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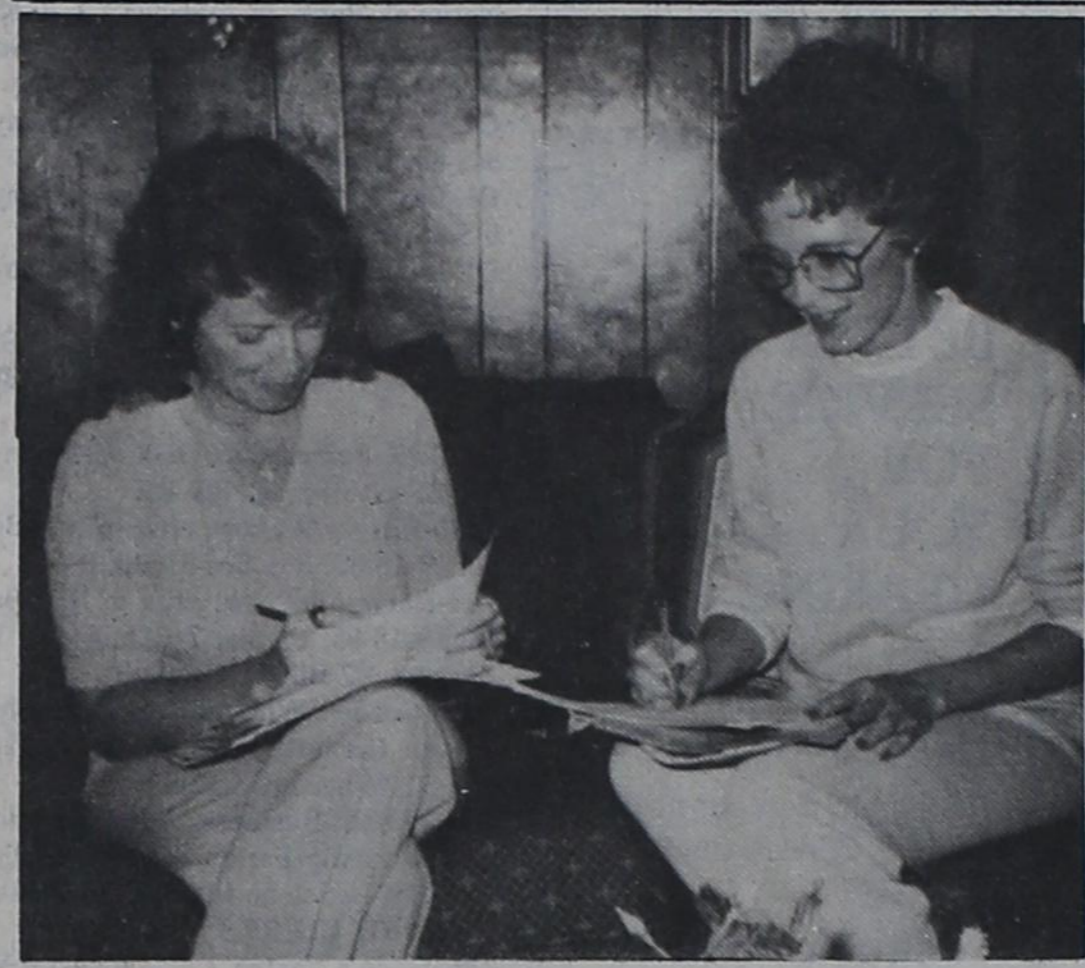

Grants Awarded For Development Fund

Governor Mark White today announced the awarding of 158 grants totaling \$40,228,984 under the Community Development Project Fund completion of the Texas Community Development Program. The awards are provided to local governments for public facilities and housing projects that primarily benefit persons of low and moderate income. The 158 projects were selected through a shared scoring system between the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TCDA) and Regional Review Committees appointed by the Governor in each of the 24 state planning regions. They were reviewed and approved by the State Community Development Review Committee as well. The state assumed responsibility for administering this program, formerly the Small Cities Community Block Grant Program, in June 1983. 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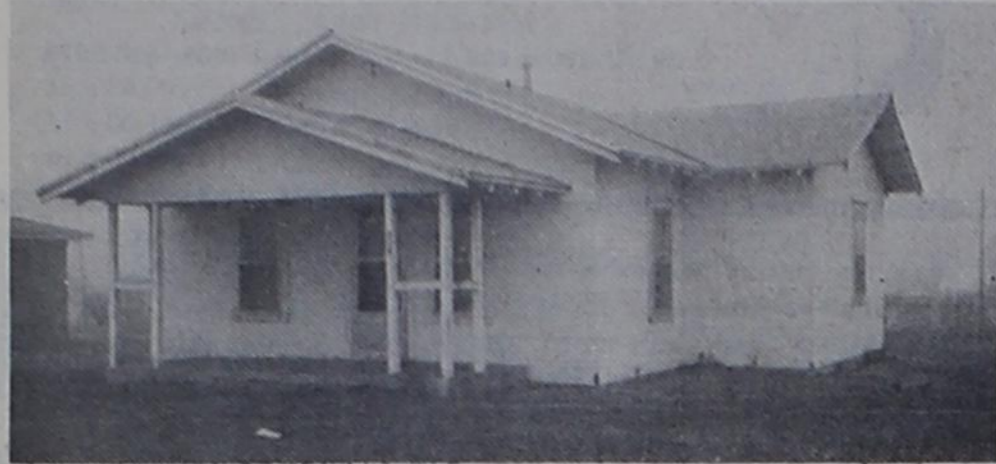

Wheeler County Evaluating Rangeland

Most of the rangeland in Wheeler County consists of warm season grasses. The amount of cool season grasses is insignificant. Towards the end of the growing season, it is a good idea to evaluate the grazing on rangeland. Select a primary or key species of grass to use yearly in evaluating the rangeland. The grass selected for evaluation should be palatable and abundant on the site. Sandy sites should have an abundance of Indiangrass, sand bluestem, little bluestem, switchgrass, and sideoats grama. One of these species is usually selected as a key species on sandy sites. Loamy or clay loam sites should have an abundance of sideoats grama, blue grama, and buffalo grass. One of these species should be selected as a key species.

After the key species has been determined, look at the cattle's use of the plant for the current year. A good rule of thumb for managing grass is to "take half and leave half" of the forage produced during the growing season. This will leave a substantial food supply for the plant to survive most winters and emerge in the spring. To determine when half of the plant has been used, select an ungrazed, typical plant of the key species. Cut the plant off even with the ground so that all the forage remains intact. Balance the plant on your finger. The amount of forage towards the bottom of the plant gives an indication of the amount that should be left. When more than half of the desirable grasses are removed from year to year, the vigor drops and less desirable grasses increase. The total production is reduced and the carrying capacity of the range decreases. With continued overgrazing, brush and weeds begin to dominate thus reducing the moisture available for grass production. If severe overgrazing is evident, livestock numbers should be reduced. If the range is drastically underused, the operator may consider increasing his herd. The personnel at the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler can assist you in determining the condition of your range. They can also help you design a grazing system in order to get more from the forage you now have.

In 1984 the state legislature passed an educational reform package which included fund distribution formulas that decreased greatly the support normally received from the state for support of the local educational system.

The combination of cuts in these two areas of finances has put the leadership of the local schools in a position in which they must cut programs and also request higher taxes from the local citizens.

"This increase in participation shows both the growing need for these activities and the result of outreach efforts by the state to make the program accessible to more communities."

Governor White also announced nine additional grants totaling \$4,613,131 in the first annual competition for Statewide Area Revitalization Funds, which enable local governments to provide housing assistance to low and moderate income households.
