

Wheeler After Win No. 6 Friday Against Follett

Owning District 1-1A's only perfect record for the season and one of the three unblemished marks of district teams, the Wheeler Mustangs hit the road for the second straight week this Friday night and the Follett Panthers will provide the opposition. Gruver and Groom hold the other perfect district records with each 2-0 to fall just behind the Mustangs 3-0 first place standing. Groom comes to challenge the Mustangs next week but have to hurdle the Claude Mustangs this week. Gruver plays host to the Blackhawks of Phillips who absorbed a convincing 34-6 whipping from Wheeler last week. The Panthers should prove no obstacle to the Mustangs but Wheeler knows that every club they face will give their best effort against the Mustangs. ONRUSHING MUSTANGS... DASH PHILLIPS HOPES, 34-6

The Wheeler Mustangs continued their relentless drive for the District 1-1A football championship as they dashed the hopes of the Phillips Blackhawks in Phillips to the tune of 34-6 last Friday night. What hopes the Blackhawks had of an upset of the state's fourth ranked team in Class A went down the tube in

the third quarter as the Mustangs put two touchdowns on the scoreboard to add to their 13-0 halftime lead and go up by a commanding 27-0 margin that put the game out of reach going into the final period. The defensive front of the Blackhawks concerned the Mustangs coaching staff before the game so the

Mustangs chose to challenge the Phillips strength and they pounded out 313 yards on the ground with Toby Collins and Dickie Salyer each gaining over 140 yards on 19 carries a piece. It appeared that the Mustangs slacked off defensively midway of the second quarter and the Blackhawks had a chance to get right back in the

game as they drove from their 20 to the Wheeler 33 but Robert Andis killed the threat with a pass interception at the Mustangs 18 two plays before halftime. Andis' interception was one of three for the Mustangs secondary and continued their string of having **Continued Page 8**

Thriftway Marks 8th Anniversary

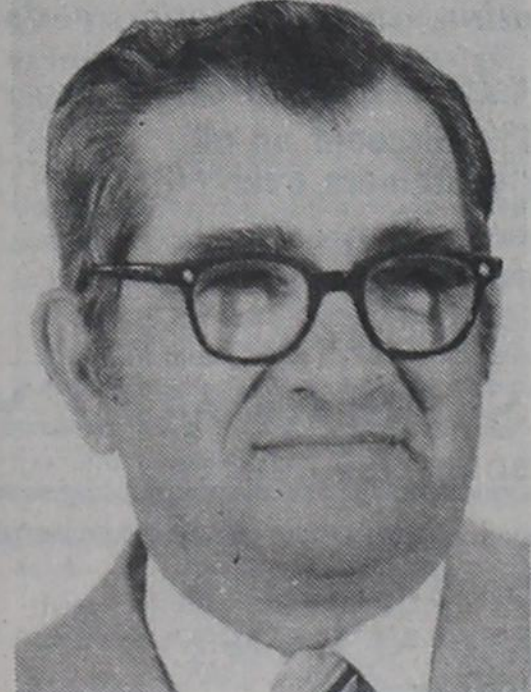
