Mobeetie Receives Water Well Grant

Mobeetie was very proud when they received the water well grant for a back up well to the one now in use. Mobeetie's request was ranked second in the P.R.P.C. competition and 8th in the state. Mobeetie must now wait for official confirmation from the governor before they can start on the

Mayor Leona House said the town will receive a grant of \$182,000 from the Texas Department of Community Affairs which will go to build the back

The wells were awarded on a competative point basis on the following three categories: the need for the project, the number of low income residents in the area, and the percentage of minorities in the area.

Communities seeking grants must first go through regional competition in this area. The Texas Regional Planning Competition where they receive a number of points then on to state T.D.C.A. competition in Austin.





Aggies lead nation in repayment of federal student loans

COLLEGE STATION — Texas A&M University graduates have compiled one of the best records in the nation for repaying federally insured student loans, so they will be among the least affected by the federal government's move to block income tax refunds to former collegians who have defaulted on such obligations.

Taft E. Benson, director of Texas A&M's student financial aid program, said studies in recent years have traditionally shown that Texas A&M's loan default rate is among the lowest nationally and the best in Texas.

He said the most recent figures compiled by the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan (TGSLC) Corp. show that Texas A&M's default rate is 1.29 percent, while the state average is about three times as high at 4.4 percent.





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

This old rock building stood on the school grounds in Old Mobeetie. It was built one year before the jail. Dolly mentioned that the partitions were only part way to the ceiling.

The next building that housed school children in Old Mobeetie was a two story, four room building on the same school ground. Gazelle Patterson says that she started to school her in 1919 and that was the building where she attended classes. Grade school was downstairs and junior high and high school up stairs. Gazelle and Dolly say that the rock building was then used as an auditorium.

In 1923 the four room building was condemmed and the school term was finished in the rock building and the Methodist Church. During the summer of 1923 both the four room and the rock buildings were torn down and the building that now stands in Old Mobeetie was built.

As smaller schools consolidated with Mobeetie School and more room was needed, the high school was moved to a new building in New Mobeetie, about 1930. As more room was needed for grade school a government building was moved to the school ground in Old Mobeetie to provide a two room annex. During the summer of 1982 she worked at a nursing home in her home town and attended Pratt Community




