Let me put on the "Mayor's hat" for a paragraph or two.

The airport board met with the city council Monday evening at our regular meeting. The purpose of their being present was additional help in developing the new airport. Present also was Jimmy E. Bird of Elk City. The council was presented a list of five items needed at the airport—a water well, a septic system, fuel system, a manager and a phone; the cost was estimated to be some \$18,000.

The airstrip and lights were completed at a cost of \$470,996; the cost to the City of Wheeler was \$113,374. And, let's not forget the large number of hours of donated labor.

The question was "Do we leave the airstrip or make it an airport."

After much discussion, the council voted to allow the additional expenditure with the hope of seeing some return on the money already invested. A 80'x100' hanger will be built by Richard McIntire of Sweetwater; planes will be brought to the airport planes suitable for charter and air ambulance. Included in the hanger will be an office space for the city to use and restrooms. Mr. Bird is a qualified pilot, flying instructor and

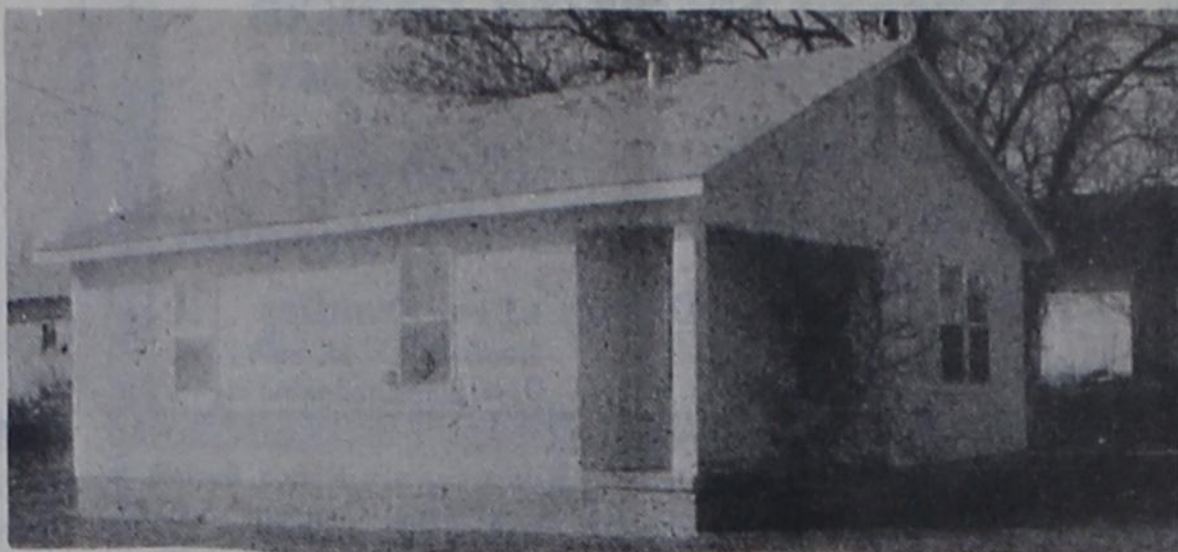

Signs Along Rural Roads To Be Registered

Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer of the Childress District of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, announced today that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected before Sept. 1, 1985, along a road outside an incorporated city or town in Texas is required by recent legislation to register the sign by December 30, 1985 or remove the sign. The new law is known as House Bill 1330 and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located. Mr. White stated that forms are available in the Childress District Office for use in registering a sign and that a form would be sent upon request. He also said that a \$25 nonrefundable fee is required with the filing of the registration application.

Mr. White pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or if the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the State.

In enacting House Bill 1330, the legislature also authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to regulate on-premise and off-premise signs which are erected after September 1, 1985. A permit for each sign is now required. Permit application forms are also available in the Childress District Office, Mr. White said.

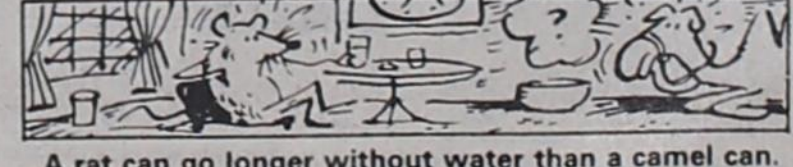

CHOOSING A SAVINGS OPTION

The variety of choices for savings accounts is perplexing or unknown to many consumers. Some consumers have chosen to stick with the product they know best—the passbook savings account. But by law, these accounts can earn no more than 5½ percent interest, which is well below today's current market rates.

Banks and savings loans currently offer passbook savings, certificates of deposit, money market deposit accounts, NOW accounts, and super NOW accounts. Credit unions make available similar accounts.

Choosing among savings options and institutions takes a little homework, but can be worth it. Here are seven factors to consider as you assess different savings options:

Yield. How much do I earn on my deposit? How is interest figured? Is the yield set at a fixed rate, or does it change with market rates?

Liquidity. To what extent are my funds available for withdrawal? Is there a penalty for early withdrawal? Am I limited in the number of times I can make withdrawals?

Safety. How safe is my deposit? Is it insured by an agency of the federal government, or by some other agency?

Minimum Deposit. What is the minimum deposit required to open and maintain the account? What is the minimum required to earn the maximum yield and avoid charges?

Convenience. How much trouble is it to open, maintain, and close the account? Can this be done by phone, correspondence, or bank machine?

Charges. Are there one-time or periodic service charges? Am I charged for each deposit or withdrawal?

Other Services. Does the account provide additional benefits such as check-writing privileges or the ability to transfer funds between accounts? The importance of each factor will vary from consumer to consumer. Before selecting a savings option and institution, ask yourself what you are looking for. If you decide that no one account meets all your needs, you may want to divide your funds among several accounts.
