders awarded prior to September 1, 1985, will be automatically changed to wage assignment

once they are 30-days in arrears. These, and other changes that provide for Interstate Income Withholding, will go a long way toward improving the rate of collection in Texas. Since the Legislature transferred the Child Support Program to the Attorney General's Office in the first year of Jim Mattox's term, the annual rate of collections has risen from \$18 million in FY 83 to almost


