COUNTY ALL-STAR GIRLS WIN 12 & UNDER TOURNEY

CONGRATULATIONS!!! To 14 young ladies ages 9-12 years who represented north Wheeler County Texas at a 12 & under girls softball tournament in Elk City, OK. The All-Star team was picked from all four teams in the Wheeler Co. Girls Softball League. Base Busters and Riley's Rascals from Wheeler, Briscoe and Kelton were all represented. The spectators, coaches and players all displayed outstanding sportsmanship! The girls showed us all how team cooperation and team spirit of working and pulling together could bring them out on top! After only 2 practices together, our team went to Elk City on Wed., August 7th to play their first two games. For those who haven't been to the Elk City ballparks; they have a softball complex which consists of two lighted regulation size fields, concession, restrooms, covered bleachers, etc. which is owned, operated and maintained by the Softball Assoc. in Elk City. The fields were beautiful, the umpiring was excellent and every little girl had her name announced each time she came up to bat or was on-deck over a loud speaker. Several different youth programs, All-Star softball and All-Star baseball tournaments are put on at these fields because they are such nice facilities and well organized.

The girls won their first two games on Wed. and therefore moved through the winners bracket and went back to play on Thursday night August 8th. The girls knew going over they were undefeated and would be able to play at least two more games, since the tournament was double-elimination. The only thing they didn't know was that at 7:50 Thursday evening it was going to be 95 degrees in the shade and that they were going to play the best team in Elk City! After 5 innings of play with several outstanding defensive plays and a lot of good base running, the All-Stars pulled out a win. This gave them a one game rest break while the team they defeated had to play another game.

Then came the championship play-off games. Elk City's little girl league champions, (who had won their league for the last 3 years) against our All-Stars. It's 9:20 at night, the temp. is down, the humidity is up and the stands are packed with screaming, excited parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and about 50 other proud Texans.

After 5 close nerve racking innings of 3 up and 3 down, excellent throws and outstanding catches; a one point lead for them; then a one point lead for us; then they pulled out a perfect single hit with bases loaded to score 2 runs and beat our team by 1 run in the bottom of the fifth.

This gives each team one loss each—therefore you play what is called an "if needed" game. The same two teams take a deep breath, pull themselves up by their shoe strings and play another game.

It's now 11:00 p.m., the All-Stars are taking the field for the third time in the same night against the same team. This will be their fifth game in two nights; more ballgames in two days than most of these girls had played all summer. The temp. is down, but the excitement and the tension is up: the spectators are on

their feet. The All-Stars lose the toss, so Elk City takes the field and our girls are up to bat. After a "pep-talk" from the coaches and parents: our girls step-up to bat and bat around the lineup, score 7-0 bottom of the first. Our girls take the field. With outstanding pitching by Mique Snelgrooves and perfect defensive plays our girls takem 3 up and 3 down. Second inning our girls are up to bat 3 more runs, it's now 10, zip. Bottom of the second inning our girls takem again 3 up and 3 down. By this time it's almost 11:30 p.m., half the spectators have lost their voices from yelling. The daddies are busting the buttons off their shirts with pride. The mommies are jumping and cheerleading like they did in high school. The third inning they got 4 runs, but our girls came back and batted around again with some "super-hits" which gave us a 20-4 lead with no way for them to catch up, the game was over and our little All-Stars had beat' em all! Each little girl's name was called over the P.A., each one went up to home-plate and was awarded an individual trophy. The girls displayed outstanding sportsmanship to each other as team members and to the other team. The coaches, Sue Ann Stiles and Thana Riley did a super job helping and encouraging the girls. We have been invited to join Elk City's league next year. 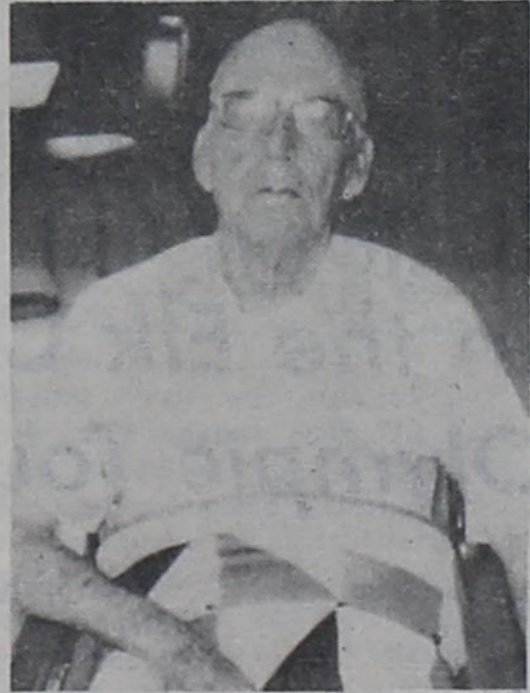

 Dangerous—chemical. Cigarette smoking—Carbon Monoxide, Cyanide, Acrolein and others—Parkview Hospital.
 Why is this permitted in our Hospital and Care Center by the Administrator, Doctors, some nurses, some members of the Board of Directors, and some council members?
 We do know that chemicals (carbon monoxide, acrolein, cyanide, and many other chemicals in tobacco and cigarette smoke) do kill. I think the citizens would like to know how we can support a hospital that keeps blowing these chemicals out into the lungs of sick and dying people. It sounds like quackery.
 I don't blame people for going to a clean-air hospital and being respected by the management, doctors and some nurses and having a clean environment. I can not recommend administrators, doctors, nurses, bookkeepers, and Board-directors that allow this kind of management.
 Why do we keep violating Federal regulations such as on May 17, 1985 concerning the right of sick people in our hospital and Care Center? We do have a right to speak out.
 I would be happy to report a clean environment in our hospital to all Health Departments I have contacted. I will be glad to talk to anyone or all people concerned in this smoking problem!

(Editor's Note: The chemicals mentioned above do exist in cigarette smoke. What the letter does not mention is the amount of each of the chemicals and how many cigarettes would be needed to cause problems. To get an idea of the amount of the chemicals involved in cigarette smoke, I called the local science teacher, Dan Stewart.
 Carbon Monoxide is the incomplete combustion of carbon in the paper and tobacco in a cigarette; in a matter of seconds this converts to carbon dioxide in the air. For the carbon monoxide to have an affect on the non smoker, one would have to lean over the cigarette and inhale the smoke.
 Three to four cartons of cigarettes burning at one time in a very small enclosed room might, just might kill a rat.
 Damage, if any, to the lungs of a non smoker, caused by being around cigarette smoke would heal overnight.
 Mr. Lester is to be admired for taking a stand for what he believes in, but it is my belief that Parkview Hospital is an excellent facility and the health of the patients is not being jeopardized by cigarette smoke.)

McClellan Waiting For Dream To Happen

If Billie McClellan believed in good fairies she might hope one would drop a small fortune to fund a project very special to her.

But faced with reality, she goes about finding money to build an all-faiths chapel at Brenham State School in a more conventional way.

"That's what you might call my crusade," says McClellan, who says the greatest honor bestowed her has been being named to the building committee at the state school.

And the day ground is broken for the church will be a high point, she says. McClellan began volunteer work for the school about five years ago. Today she is vice chairwoman for Region IV of the Volunteer Services State Council.

Her one-year term will be up in October, but the nominating committee has already approached her about serving again.

"I've spent almost the whole first year just learning the terminology," she says.

Her position on the state council requires travel to the 10 facilities — state schools, state hospitals and mental health/mental retardation centers in Austin, Brenham, Bryan, Mexia, Temple and Waco. It also frequently takes her to Austin for meetings with legislators, in an effort to convince them of the needs of these facilities.

One of the greatest needs at Brenham State School, but one which the state will not finance, is the chapel.

"I have seen the value of this type of facility at other places," McClellan says, who has worked at other state facilities in Texas. "We need it for our clients, for their normalization process."

"I have seen distraught families come in and find comfort in the chapel. They go there to worship, to cry."

"And that has made an indelible impression on me."

The site chosen for the Brenham chapel is a good one, McClellan feels.

On a slight hill and very visible as one approaches and leaves the campus, she believes it will make as much of an inward impression as an external one.

The reality of the building is still a long way off. It is estimated to cost about \$750,000, but only about \$200,000 has been raised.

"Unlike some other efforts, we can't borrow the money — get grants or loans," she says. "We have to have every penny in escrow before we can even break ground."

The fund-raising was begun more than a year ago and in all honesty McClellan expected the goal to be reached by now.

"Ours is the newest and the most outstanding school in the state," she says. "I can't conceive of us not having a chapel."

"It doesn't help our statewide reputation."

She says she did expect local people to rally around the cause because "I don't see it as a state facility aside from Brenham but rather as a part of the community."

"I thought this would be something everybody would want," she adds. But while she is disappointed, she's not disheartened and expects her dream will come in due time.

Joan Derrick, the school's volunteer coordinator, has been contacting the

corporate sector for contributions.

"And she's doing a great job," says McClellan, who meanwhile is continually on the lookout during her travels around the state for someone who may be interested in making a contribution.

Since she is not new to state work, she has made a number of contacts during the years. A teacher/counselor by trade, McClellan started out in public schools, working in Texas and in Michigan.

A native of the Texas Panhandle, originally from the small town of Wheeler, she comes from a family of teachers and ranchers.

"Boots and books, those are my interests," she says.

After several years in the public schools, she decided she wanted to go into rehabilitative work and first taught remedial reading to 12- through 17-year-olds at Gatesville School for Boys. When that school was closed six years ago, many of the boys and the teachers were transferred to Giddings State School. She was among them.

When she began limiting her work there to part time, she volunteered her extra time to Brenham State School.

Two of her primary duties at the school, outside her state job, are working as a personal advocate for clients and serving as the public responsibility member of a committee that works for the protection of clients and staff.

She explains, as a personal advocate she represents clients in the absence of parents, particularly during client staffings. Annually, all the personnel who are involved with the care of each client is called in for an evaluation meeting.

"Sometimes the parents can't or won't attend, so I'm there in their place," McClellan explains.

Her committee work is under the direction of Dr. Frank Wells, who she praises highly for his work in the area of the personal safety of clients and staff.

She commends the entire staff for its work.

"I have worked with many in Texas and Michigan and there are none better than the people here," she says. "The direct care people really care."

Away from the job, McClellan does enjoy some relaxing moments through music, drama and sports.

"I'm a great sports enthusiast, and I really enjoy music and drama," she says. "I always say it's my hidden dream to direct the Mormon Tabernacle Choir."

She also enjoys attending a football, baseball or basketball game, and as a fan of the outdoors, she misses ranching life.

But her real love is for people and doing things for them, which is evident when one hears what her favorite "hobby" is.

"I love finding scholarships and jobs for young people," she says. "I just love to do it."

"It's really one of my favorite hobbies, if that's a hobby."

Her concern for people is also evidenced in her retirement ambition.

"Oh, I have lots of dreams, but one is to retire and open a boys ranch in Colorado," she says.

But before that happens she wants to see her dream of the chapel become reality.

"The legislators say they want more clients to be returned to the

community," she says. "They want them trained so they can function in the community."

"A spiritual training is a part of that."

Reciprocal borrowing means that library patrons from Memphis to Amarillo, Canyon to Stratford and Dimmitt to Spearman can check out printed materials at any of the participating libraries. Not only does the program, initiated in 1973, mean the convenience of obtaining reading material when you are away from home, but it also opens the door to a vast pool of reading material-books in twenty five different towns---yours to borrow with a single library card. The only stipulation is that the borrower abide by the rules the lending library applies to its own patrons.

As word has spread during the 12 years since the reciprocal borrowing program was established, the popularity of this added service has grown. The availability of all types of reading materials including fiction, non-fiction, mysteries and children's books is made possible through the continuing cooperation of the member libraries of the Texas Panhandle Library System.
