Mobeetie Methodist Church Celebrates 100th Anniversary

The date for the beginning of the Mobeetie Methodist Church isn't certain because at first there were missions and circuit riders who took care of the peoples needs. The date is somewhere around 1884 and is the oldest church in the Texas Panhandle. Before the troops moved out of Fort Elliott a Union Church was organized for the Methodist and Baptist. The people in the communities lived in small communities close together because of the danger of indians. They always were found close to the Fort.

The first settlement called a town was Hidetown two and a half miles southeast of the present town of Mobeetie.

On May 1, 1898 a cyclone destroyed parts of Mobeetie, it forced the Methodist and Baptist to meet in the same building and it was called a Union Church. In 1911 the Methodist bought the Union Church from the Baptist. This was another new beginning for the Mobeetie Methodist and Mrs. George Dunn and Mrs. J. J. Long were leaders in taking up collection, selling homemade quilts, having pie suppers to help get money for the new church.

Mobeetie was still on circuit riders with the riders going to Totty, Union, Nubbin Ridge, Mount Zion and Mobeetie.

When the Santa Fe Railroad was built a mile north of Old Mobeetie the town began to move to the railroad.

The churches soon followed and in the year 1930 Rev. Sam Thomas raised the old building and a new church basement was built. For 17 years the congregation worshipped in this basement. The church parsonage was built in 1931.

During the pastorate of Rev. Hamen Sally the present church was completed and stands as a tribute to a small group of faithful Methodists who knew that a place to worship was the most important thing in a community. The first sermon preached in the new church was on Mothers Day 1947.

The Mobeetie Methodist Church started off their 100 yr. anniversary with a revival from Nov. 7, until the 10th with Rev. Jerry Klaverwelden from Miami preaching. Everyone who came once came back and all agreed it was a reviving experience. The attendance was very good with the church being full for Sunday morning services. One outstanding feature in the church is song leader Jim Batton

who sang beautiful songs every night accompanied by Cindy Venable at the piano. Jim never says no to a chance to help the church and thanks Jim for carrying me up those steps. Special song Sunday was sang by David Thweatt and his wife Sharon from Miami. Thanks to the many churches who helped make this day a success.

After all enjoyed the fellowship dinner and visiting together the program was presented.

Former pastors Mary French, Ray Copeland, Rev. L.V. Grace and Elton Wyatt were honored and presented a talk on "What the Methodist Church means to me"

District Superintendent E.B. Melton gave a short talk followed by

Margaret Trout who presented the History of the Mobeetie Methodist Church.

The people of the Methodist Church are very proud of their new pastor Rev. Steve and wife Cindy Venable. With the promise and dedication these two young people have shown the church should go thru the 20th century with hope and the promise of God for Victory in their pilgrimage.

Planned Grazing System Improve Efficiency
 Livestock producers in Texas are using planned grazing systems on about 15 million acres. The systems vary from the simple 2-pasture systems to the complex cell or savory grazing system.
 The efficiency of forage production is dependent on the health of the rangeland plants. Plants capture sunlight in the leaves and use the energy to manufacture their own food. This process is known as photosynthesis. The food is stored in the roots, stems, and leaves. When the leaves are continually grazed short, the stored food reserves are depleted. The results are that some of the plants die and forage production is reduced.
 Livestock are highly selective in the plant species they graze. The better and more palatable species are preferred over the less palatable species. After a plant is grazed, livestock continues to graze the tender, green regrowth. This is one of the primary reasons that the better plants are not dominant on much of the rangeland. Forage production on much of the rangeland has been reduced by up to 75%. The loss of these better plants can be stopped and the deterioration process reversed by improving the grazing efficiency.
 To maximize the grazing efficiency, the better plants must be made as healthy as possible. To accomplish this, the better plants need a chance to grow without the forage produced. A planned grazing system, designed to meet the needs of the plants, the livestock, and the rancher is the best way to maximize grazing efficiency. Livestock can not be forced to eat any particular plant, but the length of time and season of use can be determined by applying a grazing system especially designed for the ranch. Each ranch is different, and the system used on one ranch may not be ideal for the next ranch.
 Your local Soil Conservation Service personnel can assist you in designing a planned grazing system. If you are interested in maximizing grazing efficiency and improving your rangeland, contact the Soil Conservation Service today.

FOODS WITH LESS

What used to be called "special foods for special needs", less salt, less sugar, fewer calories, and reduced fat foods, are now becoming mainstream products.

These foods are growing in popularity because they meet some important needs. For example, according to the FDA Consumer Magazine, four out of ten adults are trying to cut down on salt or sodium. It's also been estimated by the National Institutes of Health that 34 million Americans weigh more than 20% over their ideal weight.

However, shopping for foods-with-less may require most of us to develop some new skills, especially when it comes to label-reading. For unless you know what terms like "low-calorie", or "light" mean, you could wind up with more than you think.

The Food and Drug Administration regulates food labeling. A food may be labeled as low-calorie or reduced-calorie only if a serving of that food supplies no more than 40 calories and does not provide more than 0.4 calories per gram.

Foods labeled as "reduced calorie" must contain one-third fewer calories per serving than their regular counterparts. In addition, the food must have a statement on its label that describes the comparison upon which the dietary claim was made.

The word "light" or "lite" has a much fuzzier meaning and no strict guidelines on its use. Some "light" food products, for example, have fewer calories only because they are packaged in smaller portions than the regular product.

A variety of groups are petitioning the FDA to set standards and definitions for these terms. In the meantime, reading product labels can help you know what you're getting in foods with less.
