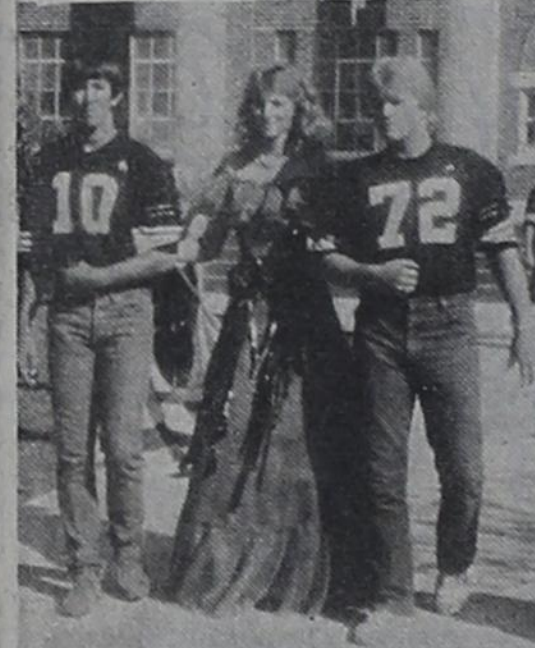

Wheeler Slaughters Lefors, 67-0

Running only 37 plays from scrimmage, the Wheeler Mustangs ran over the Lefors Pirates by a whopping 67-0 margin last Friday night and upped their record for the season to 8-0.

The Mustangs sixth straight district victory was a total mismatch from the opening kickoff. With two Pirate players being injured and already terribly outmanned, the Pirate coaching staff threw in the towel after 3 quarters or no telling how high the score would have gone.

If people think that the Mustangs are just running up big margins for reasons of higher rankings, they haven't seen many of the Mustang games. Coach Smith has been clearing his bench from the season's third game. The Mustangs principal running backs, Toby Collins and Dickie Salyer, toted the ball a meager 8 times in the Lefors game.

Wheeler amassed their touchdown total by running, passing and the defense got in on the act when Cody Wiggins returned one of the

Mustangs five interceptions for the night to the end zone.

The Mustangs went to the airways for their first two touchdowns as they mounted a 34-0 scoring onslaught on the visiting Pirates in the first quarter. Quarterback Randall Hugg passed to Bubba Smith for a 28 yard scoring toss on the Mustangs opening drive and then moments later tossed his second six pointer, this one to Randy Horton.

Horton was on the receiving end of another touchdown pass and it was the Mustangs final score of the night and it netted 21 yards with reserve quarterback, Augie Hennard, on the launching end.

Wheeler racked up an incredible 375 yards rushing on only 27 carries which averages out to nearly 14 yards every time the Mustangs ran the football. Toby Collins, Dickie Salyer, Dale Hazel and Cody Wiggins all had touchdowns rushing with Hazel and Wiggins scoring twice each on the ground.

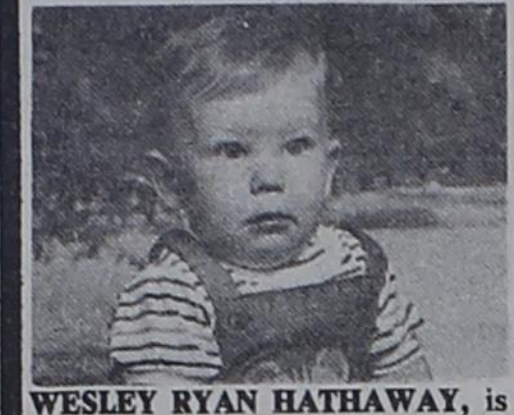

Thirty-First District Probation Dept. Report

The following report was submitted by Jeane Roper, Chief Adult Probation Officer for the 31st District Probation Department, serving Wheeler, Hemphill, Lipscomb, and Roberts Counties: Activity for September, 1985 Wheeler County Court; 8 placed on probation, 5 discharged from probation, 2 revoked and sentenced to jail, for a total of 99 on misdemeanor probation. In District Court there was no activity for the month of September, leaving a balance of 35 felony probationers. Hemphill County Court: 4 placed on probation, and 2 discharged from probation, leaving a total of 57 on misdemeanor probation. In District Court: 1 was placed on felony probation, 1 was transferred in for courtesy supervision, and 1 was discharged from probation leaving a total of 24 on felony probation. Lipscomb County Court, 3 were placed on misdemeanor probation and 1 was transferred in for courtesy supervision. District Court, 1 was placed on shock probation and 1 was discharged, leaving a balance of 25 felony probation.

Roberts County, no activity in misdemeanor or felony for the month of September. A total of 4 are on misdemeanor probation and 11 on felony probation. There are a total of 17 on Intensive supervision out of district court, in the four county area. Total number on probation on September 30, 1985 is 319. \$4,221.60 was collected in the four area for fines, court costs, restitution, and attorney fees. An additional \$2,044.00 was collected in probation fees.

Agricultural Extension Ser. Plan Stocker Cattle Management Clinic

DON KING
 The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with several veterinary drug companies, has planned a stocker cattle management clinic, "Making Money with Stocker Cattle", to be held in four locations during November. The clinic will present information that will help those who handle stocker cattle control disease and maximize profit from their operations.

The dates and locations of the clinics are Monday, November 4, Exposition Center in Perryton; Wednesday, November 6, Top 'O Texas Show Barn in Pampa; Friday, November 8, Expo Building in Dimmit and Friday, November 15, Community Building in Dumas. All of the clinics will begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 3:00 p.m. A complimentary lunch will be provided each day.

The combination of lectures and live animal demonstrations will present practical information that should be of use to all stocker operators. Dr. John McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will speak on "Cost Effective Management of Stocker Cattle." He will discuss the results of field trials using implants, wormers, feed additives, bloat control measures, lice control, supplemental feeding and other management techniques that affect the health and performance of stocker cattle.

In his presentation, "Effective Treatment of Shipping Fever", Dr. Larry Hollis of Syntex Animal Health will review antibiotic sensitivity tests and will explain how to develop an effective disease prevention and treatment program for stocker cattle.

Dr. Roger Wyatt of Immuno-Modulator Labs will discuss the use of Agriferon-C in a stocker receiving program.

After lunch there will be live animal demonstrations to demonstrate the proper method of using many of the animal health products. This will include the proper implant sites and techniques for the various implants, where and how to administer vaccines and antibodies, administration of deworming products and the proper use of microbial products. The program will conclude with the necropsy of animals with various ailments to show relationship between the physical symptoms and pathology of various diseases.

It would be helpful if those Wheeler County producers planning to attend would contact Don King, County Extension Agent, at 826-5243 a couple of days before the clinic so those in charge of the clinic will know how many to plan on.

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


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MOBEETIE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

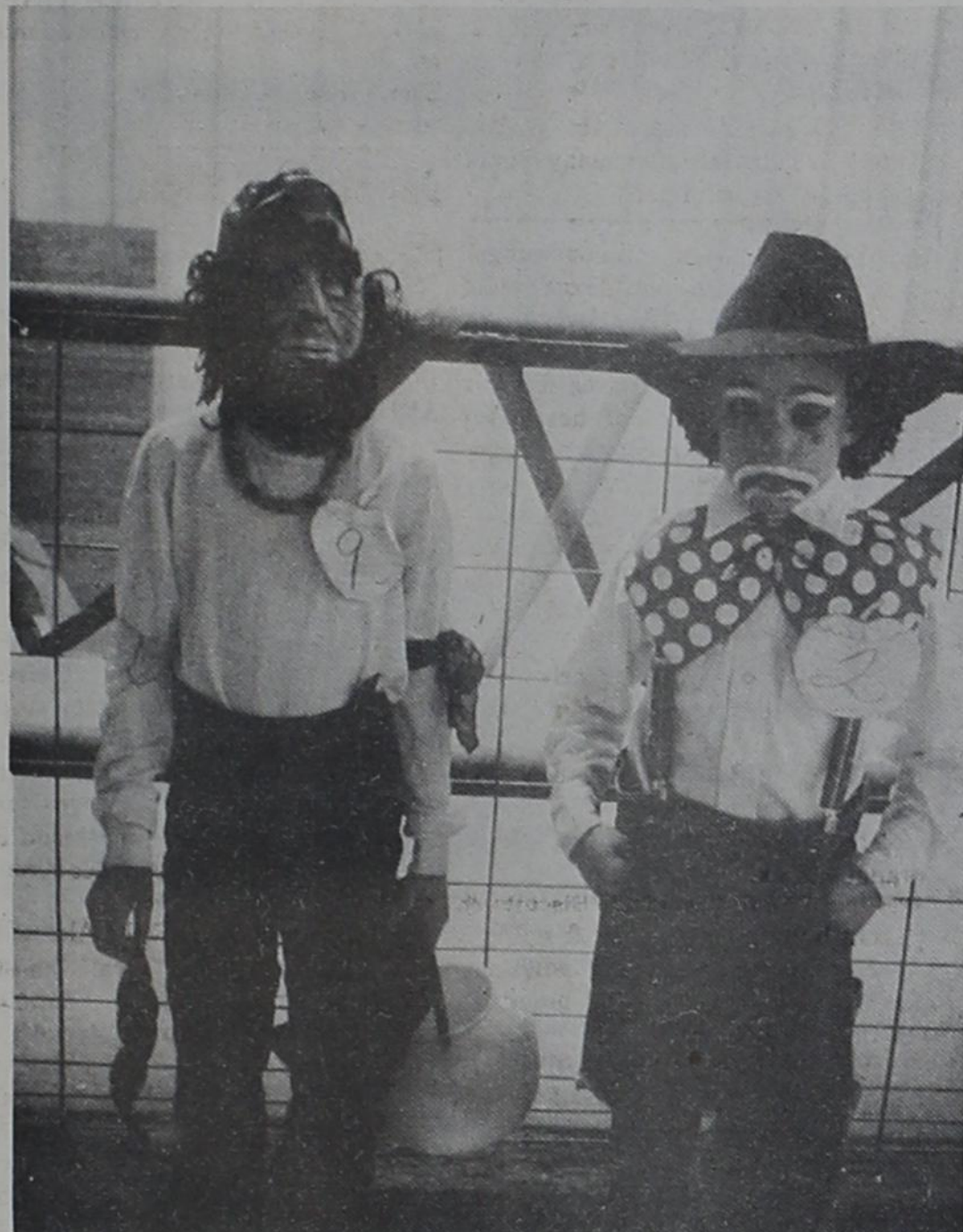

Public Forum To Be Conducted In Pampa

A public forum will be conducted in Pampa on Tuesday evening, November 5, 1985, at 7 p.m. at the M.K. Brown Auditorium. This meeting is designed to attract additional direct involvement into the Panhandle's famous oil and gas dispute.

Several statewide elected officials have been notified of the forum and have been invited to express their views on this subject. It seems that most everyone in the Southwestern United States is well aware of the "White Oil" issue. What they may not be aware of is the other controversy, involving liquid hydrocarbons and huge oil and gas companies, and billions of dollars, rather than millions.

It appears that mineral and royalty owners will have to deal with this problem in the future, and that's why this Panhandle wide meeting is being conducted.

It seems as though the Railroad Commission of Texas has become unable to adequately and properly deal with a multi-million dollar complex issue. The lack of the regulatory agency to deal with such an important issue in an unbiased and objective manner threatens the entire future of the Texas Panhandle immediately, and the long-term future of the State of Texas eventually.

The meeting is set for the M.K. Brown Auditorium in anticipation of a large crowd. It begins at 7 p.m. and will continue until such time as it appears invited speakers have had an opportunity to express their respective views on this subject.

As a matter of information, it has been estimated there are at least 600,000 identifiable royalty owners in Texas, many times with one identifiable owner representing many family members. This issue should warrant statewide attention during the 1986 political campaigns.

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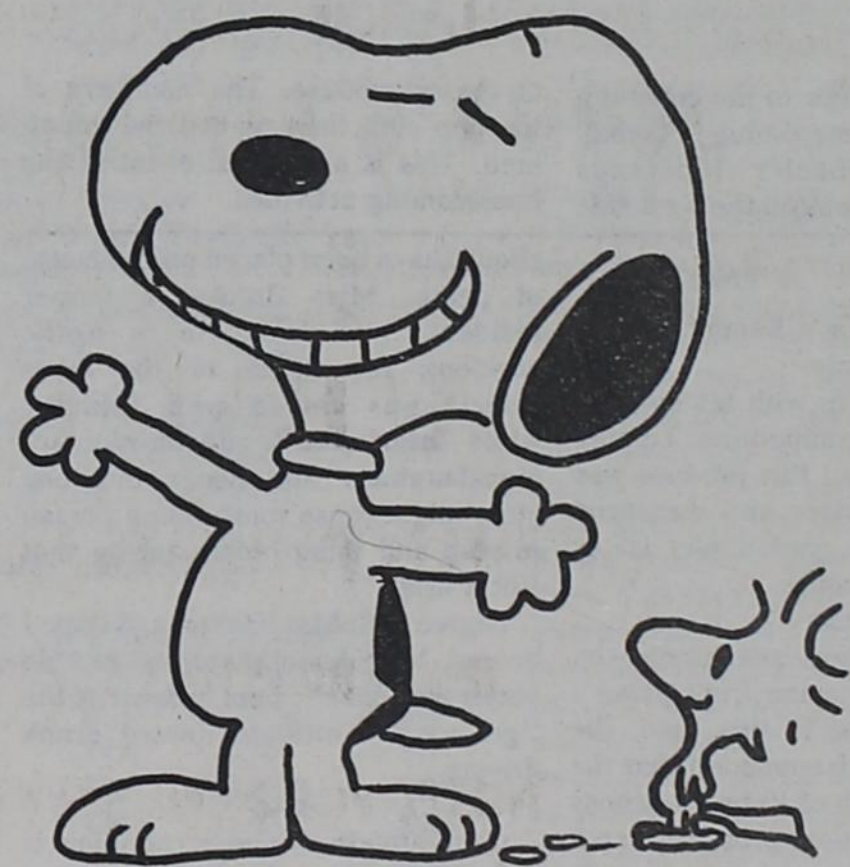
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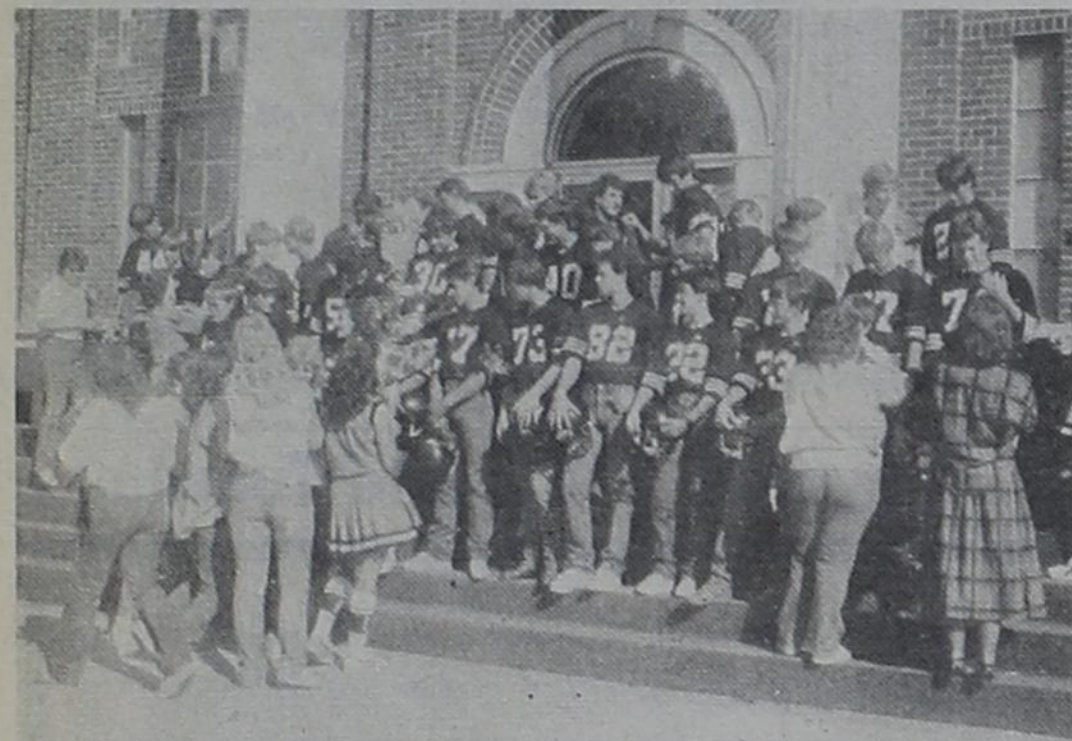

Cattle Producers Meeting Scheduled

Beef cattle producers in Wheeler County and the surrounding area will have an opportunity on Thursday, November 7, to get the latest information on supplementing the cow herd and feeding grain to wheat pasture cattle.

Dr. John McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will be in Wheeler to present a program to the Eastern Panhandle Cattleman's Club at 7:00 p.m. at Maxey's Steakhouse. This is an open meeting and non-members are invited to attend. The program will follow a "Dutch Treat" dinner. Those planning to attend are asked to contact Don King, Wheeler County Extension Agent, at 826-5243.

McNeil will show how to supplement cows during the winter to maintain body condition, have healthier calves, produce more milk, and breed more easily. The presentation will include information on saving money by feeding whole cottonseed.

Research has shown that feeding grain to stockers on wheat pasture can be a profitable practice, especially at today's prices. Dr. McNeill will give rations that can be fed to wheat pasture cattle and present information on other ways to increase gains.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.
