· McClellan Waiting For Dream To Happen

If Billie McClellan believed in good fairies she might hope one would drop a

small fortune to fund a project very special to her.

But faced with reality, she goes about finding money to build an all-faith's chapel at Brenham State School in a more conventional way.

"That's what you might call my crusade," says McClellan, who says the greatest honor bestowed her has been being named to the building committee at the state school.

And the day ground is broken for the church will be a high point, she says. McClellan began volunteer work for the school about five years ago. Today she is vice chairwoman for Region IV of the Volunteer Services State

Her one-year term will be up in October, but the nominating committee has already approached her about serving again.

"I've spent almost the whole first year just learning the terminology," she says.

Her position on the state council requires travel to the 10 facilities - state schools, state hospitals and mental health/mental retardation centers in Austin, Brenham, Bryan, Mexia, Temple and Waco. It also frequently takes her to Austin for meetings with legislators, in an effort to convince them of the needs of these facilities.

One of the greatest needs at Brenham State School, but one which the state will not finance, is the chapel.

"I have seen the value of this type of facility at other places," McClellan says, who has worked at other state facilities in Texas. "We need it for our clients, for their normalization process.

"I have seen distraught families come in and find comfort in the chapel. They go there to worship, to cry.

"And that has made an indelible impression on me."

The site chosen for the Brenham chapel is a good one, McClellan feels. On a slight hill and very visible as one approaches and leaves the campus, she believes it will make as much of an inward impression as an external

The reality of the building is still a long way off. It is estimated to cost about \$750,000, but only about \$200,000 has been raised.

"Unlike some other efforts, we can't borrow the money - get grants or loans, 'she says. "We have to have every penny in escrow before we can even break ground.

The tund-raising was begun more than a year ago and in all nonesty McClellan expected the goal to be reached by now.

"Ours is the newest and the most outstanding school in the state," she says. "I can't conceive of us not having a chapel.

"It doesn't help our statewide reputation."

She says she did expect local people to rally around the cause because "I den't see it as a state facility aside from Brenham but rather as a part of the

I thought this would be something everybody would want," she adds. But while she is disappointed, she's not disheartened and expects her dream will come in due time.

Joan Derrick, the school's volunteer coordinater, has been contacting the

corporate sector for contributions.

"And she's doing a great job," says McClellan, who meanwhile is continually on the lookout during her travels around the state for someone who may be interested in making a contribution.

Since she is not new to state work, she has made a number of contacts during the years. A teacher/counselor by trade, McClellan started out in public schools, working in Texas and in Michigan.

A native of the Texas Panhandle, originally from the small town of Wheeler, she comes from a family of teachers and ranchers.

"Boots and books, those are my interests," she says.

After several years in the public schools, she decided she wanted to go into rehabilitative work and first taught remedial reading to 12- through 17-yearolds at Gatesville School for Boys. When that school was closed six years ago, many of the boys and the teachers were transferred to Giddings State School. She was among them.

When she began limiting her work there to part time, she volunteered her extra time to Brenham State School.

Two of her primary duties at the school, outside her state job, are working as a personal advocate for clients and serving as the public responsibility member of a committee that works for the protection of clients and staff.

She explains, as a personal advocate she represents clients in the absence of parents, particularly during client staffings. Annually, all the personnel who are involved with the care of each client is called in for an evaluation

"Sometimes the parents can't or won't attend, so I'm there in their place," McClellan explains.

Her committee work is under the direction of Dr. Frank Wells, who she praises highly for his work in the area of the personal safety of clients and staff.

She commends the entire staff for its work.

"I have worked with many in Texas and Michigan and there are none better than the people here," she says. "The direct care people really care." Away from the job, McClellan does enjoy some relaxing moments through

music, drama and sports. "I'm a great sports enthusiast, and I really enjoy music and drama," she says. "I always say it's my hidden dream to direct the Morman Tabernacle

She also enjoys attending a football, baseball or basketball game, and as a fan of the outdoors, she misses ranching life.

But her real love is for people and doing things for them, which is evident when one hears what her favorite "hobby" is.

"I love finding scholarships and jobs for young people," she says. "I just

love to do it. "It's really one of my favorite hobbies, if that's a hobby."

Her concern for people is also evidenced in her retirement ambition. "Oh, I have lots of dreams, but one is to retire and open a boys ranch in

DON'T LEAVE TOWN WITHOUT YOUR PUBLIC LIBRARY CARD


Don't leave town without your public library card! If you hold a library card at any one of nineteen public libraries in the Texas Panhandle you have borrowing privileges in 28 different locations. The libraries participate in the reciprocal borrowing program of the Texas Panhandle library system.

Reciprocal borrowing means that library patrons from Memphis to Amarillo, Canyon to Stratford and Dimmitt to Spearman can check out printed materials at any of the participating libraries. Not only does the program, initiated in 1973, mean the convenience of obtaining reading material when you are away from home, but it also opens the door to a vast pool of reading material-books in twenty five different towns----yours to borrow with a single library card. The only stipulation is that the borrower abide by the rules the lending library applies to its own patrons.

As word has spread during the 12 years since the reciprocal borrowing program was established, the popularity of this added service has grown. The availability of all types of reading materials including fiction, non-fiction, mysteries and children's books is made possible through the continuing cooperation of the member libraries of the Texas Panhandle Library System.

On some bills, you'll need to calculate the due date from the billing date. If your payment dosen't arrive prior to the due date, then you may have to pay additional interest.

Many bills, such as some travel and entertainment cards, do not have any grace period. Others, like utility bills, may have one amount if paid by a certain date and a late fee if paid after that date. To avoid late fees and possibly being reported to the credit reporting agency for late payment, always pay the bills by the due date.

Establish A Dead **Litter Cover**

Many landowners and operators insurance and taxes, can be a problem will be seeding grass next spring. It is time to prepare for planting. Most species of grass need a litter cover for Use your calendar or computer to establishment. A litter cover helps to provide protection against wind erosion and helps to conserve moisture for the young seedlings. Some of the land to be seeded already has a haygrazer crop. This can be used as a litter cover for next year. Make a notation on your calendar Leave the stubble as it is. Weeds can about occasional bills that will be due be controlled by spraying, which is in each month so that the total amount usually cheaper than plowing. Also, plowing would destroy some of the existing litter.

Another crop used as a litter cover is small grain such as wheat. Wheat can be used for winter grazing as well as a wer crop. The problem with wheat and other small grains is that grass seedlings are germinating and emerging. At this stage the small grain is a weed that robs moisture from the young seedling. Small grain should be grazed heavily after the grass is seeded to remove most of the competition. When the grass begins to come up, all livestock should be removed. Herbicides such as Roundup or Banvel can be applied with a rope wick to control wheat and other weeds that might compete with emerging grass. Care should be taken to avoid getting herbicide on the young

Leave Some Brush For Wildlife

Brush is an important habitat component for most wildlife species in Texas. Total brush removal will harm more wildlife species than it will benefit, but excessive brush reduces valuable habitat components such as forbs and grasses. Brush also comnesting habitat and winter food. Properly designed brush patterns coupled with proper grazing by livestock will provide excellent habitat for

Many people nowadays purchase land with trees and brush to enjoy the wildlife, either by hunting or observation. For these potential buyers, landowners can reduce the market value of their property by total brush removal. Other landowners want their place to have a clean, manicured appearance. Taller trees are trimmed, smaller brush is removed, fence rows are cleaned, weed control herbicides are applied, and pastures are kept short. Ironically, the wildlife habitat value is decreased if these practices are not carried out properly.

Soil Conservation Service personnel at Wheeler assist landowners and operators through the local Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District in designing brush patterns, grazing systems, and weed control programs that will benefit wildlife and livestock. Technical guidance biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department can also help design brush patterns and develop wildlife management plans.

Pecan Scab-This fungal disease attacks leaves, stems and nuts. Infected nuts develop lesions that are dark brown or black and range in size from that of a pinhead to that of a match head. If infected with pecan scab in early summer, the nuts will drop prematurely. Infections that occur later in the summer will cause the pecans that form to be of poor quality. Leafspots-Many types of leafleaves to drop to the ground. Pecan spots occur on pecans and can scab can be controlled with fungi- cause premature defoliation. They usually are controlled with the same fungicides used for pecan scab.

Hypoxylon Canker-One of the

major causes of tree death, hypoxylon canker is identified by signs of die-back and the formation of black cankers on the main scaffold and trunk of the tree. This disease usually attacks trees suffering from moisture stress and usually can be prevented through good cultural

Kernel Decay-Caused by several different bacteria, kernel decay can be partially controlled with fungicides. This condition usually develops if the pecans are allowed to lay on wet grass after falling or if they're not properly stored. Dry pecans after harvest and keep in a well-ventilated area.
