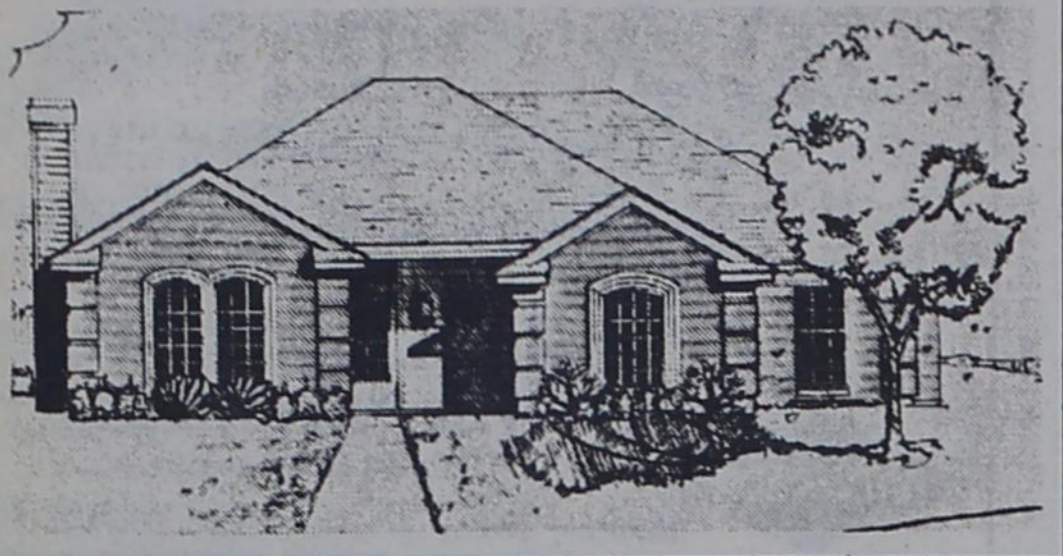

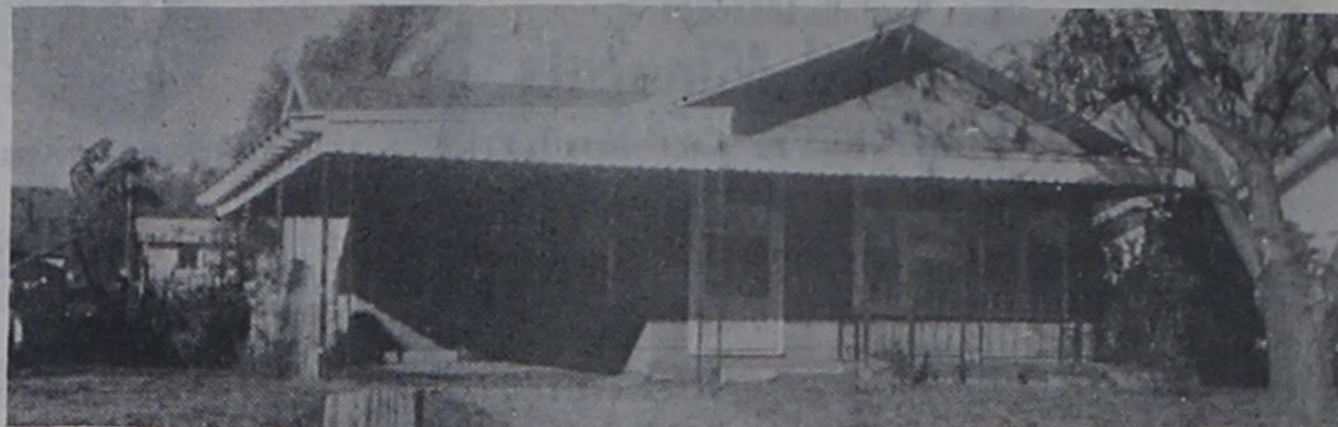

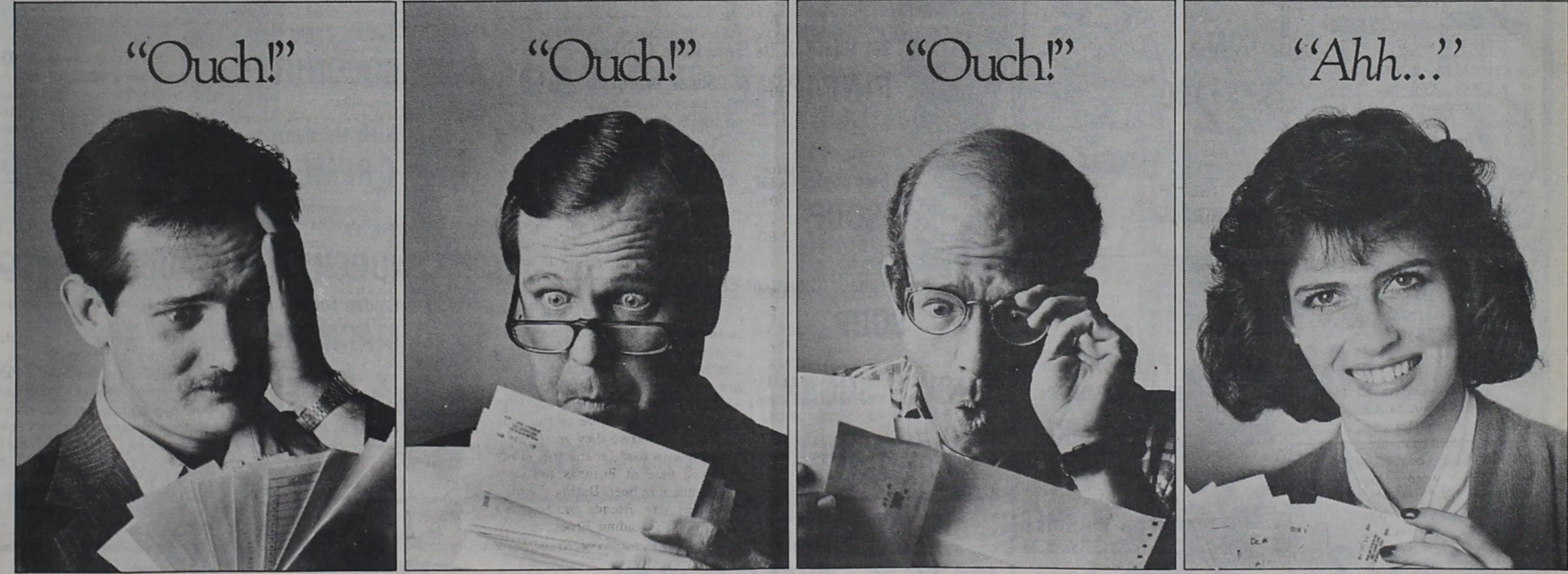

Poor Condition

RANGELAND AND WILDLIFE MIX
The playground for the "deer and the antelope" is in poor condition on more than half of the Nation's Federal and privately owned rangeland and this is cause for great concern, said Wilson Scaling, Chief of USDA's Soil Conservation Service.
Wildlife share with livestock the almost one billion acres of rangeland that is an important asset to agriculture, to the economy, and to the quality of our environment.
Although some of the poor condition is caused by shallow soil and low rainfall, much of the rangeland productivity can be improved by good management, Wilson emphasized.
Often in the same general area, poorly managed rangeland provides little forage for livestock and poor feed and cover for wildlife, while well managed rangeland provides adequate forage for livestock and supports healthy populations of wildlife.
Wildlife can mean additional income from hunting fees for ranchers. The kinds and amount of plants determine the kinds and number of animals, livestock and wildlife, the area of rangeland can support.
Proper rangeland management practices will improve forage growth and protect the soil and water resources. These practices include deferred grazing, brush management, range seeding, and proper grazing, said District Conservationist Lavon Williams.
Deferred grazing improves cover for ground-nesting birds and improves water quality and quantity. Patterned brush management provides essential cover for wildlife and increases the variety of plants that will grow. Range seeding can include plant important to wildlife. Well-managed, planned grazing systems can produce the most benefits for livestock and wildlife on rangelands.
The Soil Conservation Service can help ranchers design and apply these and other practices. For assistance, call the local office of USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Tessie Burba Receives Certificate From Texas Rehabilitation Com.

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission today awarded Tessie Burba a certificate of appreciation for her outstanding contributions to the disabled people of Gray, Wheeler, and Collingsworth Counties.

Texas Rehabilitation Commission VR Counselor, Harvey Bailey, made the presentation to Mrs. Burba, who is Center Coordinator in Wellington for the Panhandle Community Services (formerly the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.)

The presentation, made at the Wheeler Co. Courthouse, through Wheeler Co. Judge Wendell Morgan, in observance of the Thanksgiving season. Mr. Bailey states "Tessie should have been given this award some years ago due to her long time work for the cause of disabled people, and her support and encouragement of the TRC program."

Tessie Burba started her work as Coordinator of the Collingsworth County Community Action Center on March 15, 1972. During the past thirteen years she has worked in eleven of the eastern Texas Panhandle Counties. The Community Action Center, with the assistance of TSTI, established Adult Vocational Training courses in Bookkeeping, typing, auto mechanics, etc., in counties in this area.

The Community Action Center started Adult Basic Education classes with volunteer teachers. This led to a GED testing service. From this pilot program, money became available and Region XVI Service Center became responsible for these programs. Many people through the years have been able to receive their GED and go on for further training.

Training of youth and adults has long been a priority for all Community

Action Programs. Texas Rehabilitation Commission has assisted many of our youth and adults get training both in Vocational programs and Academic college degrees. Many people in this area have been referred and served by the Texas Rehabilitation Commission with medical problems. Mr. Harvey Bailey, the Vocational Counselor, has been most supportive and helpful in supplying help for the needs of the people in this area.

Through the Collingsworth County Community Action Center, Tessie Burba directs services in Collingsworth and Wheeler counties. Some of the programs are: Home Delivered Meals Program, Rental Assistance Programs, Weatherization, utilities assistance, information and referral, used clothing room, Panhandle Transit, Immunization Clinic, Referrals for Family Care and Primary Care for the elderly and disabled, referrals to Jobs Partnership Training Act, assistance in filling out food stamp applications and other forms. Until just recently, she was also director of a Title XX Day Care Program.

Tessie Burba and her husband, Dee Burba, have lived in Wellington for the past 27 years, moving from Pampa. They have five children, three of whom received educational assistance from the Texas Rehabilitation Commission. Their children are: Carol Gibbons, of Hanover, MD., Rebekah Blevins of Lela, Texas, Betty Norwood of Amarillo, Robert Burba of Irving, Texas, and Richard Burba of Fort Worth, Texas.

Tessie is also a member of the Collingsworth Volunteer Ambulance Service and is a Registered Emergency Medical Technician.

The billing was in poor shape when I took over this task. Collections were very poor at that time.

From Jan. 1, 1982 until Jan. 1, 1984 I did this as a volunteer. Since that time I received a salary of \$300.00 per month for billing. I received a \$100.00 raise in October, 1985.

Since resuming this task the collections have been as follows:

1982 collections 36,441.17
1983 collections 31,652.51
1984 collections 28,498.76
1985 collections (until Nov.) 24,501.54
Total \$121,093.98

The collection rate is running approximately 68% to 73% which is way above average for Texas Ambulance Services.

The job of billing and ambulance supervisor has been combined now, and I have been appointed for Wheeler Ambulance Service. I will be

working with the Shamrock Supervisor, Curtis Davis.

We are approaching a record year, the two services together will come close to 600 calls for 1985.
